Last week we performed the last ~~rites~~ over the death of our late comrade Dan H Hightower. His descriptive list as given by him which we copy from the ~~the~~ camp roster reads:

Was born in Mo in 1848, was first in Hightowers company of state militia Darnells regiment served there two months then enlisted in Co F Wallers battalion, was in the battle of Yellow Bayou, then returned to Tarrant county, being under age, and joined Wm Quayles company about the close of the war and at San Antonio I came back home and went on into Mexico. He died January 3 1917.

A farther memorandum recites he was made a Mason in 1877 and was for many years a consistent member of the Methodist church. suffered for several ~~years~~ years from a lingering illness that rendered him bedridden prior to his death. He is survived by four sons - A.L. W.L. H W and Dave all of Fort Worth and a stepson J.W. Tipton of Fort Worth and a daughter Mrs L.P. Jones.

This committee knew him long and well and recall his passing with sincere regret. He was a genial comrade and ever carried his heart openly and warm to all who knew him. And now after life's faithful he sleeps well.
