LUBBOCK--The songs and dance of Elizabethan England will be played in a lecture at 11 a.m. Tuesday (April 7) at The Museum of Texas Tech University.

Texas Tech music Professor Paul F. Cutter will discuss and play audio recordings of the kinds of music popular in 16th century England during the weekly art seminar sponsored by the Women's Council of the West Texas Museum Association (WTMA).

Registration and coffee for the lecture, which is the last for the spring, begin at 10:30 a.m. Admission is \$3.

Dr. Cutter will describe the kinds of vocal music, including solo ayres, madrigal and ballett, and instrumental music, including dances, sets of variations and instrumental arrangements of songs.

Cutter said dance was a favorite pastime of the Elizabethan English people.

The lecture is part of "Art through the Ages," the 26th year of art seminars held by the Women's Council. This spring the seminar has been a study of the Renaissance in Spain and England.

LUBBOCK--Heather Huszti, a psychology doctoral student from Irvine, Calif., has received the first Maxey Scholarship given by the Texas Tech Department of Psychology.

The \$200 scholarship was established in memory of the late Robert E. Maxey by his daughter, Marcia Abbott, an adjunct faculty member of the Psychology Department.

Huszti is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph B. Huszti, 22 Curie Court, Irvine, Calif. She is working on her dissertation and plans to graduate in August. She is administering a grant to reduce the psychosocial stressors of HIV infection, the AIDS virus, at Oklahoma Children's Memorial Hospital in Oklahoma City, Okla. Her undergraduate degree is from the University of California-Irvine.

The scholarship will be given annually to an advanced student in clinical psychology. A departmental committee will make selections.

Maxey, who died in 1968, served on the Texas Tech Board of Directors, now the Board of Regents, for several years, beginning in 1955. He was involved in the Red Raider Club and Ex-Students Association.

He was a student at Texas Tech for several years before earning a degree in architecture from the University of Texas in 1934. He operated Robert E. Maxey Construction Co. until 1953 and was later involved in oil production, investments, real estate and banking.

Dr. Abbott, a private practice psychologist in Lubbock and director of psychological services at Charter Plains Hospital, received her doctoral degree from the California School of Professional Psychology, San Diego, in 1979.

Kathleen Maxey Luther, Maxey's widow, lives at 3201-B 65th St., Lubbock.

LUBBOCK--Five distinguished alumni will be honored during Home Economics Awareness Week at a luncheon April 9 in the University Center Ballroom at Texas Tech University.

Receiving the honor are Maxine Wiese Blankenship of Lubbock, Catherine Barnett Crawford of Lubbock, Thomas A. Milholland of Abilene, Jean McLaughlin Kahle of Fort Worth and Quepha Rawls of Lubbock.

Blankenship, a 1946 graduate of clothing and textiles, was named A Pathfinder of Lubbock in 1984 for contributions as the first chairwoman of both the Texas Historical Commission and the Lubbock County Historical Commission. For her service to the West Texas Museum Association (WTMA) and the Women's Council, she received in 1976 the prestigious WTMA Action Award. She is an executive board member of the Ranching Heritage Association and was involved in the Barton House interiors project. She also is active in the Home Economics Dean's Advisory Council, Lubbock Cultural Affairs Council, Lubbock Arts Festival, Community Jubilee '75 Committee and the YMCA.

Crawford, named the 1987 Home Economist of the Year by the Texas Home Economics Association (THEA), serves as district extension director for home economics for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. She also served as president of THEA. She was the 1977 recipient of the Texas Superior Service Award and has won other awards from Epsilon Sigma Phi, the Professional Agricultural Workers of Texas and the Association of Extension 4-H Agents. Crawford also holds three degrees in home economics education from Texas Tech.

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A 1979 doctoral graduate in family studies from Texas Tech, Milholland is assistant director of the Marriage and Family Institute of Abilene Christian University. He is a clinical member and approved supervisor of the American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy, serves as editor of Contact, the newsletter of the Texas Association for Marriage and Family Therapy, and is a board member for the Texas Council on Family Relations. Milholland is the author of Bringing Out the Best in Your Husband, Stepfamilies and Marital Prescriptions.

Kahle is the first College of Home Economics graduate to serve on the Boards of Regents of Texas Tech University and the Health Sciences Center. She is past president of the Diamond M Foundation. The first chairwoman of the Home Economics Dean's Advisory Council for Development, Kahle has made substantial endowments and contributions to the College of Home Economics and Ranching Heritage Center. A 1944 graduate in food and nutrition and president of Phi Upsilon Omicron, she received the 1981 Ex-Students Association Distinguished Alumna award. With a history of community service in Midland, Abilene, Austin and Fort Worth, she is an advocate for art museums, schools, churches, and mental health and rehabilitation.

Rawls is an interior designer and president of Design Today Inc. and Antiques Lubbock. Her designs have included residences, hospitals, universities, businesses and show homes including a first-place citation by Better Homes and Gardens. She designed and marketed a line of furniture and wood collages and is skilled in jewelry, wood turning and painting. She has taught in the public schools, at Texas Tech and in senior citizens community courses. A 1948 graduate of Texas Tech, she earned a master's degree in 1951 in design at Texas Woman's University.
