Investment In Loyalty Fund In Tie

Three districts ended the year in a tie for first place in the percentage of exes in their area investing in the Association in 1955. District Seven, which includes Lubbock, Wolfforth, Idalou, Shallowater and New Deal, had 813 of its 3,155 exes contributing a total of \$6,201.20. This represents 25% participation.

APO and FPO, which includes service men and women who are overseas, and OUSA, which includes other exes not living in the continental United States, also had a 25% representation.

District 35, which came in second in 1954, held the same position in 1955, and District 21, 1954's leader, ranked third in 1955.

A breakdown of contributions by districts is shown below. Districts One through 29 are in Texas; 30 through 36 are comprised of other states.

HISTORY COMPLETED

'First Thirty Years' of College Related in Ruth Andrews Book

"The First Thirty Years," a complete history of Texas Tech's birth and growth, will be released on or about May 20, Dr. E. N. Jones, Tech president, has announced.

A limited number of copies will be available at the College Bookstore. A total first edition of 2,000 copies is planned.

Written by Mrs. Ruth Horn Andrews, daughter of Dr. Paul W. Horn, first president of the College, the history covers the development of the institution from three different angles.

Book I takes in chronological order the administration of each of the six presidents and gives the highlights of those years under the chapter headings: "Formative Years," "Depression Years," "The Cowboy Who Became a College President," "A College Generation," "The College President Who Became a Banker," and "Today."

Book II discusses each division on the order of its establishment: Agriculture, Arts and Sciences, Engineering, Home Economics, the Graduate School, Business Administration, Extension, and Reserve Officers Training Corps. A chapter on all-college folk, is devoted to the registrar's office, library, stu-

dent life staff, bookstore and business office.

The first chapter of Book II includes sections on religious life, organizations, the student union, newspaper and yearbook, traditions and a postscript on the three

The program will take the form of a visit to Tech by an alumnus. Highpoints will be talks with Pres. E. N. Jones, Agriculture Dean W. L. Stangel, and Coach Polk Robinson. Ex-Student Field Secretary Buddy Barron is in charge of preparing the recording, assisted by speech sophomore Bob Sewell portraying alumnus "Joe Smith," and ex-Techsan Bob Nash, now with Lubbock's radio station KFYO, playing the part of Walker.

Nash will also cut and edit the tape. Introductory and closing remarks have been written by the radio and TV continuity writing class of Mrs. Louise Allen.

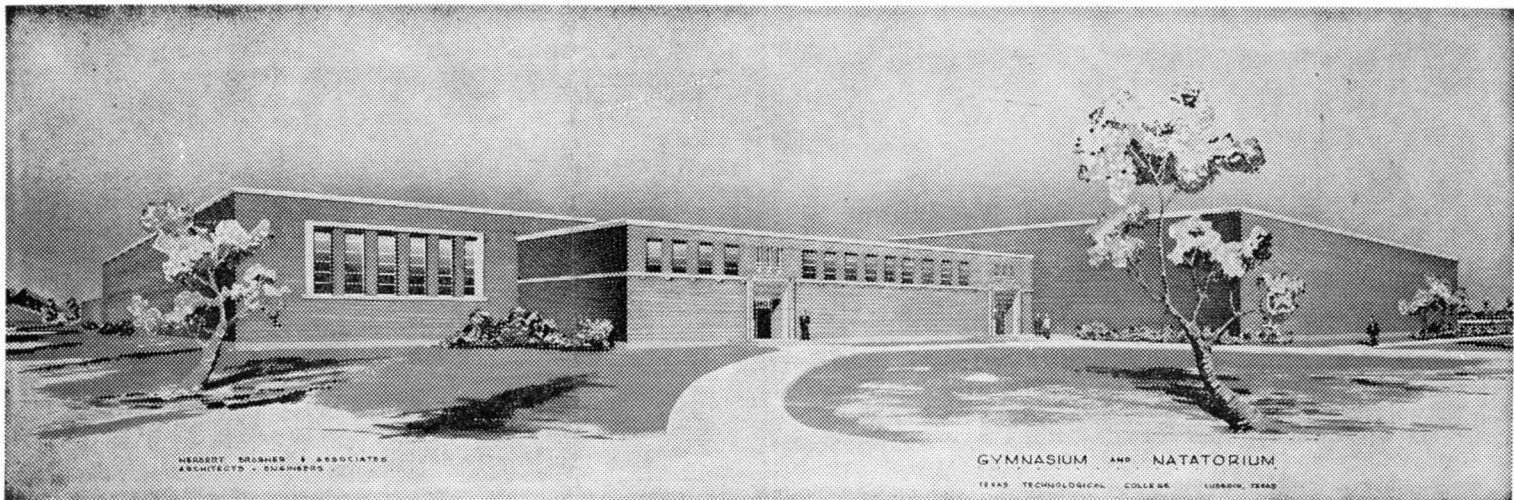

New School-Work Cooperative Plan Will Go Into Effect With Convair

Establishment of a school-work Cooperative Plan in mechanical engineering with Convair of Fort Worth has been announced by Dean John R. Bradford of Tech's Division of Engineering.

First trainees for the new program will be selected this month and will begin work with Convair at the conclusion of this term, according to Dean Bradford.

Details of the program were arranged by him, Robert L. Newell, assistant dean of engineering; William H. Crenshaw, executive

director of the Tech Foundation; and Harold Anderson, supervisor of engineering training for Convair.

In explaining the program, Dean Bradford says:

"Selected students will work for Convair during the summer following their freshman year, return to school in the fall and then alternate semesters, including summer terms, until they complete requirements for a BS in mechanical engineering."

This experience with Convair should enable trainees to command a position of responsibility in industry following graduation, the Dean adds.

In addition to gaining practical experience, student trainees will be able to help finance their own educations from their earnings.

The cooperative school-work program will lengthen the time required to complete degree work from four to five and one-half years.

A tap from a member of Forum, senior women's honorary, fell on the shoulders of 16 coeds in surprise ceremonies last month.

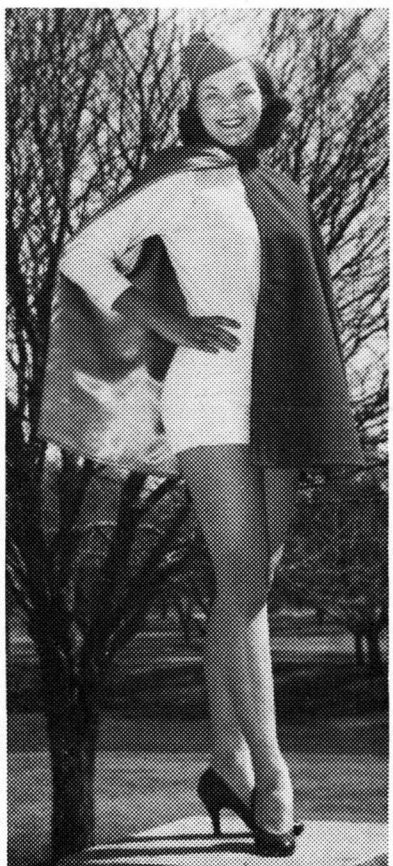

Roberts Granted Leave of Absence To Study Abroad

Dr. William Roberts, assistant professor of French at Texas Tech, will receive a year's leave of absence for research in Europe.

Dr. and Mrs. Roberts will leave for the Continent June 27. This summer they will drive in Germany, Austria, Yugoslavia, Scandinavia, and Great Britain.

During the school year, Roberts will do research on manuscripts relating to 17th century Baroque poetry, study the contemporary Parisian theater and collect books and other materials for teaching.

New Teaching Methods

He also will investigate new methods of teaching phonetics and of supervising laboratory work and explore and photograph in color various regions of France to supplement his current slide collection of 1,800 subjects.

Roberts said the slides will be used as background material for language and literature classes and may possibly form the basis of an entire course in French.

Roberts has a bachelor's degree from New York University and has studied three years at the University of Paris (Sorbonne), completing requirements for the Diplôme de Professeur de Français à l'Etranger.

Has Written Articles

He received a Doctor of Philosophy degree from Yale University in 1955.

Roberts has written for the Modern Language Journal and his contributions to the Cabcen "Bibliography of 17th Century French Literature" are soon to be published.

Since coming to Tech in 1954, he has sponsored Le Cercle Français, French Club which this year has donated a glass covered bulletin board to the institution and promoted a program of French films.

Also this year, Roberts led in organizing the Beta Xi chapter of Pi Delta Phi, national honorary French society, at Tech.

A five-member editorial committee is preparing the magazine and will be in charge of sales. Copies may be obtained from the Union for 35 cents.

not do or say the right things. And we certainly couldn't find anything for a guide in the field of scouting. But, the response to our magic show was just the same as we could expect from any group of boys, so we were on our way."

Pattern Followed

The Tech students soon worked out the pattern for handicapped Scouts that they are still following:

1. Give the handicapped boys everything they are physically capable of handling.
2. Make sure they are able to explain thoroughly all the Scout requirements they are not physically capable of demonstrating.
3. Work out replacements for requirements the retarded or handicapped boys can't meet.

When the program started two years ago, five Tech APO men served as instructors for the 16 scouts. Today, the ratio is one Tech man for each handicapped boy.

Good Ratio

"This ratio of one to one is much better for the boys," Conley believes. "Each Scout now knows he has one instructor he can depend on and these boys need that. After all, we are the only men they meet outside of their fathers."

"That puts quite a load on us, too. We try to live up to the best in manhood for those boys."

The problems of the two patrols in Troop 161 are just about opposite, according to Conley.

The mentally retarded boys can remember little specific information, but the concept of scouting sticks with them. They relearn the Scout oath, motto and laws at each meeting. Yet, one boy asked his mother at home recently, "Mother, a Scout doesn't lie, does he?"

Memory Work Good

The memory work of the physically handicapped Scouts is good and several of the boys have already earned merit badges for stamp and rock collections, Morse code, and basket weaving.

Although both patrols are socially behind other boys their age, the Tech men believe Scout outings help overcome this handicap, too. The handicapped boys have visited the South Plains Scout camp near Post where they had ringside seats at swimming meets and the Hopi Rain Dance

New Registering Plan

A pre-enrollment plan was instituted at Tech this spring to allow students who expect to be juniors and seniors in the fall to complete their fall course sign-up except for fee paying. The new program was conducted on the campus April 30-May 5 with more than 2800 students eligible to participate.

"It is not to be confused with regular pre-registration, which will be held this summer as usual," Warren G. Harding, assistant registrar, explained. Resident students who do not pre-enroll will receive materials this summer which will allow them to complete registration to the point of course selection.

"The new system will make registration more convenient for many of the upperclassmen and should reduce the heavy registration load expected next fall," Harding pointed out.

The plan is not compulsory for upperclassmen. They may wait until September to register. Freshmen and sophomores will continue to register as they have in the past.

Undergraduate students who had a minimum of 45 semester hours credit when they signed up for the current semester were eligible to pre-enroll.

Engineers must have department head approval in addition. Approved lists of engineers are posted on departmental bulletin boards prior to pre-enrollment, Harding said.

In the initial trial of the system here, eligible students were divided into alphabetical groups, with each group starting registration on a certain day. The procedure

followed was: (1) present ID card and if eligible to enroll receive a single registration card, (2) report to head of major department for working out and approval of course schedule, (3) report to academic dean for final approval of schedule.

Sometime between Aug. 15 and Sept. 1, the Business Office will send the student a bill for fees along with a copy of his schedule. The bill will be payable by mail after Sept. 1.

About Aug. 15 a packet of cards related to housing approval, student directory and other items will be mailed to the pre-enrolled student.

1931 Graduate Returns To Tech To Direct Air Force ROTC Program

A Texas Tech graduate who enlisted in the Army Air Corps in 1942 and built a 14-year career as one of the top educators in the U. S. Air Force has been assigned to the Air ROTC unit at Tech as director of education and training.

He is Lt. Col. Newton B. Wilkerson, recently assigned from Randolph Air Force Base in San Antonio.

A member of the class of 1931, Col. Wilkerson received a B.A. degree in chemistry from Tech. He then went to Idalou as a high school science teacher. When he enlisted in the wartime Air Corps

in 1942 he was superintendent of the Idalou High School.

Assigned to the Lubbock Army air field after graduation from Air Corps Officer Candidate school at Miami Beach, Fla., Col. Wilkerson was later transferred to the Pampa, Texas base where he became director of ground training.

Sent To Fort Sill

At the end of World War II, he was sent to Fort Sill, Okla., to set up the first postwar military education program. There he helped establish the Army's Class IV elementary school program for drafted troops who did not have the necessary basic education qualifications.

In 1949, he established the first American school in England for the children of military personnel assigned to the Burtonwood area. His student body — 500 American youngsters ranging from kindergarten to high school age — went to classes in a former Royal Air Force mess hall. The school's faculty included American military personnel with degrees in education, civil service teachers, and five Americans then living in England who held Ph.D. or M.A. degrees from British universities.

Sets School Pattern

Fully accredited by the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges, the Burtonwood school set the pattern for other schools in England including a high school in London.

Returning to the United States in 1952, Col. Wilkerson was assigned to Randolph where he became chief of the educational division for nine bases in the Air Crew Training Command. He was chief of personnel services at Randolph before coming to Tech.

Col. Wilkerson is married to the former Marie Carton of Lubbock, a Tech student in 1934-35. Their oldest daughter, Janis, 18, will enter Tech as a freshman in September. Their second daughter, Paula, 16, will be a senior at Monterey High School.

Dr. Thomas G. Manning and Dr. Denver F. Wendorf Jr. have received appointments as associate professors of history. Dr. Manning received his BA and Ph.D. degrees from Yale and has been a member of the Monmouth College faculty. Dr. Wendorf, a graduate of the University of Arizona with MA and Ph.D. degrees from Harvard, comes to Tech from the Museum of New Mexico.

Dr. Faye Bumpass, a former Tech English instructor, returns to her alma mater as an assistant professor of English. Dr. Bumpass has been a specialist in education for the US State Department in South America. Business Bureau Okayed

Funds for the establishment of a Business Research Bureau at Texas Tech will be solicited by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, Chamber and Tech officials announced recently.

The proposal, approved by directors of both institutions, will be the first step in creating a service to supplement present business information on 132 West Texas counties within WTCC boundaries.

The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research and similar services have promised their fullest cooperation with the new Tech Bureau, the officials emphasized.

The new agency will supply more extensive and detailed information on West Texas business than other hard-pressed services have been able to provide.

Numerous statistics and special studies of particular significance to West Texas businessmen will

be given in a monthly Bureau publication and other reports.

Benefits will include information to help West Texas companies determine more accurately where distribution and sales should be emphasized and long-needed facts for companies considering expansion in the area.

Under the program, the WTCC will solicit funds to organize and operate the Bureau during its first three years. Subject to availability of funds, Tech will assume the responsibility of operating costs at the end of the three years.

As soon as the funds are raised, the division of Business Administration at Tech will employ a staff, acquire necessary facilities and begin operation, according to Dr. George Heather, Dean of the division.

First service planned is a monthly "West Texas Business Report," containing both details and summaries of numerous business conditions such as wholesale and retail sales, bank debits, building permits, postal receipts and employment figures.

Later will come special publications on such subjects as "Land Tenure in West Texas," "The Market for Short Staple Cotton," and "The Future of the Petroleum Industry in West Texas."

Ultimately, the Bureau will undertake certain types of contract research such as economic and marketing surveys, locational studies and others.

The WTCC fund campaign is the latest step in almost a year of surveys and planning by the WTCC's Industrial Development Committee and the laying of the Bureau's organizational groundwork by Tech business specialists.

Working on the Tech planning committee are Drs. Heather, Roy

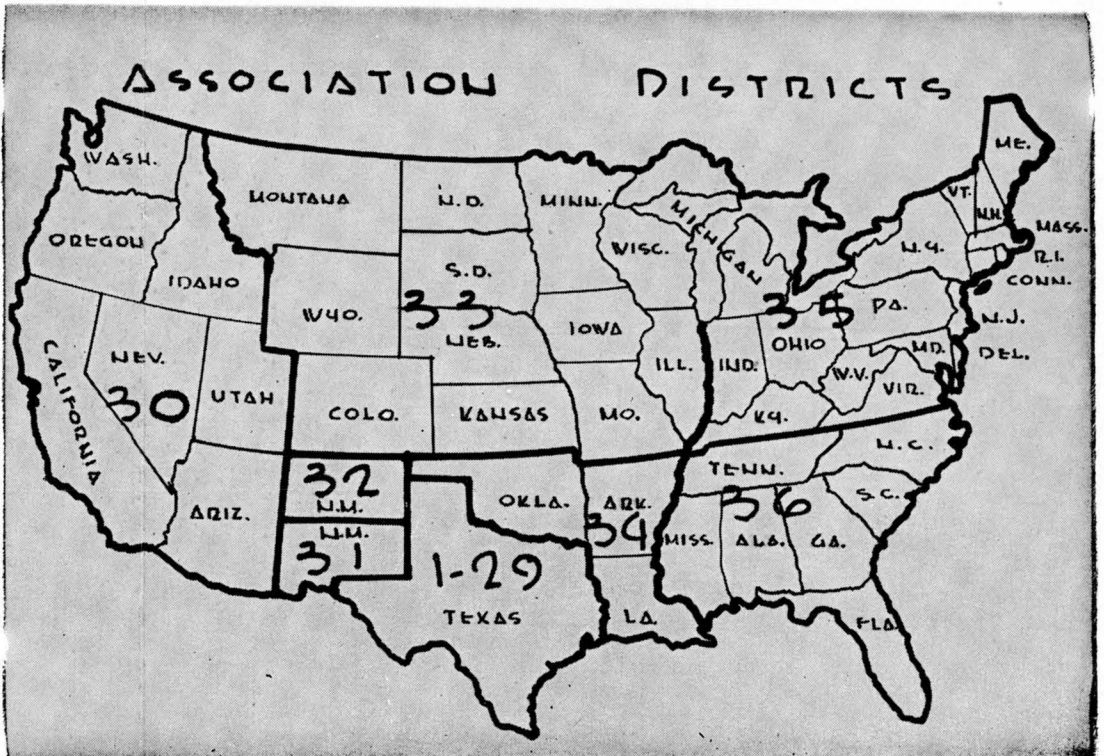

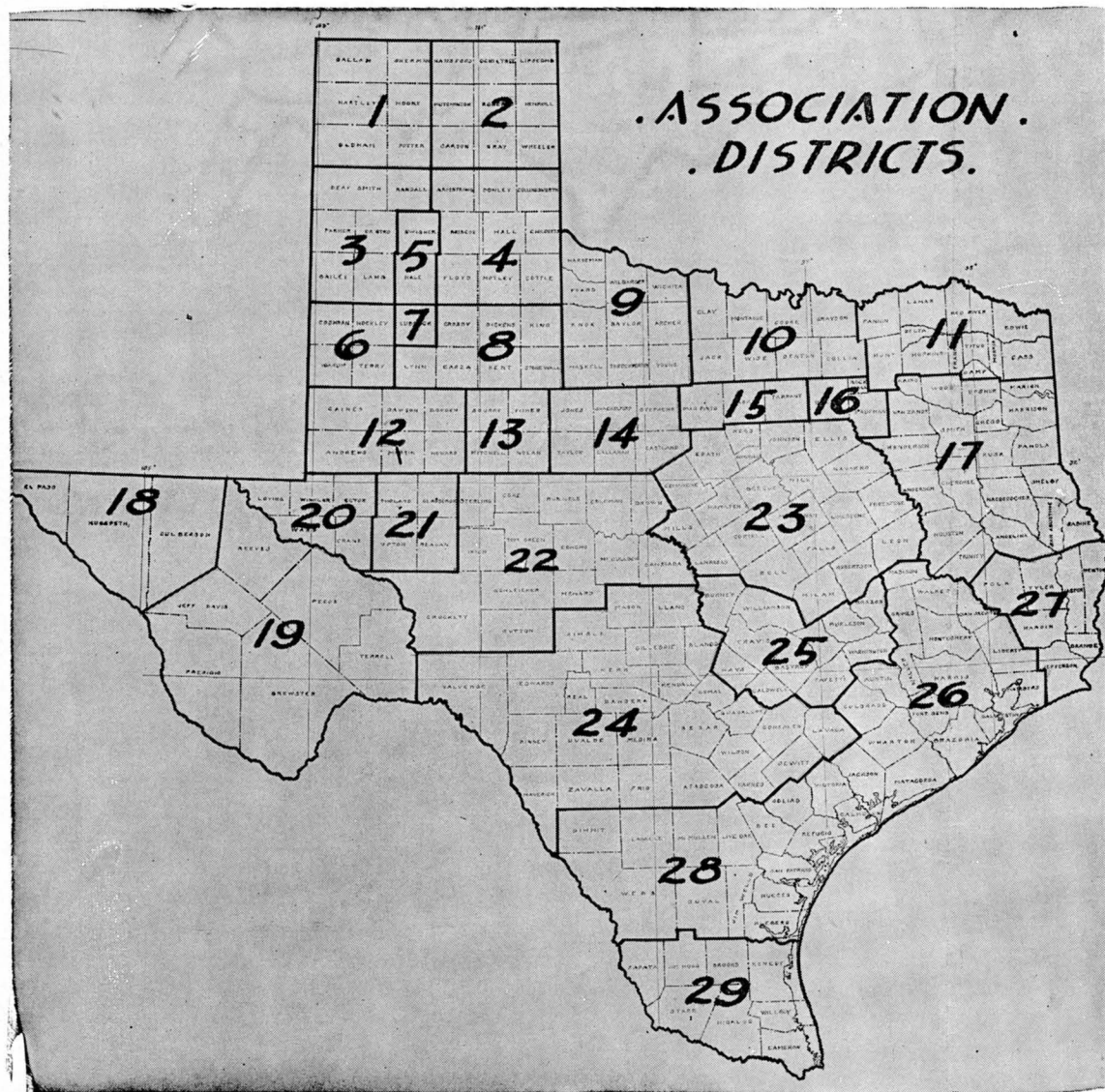

Ex-Toreador Editors Get Top Openings

The 1955 editor and managing editor of The Toreador have received two of the top opportunities available this year to journalism student graduating in the Southwest.

Former editor Bob Rooker has joined the Associated Press Bureau at Santa Fe, N.M., capital of the state and major news center.

Alton Slagle, who was managing editor, is one of approximately 65 graduate students selected for admission next year to the Joseph Pulitzer School of Journalism at Columbia University. Number of applicants each year ranges from 700 to 1000.

Under the leadership of the two Lubbock editors, the Toreador attained the Associated Collegiate Press' first class rating for issues published during the fall semester. Spring ratings are not yet available.

The advance from a second class rating in the spring of 1955 was accomplished with a staff primarily of beginning freshmen.

Both Rooker and Slagle were named to Tech Salutes, an honor section for outstanding students in La Ventana.

Rooker is the only 1956 Texas Tech graduate entering directly into wire service work. He joined John Curtis, veteran AP staffer, in covering capital news for New Mexico newspapers and radio and television stations.

Rooker is married to the former Claynelle Pack, Lubbock, who was also a journalism major.

Slagle, who majored in agricultural economics, was named "Aggie of the Year" for 1955-56. He also has been president of the Agricultural Economics Club, a member and officer of the Tech Press Club, and reporter and secretary for the Aggie Club. He is spending the summer months as a reporter on the Amarillo Globe-News.

Jane Gilmore, Class of '44, Receives \$2,000 University Women Fellowship

Miss Jane Gilmore, Texas Tech English instructor, was one of 30 women in the United States chosen this year to receive a \$2,000 educational fellowship from the American Association of University Women.

Miss Gilmore, the first Tech teacher to receive an AAUW fellowship, will use the grant to help finance her doctoral dissertation. She has been working part-time on her Ph.D. at Tech since 1952.

Her dissertation will be entitled, "The House As A Symbol in the

Work of a Group of Nineteenth Century New England Writers." She will treat the house as a significant part of the writers' environment and as a meaningful symbol in relation to both structure and content of their work.

The AAUW fellowship was awarded on a competitive basis with members of the organization and specialists in the various academic fields serving as a panel of judges.

A 30-year-old native of Pylon, Tex., Miss Gilmore has received all her advanced academic training at Tech. She received her BA degree in journalism in 1944 and her MA degree in English in 1945. Since then she has taught high school journalism and English at Snyder and Levelland in addition to her teaching at Tech.

She is a member of Alpha Chi, honorary scholastic society, Theta Sigma Phi, professional journalism fraternity for women, Sigma Delta Phi, honorary Spanish fraternity, and Sigma Tau Delta, honorary English organization.

Fellowships for both pre- and post-doctoral research are now being made available to women who have completed the residence requirements for their doctorates by AAUW for the 1957-58 year. The grants range from \$1,500 to \$4,000.

Thirty national fellowships and a number of international fellowships are being offered, according to the Committee on Awards, with supplementary stipends available in some cases where the grants may be insufficient or the purpose for which the award is made.

The fellowships are unrestricted as to field and place of study, except that the international grants must be used in a country other than the candidate's own.

Heineman's Plane Trig Book Now Out In Second Edition

Prof. E. Richard Heineman, a faculty member for the past 27 years, recently has had the second edition of his text book, "Plane Trigonometry," published and released.

This edition especially considers students who have a weak mathematical background and those who have not yet acquired the habit of orderly and independent thinking.

The professor, who received his BA and MA at the University of Wisconsin and has done further work at the University of Chicago and University of Texas, has had several books in use by Tech math classes for a number of years.

general education than is offered in the regular four-year curriculum in engineering," the two presidents said in a joint statement.

"This plan gives the engineering student ample opportunity to take a substantial amount of work in the humanities and other non-technical studies, meeting a demand of industry for engineers with a broader background," the statement said.

President Cooke pointed out that if at the end of three years the student decides he does not wish to continue in engineering, he may attend McMurry for an additional year and receive a bachelor of arts degree.

New Institute Set Up

Plans to mobilize the engineering faculty specialists into research teams for service to industry and government are in progress at Tech.

The new idea will be carried out through an Institute of Engineering Research authorized recently by Tech's board of directors.

The Institute will be a coordinating agency offering "customized" research on problems which can be solved only through the cooperation of specialists employing different research methods.

Under the new program, the engineering team can be joined by mathematicians, psychologists, physicists, chemists, historians—any specialists whose talents fit a particular problem.

The new Institute will benefit Tech in all three of its major aims—teaching, research and public service, Dr. John R. Bradford, engineering dean, said. Research opportunities are an important factor in attracting and holding top-flight engineers and scientists in education, he emphasized.

Such research projects also offer new opportunities for graduate student training, and the acquiring of much needed equipment for which state appropriated funds are not now available, he explained.

The graduate students can assist materially in undergraduate training and the additional equipment can be employed in undergraduate instruction.

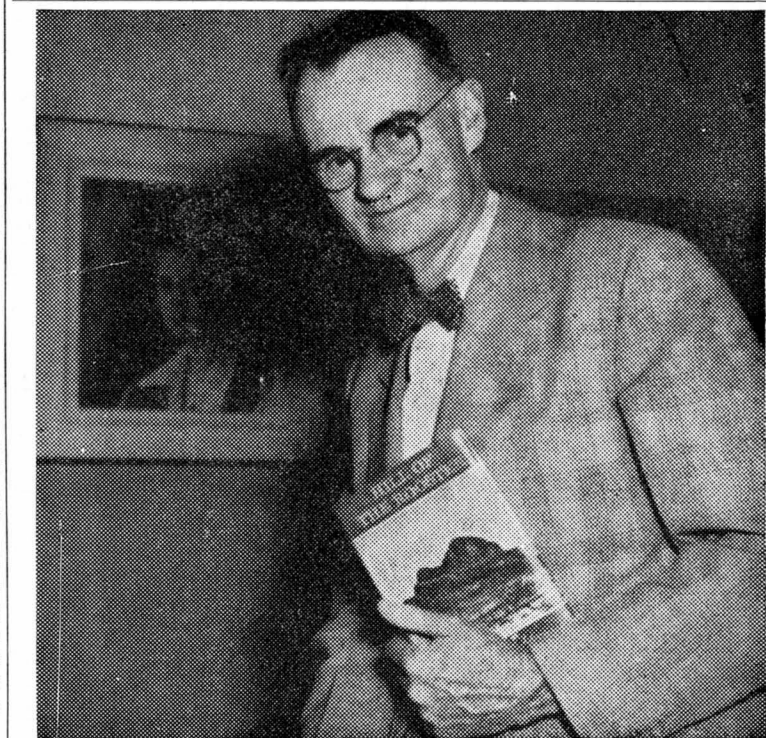
As the Institute grows, it should be able to offer West Texas industry and business specialized help and skills not available elsewhere in the area, Dr. Bradford declared.

Authorization of the new Institute came slightly more than a week after Board approval of fund solicitation for a West Texas Bureau of Business Research at Tech. Funds for the business research agency will be sought by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The two moves are the latest steps in efforts to develop Tech into an educational institution offering research and service of the first class, according to the mandate of the Legislature's founding act in 1923.

Dr. E. N. Jones, Tech president, said, "The establishment of the Institute of Engineering Research and plans for the Bureau of Business Research represent the consummation of long and intense effort on the parts of the Division of Engineering and the Division of Business Administration."

"By thus using the resources both in personnel and equipment on the campus for solution of major problems in industry and business, Tech will not only be making a contribution to the companies and corporations using the services provided, but will increase the quality of its educational program," Dr. Jones pointed out. "We are highly gratified by these developments."

Special Education Workshop Is Held

The regular department of education summer program features graduate work leading to the master of science and doctor of education degrees. It also supplies needs for certification in teaching, school administration and guidance and counseling.

hard assignments. But he also challenges the superior men in his classes with questions that require their best creative thinking.

"Almost every student if given enough encouragement—in this instance, more work than he would like to do—will actually succeed," Turnbow said.

A strict classroom disciplinarian, Turnbow nevertheless is friendly and well liked by students. His office usually is occupied by someone wanting counseling.

He also encourages his students to join him in two hobbies, sailboating and glider flying. The students gain practical experience from the sports, too, because both involve engineering mechanics principles.

Turnbow is a member of the Soaring Assn. of Texas board of directors.

In addition to teaching, he is doing research for the Army Quartermaster Corps on methods of cushioning materials dropped from the air.

Materials are dropped by parachute in some of Turnbow's experiments, but in some instances other means of retardation are used. In one phase of the subject, he has succeeded in dropping a Jeep 40 feet without damage.

Turnbow is a registered professional engineer in Texas and a member of Tau Beta Pi, national honorary engineering society, and Sigma Xi, national honorary graduate researchers' organization.

He ranked first in the mechanical engineering class and second in the Engineering Division class when he received a Bachelor of Science degree from Tech in June, 1940.

He joined the University of Texas faculty in 1948 while working on a Master of Science degree in engineering mechanics. He has taught at Oklahoma A&M College, worked for North American Aviation Corp. as a design engineer and served as an Army Ordnance Department captain during World War II.

Casa Linda Makes Move Off Campus

Casa Linda, Tech's cooperative house, has made its first move in 25 years.

When Tech opened its doors this fall, the old McClellan property was converted to house a new Casa Linda. The old Casa Linda property, a 2-story stucco building on the corner of Broadway and College, is being torn down to make way for the new girls' dormitory.

The McClellan property, which is located across from the campus on the corner of 19th and College, was given to Tech in 1953 by Mrs. Harriett E. McClellan in memory of her late husband, Clem McClellan. Proceeds from the sale of the property were to go for a new infirmary.

Between 15 and 19 girls live in Casa Linda and share house-keeping and cooking responsibilities.

Casa Linda was started by the Quarterly Club before any women's dorms had been built because there were not enough places for girls to live at reasonable prices during the first years of the college. It was the first officially named building on the campus.

The first Casa Linda was a house rented on Main Street. Two years later the college built the building that has been used as the cooperative house for 25 years.

Phyllis Sears is president of Casa Linda. Dorothy Foltyn is house director and Priscilla Baumgardner is business manager.

Other officers are: Dorothy Lowery, vice president; Betsy Donovan, secretary - treasurer; Helen Etheredge, historian; and Lavanda Vinson, assistant business manager. Dean Jacqueline Sterner is Casa Linda adviser.

Woody Herman Plays For Dance

Woody Herman and his Third Herd, the band that has won the Metronome poll, been cited by Parade and Time for bringing back dancing, and which recently played a series of record breaking engagements on the Pacific Coast, come to Tech Saturday, Nov. 3, as the first big-name group to play at a Homecoming celebration here.

Their appearance will also mark the largest dance ever held at Tech as exes and students alike are scheduled to hold forth in Lubbock's new Coliseum beginning at 8 p.m. Tickets are on sale in the Ex-Students office, the Student Union Building, Hemphill-Wells Co. and Dunlap's at \$3 per couple for students and \$4 per couple for exes.

Herman, who has recently signed with Capitol records, is one of the most popular bandleaders in the music business. A triple threat performer—he sings, plays the clarinet and the alto saxophone—Herman will present his entire orchestra of 15 world-famous instrumentalists and a lovely girl vocalist. They come directly from successful engagements at the Blue Note in Chicago, the Palladium Ballroom in Hollywood, and Basin Street in New York.

Often called the "youngest old-timer in the music business," Herman has been playing professionally for over 30 years. He was born in 1913, was a vaudeville star when only nine, a star with a big name band when he was in his teens, and made his first phonograph record when he was only 20.

Latest hits of his band are "Muskrat Ramble," "Woodchopper's Mambo" and "Mexican Hat Trick,"—all among the top band records of the year.

Enrollment Shows Women In Minority

One to three is the ratio of women to men students at Tech, according to a breakdown in fall enrollment released from the Registrar's office.

Total enrollment is 8,055, a gain of 900 over last year. Of that figure, 6,089 are men and 1,966 women.

Arts and Sciences lead the other schools with an enrollment of 2,793. School of Engineering is a close second with 2,449. Running third is Business Administration with a sum of 1,514.

Agriculture and Home Economics have 819 and 422 respectively. The ratio is, expectedly, lopsided in these schools, which claim four female ag majors and seven male "home ec" students.

In enrollment by classes, the freshmen have built up an overwhelming lead of 927 over second place sophomores. Their totals are 2,778 and 1,851. The juniors and seniors follow with 1,615 and 1,362 respectively.

Gym Work Halted By Lack Of Steel

Construction on Tech's gymnasium-natorium, begun last spring, has been delayed because of a shortage of steel, according to Marshall Pennington, Tech Vice President and Comptroller.

Work on the gymnasium has been at a standstill for approximately two months because of the lack of steel, Pennington stated. Deliveries are expected to begin within the next two weeks, and work should resume by the middle of November.

Other materials for the building, which is to be structural steel, have already been obtained, or are within sight. The arrival of the steel will set the wheels turning toward completion of the gymnasium, long needed on the Tech campus.

The foundation of the building is virtually completed, Pennington pointed out, and completion should be sometime next summer.

The million-dollar structure will contain 45,000 square feet of space for men's physical education classes. A 42 by 75 foot swimming pool will have spectator space for 300 persons. Also featured will be two handball courts, a gym apparatus room, two practice basketball courts, one varsity size court, with locker and basket facilities for 3,500 men.

Judging Team Wins In Kansas City Meet

Tech's livestock team placed first in beef cattle judging, fourth in hog judging and an overall tenth in collegiate judging at the American Royal Livestock Exposition in Kansas City Sunday.

Monroe Henderson garnered high individual honors in hog judging, Don Brothers was second in individual awards in beef cattle and the whole Tech squad was among the high ten in beef cattle classing.

Stanley Anderson, associate professor of animal husbandry, is coach of the livestock team which left the campus Wednesday and returns to Tech Thursday. Other team members are: Monty Griffin, Charles Probandt, Clarence Smith and Troy Jones.

Unusual Bulletin Board Cartoons Draw Wide Tech Student Attention

Since 1951, Techsians have had their crowded passage down the hall in the first floor, west wing of the Ad Building made considerably more pleasant by the presence of a most unusual bulletin board. There's a story behind that board—the one always covered with jokes—according to Dean of Student Life James G. Allen.

Five years ago, a committee, of which Dean Allen was a member, examined the campus bulletin boards. His opinion was that most of them were not noticed because

they had no eye appeal and were not changed often enough. So—the board outside the student life office is changed on the average of once a week and jokes are added. Circle To Be Built By Saddle Tramps

The Saddle Tramp's Circle, a pep rally area featuring a circular bonfire pit, will be built in the near future on the Tech campus.

A project of the men's service organization whose name it will bear, the circle is to be approximately 20 feet in diameter with a 2-foot retaining wall. It should be completed southwest of the new gymnasium in time for football season next year.

Figurines representing the mascots of the Southwest Conference schools will be mounted on the retaining wall around the circle. The pep rally area around the circle is designed to accommodate over 5,000 persons.

To be used for burning effigies of opponent teams and bonfires during pep rallies, the gravel-bottom circle will eliminate such problems as grass scorching, fire hazards, and make more campus bonfires possible.

The Saddle Tramp committee in charge of investigating materials and cost are Wayne James, chairman; Ronnie Couch, Scott Hickman, Jack Becker, and Gene Miles.

Plans were executed by Professor Elo J. Urbanovsky, head of Tech's horticulture and park management departments.

New Regulations, Larger Traffic Force Ease Parking Problems on Campus

New regulations designed to prevent impossible traffic snarls before they ever develop and make on-campus driving and parking as convenient as possible are in effect at Tech this fall.

Under past rules, Tech could expect up to 5,800 vehicles on campus during a regular school day, S. E. Thomson, new chief security officer, believes. So far this year, a total of 5,462 parking permits have been issued to faculty, staff and students. Freshmen have been issued 774 parking permits; off-campus students, 2,968; south dormitory residents, 265; north dormitory residents, 530; faculty and staff, 925. But there are only 3,978 parking spaces.

Nearly all institutions of higher education in this country are facing the traffic problem, brought on by rapidly rising enrollments, according to Thomson. Some of them have banned cars in certain categories, such as the freshman class. Others have done nothing in the way of special regulations,

letting the drivers "fight it out" for themselves.

The new Tech rules are thought to be the most convenient and practical for all persons connected with the institution, Thomson declared.

Perhaps the biggest change from Tech's previous traffic program concerns the parking of freshman cars. All freshmen who have entered Tech since June 1 are required to park their vehicles on the lot east of Jones Stadium between 7 a.m. and 3:15 p.m. daily. After 3:15 p.m., they may park in any of the student lots except dormitory spaces.

Dormitory students must leave their cars in dorm lots while attending class. Off-campus students will park in other designated lots. Special parking areas are again set aside for the faculty and staff as well as physically handicapped persons.

This year, freshman stickers are small green circles, off-campus student stickers are red, north See TRAFFIC, Page 3

Miss Watkins, a transfer from NTSC, is studying elementary education. She is a member of Alpha Lambda Delta and FTA.

Jordan is a sophomore in the School of Arts and Sciences while Miss Dierschke is a senior business education major.

A journalism senior, Mrs. Kaisner also edits the Texas Techsan, alumni magazine, and is a member of Theta Sigma Phi.

Electronic Era Opens Educational Frontier

The South Plains has a new set of pioneers—13 students who have enrolled at Tech for the first college-level course ever given in this area through television.

The course is in education and is designed to alleviate the increasingly serious teacher shortage.

Although it carries no academic credit, a person who has a bachelor's degree but no education courses can sign up for it and secure a temporary teaching certificate by completing the requirements of 26 lessons.

Each Saturday at 11:30 a.m., 13 Tech students in nine South Plains communities sit in front of their TV sets and take instructions from Dr. Olive Wheeler or another member of the Tech education department.

Many other persons undoubtedly watch the program, but have not signed up for it through the Tech or Wayland College extension departments.

Official students are doing special readings in addition to watching TV. They will be given written examinations later in order to complete course requirements.

If a person who completes the course wants a permanent teaching certificate in Texas, he or she will have to take only 18 semester hours of regular education courses rather than 24 hours.

Each of the 22 girls was interviewed individually by the judges who selected the five finalists on the basis of personality, beauty, and appearance.

Questions asked the candidates

Mortar Board Affiliation In Sight

Forum, Tech's senior women's honorary, has been given the "go-ahead" sign from the council of Mortar Board to proceed in its petition of the select women's honor society. Forum's chances to become the third Texas college chapter in Mortar Board look better than ever.

Mortar Board is a national sen-

ior women's honor society with 125 chapters in all parts of the United States. Its primary aims are service, leadership and scholarship on campus.

Three hurdles remain, however, before a Mortar Board chapter can be established at Tech.

First, the national expansion director will contact surrounding chapters at the University of Texas, S. M. U., Oklahoma A&M, the University of Tulsa, the University of Oklahoma and the University of New Mexico.

If those six chapters unanimously consent to Forum's admission, the group will be notified to prepare a formal petition to be mailed to all chapters of Mortar Board, for unanimous approval.

If each chapter votes "yes," Miss Daisy Parker, expansion director, will come to Tech for installation of Forum into Mortar Board and plans will be made for initiation of both present and former Forum members into the national organization.

"Every member of Forum would be eligible for Mortar Board if a chapter were installed here," according to former national secretary Miss Thelma Lockwood, who made Mortar Board's first visit to Tech in 1954.

When vice-president, Mrs. Carl G. Swanson, Jr., visited here last spring she said that Forum was ready, but that limited personnel in Mortar Board made acceptance technicalities slow.

"Forum certainly has a better-than-average chance for becoming a member of Mortar Board by the fact that two national representatives have investigated it in the last two years," she said.

In April she surveyed the program facilities of Tech and Forum and conferred with Forum members, President E. N. Jones and other key Tech administrators.

One of Forum's sponsors, Miss Sue Rainey, said that all Forum exes should send to Forum notification of their interest in becoming Mortar Board members. She added that if their pictures were not in the Tech annual, that they will need verification of membership by two former Forum members.

At present Forum has 16 members, "tapped" last spring as a procession of Forum members filed to the class of each selected girl and placed the symbolic black collar around her neck while the Matador Song rang from the Administration Building tower.

Officers are Mary Randal, pres-

ident; Joanne Holmes, vice-president; Lu Ann McNeill, treasurer and Kay Robinson, secretary. Sponsors besides Miss Rainey are Mrs. James Whitehead, wife of the dean of men and Miss Jacqueline Sterner, assistant dean of women.

Before Forum could become eligible for membership in Mortar Board, Tech had to be recognized by the American Association of University Women. This was done in 1949, 24 years after Forum was established. It was that year expansion directors of Mortar Board first requested correspondence from Forum president in regard to services performed at Tech.

Membership requirements also specify that the Mortar Board chapter be the only senior girl honorary organization on the campus and that members have a 1.9 overall grade point average.

Probably no group of basketball fans will ever experience a more marked contrast in spectator comfort than will Texas Tech's rooters.

From the crowded, uncomfortable "old barn," as Tech's gym has been not-so-affectionately dubbed since 1926, fans move this year into the beautiful, spacious Lubbock Municipal Coliseum.

Instead of there barely being room for some 2,000 persons to sit on bleachers behind a score or so of upright posts, there will be a seating capacity of 10,000. Of this number, 7,500 will be able to sit in folding, theater-type seats. Two thousand five hundred more will be able to see the game in

chairs on risers located on the arena floor.

And no one will sit behind a post. Furthermore, the folding seats have enough leg room to permit a person to pass in front of another without the latter having to rise.

Fans no longer will have to guess at how many minutes remain. At both ends of the coliseum there is a modern scoreboard.

As far as beauty is concerned, the court itself is of sparkling finished maple with scarlet and black lines and a large "Double T."
