The portrait, as well as the Masonic Apron of William Hampton was the cherished treasure of the late Judge William J. Hampton, grandson of the founder of the Masonic body of Catlettsburg which bears his name. It was the desire of the late Judge Hampton that these treasures be presented to the Catlettsburg lodge, and this bequest was carried out in a fitting manner last Wednesday evening, when upward of a hundred Masons gathered in the hall of Hampton Lodge for the triple purpose of accepting these mementos, celebrating the birthday anniversary of one of the oldest Masons in the state who is a member of Hampton Lodge and to raise to the degree of a Master Mason two of their fellow citizens.

Many Masonic Lodges were represented at this meeting, which will go down in the annals of Hampton Lodge as one of the most memorable meetings of its history,

In his address, Mr. Ley paid a glowing tribute to the founder and to his decedents and by allegory exhorted present day Masons to carry on the principles of the order as zealously as their predecessors.
