

Dear Cousin

Pittsburgh April 25<sup>th</sup> 1844

A thousand thanks for your prompt answer, and very interesting information for which I shall feel you as fully entitled to a cousin's share in my heart.

In your attention to others you have almost neglected yourself &c to some particulars that I desire to know, and first what is the name & business of your husband and your place of residence. This item I wish for case I should at some future day visit New York I may in person acknowledge your kind attention for I had almost given up all hope of having my desire gratified of learning from any of my relatives in New York what was their situation. Second the names and occupation of your brothers and all that you may consider interesting concerning your father and them. What is Cousin John doing in Pennsylvania (our state) In what circumstances are my dear Cousin Susan Bond & Rosanna Stafs. (tell Susan I will write shortly) what of Cousin Richard Cornell. dear Cousin Eliza's husband & the business of Henry Ten Eyck and his prospects, the names of Eliza's children. and Oh! how many more questions could I put and anxious Enquiry make but fear to alarm you and cause you to regret your prompt engagement to be my correspondent but remember once for all. I never wish you to neglect one single duty as a wife or relative to others in corresponding with me. I would if possible have all I ask done as a pleasure and not a task. the closing paragraph in your kind letter induces me to believe this

will be the case and most fully convinces me that I shall have a correspondent faithful but instructive one who regards the soul as preeminent in value the pearl of great price, and yet not unacquainted with poor human nature one who I trust is enabled through grace to "seek first the Kingdom of God & His righteousness" Under the firm conviction that thereby "all these(necessary) things shall be added", this alas! is not the common course of mankind they spend their strength for that which satisfis not, and reviving the wise counsel of the infinitely benevolent Creator who assigns the happiness all of therefore directs to the method of its attainment, they mind not the things of the spirit, but mind earthly things, and pursue the course of one in the gospel pronounced by God himself "Thou fool" and in the midst of their schemes and plans too often realize with him their folly, and their poor unawares souls are required of them, and then whose shall these things be, the things for which they alone have lived, forgetting God, their souls, and heaven, the dust of earth cannot satisfy the immortal spirit it was made for higher, nobler joys, even for fellowship with the Father & with His Son Jesus Christ and to realize even here that our lives are hid with Christ in God, so that amidst our severest trials we may rejoice knowing that when Christ who is our life shall appear then we also shall be like <sup>Him</sup> for we shall see Him as He is, Then our sun shall no more go down nor our moon withdraw its shining but the Lord shall

What time we have already and Oh! how swiftly one follows another, and who can tell "who must shall be summoned away" how necessary the caution "be ye also ready" I have intimated I may at some future day pay my respects to you in person in such event I shall though Divine permission be accompanied by my wife who I desire to introduce to you as one who in her Uncle holds a large share in many hearts and for twenty two years has been all I could ask for the share of my joys and sorrows we have no children we are uncle and aunt to many little protlers whose highest wish is to spend a day with Uncle & Aunt in a few weeks we start to Erie where I am to settle up with Government the contract for the iron ship of War Michigan constructed by the gentlemen by whom I am employed. Direct your letters to me at Pittsburgh Pa & I shall receive them my wife joins in affectionate regards to all our dear relatives & especially to your husband & self write soon & believe me to be truly and sincerely
