The remainder of the questionnaire would in the case of ptate legislators, the governor etc. center around the active list of state items to be adopted by the convention. This board could recommend to the next board that the new state officers (1) obtain pufficient congressional questronnaire (2) obtain through Mrs Strong of Audin the complete list of candidates for national and state offices to be filled.

The resignation of Mrs. William P. Hobby as legislative chairman and chairman of the department of government and its operation was accepted with regret.



The Treasurer's report was read. (See attached)

The Treasurer reported that she had received a bill of \$1.75 for storage on the furniture in El Pase. The President was instructed to write the storage sampany tolling them to dispose of the furniture, as no further bills would be paid.

Mrs. Cade moved that the Treasurer be instructed to send \$200.00 to the National League of Women Voters at once in payment of dues. The President reported:

Poll Tax campaign activities in each of the local leagues.

The Dallas League participated in a bond issue compaiga, giving talks over the radio.

The Salveston League had interested themselves in an effort to keep the City Commission from granting an unfair gas franchise and reduction in electric rates, and had been largely instrumental in securing the appointment of a Zening Commission.

The President alse reported the receipt from the National League of the proposed programs for 1928-1929, in their first draft, the Veters Service publicity. (Broadcasting on current issues and affeirs of Seagross every Tuesday evening at six) She reported seven letters to all locals and much larger correspondence with several in helping them with local league problems.

Mrs. Ayres reserted as Living Costs Chairman. In appreving the proposed National program for the department she reported that with the acvice of the President she had disapproved the item relating to the work of the Department of Agriculture, saying that reports of this Department had cost the South several million dellars.

Frs. Ames reported as Legal Status of Wemen Chairman. She read recommendations for changes in her department program, favoring the case from Miss Coleman of New York, recommending that age of consent be put with shill welfare program, that many other items be grouped under a resqueend tien for a demestic relations court.

of the recommended program, but offering no suggestions for changes. She reported two new publications from the National, a pamphlet on texation by Miss Rocca, which was exceedingly readable, and one on Nominating methods. She reported the work of the Galveston study group, which will take up Raymond Noley's Outline of Sovernment (published by the National League), each member of the class owning a copy and preparing for the discussion. Smaller group is growing out of this class to study the primary.

Mrs. Ames recommended that Mrs. Porter secure a group in each local league to inform themselves on the primary and make the women of Texas understand that a return to the convention will not only mean negro disenfranchisement in Texas but the disenfranchisement of white women as well.

Mrs. Ames moved that Mrs. Porter concentrate the work of her Committees on the machinery of government as it affects the women voter in Texas. Seconded and carried.

It was recommended that each local league be encouraged to hold a one day citizenship school on the machinery of government.

Mrs. Moss reported as Chairman of Women in Industry.

The program of work from January 1st to August 1st was discussed and voted upon:

- I Poll Tax campaign to January 31st.
- It was voted voted, on motion of Mrs. Porter, and seconded by Mrs.

 Ames, that Mrs. Ames as Legal Status of Women and Legislative
 Chairman:
 - a. Secure a Legal Status Committee in the State, composed of a Chairman in each of the five active leagues and a key woman from each of the 150 legislative districts in the State.
 - b. Secure the opinions of fourteen or more leading lawyers in the State as to the proposed bill on Texas Married Women's Property Rights.
 - c. Prepare kits for study:
 - 1. A brief one for county key women, just giving the salient points.
 - 2. A more elaborate one for local leagues.
 (Physical preparation to be done at head-quarters)
 - 3. Key women and local Chairmen to be asked to (a) inform themselves (b) interview candidates (3) speak to other organizations.
- III It was voted, on motion of Mrs. Ames, to ask Miss Mary Sanders of the State Department of Education to make a brief statement, for distribution to local league groups and county key women, as to the

relative merits of the proposed law over the present law relating to the appointment of County Euperintendents.

- IV It was voted, on motion of Mrs. Ames, that Mrs. Ledbetter of the State Child Hygiene Bureau prepare a brief statement as to the need for the doubling of appropriations for Sheppard-Towner; this to be sent to legal league groups and to key women.
- Local leagues will be asked to form three Committees of three to ten each; one on Legal Status, one on Child Welfare, and one on Education, to inform themselves on these measures and be prepared to speak before other organizations and interview candidates. Persons not members of the league may be asked to join these groups and become members of the league.

June to July 20th will be devoted to activaly getting out the vote.

It was voted that Mrs. Ames be asked to prepare a resolution on these three measures, to be furnished local leagues, and key women to be adopted at precinct, county and state conventions.

The matter of questionnaires to candidates was discussed, and Mrs. Ames reported the Legislative Council plans to submit questionnaires and publish candidate records. She reported that the League still owes the Legislative Council \$75.00 on back dues. It was moved by Mrs. Gade, seconded and carried, that the balance still due the Legislative Council be paid at once.

It was moved by Mrs. Ames, seconded and carried, that Mrs. Ames ask that the Legislative Council be asked to include Married Women's Property Rights, Maternity & Infancy Work and Appointment of County School Superintendents in their questionnaire, and that copies of the printed answers and candidates records be furnished local leagues.

Notion was made by Mrs. Mess, seconded and carried, that from February 1, 1928 to February 1, 1929, the price of the bulletin be 10¢ per copy; that Mrs. Ames secure the membership lists and subscription price for each name from the other organizations in the Legislative Council, and that the briefs on appointment of County Superintendents, Maternity & Infancy appropriations and Married Women's Preperty Rights be printed in successive issues, fellowed by resolutions to conventions, etc.

The matter of a State "Set Out The Vete Chairman" was discussed, and on metion of Mrs. Porter it was voted to leave the appointment with the President.

Mrs. Ayres presented her resignation as thairman of Living Costs, since she will be away from the State for the remainder of the year. It was accepted with sincere regret by the board.

On motion of Mrs. Masterson, Mrs. J. W. Hopkins was appointed Chairman of Living Costs.

On motion of Mrs. Porter, the appointment of Mrs. Moss as Chairman of Women in Industry was confirmed.

The Finance Chairman reported Miss Griffith's activities in Houston and El Pass. She reported \$50.00 received from Mr. Will Hogg. The Finance Chairman asked for a statement of finance policy.

The Board agreed:

- 1. That the Finance Chairman write local leagues requesting monthly or quarterly payments of quotes unless the locals can pay in a lump sum at the beginning of the year.
- 2. That local Finance Chairmon be asked if they wish to ask possible donors in their counties for large donations in helping to raise the unassigned portion of the budget, or if they prefer to send the State Finance Chairmon names of persons who might give large donations, so that the State Finance Department may secure gifts direct.
- 3. That the State Finance Chairman be permitted to write State board members as to subscriptions to the League.

Mrs. C. H. Carlisle, Treasurer, announced that she wished to contribute \$5.00 a menth for the year.

The Bourd voted to make operative the metion made at the Coteber 29th bourd meeting:

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MINUTES OF BOARD MEETING TEXAS LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS Dallas, Texas. April 6th, 1928.

The Board of Directors of the Texas League of Women Voters met is Dallas at the Name Club House on April 8th, 1928. Those present were: Mrs. D. W. Kempner, President, Mrs. W. E. Paschall, Mrs. C. L. Mose, Jr., Mrs. Anna B. Cade, Miss Mary E. Jagos, Mrs. O. H. Carlisle, Mrs. Jossie Daniels Ames, Miss Ruth McIntoch, Regional Secretary, and Mrs. Sarah Hughes. Mrs. D. W. Kempner, President, presided.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board of Directors in Houston, January 6th, 1928, were read and approved.

The Treasurer's report showing a balance of \$207.68 was read and approved. The expenditures included a payment of \$250.00 to the National League, which entitles the Texas League to five delegates and five alternates at the National Convention. The matter of the form in which the Treasurer's report should be presented was discussed, and on motion of Mrs. Paschall, seconded by Miss Jagos, it was decided that budget forms for use by the Treasurer be prepared and sent to Mrs. Carlisle to be used to make out her monthly Treasurer's report.

The President's report was made. She reported study groups in Dallas, Denton, Fort Worth and Galveston. She re-ported that each local league had passed resolutions endorsing the Norris Bill on Muscle Shoals, and had advised the Texas Sanators of their action. Mrs. Fred Clarke of Dallas has been made Transportation Chairman for the Texas League delegation to the National Convention. The President reported that Mrs. Boyd Reading had been made State Chairman or GET OUT THE VOTE, and that a local Chairman for G. O. V. had been appointed by each local. The President reported that she had gotten response from some of the local leagues, but that she had gotten almost no response from others, which made it difficult to continue being of service to them. The President stated that she wished to go on record that the filing cabinets and office furniture were purchased by her and therefore do not belong to the Texas League of Women Voters. The President reported that the State office has borne the expense of the kits sent out to the State Chairmen. The President was instructed to write each local league presidents to send in written reports of the local leagues each month; and, if she did not have time to eare for this herself that she should appoint a corresponding secretury to keep in communication with the State office.

The Secretary was instructed to send the Presidents of local leagues copies of the Board minutes.

It was moved that the following be appointed as delegates and alternates to the National Convention. Delegates: - 1

Mrs. D. W. Kompner, Mrs. E. L. Porter, Miss Mary B. Jagos, Mrs. H. G. Bonorden, Mrs. Ida E. Lanc. Alternates: Mrs. J. W. Hepkins, Mrs. O. H. Carlisle, Mrs. S. C. Long.

The President requested that State Committee Chairmen be asked to send copies of all letters to the State office, and report to the State office any activities carried on during the month.

Mrs. Paschall reported for the Child Welfare Comnities that she had sent kits containing material on materalty and infancy care in Texas to each local league Child Welfare Chairman, together with a personal letter explaining the use of the kits. She also stated that she would send letters to local Chairman each month hereafter, setting out matters of special Interest on the child welfare program, with the request that they bring these matters before the local leagues.

Mrs. E. L. Perter, Chairman of Efficiency in Government, sent her report, which was read by Mrs. Hughes. She reported that letters had been sent to each league offering to send a kit on the direct primary to all groups which would develop study groups. Dallas ordered a quantity for a study group, and El Paso ordered nue to discuss the proposal of ferming a group. The material for these kits has been mimographed and the kits prepared. The Galveston Efficiency in Government study group, with an average attendance of twenty, meets bi-monthly, and has used Moley's "Outline of Government" as a basis for its study.

Mrs. Mass reported on the Women in Industry Committee. She gave the program of work of the department prepared by the National, and the letters sent from State Chairmen to the National Chairmen as to proposed changes.

The procedure of the National League in developing the program of work of the various committees was discussed. Mrs. Paschall suggested that the President request the State Chairmen of Committees to write to each local chairmen for reports on the proposed state program before November, and that state chairmen compile the reports from local chairmen and send the compiled reports to local chairmen. Mics McIntech suggested that a committee be appointed to develop a procedure for the make up of the state program of work, to bring recommendations before the ment Deard meeting.

Ars. O. H. Carlisle, who had been delayed, arrived, and supplemented the Prosident's report by a report of the House. League: The directory of the Wenen's Clubs has been published, and had already netted the League over \$1900.00 alear, and over expect, through the sale of the directory, to clear about 3000 more. She reported that on April 2nd they gave a lunchase, which all of the advertisers in the directory had exhibite, and with all of the Club women were invited, and others, [2] the first and women, who wished to attend. 2000 attended the lunchase, the

advertisers furnishing part of the food free. The lausheds cost the League \$105.00. Arc. Carlisle reported that several level leagues had sent in 25% per member for State dues, instead of 50% as required by the constitution. Mrs. Carlisle was instructed to write to level leagues and quote the section of the constitution governing this, and ask that they remit the remainder of their dues have been received from Dallas, Calveston, and El Pasc. his McIntosh reported that Mrs. Buckley is putting a check to the mail today for the Fort Worth dues, \$35.00, being 50% per amber. Mrs. Carlisle reports that Houston will pay its dues and full quota within the month.

The Prosident, as Chairman of Organization, reported the organization of the Rice Institute League of Nomen Veters. Mrs. Carliele reported that they are planning a Citizenship School, with the aid of the least league, which will be held for two afternoons and evenings. Speakers are being asked from ever the State. The School is based on the recommendation sent out to the least leagues by the state president, for pre-primary eitizenship schools. Mrs. Kempmer reported that Dallas is helding such a school this month, and that the Galvestan school will be held on April 14th. The Houston school will be on the 19th and 20th. Mrs. Kempmer reported that Il locals ere planning candidates meetings, and that she had sent out a questionnaire, copy of which was sent to Board members to be used as a basis for these meetings.

Mrs. Rempast reported requests for material and suggestions on organization from Westfield, Canton, San Angela and Amarillo, and from several individuals. Letters to these towns have received no answers, however.

Miss Jagos reported as Chairman of Publicity. She requested that Mrs. Assper send on to her the copies of the clipping Eureau. She reported that she had been giving the stories to the Associated Press.

Miss Jagos and Mrs. Aughes reported as Reiter and Business Manager of the Bulletin. Many Board members reported compliants from members and others on the subject matter in the Bulletin. Mrs. Aughes reported that three ads had been secured since the Convention, and this will income publicution as issues through June. She had pledges of adv from Fort Worth Find Ni Pass, which, with one other, will income the publication of the

Bulletin for the remainder of the year.

Mrs. Ames reported as Chairman of Legal Status of Homon. She reported that a lawyers advisery committee had been formed to advise with her en the proposed Married Person's Proporty Rights bill. A mosting of the advisory committee was held last month in Austin. It was advised by the committee that the fellowing two changes be made: Article 4619, after the words "shall be under the joint management, control and disposal of husband and wife", insert "Provided me rights of innecent persons acquired before such filing shall ever be projudiced" Article 4618, add "and provided, if one spouse abandon the other without just sause, such abandened spouse shall have the seleright to dispess of the semmunity property or so much thereof a shall be necessary". This latter is provided in case that the wife and husband are jointly controlling the property at the time of abandonment, and further cause of an amendment to inti-1619 passed on March 28th, 1927. She reported that she had nonkits to all local league chairmen in quantity for study groups. She reported that Mr. O. H. Speer is bringing out a revised copy of his book on Toxas Haritial Relations Laws, and that the con-

Mrs. Ames was asked to write to each local president asking her to designate one of the local league shairmen in charge of an active legislative measure, to have charge of the intervioring of candidates, and future legislative work, with regard to all three measures which form the legislative program of the league.

Mrs. Amos reported the fellowing plan of the Joint Legislative Council: That is thirty-three Counties of the State thore be developed a local legiclative Council perresponding to the Joint State Legislative Council, but not necessarily limited in membership to the organizations forming the State Council. Mrs. Amos stated that ever half of the Legislature come from these thirty-three Counties. She requested that, in communities having Local Leagues of Wemon Veters, that the State President request Local Leagues to take the initiative in ferming these local Legislative Councils. Three names were submitted to the Board, and a motion was made by Mrs. Ring, seconded by Mrs. Moore, that the President be empowered to not regarding the filling of these wasnesse. This motion was carried.

Mrs. Bonorden was appointed to prepare material for the Voters News, as Miss Mary Jagos is on a leave of absence in New York assisting in the Women's National Committee for Hoover.

Motion was made by Mrs. Hopkins that the President be empowered to investigate the possibility of a State Secretary, and report back at the next meeting of the State Board. Seconded by Mrs. Ring, and earried.

A letter has been written to our lation sponsored by the National League. Some replies have to all the State Representatives and Senators regarding the -2

Service. WFAA-Dallas, KPRC-Houston, and WOIA-San Antonio accepted. Locals have been requested to send in their quotes. They have also been asked to appoint Chairmen on Immigration. There has been one request from a Local for the kit on Immigration. Fort Worth is reported to have new officers. Rice Institute asked to have a College League formed and a constitution was written and a study program planned, but the League has not yet been formed. The GET OUT THE VOTE Campaign was a splendid success. The Procident asked that Board members and Chairmen should eand in any expenses they incur so that the State League buy pay them. The President reported that Mrs. Masterson would be a delegate to the convention on the Cause and Cure of War. Questionnaire asked for by the National regarding women holding public office in Texas has been sent to the National League. An Executive Board meeting was held in Houston on November 23rd to discuss what action should be taken about the Legislative Council. A request from Mrs. McCallum had been received with regard to forming a League in Austin, and it was hoped that a little later it would be possible to form a local there. All the locals, with the exception of Fort Worth, had sent in a list of their activities. Four Questionnaires sent by the National League have been sent in with the information requested.

It was moved by Mrs. Bonorden, seconded by Mrs. Moss that the report of the President be accepted with thanks. Motion carried.

that a great deal of material had been sent from the National League on the Newton Bill and that letters had been sent to Local Leagues, suggesting study groups and meetings, and that letters be sent to Congressmen urging the passage of the bill. Replies had been received from all the Locals.

Mrs. Hopkins, Chairman of Living Costs, reported that an intensive drive had been made in behalf of the Musele Shoals Bill at the time it was before Congress.
