


### TEXAS TECHNOLOGICAL COLLEGE 1923 - 1963

ACADEMIC DEVELOPMENT was continued with the opening of Tech's new library at the beginning of the fall semester, 1962. The formal dedication for the building, largest on Tech's campus, was conducted Oct. 21, 1962. The library, built at a cost of \$2 million, has 72 columns and 68 arches in five stories and a basement larger than this football field. It is completely air-conditioned and has carefully engineered lighting throughout. The library's academically vital facilities include 500,000 volumes now open to users, with an ultimate capacity for 800,000 volumes.






# Tech Union Has Stimulating Entertainment Slated

The tenth anniversary year of the opening of Texas Tech's Student Union will continue this fall semester with a diversity of "big names" and special programs.

For instance, the Union's first Special Event, Oct. 25, will present one of the foremost acting personalities, Hans Conreid, in a program touching on all phases of

The Fine Arts Festival, Nov. 10-19, featuring "Form in the Arts," will include films, exhibits, concerts, lectures, a play and on Nov. 15 guest performer Peter Nero, pianist of concert theaters and supper clubs, playing jazz and the classics. Nov. 12 and 13 will be highlight days, with the showing of the widely-acclaimed Stratford Ontario version of "Oedipus Rex" in color.

The Select Film series for fall will include "Last Year at Marienbad" Oct. 11 and 13; and George Orwell's "1984" Dec. 6 and 8. On Dec. 7 the "Raider Rambles," Tech talent show, will be presented in the Union Ball-

The Special Event for December will present "The National Players" in Lubbock Municipal Auditorium. The players, the longest running classical repertory company in the country, will present either "The Taming of the Shrew" or "Oedipus Rex."

Attractions for the Spring semester will include the Clebanoff Strings April 15 in the Municipal Auditorium.

The Tech Union was officially opened a little more than ten years ago, in March of 1953. Its opening was the culmination of years of endeavor by Union advocates including Dean of Student Life James G. Allen, who originally suggested a Student Union in 1928, and W. Conner Cole, manager of the Tech bookstore, who in 1949 promoted the idea of issuing bonds to construct the

For five generations of students the Tech Bookstore has served as the only meeting place. Then in 1947 the College learned that it might have some army surplus buildings, if they could transport them to the campus.

Tech requested three, which were set between the Administration Building and the Music Building. One was leased to a commercial firm for a cafeteria. The other two were joined together for a recreation hall.

Dean Allen undertook to raise about \$25,000 from townspeople to make the "Rec Hall" a usable student center, and Lubbock citizens responded graciously.


It was following this that Conner Cole conceived the idea of turning Bookstore profits from a "general fund" into a permanent Union building fund, and issuing bonds

Tech's Board of Directors approved the building plans in 1950, and the cornerstone for the building was laid in October, 1952.


The finished structure in 1953 contained a ballroom to accommodate 400 couples, a snack bar to seat 48 persons, a lounge area, three meeting rooms and a student organizational workshop.

Another big step for the Union was taken in 1957 when the Board of Directors drafted plans for a milliondollar expansion of the building. Groundbreaking ceremonies for the addition were held in September, 1960. The formal opening and dedication of the annex came March 19, 1962. The Union now has a total of 85,000 square feet, including a mammoth new ballroom downstairs, a modern cafeteria and new office space, game and meeting rooms.

The Union has never operated on state funds. It works on a non-profit basis in conjunction with the Bookstore, and a set Student Union fee paid by the individual

Sometimes these changes evoke criticism and confusion, as did the radical revision of the substitution rule made last January, but in the end the game keeps on growing and expanding and becoming more exciting to players and spectators alike.

What you are seeing every Saturday afternoon of the 1963 season is the effort of the coaches to come to terms with the new substitution rule and deploy their manpower for maximum effect.

Briefly, the new rule is this: either team can substitute freely on second or third down or on first down earned on a drive if, in all cases, the game clock is stopped. No more than two players can enter the game for a fourth down play or one on which the ball has just changed with the same 11 men who started it, or as close

Of course there is no denying that what every coach wants is wave on wave of large, fleet, siderably below the ideal. 

The Washington State Cougars promise to bring back to the state of Texas the brand of exciting football that earned the Southwest it's wild and woolley tag back in the 1930's.

Cougar Coach Jim Sutherland is noted nationwide for his wide-open, prostyle offenses, and the 1963 team at Washington State promises to be one of Sutherland's finest offensive clubs. Quarterback Dave Mathieson was ranked seventh among the nation's passers in 1962 with 104 completions for 1,492 yards and 12 touchdowns, and he's back for his senior season. The Cougars also have two of their best receivers from last Fall — end Gerry Shaw and halfback Ken Graham — returning.
