### LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF GARLAND, TEXAS

LOCAL POLICY GUIDE Approved Nov. 4, 1968 Revised April 12, 1971

The League of Women Voters of Garland urges all members, except those serving as officers or Board members, to work actively in the party of their choice. Members are encouraged to attend any and all administrative meetings of county, city, and school districts where they may participate as private citizens. However, they may not speak for the League as the president or someone she designates shall at all times speak in the name of the League.

All members should refrain from any discussion of a candidate or of partisan

matters at League meetings.

### NON-PARTISANSHIP

The Bylaws of the LWV state that the League "shall not support or oppose any political party or any candidate." This policy of non-partisanship is the foundation

of the effectiveness and prestige of the League throughout the country.

It is the duty of the Board to support and protect this policy. In order to insure this non-partisan method of operation and in order that the public may be convinced that the League's non-partisanship is bona fide, the members of the Board of the League of Women Voters of Garland do not engage in any partisan political activity during their term of League leadership. This policy applies only to members of the Board because they plan League activities, conduct League business, and act for the League.

A Board member may not hold an elective office, actively promote a candidate, hold office or work actively in her political organization. A Board member may attend precinct meetings but may not be elected to any party position. She may not display signs in her yard stating the candidate of her choice, display bumper stick-

ers, etc.

A Board member must resign from the Board before announcing her candidacy for an elective public office in time for the Board first to make public announcement of her resignation. Should any member of the immediate family of a League Board member become a candidate for public office, her resignation from the Board shall be decided upon by the Board. Any position or activity that might reflect a conflict of interest with League work or stated position should be discussed with the Board and decided on a case-to-case basis. If the Board feels that there is conflict of interest, the Board may request the individual to resign.

A Board member shall at all times weigh what she says in the light of the non-

partisanship policy of the League.

### ROSTER

Membership lists are for the use and convenience of members in carrying out League work only. Its use by other non-League organizations must have Board approval. A statement to this effect shall appear on the annual League membership roster.

### PUBLICATIONS

The Garland VOTER shall not carry any announcements for fund raising projects other than League. Any articles of civic interest to Garland shall be considered by the editor.

### BUDGET REVISION

The Board may designate the revision of the budget, by the treasurer or a committee, if it becomes necessary. This revision is subject to Board approval and shall be submitted to the membership if it is a large expenditure.

<u>POLICY STATEMENT</u> The Board shall review this policy statement annually and may alter, eliminate, or retain any or all parts of it. When approved by the Board, it should be sent to all members of the local League.

Dear LWV Member,

It is with deep regret that I inform you that after long and diligent work the nominating committee is unable to arrive at a slate of officers and directors to nominate at the annual meeting. The following have agreed to be nominated: Christine Lewis, First Vice President; Jane Brewer, Secretary; Cleo Treece, Observer Corp; Mary Raines, Public Relations. The present officers and directors whose terms of office have not expired are: Betty Herrmann, Third Vice President; Joan Hunt, Treasurer; Irene Thompson, Publications; M. J. Ayers, Voter Editor. Positions that must be filled are: President, Second Vice President, Membership Director, State Program Director and National Program Director.

At our March 1 Board meeting it was decided to change our annual meeting from March 25 to <u>April 8</u> to allow our league membership (that means you) to study the options open to them. The meeting will be held at the Terrace Room, First National Bank of Garland at 7:30 p.m.

#### OPTION I

At annual meeting the membership may nominate a complete slate of officers and directors. Be sure you have consent of nominee.

OPTION II - UNIT OF AN AREA LEAGUE

You can vote to become a unit of an area League (probably Dallas or Richardson). Both our membership and that of the other League would have to approve merger by majority vote. Under this plan we would transfer our funds and equipment and also, pay dues to the area League. We would follow the calendar of the other area League. We would have unit meetings in Garland. Local action and study would be possible with permission of parent board.

Finance Drives would be conducted in both cities. We would need to elect a Unit Chairman and a membership chairman.

### OPTION III UNIT AT LARGE

We could vote to become a unit at Large of State League. This would require 10 or more members. Dues of \$15 would be paid directly to the State League. We would plan programs with a state advisor. We would get state and national publications needed for programs. It would be necessary to submit a monthly report to state and to have 9 or more unit meetings a year. Garland could provide Voter Service, with local funding, and with permission of the State Board. We would be able to keep our current assets. On a new finance drive we would keep 75% and send 25% to the state organization. We would be able to take action on local positions which we already have consensus, with approval by state. We would not be able to undertake new local studies.

All LWV activities in a unit at large community are under the direction of and with the approval of state board. We would need to elect a Chairman and a Secretary/Treasurer.

#### OPTION IV DISBAND

Fold our tents and silently steal away. We would notify the State League and turn all assets over to them.

THIS IS A VERY IMPORTANT MEETING! The decisions will be made at this meeting. Do not wait a couple of months and thensay, "If I had know Garland League needed me..." or "I wish we had...". Now is the time and YOU are needed. See you April 8, Terrace Room, First National Bank.

b. Information to community: Publicity-We discussed the KYT Survey with businessmen called upon during our finance drive. Newspaper articles have preceded each of our KYT meetings and a follow-up article on the general meeting with our city officials (see below).

Meetings: We have had three sets of units (1 each on education in Garland, Local Program Making, and general discussion of the KYT) and two general meetings: one a "go-see" tour of city facilities, the other "Directions for Garland" with guest speakers (Mayor, City Manager, and Chairman of the Planning Commission).

Publications: "Know Your Elected Officials" (as per Voter's Service Report) have been distributed. The KYT Survey will hopefully be published and distributed this year.

a. Extent of coverage -- We have covered all of the State Program items.

Unit meeting breakdown, as follows: TCR (2), Texas Executive (3), Texas

Legislature (2), State Program Making (1), and on May 14 we held a set of

units on State-Local Relations and Voter Registration (no program report

attached for this date). Some consensus has emerged on each of those items

studied. All have had advance information in the Garland VOTER.

b. Information to community -- Publicity: Advance newspaper articles have appeared before each of our units.

Meetings: (See a. above) No General meetings on State Program items have been held but in all publicity on units we have invited interested women to attend.

Distribution of publications: the TCR booklet has been given to the library and 200 copies of the booklet were distributed to the two high schools.

National Program

a. Extent of coverage -- We have covered all the National Program Items. We have had good coverage and emerging consensus on all items. General information in the Garland VOTER prior to meetings and detailed information as space allowed on those items not being studied that particular month. Unit meeting breakdown, as follows: Electoral College (2), Human Resources (3), China  $(2\frac{1}{2})$ , United Nations  $(\frac{1}{2})$ , a study of the Texas Water Plan (1), Foreign Policy - Aid (2), Tax Rates and Treaty Making  $(\frac{1}{2})$ , Representative Government  $(\frac{1}{2})$ , and Water Resources (1). Our final unit this year will be entitled "Human Resources -- The Headstart Program in Garland". General Meetings - see below.

b. Information to community -- Publicity: Advance newspaper articles of all units and general meetings. National office release of China consensus was picked up by our local paper.

Meetings: One general meeting on the United Nations with guest speaker (the President of the Dallas U.N. Association) and one general meeting on <u>local</u> water resources and pollution with guest speaker (city sanitarian).

Distribution of publications: "Choosing the President" given to the library.

NOTE: Copies of all program reports (except the May 14 State Program units) are attached.

9.c. Evidence of ability to carry the full League Program and understanding of the requirements in this regard.

From the above reports and the attached program reports I feel we have carried the full League Program for two years. I see no reason why we cannot continue to do so. We have a good nucleus of members who are vitally interested in program and are willing to serve as resource persons.

- 10. Voters Service activities.
  - a few hundred Voters Guides (from the Dallas LWV) were distributed before the May, 1968, Primary Election.

2500 Voters Guides and 300 copies of the National VOTER special edition were distributed prior to the Nov., 1968, General Election.

2000 Voters Guides were distributed before the Aug., 1969, Constitutional Amendment Election.

Prior to the May 2, 1970, Primary Election -- 1,000 State and 1,000 County Voters Guides were distributed in Garland, many with cover letters to the businesses and churches informing them of a candidates carnival (co-sponsored by the Dallas LWV) and with an attached coupon which they could

return indicating the quantities of Voters Guides they would like to be serviced with in the future.

Participation in the Texas Citizenship Test, 3/11/69. Six of our members took the test at the television studio, publicity in the <u>Garland Daily News</u> with the test form, test forms (paid for by the Garland Business and Professional Women's Club) were distributed to 1300 High School students.

Articles in our local newspaper reminding people to vote and to register.

Labor Day Parade (1968) -- "Please Vote" theme

Punch Card voting demonstrations at units in October, 1968.

"Know Your Elected Officials" distributed: Spring, 1969 -- 500

Fall, 1969 -- 500

NOTE: Because of the pressures of other jobs that needed to be done and a limit to our "womanpower" we have purposely kept Voters Service to a minimum. We want to do more next year if money, time, and members are available.

11. To what extent are publications being used by the members? in the community?

Approximately 20% of our members regularly buy the facts & issues and other publications available. We have no subscription service at this time.

We have "Choosing the President", "Is Politics Your Job?", "The Role of the Political Parties", and the TCR booklet available in our library. And 200 copies of the TCR booklet have been given to our two high schools. We plan on servicing our library with the following publications: "Who Should Elect the President", "Crisis", and the "Ill-housed".

PROVINCENTAL LEAGUE OF MOMEN VOTERS OF CARLIND General Meeting - October 10, 1968

The Provisional League of Women Voters of Garland, Texas, met for a General Meeting on October 10, 1968, at 7:30 p.m. in the Community Macm of the Pirst National Bank. Mrs. Charles Heaberlin, President, welcomed the mambers and their guests. There were 23 people present, all of them LAW mambers except for two or three. It might be noted that two Garland Deily News articles had publicised the meeting, the membership committee had made telephone calls urging members to bring their husbands and friends, and invitations were sent to the city councilsen and the mayor. Replies of prior commitments were received from two of the councilmen. In addition, approximately 50 churches were asked to invite their members through their church bulletins.

Mrs. Harry Cerroll, membership chairman, reported that the Garland Provisional LWV has 61 members at the present time, and displayed a map of the city showing the residence of each member with a sequined pin. The amazingly even distribution of members throughout the city was noted.

Mrs. Robert Lehr, Jr., Voters Service Chairman, announced the time and places that Voters Guides would be distributed. She also called attention to the fact that the Provisional LWV of Garland would provide transportation to anyone needing it to the polls on Movember 5.

Mrs. C. H. Ulrickson, Organizational Vice President, reminded members to be sure to get the Facts & Issues publications on the Legislature so they could be prepared for the next unit meeting.

Mrs. Gary Wull, Publications Chairman, called attention to the display of publications, stressing that there was an ample supply of free UN materials.

Mrs. S. A. Good made several announcements regarding meetings of interest to LAN members in the Dallas-Forth Worth area.

Mrs. Robert Berensprung announced that a demonstration of how to use the "punch card voting machines" would be presented at the unit meetings on October 24.

First Vice President Mrs. Z. G. Dodd introduced Mr. Robert L. Lichten, President of the Dallas U.M. Association who spoke on "The UM - Where Is It Headed?" Mr. Lichten armounced that there would be a meeting of the Dallas UM Association on United Nations Day, October 24, at 8:00 p.m. in McFarlin Auditorium at SMU, with Marsha Hunt and Francisco Cuevas Cancino, Mexican UN Ambassador as quest apeakers.

He empahsized that the purpose of the UN is in the field of keeping the peace. The U.M. is a forum where representatives from countries around the world can come to talk through and work out differences and where, in some cases, they can reach agreements through talk instead of attempting to settle them through fighting wars.

Mrs Lichten reported that he would attempt to answer a few frequentlyasked questions. (1) Why is the UN run by communists? The operation of the W is shared by member countries, so, consequently some communist country officials have responsible positions, though they do not predominate.

(2) Why is the UN against religion? There are no preyers in opening sessions; many different religions are represented in the UM and there is a meditation

room in the UN building.

(3) Where is the UN headed? What about the financial setup? Is the US really footing the bill? France and Russia have not peid for peace-keeping dues but have paid the operational dues - they feel the UM (in the peacekeeping area) has taken a role detrimental to their own countries and, therefore, refuse to pay the total dues. In 1965 the estimated per capita cost of the entire UN system to the American taxpayer was 99 cents, with 190 going for the regular budget, 5 1/2 ¢ for military and peace-keeping operations, 55¢ for relief agencies, and 19 1/2¢ for specialized agencies.

There are 122 nations represented in the General Assembly - with one wote each, no matter what the size of the country - a meeting place of unequals. In the Security Council, effective action can come only through agreement, because of the veto power. As years go by and there are increasing tensions and confrontations, the UN should be an effective force for keeping the world in one paece - somehow.

Mr. Lichten then answered questions from the floor.

Mrs. Heaberlin expressed our gratitude to Mr. Lichten for his presentation, and the meeting was adjourned, with punch, coffee and cookies served following the meeting.

TEXAS LEGISLATURE
UDITS

Our study of the Texas Legislature left many of us feeling that there is much, much more that we need to know. Fortunately, this is a continuing studying item to which we can return next year.

Both the morning and night units agreed that the Texas Legislature should have annual sessions, that business should be carried over from one session to the next, that there should be a published verbatim record of the proceedings of each house of the legislature, and legislators should have higher salaries.

They also agreed that legislators need more professional help and improved facilities for research, information, and bill drafting, including the use of electronic aids.

There was general agreement that Texas Lobby Control Legislation does not adequately regulate improper lobbying practices. Two suggestions for improvement from both the morning and night units are to require year round reporting of expenditures by the lobby and to require lobbyists to report their primary employers, not just the intermediaries.

We are pleased that so many of our members came to the meetings and entered into the discussions. We are especially appreciative of our hard-working resource people, Mildred Rupard and June Good.

A committee of four people made a thorough study \$6 the materials on Human Resources including "Crisis" and all the Facts and Issues." "Focus on Community Action", "Model Cities", and facts from the Kerner report were used as background material since we realized we were "new in a rogram that has been well under way for several years in older Leagues. se determined that such an extensive subject would require three unit meetings and we attem ted to create initial interest by using a skit in the first meeting. Posters were made in order to have the facts readily available and accurately presented.

The first unit meeting concentrated on the study of equal opportunity in education and employment, the second on housing, and the third was a review of all three subjects and consensus. The subject matter of all unit meetings necessarily overlapped since the issues are completely intertwined. We also distributed "Pair Housing: what It Means To You" put out by the Department of Mousing and Urban Leveloument.

The following questions were presented for Consensus at the third unit meeting. Limitations and qualifications follow the questions to which they apply. If discussion simply clarified or reinforced the question as a whole it is not noted. Some thought that a few of the questions were history rather than issues since wer are "New" at an "old" subject, but we believe they have provided a basis and a direction for future issues. Our attendence for the three unit meetings was recorded as 24 on Nov. 21, 19 on Dec. 12, and 26 on Jan. 9 when we reviewed and discussed the specific questions.

- 1. The following criteria sould be applied to federal programs providing equality of opportunity for educati maand employment:
  - a. The nationwide effort to achieve equality of opportunity in education and employment should include participation of government at all levels, and rivete institutions as well. (Yes, with emphasis on Local)
  - t. reagrams should be corefully tailored to the educational or employment needs of the peo.le they are intended to reach. (Yes)
  - reople for whom community action programs are designed should be involved in the plenning and implementation of those programs. (Yes, but see item "f")
  - d. trograms should ussist people to become self-supporting. contributing members of society (les)
  - e. The programs should be nondiscriminatory. (Yes. Nor should they necessarily employ reverse discrimination.)
  - f. The programs should be administered by qualified personnel. (Yes)
  - Research, pilot projects, and continuing evaluation should be encouraged and, where feasible built into pro rams. (Yes,
  - h. rrograms may be closely relatied but should avoid unnecessar y duplication. (Yes)
  - i. State and local governments should contribute to the extent their resources permit; at the same time adequate federal funds for the establishment and continuation of programs should be available if necessary. (Yes)

- 2. The following criteria should be applied to programs and policies to provide equal opportunity in access to housing:
  - e. The housing market should operate free of restrictions based on race, color, religion, national origin. (Yes)
  - b. Covernment at all levels and the private sector as well have a role to play in the nationwide effort to achieve equality of opportunity in access to housing. (Tes, with amphasis on local level)
  - c. In the enforcement of fair housing laws, administrative procedures and responsibilities should be clearly defined; mediation and legal redress should be readily available; funding should be adequate to help insure prompt enforcement and continued evaluation should be encouraged. Procedures should be revised when indicated. (Agreed in full)

(The following question was inserted by our committee in order to learn just how extensive our agreement would be. se were delighted to find that with the addition of the last phrase the support was affirmative.)

5. Should we support local projects im lementing existing laws concerning equal opportunities in education, employment and housing within our human resources consensus and upon approval of the Board. (Yes)

MRS. HACKETT GAVE A BRIEF EXPLANATION OF THE BUDGET AND THANKED THE COMMITTEE WHICH HAD WORKED IN COMPILING IT, AND UPON MOTION BY MRS. GOOD. IT WAS SECONDED AND NOVED TO ACCEPT THE PROPOSED BUDGET WORKSHEET AS PRESENTED.

### REPORT ON CHIMA UNIT MESTINGS

APRIL 10 124, 1969 CHINA UNITS

"China" unit meetings were hald on April 10 and April 24. The morning unit on April 10 met in the home of Mrs. Keith Muncy, with 6 members present. The evening unit on April 10 met in the home of Mrs. O.E. Ulrichson, with 11 members present. This unit meeting was devoted almost entirely to supplying information about China's geographical, historical and cultural background. Color slides and a narration entitled "China Pumale" based on the book of the same me from the Education office of the LAV, was used. Other esterial that the resource committee considered important to the subject was added during the narration. (Included were biographic of Sun Yat-sen, Chinag Kai-shek and Mac Tee-tung.) It was the China resource committee's hope that these facts would bring about a better understanding among League members, of the people of the "two Chinas" and their internal problems.

The evening unit on April 34 met in the home of Mrs. D.C. Kilgour, with 11 members present.

The evening unit on April 34 met in the home of Mrs. W.K. Sardin with 15 members and 3 visitor present. After a summary of the previous meeting, the resource people offered pertinent facts about Taiwan and Communist China, today. Consensus questions sent to us from the national office were used as a basis for formulating discussion questions. The first commensus question was, "that do you think our country's broad policy goals should be toward the People' Republic of China?" The resource people gave facts about China's Policy Toward Other Countries Other Country's Policy Toward China and United State's Policy Toward China. Then discussion was opened as to what U.S. broad policy goals should be toward Mainland China.

There was lively discussion as to whether or not building a "sphere of influence" in Asia is legitimate goal for the U.S. or for China. There was disagreement as to what the term "sphere of influence" seant. There was a wide variation of ideas on this subject and no agreement could be reached in either the morning or the evening meeting.

Next, discussion centered around whether or not the U.S. should continue her present policy of involvement in defense alliances whose objective is to tie China's neighbors to us in the her that we can thus deter the spread of communism. The morning unit concluded that we should continue our present policy of involvement if we do not limit our involvement to military aid only. The evening unit was undecided and was not unanimour as to whether or not our

present policy of involvement in defense alliances does dater the spread of communication.

Both & the morning and evening unit meetings concluded that the United States should attempt to strengthen communication lines with Communict China.

The second China Consensus question sent from "mational" was, "Do we support changes in specific policies" If so, in what direction" Facts about U.S. and other country's trade policies were presented by the resource countttee, leading to discussion of our policy toward trade with Communist China. Fear was expressed by the group as to the effects that any change in our policy might have upon our relationship with other countries, including Taiwan, and no decision was reached in either morning or evening unit, concerning trade policy.

Both morning and evening units thought a change in our policy toward cultural emchange would be an important way to strengthen our communication lines with Communist China. It was decided that our cultural exchange policy should be broader and be more liberal.

In conclusion, the units reached agreement that (1.) we definetely should attempt to strengthen our communication lines with Communist China and that (2.) one way that this could be accomplished is by making our policy toward cultural exchange broader and more liberal.

(3.) This could also be interpreted as taking a step in relaxing tensions between the U.S. and Communist China. Hany important issues between the United States and China, such as U.S. recognition and U.S. recognition, were not discussed because of insufficient time. Realising the impossibility of covering such a vast subject as U.S.-China relations in two usetings, it was the intent of the resource committee to create and stimulate sufficient interest emong the membership for continued individual RHEXX follow-up on the subject.

There was lively discussion on all questions, with the morning unit completing the questionaire, including a brief verbal report on the Garland library.

The evening unit did not discuss all the q estions, but chose instead to consider those of special interest.

Since the purpose of these meetings was to inform members about our community and no consensus was required, the discussions at both meetings were informal and, of necessity, inconclusive.

The Electoral College was the topic for the unit meetings on Octobers and 26.

16 copies of FACTS AND ISSUES were sold, also 4 copies of WHO SHOULD ELECT
THE PRESIDENT. Resource committee (Betty Wilson, Dot Davis, Vivian Yarborough)
used THE PEOPLE'S PRESIDENT by Neil Pierce, THE MAKING OF THE PRESIDENT 1968
by Theodore White, and James Michener's new book, as well as WHO SHOULD ELECT
THE PRESIDENT and current news. Dorothy Shaw acted as discussion leader for
all four units.

The morning meeting on Oct. 9th was in the home of Dot Davis, with 12 members present. The discussion was lively and consensus was reached that some change was necessary in the method of electing the President and Vice-President. The evening meeting was held in the home of Ledainne Henley, with 6 members present. The discussion was spirited with one member dissenting from the consensus that a change is needed.

The morning meeting on October 23rd was held in the home of Dorothy Shaw, with 8 members present, the evening meeting at the home of Frances Dodd with 9 members present. Each member was given a copy of the Chief Types of Reform Proposals, and the consensus questions. Pros and cons for each proposal were presented by the committee:

Consensus questions were discussed and some consensus was found, but on some of the questions, there was no consensus.

1. Is a change needed in the method of electing the President and VicePresident of the United States?

At the morning meeting all agreed that a change was necessary. At the night meeting all but one agreed, she was on the fence, not knowing what might change might finally be made, preferred to stay with the Electoral College.

One of the chief reasons for a desired change seems to be an objection to electors.

2. If a change is made in the method of election, does your league prefer that the U. S. President and Vice-President should be chosen by \_\_\_\_\_\_ Direct election by popular vote?

An election process that includes a state-related step? Consensus was for a state-related step.

The reason is belief that Federalism should be preserved.

Gopular vote would have possibility of fraud.

3. If the method of election is to be changed, what provisions would your league prefer for

Answer: This would depend on what change is made. If by popular vote\_\_\_should take 45% to elect.

Nov. 6, 1969 TEXAS GREENTIVE UNITS

"Why don't we solve all our problems by having a king and queen and calling ourselves the League of Women Subjects?" was the suggestion of one member as we wrestled with the problems of the Texas Executive Department at our unit meetings. This supposedly dull subject evoked lively discussion. Everyone came equipped with opinions and the will to express them.

However, we did reach agreement in the morning unit that the structure of the Executive Department is inefficient, ineffective, and cutdated, and that there need to be some changes. The evening unit kh agreed that the structure is, as one member put it, "Messy". Both units advocated a decrease in the number of elected officials, with the commissioner of agriculture, commissioner of the general land office, state board of education and the railroad commission to be appointed. Neither unit felt they had enough knowledge of the positions within the Executive Department to recommend that any of them be abolished.

Both units are in favor of a change in the direction of a cabinet type executive branch of state government divided into a limited number of departments established according to function. The morning unit feels that there are too many boards and commissions within the executive department and that they are probably repetitious and unco-ordinated. The evening unit agrees that the functioning would appear to be inefficient.

There was consensus (with one dissenter in the night unit) that the governor and lieutenant governor should run together as a team. Both units agree that there should be only one budget presented to the legislature, but there was no consensus as to who should prepare the budget. The night unit recommended that if everything else in the present structure of the Texas government remains the same, the legislature should present prepare the budget. However, if the Exem governor's office is otherwise strengthened, budget-making should be one of his powers.

The night unit suggest as an area of interest for further study the constitutions of our newest states, Hawaii and Alaska, in comparison with "antiquated" ones such as that of Texas.

After opening remarks by the President, Mrs. R. J. Jockim, and announcements, Mrs. M. R. Hayslip introduced the panel of city officials to present remarks and enter discussion on "Planning Responsively for Garland," the penel consisting of Mayor Jim Toler, City Manager Charles Duckworth, and Chairman of the Planning Commission Don Raines.

Mayor Toler spoke briefly regarding the direction growth and development has taken in the city, emphasizing that many years it was decided by city leadership that Garland should try to emourage industrial growth and development. with the change from an agricultural to an industrial community beginning prior to World War II. Garland has grown from the small agricultural community with the "pickle plant" and the hat factory (Morton Foods and Byer-Rolnick) to a city with an industrial economic base composed of a large number of industrial plants in varied fields, and, therefore, the city is not dependent upon just one industrial commodity or field. With this broad and varied economic base, we are going to have people on all levels of the economic scale. We do want and benefit from this, whereas in some neighboring areas they have catered to the "executive level" in their housing development. In all our planning, we try to keep this broad economic base in mind. There is a master plan study under way, with future land use and the park system areas to be covered first. One of the main reasons why it is important to cover this first is because of the development of Lake Ray Hubbard--it will cost much less now than later in developing a park there. We want to be a self-contained community; naturally, we are dependent upon Dallas for many things, but we still want to be "selfcontained." One thing which should contribute to this is the possible development and "renewal" in the downtown area which would give people a central area to look to and identify with. In our expanding areas of growth, the major developments now are in the east and north sections of Garland.

Mr. Raines explained that the Planning Commission is made up of 9 appointed officials with 2-year terms on a staggered basis; the Commission is charged with the responsibility of working through the zoning ordinances and making recommendations to the City Council regarding property plans and development. Every piece of property is classed under 18 different types, with several uses permitted under each. In 1962 Marvin Springer was hired to do a comprehensive zoning plan and land use guide. When there is an application for a zoning change, the city administration studies the application with regard to the facilities around. Public hearings on each request are held; any interested people are given 10 days prior notice of the meeting. Recently we have adopted a new ordinance concerning apartments -- lowered density and provided better set-backs. A newlyappointed committee will study guidelines of zoning.

Mr. Duckworth gave information regarding factors which affect the financial structure of Garland, emphasizing that Garland is a community that is becoming a city in its own right; even with all the growth plains we have many extres our neighbors are not able to enjoy. In the city government, with our home-rule city government council-manager form of government, the council can be considered the Board of Directors and the citizens the stockholders. There are 23 operating entities in the city--4 appointed administrative boards and 19 operational functions.

In the question and answer period, some of the following were covered in the discussion:

Library - The Library is one thing which ties us all together -- old Garland and new-the Library being located in the old downtown section. What about the \$8,000 in the Library budget from State funds. Answer from Mr. Duckworth: This is our third year under the program of a "District Library Area" whereby we will assist neighboring communities in their library needs through Mr. Lindsey and his staff(for instance, helping the Sachse and Plano library). This is the way we have claim on this \$8,000, which will end up being about \$3,000 this year. Our new Library facilities will cost \$625,000, \$150,000 from Federal money with some State participation. \$500,000 was provided by a bond election; the Electrical Department of the city will buy the old Nicholson Library building and use it for offices, so the Library should get about \$125,000 this way to make up the additional cost of the Library

Self-contained city - How self-contained can be be when all of the cities adjoining us are expanding and so are we and we are over-lapping--how much area planning is going on to contribute to orderly growth? Answer: we've committed ourselves to some joint things which will benefit us all-i.e., joint sanitary sewer and drainage plant with Plano, Sachse, Rowlett, and Richardson:

Comment by Mr. Duckworth: "We are a city of shopping centers which are not complete in themselves (not a major department store in Garland) -- until we can give complete service we will continue to lose 80 percent of our shopping dollar after groceries, automobile, housing expenses, etc. because of this lack of a major department store. We have been moving progressively along, and we can have anything we want.

Question to Raines: Has there been a recommended average population density for Garland and is park land per person or density? Answer: 29 reduced to 21 MFA now.

What determines how many parks and where they will be? Answer: Usually they come in subdivision development, with developers procuring the sites. We have 50% coverage of our land use: planning is going to be very critical in the next few years to ensure orderly growth.

When will study be available and will it be effective? Answer: We will have the benefit of the best professional thinking available.

"With the price of housing going up faster than people's ability to pay for it, what is the Planning Commission's position with regard to trailer parks and prefabricated housing?" Answer: A special committee has been named and we are trying to get all pertinent information possible to study it wisely. Comment: Modular housing will probably be an answer that might be tried. With a selfcontained city basis and a balanced community based on all economic levels, it is important that good housing for lower income families be provided. Some questions have to be looked into regarding national building codes and mobile

Other questions concerned telephone system, transportation, sales tax receipts. Comment by Mr. Duckworth: "We have no major State highway in the center of town-people wonder where Garland is." (Toler)

Regional planning -- it's a good idea and it's necessary to have it. Cities have been fighting for their lives to maintain their own control over their affairs and fight encroachment by federal government.

Added comment by Raines: "Government is not all bad -- for example, where would be all be without FHA -- we certainly wouldn't all be homeowners without our federal government."

#### 9. Program activity

Local Survey

a. Extent of coverage — All sections of our KYT Survey (except as noted below) have been completed, approved, and published in The Garland VOTER. The Health & Welfare section is completed, will be in for approval in Jan., 1970, and due to be published in the Feb. VOTER. Planning and Zoning section due to be completed in Feb., 1970, approved in Feb., 1970, and published in the March VOTER. At that time all sections will be up-dated, re-edited, reapproved as necessary, and published for distribution throughout Garland (we have had offers of help in publishing the survey when completed).

NOTE: We are sending this application in without having completed our KYT Survey, because State and National Boards will be busy with conventions by the time we are through with the survey.

b. Information to community — Publicity: We discussed the KYT Survey with businessmen called upon during our finance drive. Newspaper articles have preceded each of our KYT meetings and a follow-up article on the general meeting with our city officials (see below).

Meetings: We have had one set of units discussing education in Garland and two general meetings: one a "go-see" tour of city facilities, th other "Directions for Garland" with guest speakers (Mayor, City Manager, and Chairman of the Planning Commission). Before June, 1970, we will have also had a unit on Local Program Making and a unit for general discussion of the KYT Survey.

Publications: "Know Your Elected Officials" (as per Voter's Service report) have been distributed. The KYT Survey will hopefully be published and distributed this year.

#### 9. Continued

State Program

a. Extent of coverage — We have covered all but two of the State Program items (these two are scheduled to be studied later this spring). Unit meeting breakdown, as follows: TCR (2), Texas Executive (3), Texas Legislature (2), State Program Making (1). By the end of this program year (June, 1970) one additional meeting on TCR and/or the Texas Legislature and one meeting combining State-Local Relations and Voter Registration are scheduled. Some consensus has emerged on each of those items studied. All have had advance information in the Garland VOTER.

b. Information to community -- Publicity: Advance newspaper articles have appeared before each of our units.

Meetings: (See a. above) No general meetings on State Program items have been held but in all publicity on units we have invited interested women to attend.

Distribution of publications: the TCR booklet has been given to the library and 200 copies of the booklet were distributed to the two high schools.

National Program

a. Extent of coverage — We have had good coverage and emerging consensus on those national items studied. General information in the Garland VOTER prior to meetings and detailed information as space allowed on those items net being studied that particular month. Unit Meeting breakdown, as follows: Electoral College (2), Human Resources (3), China  $(2\frac{1}{2})$ , United Nations  $(\frac{1}{2})$ , and a study of the Texas Water Plan (1). By June, 1970, the following additional units are scheduled: Human Resources (1), Foreign Policy — Aid (2), Water Resources (1), and a combined meeting of Representative Government and Tax Rates & Treaty Making (1). General Meetings — see below.

b. Information to community - Publicity: Advance newspaper articles of all units and general meetings. National office release of China consensus was picked up by our local paper.

Meetings: One general meeting on the United Nations with guest speaker (the president of the Dallas U.N. Association) and one general meeting on <u>local</u> water resources and pollution with guest speaker (city sanitarian).

Distribution of publications: "Choosing the President" given to the library.

NOTE: Copies of all program respects are attached.

9.c. Evidence of ability to carry the full League Program and understanding of the requirements in this regard.

From the above reports and the attached program reports I feel we have carried the full League Program for almost two years. I see no reason why we cannot continue to do so. We have a good nucleus of members who are vitally interested in program and are willing to serve as resource persons.

#### 10. Voters Service activities.

a few hundred Voters Guides (from the Dallas LWV) were distributed before the May, 1968, Primary Election.

2500 Voters Guides and 300 copies of the National VOTER special edition were distributed prior to the Nov., 1968, General Election.

2000 Voters Guides were distributed before the Aug., 1969, Constitutional Amendment Election.

Participation in the Texas Citizenship Test, 3/11/69. Six of our members took the test at the television studio, publicity in the <u>Garland Daily News</u> with the test form, test forms (paid for by the Garland Business and <u>Professional Women's Club</u>) were distributed to 1300 High School students.

Articles in our local newspaper reminding people to vote and to register.

Labor Day Parade (1968) - "Please Vote" theme.

Punch Card voting demonstrations at units in October, 1968.

"Know Your Elected Officials" distributed: Spring, 1969 -- 500

Fall, 1969 -- 500

NOTE: Because of the pressures of other jobs that needed to be done and a limit to our "womanpower" we have purposeTy kept Voters Service to a minimum. We want to do more next year if money, time, and members are available.

11. To what extent are publications being used by the members? in the community?

Approximately 20% of our members regularly buy the facts & issues and other publications available. We have no subscription service at this time.

We have "Choosing the President", "Is Politics Your Job?", "The Role of the Political Parties", and the TCR booklet available in our library. And 200 copies of the TCR booklet have been given to our two high schools. We plan on servicing our library with the following publications: "Who Should Elect the President", "Crisis", and "The Ill-housed".

It seems to me that we need a bit of additional information and that we should ask them to do a couple of additional things before we send in their application with a recommendation that local League status be granted.

The mimeographed material they have done on their KY Town should be included with the application. They seem to be almost finished with firm plans for completing the survey but I don't think we should expect national to search through their Voters again for this information. I can't imagine why their Consultant didn't insist on this since national questioned it in the interim report. They are not required to print but they seem to have plans to do do. This is fine but they could at least include what they have done on the survey to date.—with plans to complete.

I would like to see them start a local subscription service. National has been questioning this for at least a comple of years.

I am concerned about only 11 Board members. The minutes say something about appointing a Voter editor but it is not reflected in this application. I know that they were in a flap about losing their fine President and that they have had a rather rapid turnover in Board members but this is to be expected in the mobile society of today. It would be very helpful if they could find a couple more Board members as only 11 will be overworked and will tend to become discouraged more easily than if they had more.

I am almost sure that the Dallas County Survey was made available to them. We do not expect them to redo a survey that is reasonably up to date but perhaps they should schedule a few meetings on county government to bring members up to date on this important part of government that affects them. I know that some of them were members of the Dallas League and worked on county items but there should be at least a few meetings since many of their members are new. (The Bay Area used the Houston County survey and I know that the Galv. Co. survey was made available to them XX if any members lived in Galv. county. I think they did at first.)

Considering the size of their membership, their committees look good. Program coverage seems quite adequate. I know that they were granted permission from SB to work for the two ammendments we supported in Nov. and they also asked for permission to take action on HR. I can't find anything to say whether this permission was granted or not.

This group has sent representatives to all the area meetings held anywhere in the vicinity and they have taken advantage of the briefing and training sessions offered to them by the Dallas League. This is much in their favor.

I would recommend to the new Org. Comm. that a new Consultant be sent in to do their Board traing this coming year. It would be good for them to meet and work with a new member of the Org. Comm. in order to provide them with "old truths" said in a new way. They will also need close supervision for the first year as a recognized local League.
