Harun, who was at the peak of his power around 800, was also the most colorful figure in this dynasty--so much so that he is featured in several tales of the Arabian Nights.

<sup>2</sup>For about two decades the Persian Barmecide (Barmekid) family provided viziers, counselors, and scribes for the Abbasid caliphate. Harun Reşid's grand vizier was Cafer (Jafar) Barmecide. By then the Barmecides had acquired so much power in the Abbasid caliphate that they posed a threat to the dynasty. Harun Reşit had the family exterminated; Cafer was executed in 803.
