## Clement Hall

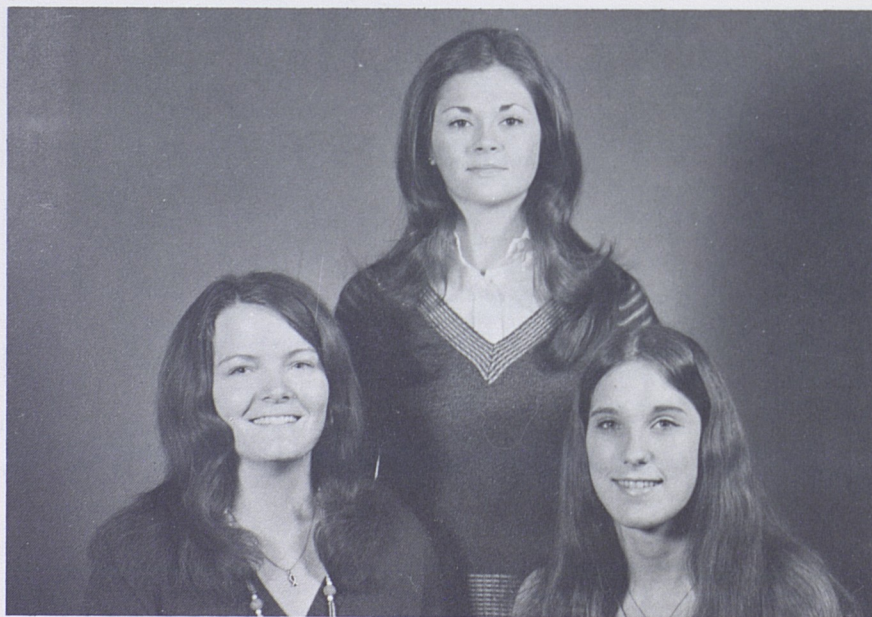
Clement is the greatest! Come live in Clement Hall and experience the friendliness and spontaneity of dorm living.

Gates is an all-around dorm—and Gates girls are all-around girls.



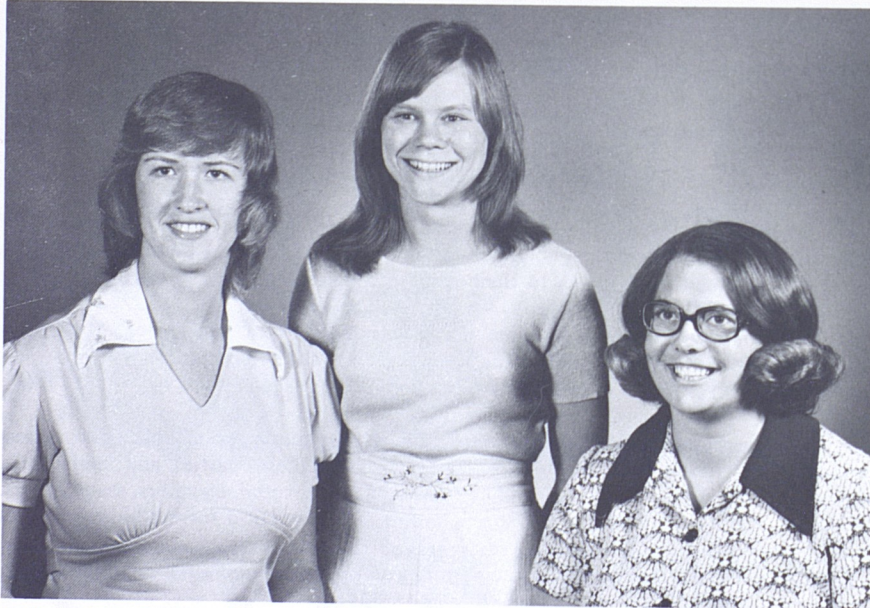
## Horn Hall

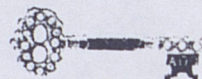

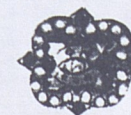

## President's Hostesses

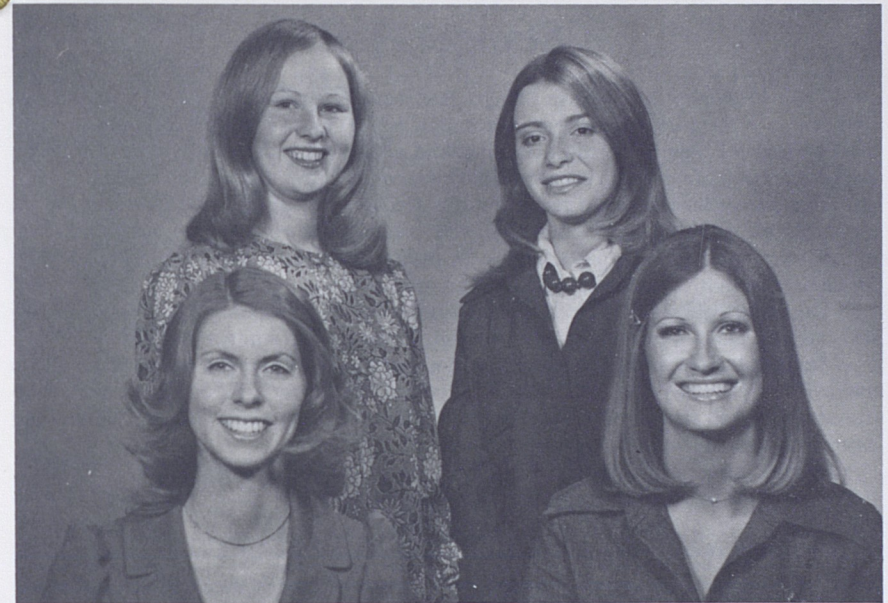
