Taylor's Brigade, Early's Division, Stonewall Jackson's corps, Army
of Northern Virginia, and on the organization of his regiment was
made Sergeant Major of the regiment. He participated in the battles
of Cross-Keys, Fort Republic, Gaines Mill, Malvern Hill, Cedar Mountain,
Bristow Station, Second Manassas, first and second days at Harpers
Ferry, Sharpsburg, Rappahanock Station, Gettysburg, The Wilderness,
and other minor engagements participated in by the renowned corps of
Jackson. He was wounded several times, and lost an arm in one of the
engagements. His record as a soldier was distinguished by courage,
fidelity and constant service with his commands, when not disabled by
wounds, up to the close of the war.

After the close of the War, Comrade Littlejohn came to the State of Texas and engaged in business at Marshall, and for the last thirty years his residence and place of business has been in the city of Fort Worth.

His integrity was never questioned, and his generous heart was always open to help those whomneeded his help. He was faithful to every duty as husband and father.
