The conference chairman is Idris R. Traylor Jr., executive director of Texas Tech's Office of International Affairs. According to Traylor, the subject of the world's drylands is significant worldwide. This meeting will bring together a number of global experts to provide the groundwork for the creation of an international system for data exchange concerning drylands research, collaborative sustainable development projects and expansion of these international conferences.

The desert conference, which opened Monday (Aug. 12), will continue with presentations in the Texas Tech University Center and special events around the Lubbock area.
