

#### STONE FOR STONE

Edward D. Stone, the architect, was refreshingly blunt the other day on the matter of modern building materials.
Architecture is "the most permanent of the arts," he said, and "permanence is associated with stone—not with glass or tin or architectural frills.

Today's emphasis on glass and "tin" has created "a colossal mess," he said. "If you look around you, and you give a damn, it makes you want to commit

Three cheers for Mr. Stone. He has flung down a needed gauntlet in a profession which sometimes seems to have given up art in favor of pure engineering. We need men like Mr. Stone who are confident that their school, whichever it is, is the best one — and Mr. Stone's own work certainly speaks eloquently in behalf of his cause. But there are others like Mr. Mies van

der Rohe who can make an equally good case for glass and who might care to denounce other buildings as "cumbersome heaps of rock and concrete." We might then hear Le Corbusier, the French expert with concrete, reply that the "glass houses" are nothing but "transparent stacks of window panes." And those who are skilled in the use of stainless steel and aluminum [an example is Chicago's Inland Steel building, by Skidmore, Owings and Merrill] could be righteously indignant at the suggestion that they are creating eyesores of "tin."

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

## TO YOUR Dozen Ointments Haven't Relieved His Itching

By Dr. Joseph Molner

DEAR DR. MOLNER: Can you suggest something to do about pruritus ani? My grandson, 19, has been bothered with it for two years. He has been to many doctors, who in turn give a prescription for an ointment.

He has used at least a dozen ointments with no results. He changes underclothing every day, and sometimes bathes

PRURITUS ANI (rectal itching) can be an abomination.

Let's consider the principal causes.

First, is there any local cause-hemorrhoids, or fissures in the rectum which may be producing a discharge which irritates the skin and makes it itch? I assume that if the young man has seen so many doctors, he has had a thorough rectal examination by at least some of them. If not, and he has been using salves suggested on a sight-unseen basis, then have him examined

Second, allergy or sensitivity to certain foods can be

cases for months after the drugs have been stopped.

Third, overmedication can be a factor. Salves can be very fine if used for a brief time to overcome the itching, but they can backfire by keeping the skin moist and soft and vulnerable to irritants which otherwise might cause no itching.

I SUGGEST keeping a bit of dry cotton at the rectal opening. I have known this simple and cheap treatment to do more good than many ounces of ointments. And an added

tip: Keep the area clean, but wash with plain water. Soap can be an irritant. Then dry carefully, apply the small wad of cotton, and see whether it helps.

I ALSO RECALL a friend who had suffered for years and in desperation went, on his family physician's advice, to a psychiatrist. Several sessions and a few weeks later the trouble vanished entirely. Evidently, in his case, extreme nervous tension played a part in the condition.

Wash furniture with turpen-tine and sand the rough spots very lightly with fine sand-paper. Paint with flat white paint, giving two or coats, allowing plenty of time to dry thoroughly between Sand lightly after each coat of paint except the last coat.
