some have been planted
this year - laying idle -

agents planting the back
yards in something and
at the same time there
is thousands of huge
tractors idle and the
fence corners strewed with

(5) farm implements and
the roads strewn with awlons
decorated with flags and the
streets lined with drummers
and agents - all and more
right here in the valley.
Land has come down in
price from 50 to 75% - say
prairie land that sold
3 years ago for 100 and \$150 -
can now be had at \$50
to \$75 and is now pretty
well improved - and land
that sold then for \$50
to 60 in the brush and
now pretty well improved
with house on it. can be
had for \$25 - to \$30 per acre
you see what the land has
and grafter was getting
from the Homesteaders they

⑥ called them - but I call them like myself suckers. thousands have had to give up an account of not being able to meet their interest and payments - some being thrown out leaving their crops - people are getting wise to these things - and the land hog sees the hand writing on the wall - I believe the time is ripe and ready for all the class conscious socialist to rally together and concentrate their efforts - organize cooperative colonies as near like the Llano Rio del Rio colony of California if they have to do it at a

① considerable financial loss or inconvenience for the present. we have let the golden time pass. but I don't believe its too late yet. and I know that the Llano colony is making more socialist than all other agitators and publications in the united states put together. the eyes of the world is on them. and they are proving to them that cooperation will go under a socialistic

management and democraticly controlled. besides they will be better prepared to withstand the winds and some hail and rains that will beat upon them than

8 we know one left out
in this cold world to
fight the wolf alone.
They are better prepared
to take care of themselves
and the women and children
of those that will be taken
away and carried to that
awful slaughter pen -
and now while the capitalists
have their guns turned
the other way. Lets colonise
and if in the end we
fail we cant be no worse
off. but I believe we
can organise a colony site
here in the Rio Grande valley
on a little different plain
of the Llano Colono and
make a go of it. anyway

Dallas Texas Nov. 4 1917.

Dear Comrade. I am sending this on the back of one of the pleas for help, only because paper is scarce, and there was a few of them left that we did not get mailed out before the three cent postage came. So we are not sending out any more. Poor Clark was hustled away to Chicago before your first contribution came, but he received every dollar. I myself sent it to him in a money order registered letter., and the card came back with his name signed in his own hand so I know he got it. I am handling his defense funds at his request , and I would sooner steal the handles off my Fathers coffin than to use a penny of it for any other purpose , and all our friends who know us both , know that , that is true. I am working as a typist at the western Union and I have sent out for Clark 1778 letters and all but the last five hundred, I pounded out on the typewriter, four at a time , after my nine hours for the corporation was done. I thank you from my heart for what you have done and Clark thanks you too. It was a brave thing to do in this hour , when it is even dangerous to be acquainted with a real radical. Your contribution was the largest received to date. We have received exactly \$119.00 one hundred and nineteen dollars. I have a complete list of names , addresses, dates and amount. Covington Hall thinks the men are in grave danger for the present strike in the oil fields and refineries and the threatened sympathetic tie-up in the lumber districts will make the copper strike and the other strikes of the past look like children's play. and now is the time when you will see Standard Oil show its teeth and fangs. I expect to see vengeance wreaked on any workingman who is helpless and within their grasp. Both Hall and Smith say history is in the making rapidly now. I am living in terror, not for myself , but for what may happen to Clark. I got an awfully sweet letter from Debbs, telling me not to worry, that they were all coming clear, but you know Debbs is an optimist. I had better close before I say some things that wont get through the mail. Yours Loyally Dora Merts Clark.

Dallas, Texas, Oct. 25, 1917.

Dear Comrade:

You have no doubt been called upon to contribute till you dread to open your mail for fear it is some call to help.

However, I must tell my friends of my troubles to have even a fighting chance to escape an unjust sentence to years in prison.

You, perhaps, have heard of my arrest at Wichita Falls charged with "seditious utterances" and my release under fifteen thousand dollar bond. Later, I was rearrested charged with "conspiracy against the government" and held in the Federal jail at Tyler for twenty thousand dollar bond. I am not guilty of either of these charges

My first trial comes up at Wichita Falls Nov. 19th, and I have not a dollar to defend myself. My lawyer insists that I will need not less than fifteen hundred dollars, and my only hope to get together any amount is the generosity of my friends.

I do not regret the twenty years given to the cause of humanity, and I shall not if I am sent to the penitentiary for it, but I would like a fair trial.

So I am calling on all the faithful to remember me while contributing to the numerous defenses, and to help as much as you feel able in my efforts to get some money to fight for my liberty.

Send all contributions to me at Dallas, Texas.

And show this letter to the comrades, please, for I have not even postage.

My reason for not answering your letter is, that it came to my office during a prolonged absence from the city and then was lost in the shuffle by my secretary. Obviously, it would be impossible for me to say what the action of the officials would be with reference to a setting of your case should you be re-arrested. I have been able to follow the Texas cases only in a fragmentary way. So much has happened since we met in Washington that I scarcely would know how to advise you. Suffice it to say, that I shall render you any personal assistance that is in my power at any time, although, with my present professional engagements, I would hate to have to go to Texas. I wish you would drop me a letter upon receipt of this and let

I have written all socialist whose names I could remember that I was in a receptive mood for the appointment of Chief Can Inspector in the first Revolutionary Cabinet formed under the Socialist Republic, I'm taking this opportunity to solicit your support. One request, seriously, if the Federal Jury bills me in Wichita Falls next week (which it will) they may ship me from this Can to Wichita Falls for trial at once, our Can never tell. If they do I shall wire you to that effect. On receiving the wire get in touch at once with Chas McMurray of Vernon and others and meet me in Wichita with bonds.

I think if they do not return me to Texas I will be able to bond here by Dec 1st if they do return me I will make bond there for appearance here. There is much that I would appreciate writing but the Post Office officials appear to find revolutionary statements in the Lords Prayer so I fear

We have not the slightest idea
when we will get a trial some of
us may never be tried, we are forced
to play the game with liberty as the
stake with loaded dice against us +

such conditions -

Dear Comrade Hickey:

Your appeal of Sep. 1 came to hand on the seventeenth, yesterday, and I was surprised to learn of the suppression of the dear old Rebel, so you see how well posted I am; and you say it occurred on June 9, and I had been so anxious to get settled so I could renew my subscription.

We are members of that great and growing class, the wagon tramp, traveling the tin can route, and, at the present stage of the game, find it increasingly difficult to keep our heads above water, or rather to keep ourselves fed, and if the cause of humanity is dependent on us, husband and me, I fear it won't survive long.

Husband is sixty five and rheumat-
ic besides, and while I am nearing
sixty, I am quite spry and healthy for
that age, and might earn a few dol-
lars I would freely invest in our
beloved cause, if I was in a thickly
settled part of the country, I know
of nothing I could do here to earn
any money at all.

I have none, therefore, can not share
with you in your hour of need, much
as I wish I could.

You say The Rebel is the largest
paper suppressed.

That relieves me of one fear while
it has confirmed the other.

A sister wrote me it was such a
pity about the suppression of the
liberal papers, but did not name
any, and I asked her to name them,
and have heard no more from her,
so I did not know what paper had

been destroyed, till you notified me.

There is much to congratulate our cause on in the fact that we have some papers strong enough, that may be they dare not suppress them.

Yes, Dear Comrades, I can see in the few "Wenro-rot" papers I get to read, that they are using the war fever for many vile purposes, and our Texas officials at Washington and Austin, too, are pliant tools in this terrible administration.

Of course Tom Watson roars right in his claim of violation of the constitution in the draft-law, but the venial attorney Generals will uphold Wilson and his Congress in forcing the flower of America's young manhood into a life of servitude as soldiers.

Dear Comrades, I don't know
if there ^{is} a Socialist in this county,
much less a local.

I asked the postmistress sometime
ago if anyone received a Rebel or
Appeal at Blythe P. O. and she said,
"No; there has never been one here".

So, I know of no way that I could
assist you, much as I have loved
the Rebel, and the stand you've
occupied has always commanded
my admiration and unqualified
approval, and I wish I could help.






