Our comrade enlisted in 1861 in the ~~XXXXXX~~ ²⁰ Texas ~~infantry~~ ^{Cavalry}
and ~~served~~ ^{served} faithfully in the Transmiss department throughout the war, having participated in as many as nineteen battles with his command, first in the Indian Territory and then with his regiment in the principle battles on this side of the river. For a long while his health was such that he could not labor and at one time was an inmate of the Home at Austin but more than a year ago was at his own request discharged from it and had drawn his first pension ^{quarter} last April under the provision of our pension law when death came upon him suddenly from heart disease. He leaves sons and daughters some of whom live here and some in the western portion of the state to mourn his loss.

Therefore be it resolved by this camp that we mourn the loss of our departed comrade and extend to the bereaved relatives our most heart felt sympathies in their great distress.
