
PUBLIC TELEPHONES: Several booths are located on the ground level concourse in both east and west stands.

## Scholarship System—The NCAA Way

IN AN ERA of amazing physical and intellectual accomplishment on the part of our college-age young men (and women), specialization seems almost of necessity the rule. Academic excellence and athletic prowess aren't often enough found in the same person. Or are they?

The answer is a resounding, "Yes, they are, a great many times." And the National Collegiate Athletic Association aims not only to spotlight the nation's outstanding football and basketball players who have demonstrated their classroom superiority, but to reward them in a meaningful way.

The NCAA will award top scholar-athletes graduating during the 1964-65 college year a total of 32 one-thousand dollar grants for post graduate and professional study.

The \$35,000 necessary to finance this new scholarship program (the additional \$3,000 is administrative expense) has been appropriated by the Executive Committee from football television receipts which will acrue to the NCAA this fall from the National Broadcasting Company. Participating

colleges on the NCAA football TV schedule receive 96 per cent of the \$6,522,000 NBC will pay as rights for the 1964 telecasts and the NCAA four per cent.

The 32 grants can only be awarded for post graduate study. Twenty-two of them will go to top football players — 11 each in the University and College Division, with the remaining 10 going to stellar cage athlete-scholars—five apiece in the major and college division basketball classifications.

Though no scholar-athletes in other sports are now included in the NCAA scholarship program, the Executive Committee has provided indirect benefit to all athletes in other sports with an appropriation of \$84,088 from the TV revenue source to support instructional clinics and encourage increased participation in those sports.

The remainder of the NCAA's four per cent will go to pay for the entire administrative expense of the football television program—\$81,000—and to the College Division's regional football champion-ship reserve fund—\$60,000.

Administration of the NCAA scholarship program is not established in all its detail, but the grants will be made directly to the universities or professional schools of the recipients' choice.

"A program of scholarship awards for distinguished academic achievement has been discussed from time to time for some years in the NCAA," Executive Director Walter Byers stated at the time the grants were approved last April, and NCAA President Robert F. Ray of the University of Iowa observed:

"Thirty-two scholarships are a good start, but they won't begin to take care of the number of senior football and basketball players in our member institutions who are honor students in all fields of study."

In retrospect the list of great athletes who might have qualified for such an award is legion. The Byron (Whizzer) Whites and Barry Woods of football's past, the Jerry Lucases and John Richters of basketball's present and annually the Academic All American teams would have qualified as prime candidates.

So too the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame scholar-athlete award winners annually honored might well be among those considered. To reemphasize the point a listing of both 1983

To reemphasize the point, a listing of both 1963 Academic All America and Hall of Fame scholarathlete winners might well be appropriate in conclusion. Their counterparts of 1964 will be equally distinguished.

This Dads Day marks the formal induction into the Hall of Honor of:

CHARLES WOOLDRIDGE GEORGE LANGFORD

Certainly these two more than live up to the qualifications as stated by the sponsoring organization, the Texas Tech Dads Association:

"... shall possess or shall have possessed in addition to outstanding ability in a sport or sports, other qualifications such as sportsmanship, character, integrity, and be a person who has brought distinction to Texas Tech or served the school with distinction in its athletic program."

Wooldridge lettered in track at Texas Tech in 1927 and 1928 and in football, at fullback, in 1928 and 1929. He did not play high school or freshman football but was invited out for the varsity after his Engineers' team won the intramural championship. Wooldridge, currently vice president, Texas Power and Light, in Dallas, has served on the Texas Tech Board of Directors and as president of the Cotton Bowl Association.

Langford is another whose first football experience was as an upper-classman at Texas Tech. He enrolled in 1926, dropped out to ranch and earn money to finance the remainder of his education, then returned in 1929. Langford reported for the team that fall and lettered for three seasons at tackle. A farmer and rancher most of the time since graduation (with time out for Army Air Force service), Langford, a Lubbock resident, continued to serve Texas Tech. He was one of the ten members of the 100 Club that organized the Ex-Students Association, was ten years on the Athletic Council, and is a member of the Century Club.

# Matty Bell . . . Builder

The Southwest Conference owes its reputation to those who were associated with it during the formative years. Tonight's program is respectfully dedicated to one of these—Matty Bell, who concluded more than 40 years of service to the conference when he retired as Southern Methodist's athletic director last June.

Bell, an outstanding athlete at Fort Worth's North Side and Centre College, had coached at Haskell Institute and Carroll College before becoming head coach at Texas Christian University in 1923. He also coached at Texas A&M before joining SMU as line coach in 1934. A year later he succeeded Ray Morrison as head coach and guided the Mustangs to 12 victories and the honor of being the only representative of the Southwest Conference to play in the Rose Bowl. While coaching at SMU Bell always developed colorful teams, four of whom won or shared Southwest Con-

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

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### SMU In Fact

Southern Methodist University—located in suburban University Park, an incorporated residential district surrounded by Dallas, Texas—has, in its short lifetime, a record of growth and achievement to match that of the dynamic region in which it was placed only 50 years ago.

With a population of approximately 800,000—and situated in a county of more than 1,100,000 and a metropolitan area of 1,250,000—Dallas is the nation's fourteenth largest city and is one of the fastest growing cities in the United States (in the number of office buildings constructed since the end of World War II, for example, Dallas ranks second only to New York City.) Within the Dallas boundaries lie the ninth largest concentration of million-dollar businesses in the U.S., a burgeoning industrial complex, and a sophistication of cultural endeavor truly cosmopolitan. Dallas is a clean, beautiful, vigorous city of accomplishment sensitive to the intellectual currents of the time.

In this climate of great potential SMU was founded in 1911. First classes were held September 22, 1915.

At its opening session, the University had two buildings, 706 students (characteristically, at that time the largest first-year enrollment of any university in this nation's history), a 35-man faculty, an endowment fund of \$279,178, and a 133-acre campus.

Today, these relatively few years later, the University inventories 80 buildings in its physical plant (60 of these constructed since the close of World War II), a faculty of more than 300 employed on a full-time basis, total assets

of \$60,000,000 (including endowment of \$16,000,000), an enrollment that has averaged approximately 6,000 the past few years, and a 150-acre campus which occupies some of the most valuable land in Texas.

Since SMU is not a state-supported institution, enrollment is not limited to residents of Texas, nor is any distinction made for out-of-state students regarding entrance requirements or tuition and fees. Nearly all the students in SMU's first class came from Dallas County, but now—reflecting the widespread acceptance of its scholastic programs in recent years—more than 40 per cent of the University's student body come from outside of Texas, and the ratio of out-of-state to Texas students is increasing annually.

A Master Plan for the academic future, adopted by the Board of Trustees on May 10, 1963, rededicates Southern Methodist University to its belief and aim as a national private institution of higher learning, pursuing academic quality and the full development of each individual student. It insists upon a program well balanced in the humanities, the social sciences, and the natural sciences, and well balanced in undergraduate, professional, and graduate education.


SMU was established in Dallas by The Methodist Church, and management of the University is vested by SMU's Board of Governors in an Executive Committee of civic, business, and religious leaders.

President of SMU is Willis M. Tate, a 1932 graduate of the University.
