Minutes of Executive Committee Meeting Monday, June 5, 1989/12:30 p.m./League Office

Present: Jackie Alfred, Melba Drake, Novelle Doherty, Charlotte Bowers, Jo Williams, Mary Elder, Denise Isaac, Allison Dieter, and Barbe Bozeman.

Jackie Alfred called the meeting to order at 12:15 p.m.

Jackie announced that prospective Executive Committee Meetings will be held on the second Monday of each month at 1:30 p.m. in the League Office. She requested that all Committee business be conducted in advance of that time.

Jackie announced that a Calendar Planning Session will be held on Tuesday, June 27, at 10:00 a.m. at the League Office. This upcoming Wednesday, June 7, at 3:00 p.m. will be the deadline for submitting items for inclusion in the Board Report.

Monday, June 19, has been slated as a joint Executive Committee Meeting/Board Development Session. The Board meeting will be held in the League Conference Room from 9:30 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. A brief break will follow for lunch. The Board Development Session will end the day and all activities should wrap up by 2:30 p.m. Jackie suggested collecting \$2/person from attendees and sending over to the Kroger deli for sandwiches. Those who wish to "brown bag" are welcome to do so.

Denise Isaac led discussion of the Membership Committee's activities. She wants the Committee to lend a "personal touch" in welcoming new and prospective members. This can be achieved by warmly welcoming newcomers to the League and quickly involving them in some committee work so they will feel a meaningful part of the organization. How can this objective be achieved? <u>Jackie</u> suggested that each committee chair write a brief (three to four sentence) description of the activities of their group, meeting dates/times/locations for inclusion in the September issue of the VOTER. The Program VPs will contact each of their tespective committee chairs with this request.

Jo Williams suggested that a membership brochure be sent to each returning member in the fall to distribute to an interested friend/colleague. Jackie agreed that this item could be included in the mailing of the VOTER; the brochure would also serve as a reminder to members of the objectives of the Long Range Plan endorsed by the membership at the Annual Meeting. Novelle thought the September VOTER would be a good issue in which to include the membership brochure; she added that we will probably need to order 1000 extra brochures to accomplish this mailing.

<u>Jackie</u> suggested that we identify new members at our monthly meetings by a unique nametag/badge. In this way, it will be easier for experienced members to greet the newcomers.

Mary Elder announced that she was seeking a Voter Registration Chair. Jackie suggested Kay Shillock as a potential name. Jennie Mae Rall has finished the written material for the Publications. Barbara Nelson is leaning towards acceptance of the Publications Chair. In light of Jennie Mae's rapidly approaching departure, Mary advised appointment of a Librarian/Historian to fill Jennie Mae's shoes. The name of Laura Mewhinney was recommended as a

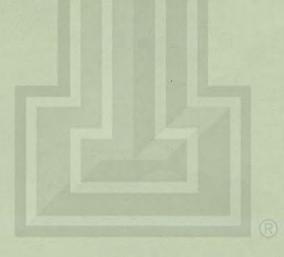
Melba Drake announced that two City of Houston Budget workshops will be held on June 8 and June 15. These workshops are designed with the members of City Council in mind. Budget Hearings will be held in the respective districts later in June. The Budget Hearing in the City Council chambers will be held on June 22. Melba will try to get the specific district hearing dates in the Board Report.

 $\underline{\text{Melba}}$ suggested as a possible program meeting topic how state legislation impacts county and municipal government. She will develop this idea further for the Calendar Planning Session.

Allison Dieter and Jackie Alfred submitted a document reflecting Arnold Smith's summary of first-round lease negotiations. Jackie estimates that it will cost approximately \$150 to move two telephone lines, including some labor to install the telecom. A moving outfit of a truck and two men will cost about \$300 for one eight-hour shift. We are thinking in terms of a five-year lease given the "no-COLA" clause. The Executive Committee gave Jackie direction to inform Arnold to proceed and obtain the best possible monthly rate at the West Alabama property. A vote on whether to move will be made at the next Board Meeting.

The 69th Annual Meeting of the League of Women Voters of Houston was called to order by President Jeanette Vanderwater at appx. 7:20 p.m., May 11, 1989, at The Doctors' Club of Houston, 1133 M.D. Anderson Blvd. Novelle Doherty (Credentials) reported 55 members present (43 required for a quorum) plus five guests.

APPOINTMENTS BY THE PRESIDENT:

Parliamentarian Timekeeper Tellers Committee to approve minutes Jennie Mae Rall Jim Elder Danny Doherty, Darold McCalla Barbara Swartz, Jennie Mae Rall, and Jo Williams

ADOPTION OF ORDER OF BUSINESS: Change "Presentation of 1989-90 Budget" to PRESENTATION OF DUES AMOUNT FOR 1989-90 AND THE 1989-90 BUDGET. Margaret Wedge moved adoption of amended Order of Business, seconded by Mary Elder, carried.

ADOPTION OF RULES: Joyce Punch moved that the Rules as printed in the Workbook be approved. Seconded by Helen Hunter, carried.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: Fauncine Martin moved that the minutes of the 1988 Annual Meeting be approved. Seconded by Belinda Chagnard, carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Jean Lustgarten pointed out that the report in its entirety went out in the Report to Members, 1988-89. It is complete and ready to be filed for audit.

PRESENTATION OF LOCAL PROGRAM FOR 1988-1989: Anne Deidrick will present. Recommended Program Items, Pages 4-thru-6 in Annual Meeting Workbook, were briefly summarized by Anne Deidrick. Anne Deidrick moved adoption of (1) Social Policy, seconded by Rhoda Haddox. Anne moved adoption of (2) Natural Resources, seconded by Betty Jane Baker. Anne moved adoption of Government(and pointed out that the new consensus on Financing City Government was available at each seat this evening for our perusal), seconded by Betty Certel. Anne Deidrick reported that Child Abuse/Neglect will be a continuing study. There is no consensus yet. The Houston League will do this study under the guidance of the State Board. Anne Deidrick moved that Child Abuse/Neglect be a continuing study, seconded by Mary Elder.

There were no New Study Items. However, for the information of the membership Sally Hirschheim of the East Fort Bend County Unit told us their unit was conducting a public information study on the proposed expansion of Highway 6 through First Colony area (from a 6-lane highway to a 9-lane highway). By the end of this summer it is planned that information will be available in libraries and supermarkets in the area. The public will be asked to provide opinions on the proposed expansion to their various legislators. There was general discussion as to whether or not a motion was needed affirming this study. Lavora Arizaga pointed out that this would rightly come under Voter Service, it does not have to be a "new" study...it is for information purposes and the League has no position on it. Jennie Mae Rall moved that the EFBC Unit be genuinely thanked for bringing this information to the membership, seconded by Rhoda Haddox, carried.

ACTION PRIORITIES: Housing, Teen-age Pregnancies, Education. Lavora Arizaga pointed out these items should come under Direction to the Board. No vote necessary.

Discussion on the motions for our Recommended program, 1989-90:

1. Adopt the Social Policy

Andrea Eisenstein asked about the item on libraries...inter-area borrowing. Sharon Friedman told us the idea was to merge the city and county facilities, but at this time it is not politically feasible. The city and county are just not "buying" a merger. There is cooperation, however.

2. Natural Resources...motion is to retain.

By way of a compliment, Jennie Mae Rall stated that there is no committee that works any harder or does more serious work than this group. Horty Sher asked if we could compliment the City of Houston and its commitment to recycling? This would come under Direction to the Board.

Geraldine Beeman asked about a "watchdog" policy for more of the things that go on...this means constant watching; the picture changes, natural resources are not static. (No response to this "comment-question.")

3. City Government - no comments.

4. Child Abuse/Neglect

We will continue to study under guidance of the State League. It will be moved to Social Policy if we reach a consensus.

Phyllis Frye stated that Betty Dertel and Betty Mooney were "just great at State Convention. They took a non-recommended item and found a way to get it done before the next state legislature meets. They are to be commended for a really good! job."

Jeanette Vanderwater asked for the vote. Items 1,2,3, and 4 were unanimous.

PROPOSED LONG RANGE PLAN - JO WILLIAMS

Jo Williams commented that this Long Range Plan has been in the making by two previous groups for about two years now. And it is obvious our Long Range Plan is going in the same direction the League has been heading all along. Jo moved that the Long Range Plan be accepted, seconded by Betty Mooney.

Discussion...Mention was made regarding "using the media." One person cannot do this job alone — not even a committee. ALL of us are needed here. "Think Media!"

Under OBJECTIVE 4 for "developing a solid financial base...Wissie Johnston said the Strategy Item 4 should also translate into the financial goal of each member bringing one new contributor into the League each year. Lavora Arizaga moved that we insert Strategy Item #5: Encourage every member to set as a personal goal bringing in at least one new contributor each year. Seconded by Bonnie Cassidy.

Andrea Eisenstein wondered if 1c) should be modified...? No. The vote was called on the amendment, carried.

Sharon Friedman commented re further endeavors toward inviting all races, creeds to join the League...this should be in Direction to the Board.

A vote was called on the Long Range Plan as amended, carried.

PRESENTATION OF DUES AMOUNT 1989-90 AND 1989-90 BUDGET: Andrea Eisenstein stated her deepest thanks to her committee: Mary Gillette, Denise Isaac, Alison Dieter, and Jean Lustgarten. Andrea presented two motions simultaneously: Moved that the dues we currently have be adopted, seconded by Novelle Doherty. Moved that the budget be adopted, seconded by Jennie Mae Rall

Discussion...Robert Mullally asked about "discounts" on dues in trying to acquire new members. Novelle Doherty responded that the League does have a \$5 fee for those merely wanting to be on the mailing list for our material. This \$5 just covers the cost. Our present dues structure covers the in-and-out movement of membership.

This \$5 fee could be offered to students, and in some cases we do offer a very small number of "dues scholarships." In conjunction with the latter, however, these people are encouraged to really participate, not just be passive members.

Horty Sher asked if our publications went to universities, libraries, and the like? Jennie Mae Rall answered "no," but we do have a courtesy mailing, however, it does not include any universities.

Regarding the Budget, Barbara Swartz mentioned Item N.6-Rent, noting that \$6,500 was budgeted. The price the landlord has offered is \$5,800...can't we use this saving, considering last year's deficit?

Recommendations; Would like to see increased activity in selling of our publications. Couldn't each of us take the responsibility for taking pubs to the various places we go and offering them for sale.

On the membership form, add a "contributory" category, say \$10.

One change in the form of the Budget...re In-Kind Contributions and Expenses. This item should be included in the budget to be able to see really how much our members give to the League. All who do this will need to fill out a form.

The motion was to continue the current dues of \$35/yr.

Sharon Friedman stated it was a good idea to retain. Charlotte Amrhein wanted clarification on the membership figure...it was arrivedat by separating out Household Memberships and those who join through National.

The vote was called. Carried, unanimous.

The Budget motion was called (Fiscal year June 1 through May 31). Carried, unanimous.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT: Joyce Punch directed our attention to Page 12 of our Workbook. Joyce asked her committee to stand and she personally thanked them. Joyce pointed out one omission to the listing of nominees. Please add FRAN SMITH under Directors (One Year Term). Nominations from the floor were solicited...there being none, the slate offered by the Nominating Committee was elected by Jeanette Vanderwater's instruction to the secretary to cast an affirming vote.

Our outgoing president then invited Jackie Alfred, our incoming president to come to the podium, whereupon she presented Jackie with the gavel and the "key to the executive washroom!" Also included with this auspicious key was another one so that Jackie could get into the office after hours, before hours, on Saturdays, ad infinitum.

Jeanette told us she had found the past two years to be both fun and rewarding. Mainly because of the great cooperation received from every member of the Houston League. A truly great bunch to work with.

Jackie Alfred told us that her appreciation for Jeanette included the stewardship and skillful leadership by Jeanette in keeping us afloat during the trying financial times. She guided us through masterfully! Then Jeanette accepted a gift from the board: a most unusual and lovely necklace/pin combo with matching earnings.

Jackie Alfred then talked to us, beginning with the truism: Every ending is a new beginning. Relying on that signal of constancy of what's gone before showing what's to come...the past 69 years' history of the League reveals it still to be a strong and stable organization. We are going to try to perform in the same strong and dedicated manner as our predecessors. All our new officers and directors are so fine! And we know that the board is <u>not</u> the Houston league; it is really each and every one here tonight and who are members throughout out League.

Danny Doherty will pass out a "present" from Jackie. It will be returned at the end of this meeting as a "promissory note." Fromising one thing that you will do for the League in the coming year. This will be limited only by your imagination... suggestions:

Write something specific that you can - and will - do. Let's start out by doing one thing and maybe someday you too can be president!

Jackie told us this is a challenging time, and one of the most awesome things she has ever done. But she believes the League can accomplish anything. It is a singularly talented group. She looks forward to working with us in the coming year; it is an opportunity to set the cornerstone for what the League will be in the coming decade...thanks for the opportunity to do this.

Mindy Travillian - More 5:30 meetings

We must invite people. She hopes to get more involved in recruiting minorities.

Sharon Friedman - mentioned the orientals, the SE Asians, college students (we must recruit from the universities)

Barbara Swartz - reported that we have about half-dozen students now Wissie Johnston - asked about Voter Service "translations" into foreign languages...? Translators are the difficulty; continue researching this question, seeking answers

Jackie Alfred mentioned that the ballot amendments could be translated; our Secretary of State always provides Spanish translations.

Gwen Essinger - has worked with the INS people. One thing they cannot cope with is the fact that we are NON-PARTISAN. This is very difficult for them to deal with.

Joyce Punch - mentioned /coalition of women/Oriental and Spanish. Should be invited to League

Melba Drake - League should give more attention to county government. We should be represented on a regular basis in Commissioners Court

Pat Macartney - voter registration...is there a way to get into the school systems and reach the 18-year olds (maybe even in elementary schools) teaching them how to vote, its importance, etc.?

Barbara Swartz then took the floor to bring our attention to a loyal Houston Leaguer for the past seven years; one who came into the office almost every day, and who will be moving to Wisconsin in August. Who else but Jennie Mae Rall. Jennie Mae accepted special commendation for her service and dedication to the Houston League — and received a pictorial collage of LWV-H folks. She has "one space" left in her home for it to hang! Jennie Mae graciously accepted her recognition, commenting that she'd gone to National Convention in 1960 and "look where it got me!"

Andrea Eisenstein moved adjournment of Annual Meeting, seconded by Betty Oertel. Carried.

The guests were then entertained by the enactment of a play (see attached) written by our playwright in residence, Alison Dieter, entitled: LWV-HOUSTON POST CONVENTION BORED MEETING

Anne Deidrick moved the agenda be adopted as amended, Jennie Mae Rall seconded, passed.

MINUTES - approved as written.

Executive Committee Minutes... for info only; okay as written.

At this point, <u>Helen Hunter</u> introduced two members from the newly formed East Fort Bend County League: <u>Sally Hirschheim</u> and <u>Nell Havron</u>. Welcome! ladies.

TREASURER'S REPORT - Jean Lustgarten

Jean told us that because of the bills paid this past week and state convention expense, we may have to go into our savings. We are up to date with our bills, however. Jeanette Vanderwater pointed out that we will probably end up the year with a minus figure. This is because of the two PMP's we have had to pay. Report filed for audit.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT - Jeanette Vanderwater

Jeanette directed our attention to "Dates to Remember." Helen Hunter reported that she had the majority of her reports to members.

Jeanette told us that she would like to be the League representative to the Police Advisory Committee -- see R-1, Board Reports. Pam Holt so moved, seconded by Novelle Doherty, passed.

Jackie Alfred reported on a Call to Action from National on Advocacy for the Voter. Letters have been sent to all representatives. Margaret Wedge sent an article to the Post and also there is an article on this in our latest VOTER.

Jackie told us she'd had an SOS call from Evelyn Bonavita regarding legislative action...could we call all Houston area representatives re the appropriations bill (on Easter weekend)? Jackie did call those folks and asked them to be supportive of the Human Services appropriations, and to consider adding additional line items for children and mental health. Jackie suggested calling the legislative hotline to find out if it has been "marked up." Jackie reminded us to read the next VOTER to learn about upcoming items.

Fran Smith asked if anything was known about the State Department of Agriculture and Hightower? Jackie said the Leagues are supportive of the Sunset Law. However, we did not anticipate that it would be used politically to get rid of an elected official.

(We broke for a refreshment time.)
Meeting called back to order at appx. 10:50 a.m.

Fran Smith told us that Mary Gillette and Terry Hershey have been active in trying to protect bayous from Clear Creek to Cypress Creek. They are now focussing on the Corps of Engineers' plans for Cypress Creek and the proposed roadway in Armand Bayou...Mary Gillette would like to get a public hearing set up.

Fran would like to know about those of us doing work (as private citizens) in other areas where the League has a position. Watch for newspaper articles re toxic conditions affecting air contaminants, especially the effects on ozone. Some of these items will be "coming down the pike" re EPA's newer, more stringent regulations — and will affect all of us.

Melba Drake told us that the Fire Chief was highly complimentary about Fran's knowledge and participation in the Local Emergency Planning Committee.

Karen Miller presented a talk pertaining to public participation — in a knowledgeable way — in school board meetings in the Houston area. Local school boards control access to information. All school districts are different in their compliance with the Open Meetings rules. There is a "gray area" on committees meeting with less than a quorum present. Karen would like to have League members who are members of PTA's to do a survey on school board meetings — from all districts. Background material available...? Numerous questions could be put into such a survey: What is "required" vs. "good practice," board policies on citizen participation, etc.

Jeanette told us that such a survey does not have to go through the program study mechanism, and could be done. Betty Oertel asked if such a survey included all of Harris County...yes. Mary Elder wanted to know "What is the plan after gathering information?" Karen Miller said that newspaper articles could be used, but it is preferred that meetings with administrators could be held...really, no plan yet. No real agenda until information acquired. Dawn Petershagen asked if this wasn't an Education Committee item? Karen Miller stated this would be a very time-consuming project; she envisions a joint venture with PTA's. Dawn commented this would be good for PTA, but might not be so great for the League. Karen Miller felt this was related to Open Meetings, citizen access to information. Dawn asked if this could be a study item?

Jackie Alfred asked the relationship between PTA and school boards?

Karen said a positive relationship seemed to be predominant. The League does not have an established relationship with school boards (such as with our city council).

Jackie Alfred suggested an "Observer Corps" to establish rapport with the school boards. The League might be in a resource position. Fran Smith felt this was a discussion on something that has become more important in the last five years: public communication and access to information. This applies to almost any organization. What about a booklet informing all about citizen access, laws, handling of complaints, etc.?

Jackie pointed out there are a number of items we still need to clear up, so can we table, asking Karen Miller to think about it a little more and we will try to dovetail with a League position...? Anne Deidrick asked Karen if this wasn't a fall item? Karen affirmed this. Jennie Mae Rall explained this can be brought up again...Jackie's suggestion to table was moved, seconded by Marqaret Wedge, passed. Karen Miller will bring something back to the board supporting a more viable project.

STATE CONVENTION - Novelle Doherty

Novelle reminded us of the board reception Thursday evening, 7-9 p.m. Gwen Essinger has planned a "pot-luck" dinner and passed around a clipboard for us to note all info re people attending, what dish they intend to bring

(enough each dish to serve 10-12 people, please), those who can contribute \$10 or two bottles of wine. Please sign up...and, card tables, tray tables, etc. are also needed. Casual dress.

Novelle Doherty has forms for those who need to be delegates. As of March 30th, we had 39 delegates with four more to be added. Calls have been made. Jackie Alfred told us that if we think of anything that should be mentioned, please put a note in the office to help her and Novelle.

Novelle thanked <u>Betty Foote</u> for her wonderful letter in the unit packets. Novelle is still looking for a reply from the mayor to the written invitation to attend convention. <u>Anne Deidrick</u> suggested perhaps sending a registered letter...Novelle told us she'd also sent a letter asking for a proclamation of LWV Day in Houston. Anne feels this will be done.

Denise Isaac has a Galleria area map which will be at the Hospitality table. Mary Elder asked if there would be a Message Board? Jackie Alfred said there would be one in the office and one outside the guest relations area.

Novelle Doherty would like to reimburse the delegates with any overage or unspent convention budget money. This does make a real impact on morale and is a good membership tool. Novelle Doherty moved that we reimburse our delegates to convention up to maximum permissible, seconded by Anne Deidrick.

Mary Elder reminded us that we need money for the reception on Friday night...Phyllis Frye (given privilege of the floor) suggested that unspent convention money might be used for any necessary out of town trips. Novelle amended her motion by asking for a \$5+ additional reimbursement...anything less than \$5, there would be no reimbursement. Amended motion seconded by Anne Deidrick. Passed.

Jeanette Vanderwater brought up the bylaws revision...she had not had time to read them thoroughly. Jennie Mae Rall had read and told us the wording is excellent and would not hurt us at all.

Program Item - Betty Dertel. Pushing Child Abuse as a non-recommended item for state study. Will be lobbying for Child Care and Child Abuse as a state study. Betty Dertel told us that Betty Mooney is ramrodding this effort. There will be two more strategy meetings at the LWV office -- anyone who can, please attend. Jeanette reiterated that this is our "push."

Jeanette told us that invitations had been sent to Houston Legislators. City Councilmembers. Commissioners to attend our 70th Birthday Gala. The one group not included are our major contributors. Charlotte Amrhein and Novelle Doherty will work on this, and such an invitation should go out as quickly as possible.

FYI: We had a request from Barb Swartz to pick up state board members on Thursday, from both Intercontinental and Hobby, if necessary. This will be played by ear.

ORGANIZATION - Helen Hunter

Helen talked with Mary Matula...she has done such a great job for all our meetings in setting up, etc. She cannot do this job next year (having a baby), but will go through our May meeting. Helen will write Mary Matula a thank you letter and all those who have worked with her will be signing as well as all who have benefitted from her efforts. Jennie Mae mentioned that Mary Matula also sent out notification letters to the Lunch Bunch...much appreciated.

Sally Hirschheim announced that the East Fort Bend County LWV Unit now has an official meeting place: First Colony Christian Church, 4141 Sweetwater Blvd., 1st Wed. each month 012:30 p.m. Betty Foote asked if this meeting date conflicted with the VOTER deadline? Sally told us this meeting date might be changed in the future after they see how it works.

Helen Hunter said she had most of the Report to Members articles in, and suggested that a report from the recording secretary (for the first time) might be nice...(well, I loved it and certainly will. Thanks!).

PROGRAM ACTION - Anne Deidrick

Anne asked <u>Melba Drake</u> to report. Melba told us to watch for our public forum which is to be broadcast on the municipal channel this coming Friday, 4-7-89 at 7 p.m.

The consensus meetings were completed this past Tuesday and all reports are in. The committee is meeting Monday morning to compile the consensus and will get that subject nailed down. It will be discussed at our next board meeting. Everyone has been highly cooperative.

Melba brought up the subject of the report from the Select Committee on Tax Equity, "Re-thinking Taxes" - two volumes: Findings, and Recommendations. It was of immense help to Melba in preparing her FOCUS article,

Phyllis Frye was given privilege of the floor. See Board Report, R-1 and R-2, March 1989. Phyllis pointed out that this will be presented as an Action Motion from LWV-H and lobbied through the use of telegrams. Jeanette explained the convention action motion committee. Melba Drake moved that the action motion as presented by Phyllis in R-1 be presented at State Convention, seconded by Novelle Doherty. Jackie Alfred told us that State has indicated support and it does not look as though there will be any problem. Motion passed.

Helen Hunter reported that the Emergency Program Item from the East Fort Bend Unit is to be presented at our Annual Meeting. Helen talked with Mary Gillette, Barbara Swartz, and Lavora Arizaga about this item. Sally Hirschheim then presented their request for action. See Page R-2 of the March board reports...the main thrust is finding out why nine lames are being proposed for Highway 6 rather than the six all homeowners in that area were originally told would be constructed. Hard information is needed -- especially to dispel the many rumors now in circulation. Particularly the rumor of an "Evacuation Route." Much discussion followed: Anne Deidrick asked if any specific dates had been mentioned... Sally told us "not as yet, really no official information." Gwen Essinger said that the state usually does not announce something like this until the right-of-way has been bought. In this case, this has not been done. Gwen wondered if there had been a community meeting...Sally replied there had been one, and after announcing the nine lane highway, rightof-way access purchase is being pursued. In the name of the League, can the EFB LWV unit do a study on this matter...just exploratory work? Betty Foote expressed an affirmative reaction, IF such a study would be to gather information; we must be careful not to show a bias. Betty Dertel wondered about a community forum...? Sally said that would be most satisfactory and would help stop all rumors and deal with hard facts.

Phyllis Frye suggested that the Fort Bend County Resident Engineer of the Texas Highway Dept. (highways and public transportation) might be a good place to contact. Sally Hirschheim requested permission to have a study for information purposes first, and then hold a public forum. So moved by Betty Dertel, seconded by Margaret Wedge, passed.

Charlotte Amrhein reported that we "still have money!" Yeaaa!!

Melba Drake -- City budget workshops are scheduled for the first two weeks in April...on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Melba plans to attend. She reported that Mr. Haines is the new Director of F&A...all this new harmony is spooky!

Then Melba quoted an old axiom: "Ask and ye shall receive" as she told us that before <u>Karen Miller</u> left today's meeting, Karen gave Melba Volume 1 of Rethinking Texas Taxes. Karen told her that Volume 2 is available at the <u>Legislative Budget Board in Austin...maybe Evelyn Bonavita</u> can pick it up for us -- FREE!!

Reporting further, Melba said at City Council this past Wednesday there was a great deal of testimony given about the West Side Airport. There is a great amount of protesting the placement of an airport in the middle of a bird flyway. The EPA report is available; public hearings will be held on this. Jeanette asked Melba to keep Mary Gillette informed on this.

Betty Dertel told us about an invitation to attend a luncheon meeting of the Texas Department of Human Services...about Children's Protective Services. (Date...?)

Alison Dieter -- Reminded us of the meeting next week of the Right to Food conference. Information on this is in the VOTER. Basically, this is to honor the food pantry workers...all who can, please try to go.

Jennie Mae Rall -- Read in the VOTER her invitation to a Lemonade Drop-in to her apartment...and to meet your friends there! We'd love it!

Gwen Essinger -- Passed out sign-up sheet re convention attendance, potluck food contributions, monetary contributions, etc. Please call if you decide you can come (and are not on this list).

Margaret Wedge -- Margaret had talked with the head of the Houston Pro-Neighborhood Program...she was enthusiastic about mentioning the League. Information about the League will be sent and, hopefully, this will get into the <u>Chronicle</u>.

Phyllis Frye -- Re legal research. If the board thinks this is a good idea, she will put together a one or two page "shortie" about doing legal research, for sale for around \$2.00.

Helen Hunter -- Reported that our membership count is now 499. Jeanette commented that an increased membership is one goal she has not been able to achieve.

Sally Hirschheim -- Told us a project of the EFB LWV unit is participation in school board elections in the three areas covered by their unit. They will have poster campaigns telling where to vote. It seems the voting places are always changing. This project of EFB is directed toward "informing the public."

Nell Havron -- Commented that the school boards in their area are so secretive, and by our poster campaign we hope to increase election participation in the school board elections.

Minutes of Executive Committee Meeting Monday, April 10, 1989/12:30 pm/League office

Present: Novelle Doherty, Mary Elder, Helen Hunter, Fauncine Martin, Jennie Mae Rall, and Jeanette Vanderwater.

Jeanette Vanderwater called the meeting to order at appx. 12:45 p.m.

Jeanette Vanderwater reported she'd had a call from Barbara McCormick
this past Thursday. Barbara wanted to rent our sound equipment for \$30.

Jeanette consented. Jeanette asked if the League might like to offer this equipment for rental...? Helen Hunter felt that any Leaguer should be able to rent the equipment. This was the feeling of Exec. Cte., also.

Jeanette met with convention chairs on April 6. Phyllis Frye gave Jeanette a memorandum about doing legal research. After reading Phyllis' paper, Jeanette talked with her over the phone; they agreed that the League's letterhead would be used while indicating it was written by Phyllis Frye, Attorney and Counselor. Copies will be mailed to Jennie Mae Rall who will set its price. The memorandum is along the lines of a FOCUS-type item, and is excellent information and would be most helpful in doing legal research (Belinda Chagnard will also need to read it).

A note has been received from Tina Egge who needs samples of the Voters Guide -- Jennie Mae will provide these samples and offer any help needed.

Jeanette told us of an invitation from the Park People and Texaco to a Holly Tree Planting ceremony this Saturday, April 15, at 11 a.m. on the banks of Buffalo Bayou. This date/time conflicts with the LWV State Convention and it is regrettable we cannot attend and see these newly planted holly trees.

Jeanette Vanderwater - re convention: We may be running short of workbooks and may have to share. Another 15 have been requested but we may not have time to get them, so plan on sharing if necessary.

Jeanette has looked over the convention workbook...the bylaws changes should cause no discussion or take up any time. And speaking of time, Jeanette doesn't believe there is going to be time for a meeting of the delegates prior to convention (there can be floor discussions among our delegates).

One item that could create some discussion is the sharing formula. There have been some problems with this, particularly with restricted donations. There is just no way State League can share these types of donations.

Jeanette could see nothing in the budget that would create any real discussion. However, on program, we expect both discussion and time to be involved. Our item on Child Abuse needs everyone's backing and support.

Mary Elder questioned the dues matter...? Novelle Doherty told us there'd be no PMP increase for the coming year, but there will be an increase in the following year...\$1.00. Novelle does not want us to end up with \$40/year dues. It does impact on our membership. Jennie Mae commented that it comes down to a personal decision on how one's money can be spent. Mary Elder pointed out that the decision will be made at this convention, however.

Jeanette Vanderwater then restated action taken at our last board meeting: we voted to invite our local League past presidents to attend the 70th Birthday Gala as our guests (\$25/each). Jeanette has had some comments about this perhaps being illegal and cannot be taken out of the Ed Fund budget. Jeanette does not feel this is illegal, but it could be hard to explain (on the IRS form). We were audited last year and in another year or two another audit is possible Barbara Swartz reported that two past presidents have accepted the invitation...this represents \$50 (so far). The decision can be left as it is and can be brought up at next board meeting and if necessary this expense can be transferred from Ed Fund to the regular LWV budget.

Mary Elder sought clarification: Right now, the expense we're looking at is \$50 - yes. The Ed Fund is for educational purposes - yes. Aren't these ladies going to have the opportunity to speak and tell about their campaigns, struggles, victories, etc. during their respective terms - yes. However, Jeanette said this could be a gray area. Novelle Doherty and Mary Elder felt this should be done via Ed Fund inasmuch as they see it within the educational area. Helen Hunter expressed the wish that all the past presidents can come and she, too, felt the Ed Fund could rightfully take this expense. Jennie Mae Rall said with some research of past VOTERs, their speeches would be backed up by facts. Novelle Doherty pointed out that lobbying issues naturally follows education about the issues, hence our theme: Celebrate Our Victories. Jeanette Vanderwater said this item will be brought up at next board meeting, and if we feel nervous about this we can transfer to the regular LWV-H budget; our IRS reputation is great and we want to keep it that way.

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Novelle Doherty told us that everything is under control for convention. She still hasn't heard from the mayor's office about her attendance. Novelle will check further on this. Mary Elder hand-delivered our invitation downtown to the mayor's office, and asked Barb to call, also. Jeanette and Madeleine Appel also called the mayor's office.

Novelle had a call from Betty Stewart, SW Bell...they are still mulling a donation to fund the reception (also trying to obtain funding from Coors). SW Bell was told that we'd appreciate a donation to accommodate from 80-100 persons 2 \$8-10 each. They thought that was a little high. Therefore, we are waiting on their decision. Novelle had considered going to the Cadillac Bar, but the logistics almost preclude that. And, the bar area in the hotel is quite nice. Mary Elder asked if we'd be able to get a special rate on the bar from the hotel...? Novelle answered that no one has committed yet; we are hoping for a donation — she told SW Bell that we would be happy for anything they could give us.

Jeanette asked Jennie Mae "When was the last time State Convention was in Houston?" After a mini-discussion between Jennie Mae and Helen, they both said 1970 -- Jennie Mae will check records to be absolutely sure.

Mary Elder told us she'd heard from Linda Snyder who is a member of the Federation of Houston Professional Women (which has about 5,000 members). They are having a convention at the Crowne Plaza Hotel on April 24. The thrust of the meeting is: Women in Government. This convention will provide lots of time for networking, and they wondered if we want a table — at no charge. Jennie Mae Rall and Mary Elder will go — probably from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m., taking some publications and membership applications. Marta Greytok of Texas PUC will be one of the speakers.

Mary Elder also mentioned that she needs a Voter Registration Chair and a new Librarian.

Helen Hunter reported that the East Fort Bend County LWV Unit is putting posters into the grocery stores — telling about the coming school board elections. Stafford and Missouri City candidates have no opposition, only Sugar Land.

Helen told us that the LWV-H Board will be invited to a luncheon on May 17. They acquired three new members at their last Wednesday meeting. It is really an enthusiastic group.

Helen reported that so far she had not found a Membership Director, and if anyone has a suggestion, please let her know. Also, <u>Mindy Travillian</u> wants help for the **VOTER**. Novelle <u>Doherty</u> suggested Verna Ponton.

All is set for Annual Meeting at the Doctors Club. Jeanette asked Jennie Mae to be parliamentarian for this meeting...Jennie Mae agreed.

Jennie Mae Rall reported that Pam Holt had told her the hospital where Pam works is moving — and, when this happens, Pam will see to it that we will get their program about procedures for throwing things away.

Mary Elder asked if the names of people filling the above job vacancies need to be in in time for inclusion in the Annual Meeting Workbook? Jeanette Vanderwater said "No, they can be announced at Annual Meeting." There will be an Executive Committee meeting just prior to Annual Meeting.

Jeanette told us that Fran Smith will be named to complete Novelle Doherty's term on the board...this will be announced in the VOTER.

CHILD ABUSE/NEGLECT, Betty Dertel

What an incredible experience for my first State Convention. The Child Abuse and Neglect Study Committee wishes to thank delegates who worked hard for convention support of the study. For those of you who were not present, we needed a 2/3 vote since this was a "non-recommended by state board" item for study. We had buttons, flyers, posters, and caucuses trying to inform and persuade delegates to support this study. When the final vote came on Sunday morning, it failed. But with the energy of Patsy Cunningham behind the study we learned how to present the convention floor with another method to agree to the study. With only minor con arguments and a lot of confusion, the convention voted to permit the Houston League to conduct the study, under the supervision of the state, in order to reach a consensus position which will be used as a basis for concurrence by other Leagues in Texas.

Some Houston delegates were outstanding and deserve a special mention: Betty and Jake Mooney, Patsy Cunningham, Hazel Youmans, Bonnie Cassidy, Barbara Nelson, Betty Jane Baker, Lavora Arizaga, Phyllis Frye, Jeanette Vanderwater, and Helen Hunter.

The reason for wanting consensus on this subject is so we can join the rest of the community to help improve the protection of the children from abuse and neglect.

On March 28th I attended an "invitation only" forum sponsored by the Children's Protective Services program of the Dept. of Human Services and the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health. The purpose was to foster open communication and joint planning between the community and CPS on critical issues affecting the children. A follow-up action committee meets in May. Even though I can't speak out yet, I'm meeting key people in the community who care about the safety of kids. This forum is one of 15 being held right now across the state.

CONSENSUS REPORT ON FINANCING CITY GOVERNMENT, Melba Drake Seven units with a total of 58 members participated.

1. a. Property taxes now constitute half the sources of revenue for support of the General Fund Budget. Do you consider this over-reliance, underreliance, or about right in reliance on this revenue source? A majority of three units with a total 36 members agreed that the city had reached a maximum or over-relied on property taxes for support of the General Fund Budget. One unit of 12 members agreed that reliance on property taxes was about right. One unit of 10 members did not answer the question as asked and was not counted.

- 1. b. Should we continue reliance on property taxes or are there other sources of revenue?
 - The majority of six units for a total of 38 members agreed the city should seek other sources of revenue. One unit of 10 members thought the city needed to rely on property tax and offered no further suggestions. One unit of 14 members who agreed dependence on property taxes had reached its maximum limits were not sure what other sources of income should be. While a number of suggestions were given there was no majority agreement on any one specific source; however, the five responding units listed possible new tax sources that require state legislation. Three units for a total of 22 members specified the city share in a graduated income tax.
- 2. In FY88 the city instituted a zoo fee. To what extent do you think fees and charges for city services should recover the cost of the service provided?
 - A majority of 32 members in five units agreed that the city should recover 100% of the cost of providing the service, except for those services that provide for the general welfare and common good. These services should continue to be tax supported. Two units did not answer the question as asked.
- 3. An argument for expanding the state's sales tax base cited by the Select Committee on Tax Equity is the growing need for local-government revenues. Do you agree or disagree with the local administration's support of this means as a desirable source for financing city government? Discuss pro and con.
 - Majority of five units for a total of 46 members opposed the administration's position for widening the sales tax base. One unit with 10 members did not answer the question as asked, stating only State League position. One unit of 2 members supported the administration's position, and one unit of 14 members reported a minority vote in favor of widening the base.
- 4. Financial policies adopted by the city last year state the tax supported debt service costs should not exceed 20% of the total revenue of the annual General Fund Budget. Currently the debt service incurred by sale of Certificates of Obligations for equipment purchases are not included in this 20% debt service cap. Should they be? Should they be voter approved? Should there be a limit on debt service costs? There was a strong consensus in all units for a cap on the debt service cost of no more than 20% of the total funds of the General Fund Budget, and that other indebtedness from the sale of bonds, such as certificates of obligation, be included in the total debt service cost. There was no
- purchase of certain equipment and vehicles.

 5. The city has a goal of reserving an unappropriated ending general fund balance that is equal to 5% of maintenance and operating expenditures. Should this standard be written into a binding policy or law? Why is it important in the financial management of the city?

- There was a strong consensus in five units with a total of 51 members for the city's adopting a financial policy reserving an unappropriated ending general fund balance that is equal to 5% of the General Fund Budget. Two units of seven total members reported a minority view of disagreement with a binding policy specifying 5%.
- 6. Cutting expenditures and increasing proficiency while providing more and improved service is a common dilemma of most cities. What suggestions do you have for Houston in dealing with this challenge?

A question was raised; can we make a donation to State Board? For defraying cost of state office. We have a policy that describes a motion to allocate unbudgeted funds. There is also the question of transferring funds to the regular LWV. There was general discussion...is it legal to give money to state? Jennie Mae Rall made the motion to suspend the rules and make a donation of \$2,000 to LWV-Texas Ed Fund for the purchase of the office building, seconded by Jean Lustgarten. A detailed discussion followed.

Jackie Alfred felt it might be a poor precedent to suspend the rules, no critical event has occurred, this is just a nice gesture...no crisis here.

Betty Foote commented that our members may not appreciate such a gift to State inasmuch as (1) we have problems with our general budget and the Ed Fund budget -- and, they have given generously earlier.

Alison Dieter had a concern about what major donors to the League might

Dawn Petershagen wanted to know if we had been asked to give to State for this item...yes, a general letter was sent to Leagues about two months ago, however, there has been no new appeal.

Charlotte Amrhein was opposed to sending a gift to State.

Novelle Doherty questioned whether or not the Houston League hasn't already given about 50% already? (Yes.)

Jennie Mae told us that policy requires that this has to be proposed, and this is a good example to members and other Leagues to support the entire organization.

The prior motion was put to a vote -- failed to pass.

Mary Elder then moved to suspend the rules and give \$1,000 to LWV-Texas Ed Fund for the purchase of the office building, seconded, put to a vote -failed to pass.

HUNGER PROJECT - Alison Dieter

Alison reported that Clarence West, City Attorney, had been called in order to give some sense of urgency to this project. Apparently our community garden is not a high priority item for the city.

Alison reported on her trip to Washington. She passed around a list of community activities of many other Leagues. She will have a VOTER article on her trip.

Alison advised us of a slide show on Hunger in America - produced by FRAC, i.e., Food Research Action Conference. Alison said this slide production is excellent and could be of use here in Houston. The price is \$75. Money from our \$3,000 grant cannot be used for the purchase of this slide show. Can we use Ed Fund money, or seek additional money specifically for this item? A motion was made that we purchase this slide production from Ed Fund money, seconded. Discussion followed: Pam Holt suggested accompanying the slides there should be a fact sheet, there should be resource people to accompany its showing, publicity; Mary Elder wondered who would follow through on use of film and return it; Betty Oertel commented that U.S. hunger is not a world-wide topic. Original motion was made that the money for this slide production come from the Ed Fund, passed.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS.

Fran Smith - A workshop is being planned to inform the public about the right-to-know provisions of SARA III (the Super Fund Amendment of 1986). This workshop will bring together various people who are involved in public communication. Leaguers are also involved in the planning. Can we co-sponsor pending further details...? Jeanette Vanderwater commented that we are generally in agreement with the aims of this effort and, therefore, could go along pending further details. There was general consent from the board.

Melba Drake - There was an invitation for the Ed Fund from the Tax
Research Association to attend its annual meeting and luncheon, April 13. The
cost is \$25. The speaker is Bob Bullock...on "How Texas Can Take Care of
Everything About Education and Prisons Without Taxes!" Jeanette Vanderwater
asked if this could come out of the Hershey money...Fran said it could.
Jeanette said that if one or two people want to go, the tickets can be
purchased.

Novelle Doherty spoke to us about the Saturday evening dinner honoring past State League Presidents. There are eight past presidents eligible to attend. The dinner is \$25/person. Can the LWV-Ed Fund pick up the tab for these ladies? This will cost appx. \$200. Jeanette thinks it can. She pointed out that the Bush budget will continue actual cuts of 10-13% in social services, and pleaded with everyone to take action—on the federal level to resist budget cuts to entitlement programs, administrative

funds for food stamps, WIC, TEFAP, and programs for the elderly. We should ask for an additional \$150 million to make WIC an entitlement program. This year co-sponsors are needed for the WIC and Child Nutrition Programs, which are both up for reauthorization; next year for the Food Stamp Act. We should write to members of the Senate Agriculture Committee and the House and Senate Budget Committees right away. On the state level, we should ask for implementation of the Hunger Prevention Act and for more participation in the Food Stamp Program.

More than one of the project managers was upset that their Leagues could not take this kind of action without seeking approval from LWVUS first.

I enjoyed this meeting tremendously, and appreciate having the opportunity to go.

FINANCE, Charlotte Bowers

We will sponsor a leadership seminar consisting of two simultaneous writing courses held at the Hyatt Regency West. The total openings are twenty. Each course has a maximum of ten students.

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For those board members interested in organizing and writing funding proposals, and becoming actively involved in fund-raising activities, we have Hugh Ray-Hoe teaching his <u>Engineered Writing Course</u>. This study time will last one full day and two one-half days. The full day will be held on Saturday, January 27, at the Hyatt Regency West. The additional two mornings will be on Monday, January 29, and on Wednesday, January 31. These two four-hour meetings will be at the Lutheran Church on Rice Boulevard.

For those members interested in effectively organizing, editing, and writing articles, letters or a local <u>Focus</u>, we have Gabrielle Cosgriff, Houston Metropolitan Magazine Editor, teaching a course directed to achieving maximum reader impact.

The exact length of the day is to be determined later. Each morning session will be four hours.

Both presenters are giving their services free of charge.

The Hyatt is contributing our two rooms and a complimentary lunch.

METROPOLITAN COMMUNITY GARDEN, Alison Dieter

By September, we have four beds planted: tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, and bush beans. We now have beds of broccoli, cabbage, and kale planted for the winter. Five other beds are ready to receive onions, carrots, beets, peas, and potatoes in January. The plants suffered from an early lack of water during a time when the Center's watering system was broken, and otherwise would have produced a much larger crop. During October and November eighteen lbs. of beans, three lbs. of peppers and about six lbs. of cucumbers have been harvested. The tomatoes look very good, and should be ready in a week or two. Each of forty tomatoe plants should provide one or two lbs. of tomatoes. The tomatoes, beans, and peppers should continue to produce crops until the first freeze, usually some time in December. In all of our gardening efforts we continue to be guided and educated by Dr. Bob Randall, Director of the Interfaith Hunger Coalition's Community Gardening Program.

As a result of our Garden Project, Councilman Vince Ryan has shown a serious interest in a composting program for the city in conjuntion with budgeting City revenues for gardening purposes. This is currently being done in Austin, Texas. Cities in Texas are bound by the State Constitution and may not provide or fund services, or land use to any individual, group or agency except in lieu of payment and/or services rendered. For that reason, part of our grant was used to build a gardening bed for wheelchair clients of the Center, and to provide plants for decorative (flower) beds. Most of these

plants were donated by local garden clubs and nurseries. Some of the \$116.85 for seeds and plants (voucher 4) was used to purchase decorative plants and bulbs for this purpose. Combination of Television of the Company of the Com

Our budget was modified considerably to include many items left out of the original budget. The Metropolitan Center has donated a small space in a storage area for gardening supplies. This area is now well stocked with many supplies for a state-of-the-art garden.

Due to a contribution of workers from the Community Option Restitution Program, we will be able to finish up all work on the garden, rendering all beds ready for planting in January. We will also finish the work for the Metropolitan Center that we contracted to do - all by December 1.

Present: Anne Deidrick, Novelle Doherty, Helen Hunter, Fauncine Martin, Jennie Mae Rall, Jeanette Vanderwater, Margaret Wedge...Melba Drake (came in later, plus a LWV member guest: Karen Miller (came in late just to present her subject).

Jeanette Vanderwater called the meeting to order at appx. 12:30 p.m.

Before we began discussing program items and the upcoming State Convention, Jennie Mae Rall passed out a short addendum to the FOCUS on Financing City Government...it gives three items to correct. Jeanette stated there would be an article in our next VOTER on this subject. The corrections are as follows: Errata FOCUS #71 Financing City Government 1989 and Beyond

Page 1. Paragraph 3, Last line should read: By 1980, voter approval had allowed many Texas cities to adopt a 1% local sales tax....

Page 8, Paragraph 5. Line 2 should read: Houston's FY 87 Financing Plan called for issuing \$50 million water revenue bonds intended to pay for upgrading....

Page 9, Paragraph 1, Line 9 should read: Interest for these notes is at a lower rate than that of the General Obligation Bonds.

Jeanette Vanderwater advised that Barbara McCormick would like to put a notice in this month's VOTER announcing the Right to Food Conference on Friday, April 7. Barbara will write this article. It was noted that this was in the VOTER last year; it fits in with our social policy as well as our position on agriculture. It was agreeable with Exec. Cte. for Barbara to do this, and Helen Hunter will check with her regarding the VOTER article.

Jeanette then passed around a letter from Michael McFadden pertaining to the merit selection of judges. This letter was given to <u>Helen Hunter</u> who will pass on to <u>Phyllis Frye</u> as this item falls in her purview.

Jeanette reported that Phyllis Frye would like for LWV-Houston at our next board meeting to vote on offering an action motion re Senate Bill, SB-23.

Jennie Mae Rall pointed out that this motion will first have to go to the Action Motions Committee which makes the decision on whether or not to pass along to the board. This will be done. A copy of this action motion will be in the board report.

Jeanette Vanderwater told us that at the State Legislative Days in Austin, Nikki Van Hightower asked for our help. In her ongoing dealings with the County Commissioners, it seems that body has stripped Ms. Hightower's office of many of its powers. Her office is part of the checks-and-balances system of government. It was noted that Mary Gillette has been asked to research this subject to see if we can help. Helen Hunter and Anne Deidrick commented that they did not know whether or not we could enter this matter from a League standpoint. Jennie Mae Rall suggested that we can work on it as individuals, but that as a League we have no position...this was the consensus of the Exec. Cte.

Melba Drake arrived and we reviewed last Friday's general meeting. Jeanette thought everything went very well, and she was impressed by the number of press attending. Helen Hunter heard mention of the meeting on the radio, Jeanette saw a Ch. 26 report but NO MENTION! was made of the League. Channels 2 and 13 were also there and the media did talk with Privett and Greanias.

Jennie Mae commented that all the speakers seemed to be relaxed and in their normal "characters." Melba wanted this meeting to be stimulating...and it was. Jennie Mae has it on tape and will write an article for the VOTER. There were approximately 60 in attendance. Melba pointed out that Mr. Privett brought out that the League really needs to have contact with the county... particularly in the area of duplication of services.





Melba Drake and Jeanette Vanderwater handled the Q&A...and Jennie Mae noted "there was not one wasted word." Melba felt the questions were on the mark...the meeting was quite successful. Jeanette told us the mayor had said she will be at convention and Jennie Mae confirmed this.

Jeanette Vanderwater called our attention to an Action Alert from National..re making sure voters are informed about their voting rights. In their mailing a sample op ed letter and VOTER article is included as well as information on how voter registration is handled in Texas. We are asked to support a bill in Congress that would tie-in voter registration with driver's license renewals. Mary Elder will be working on this, and Jeanette gave this mailing to Margaret Wedge for follow-through. Jeanette gave Helen Hunter the info on the DPM, as well as to Margaret Wedge should a press release be called for...Margaret will check out. Jeanette stressed that we want to be a part of this and would like to be in the OP-ED section.

Jeanette told us that in the same National mailing we are notified of a nominating committee meeting and we are asked to submit any nominations we may have for the National Board...and send such names in now.

Further, a rewrite of the social policy position was included. Mary Gillette will make a decision regarding our Food and Agriculture inclusion.

State DPM came over the weekend and in it is a convention workbook (in two parts)...there apparently is a major revision of bylaws. Also, a request that if we want to invite guests, there is a \$25 fee (to be paid by the guest). A form was included for this purpose...this will be discussed more fully at board meeting. Novelle Doherty suggested inviting Councilmember Vince Ryan to be a delegate...Jeanette also invited him in this role. Novelle suggested inviting all council members as well as other city movers—and—shakers. Novelle will draft a letter to potential guests, noting the cost of \$25 (the League does not have the money to pay for guests). The invitation deadline for acceptance would be April 1, however, a last—minute request could be accommodated.

Novelle Doherty said everything is under control with convention arrangements. She requested all board members -- if not already a delegate -- to please come to convention. Badges and banners should be in the office by Wednesday (from State Council). The registration deadline is March 15 (including registration check). The deadline for a refund is March 31. In the event we do not have the full 53 delegates allotted, Novelle recommended that we divvy up the remaining money in the budget for convention purposes. This is a good investment for the membership. There has been good response from the units. Novelle will be making phone calls and will also check with Betty Foote to call on unit leaders re convention. Novelle told us there is a limited number of registration forms (forms are now in the office). Funding of the Host Reception on Friday evening is still being worked on...talking with a number of good possibilities. She is preparing a cost estimate for these donor prospects. Would like to have champagne for Saturday night; this will take appx. \$500...still looking for this money. A meeting of the committee chairs will be held soon. VOTER deadline is Friday for mention of the foregoing. Novelle will also check with the Mayor's Appointment Desk re Her Honor's attendance at convention. Also, Novelle has asked the mayor to declare April 14 as LWV Day in Houston. State has also been asked, but no word on that yet. Helen Hunter said our publication should be touted and Jennie Mae will work on this.

Our League member and guest, <u>Karen Miller</u>, (who moved here from Austin) presented her subject at this point. Karen is the Legislative Chair of the District 11 PTA. Her area of interest is school finance...lives in the Cy-Fair School District. The thrust of Karen's presentation was Open Meetings and access by the public to board policies. Texas law apparently does not

require audience and/or public participation for school boards. Any citizen can make a presentation by going through channels of board policies...this is fraught with obstacles. Karen gave us a rather thorough dissertation on the operations of school board meetings.



Jeanette Vanderwater suggested talking with Jan Wilbur...and, Jeanette remembered incidents she'd experienced with both the Spring Branch and Cy-Fair School Boards. Karen told us she'd like to get together with some of the PTA: groups in Harris County...not in the role of "Truth Squad." Could the League do a study on open meetings and board policies...and then any follow-through would be by the PTA?

Anne Deidrick questioned the depth of such a study...it was possible the LWV Board could vote on doing a <u>survey</u>. Melba Drake asked if there wasn't a committee formed regarding school district meetings...? Recollection was that we've never really been into the area of how school districts work. Jeanette asked that something be put together for the board report by Karen Miller and to see if there was someone in her area who could help...in "problem" areas, the local citizen could go to school board meetings. Karen has talked with Nancy Feaqin and Evelyn Bonavita about this...karen feels that quiet discussion and sharing of concerns could bring about understanding and openness and something could be achieved. There are about 20 school districts...we need someone in each district to attend the meetings. Karen will work with the PTA councils to recruit people to do this type of legwork. Karen will prepare an article for the board report so that we can discuss at our next board meeting.

Jennie Mae Rall suggested that something in this line be put into our schools survey...seems possible. Jennie Mae said this seemed to fit in with our position on Open Meetings. Karen Miller told us there was little cooperation from the press — one reason being the numerous districts, lack of personnel. and lack of interest unless a scandal was involved (monetary, school personnel...). Margaret Wedge is going to check out a publication she has dealing with Open Meetings...more on this later.

Karen will go through the PTA first. If they cannot work on this, can the League work on it? Jennie Mae felt it was possible, but it will all hinge on getting the people necessary to work on it. Anne Deidrick believes the League members should work on it who are from each school district. (Karen had to leave after her presentation.)

Anne Deidrick informed us of an invitation from the German American Chamber of Commerce holding a March 30th meeting at the Warwick. There is a \$35 cost. The guest speaker will be the Minister of State, Foreign Office, Bonn, West Germany.

Melba Drake wondered if the League would be interested in buying a copy of the Report of the Special Committee on Tax Equity for our library...? She did not know its cost at present, however, she has found it invaluable as a resource material. Jeanette asked Melba to determine its cost and we can make a decision then. Melba advised she will be sending thank-you letters to each of last Friday's speakers.

Helen Hunter is still looking for people to serve on the board next year.

Jennie Mae Rall is presently seeking delegates for State Convention.

Marqaret Wedge advised she had received a thank-you letter from the

Radcliffe librarian re our Houston Women...book which has been put into their
library. This book will be touted at convention, also.

PRESIDENT, Jeanette Vanderwater

We have been requested by State to invite guests to the Saturday night gala at Convention. Jackie and I have met and have decided to send invitations, dutch treat, to the following: City Council, Commissioners' Court, Houston Congressmen, and Houston Legislators.

We have received a communication from national concerning VISA cards. The bank received 23 applications from Houston League members and issued 17 cards. Sometime around April 15 we will receive \$69.00. Beginning July 1, the income earned from the cards will be split 50-50 with the local League. If that had been done for purchases during 1988 we would have gotten half of \$137. This appears to be about like our Safeway deal, but we need more people to apply for and get VISA cards issued.

I have attended on behalf of the League the last two meetings of the Police Advisory Committee. It has been an interesting experience and I do intend to continue going. Should I be appointed as the official representative? The Committee has been asked to look at the issue of "arbitration." The Mayor would like to do away with it, and for some good reasons. The Union feels that this is their only protection from management. Council members have other opinions. There is a bill in the legislature which would make some guidelines to be used in the "arbitration" procedure. The Committee will make a decision on this in the near future.

CHILD ABUSE/NEGLECT, Betty Gertel

The Committee studying Child Abuse has decided to attempt to add Child Abuse to the state's recommended Child Care Study. We <u>definitely</u> need all <u>advice</u> and support of all of you who have been to state conventions and/or who are going to this one!

Child care being the recommended item doesn't include the word abuse anywhere in the scope and focus. But much abuse is happening at child care facilities and it should be included. We have had one planning session, another is scheduled for March 23, and the final one at the committee's regular meeting, 2nd Thursday of the month, April 13, 10:00 a.m., Conference room. Betty Mooney is heading this convention committee.

ACTION MOTIONS & STATE CONVENTION, Phyllis Frye

This is being copied to Reed Bilz of the Ft. Worth League. My hope is that both the Houston League and the Ft. Worth League will offer same as an action motion at State Convention. Please consider the following:

WHEREAS, Senate Bill SB23 states:

"Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Section 21.06, Penal Code, is repealed.

Section 2. An offense under Section 21.06, Penal Code, may not be prosecuted after the effective date of this Act. If on the effective date of this Act a criminal action is pending for an offense under Section 21.06. the action is dismissed on that date. However, a final conviction for an offense under Section 21.06 that exists on the effective date of this Act material to the state of the state of is unaffected by this Act.

Section 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 1989.

Section 4. The importance of this legislation and the crowded condition of the calendars in both houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three separate days in each house be suspended, and this rule is hereby suspended."

AND WHEREAS, the League of Women Voters of Texas found while in Council in the Spring of 1988 that the repeal of Section 21.06, Penal Code, was consistent with its positions;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the League of Women Voters of Texas meeting in Convention urges both houses of the Texas Legislature to pass SB23 and for the Governor to so sign.



EMERGENCY PROGRAM ITEM--EAST FORT BEND UNIT, Sally Hirschheim

BACKGROUND: Residents of the First Colony neighborhoods were recently told that the State Highway Department had before it proposals to widen Highway 6 from the present 2 lanes to 9 lanes, with an overpass at the intersection of Hwy. 6 and Williams Trace Blvd. This was much to the astonishment of the merchants and residents of the First Colony area who had always anticipated the road would be widened from its present 2 lanes to 4 lanes, but never such a huge road as 9 lanes. The environmental impact on the First Colony residents and the community would seem to be tremendous as the proposed overpass would be in the middle of the community and would actually displace dozens of local businesses.

WHAT IS HAPPENING: Local politicians have begun campaigns on opposing sides of the highway issue and residents have already started to get "hot" about the issue. Many reasons for the expansion have been rumored in the area, as you can imagine, but little factual information has been presented to the public at this time. This situation is causing great distress and distrust in the community.

WHAT WE PROPOSE TO DO: We, as a unit of the LWV, would like to make a study of the background on the presently pending plans and possible options that might be used. We would like to talk with local politicians regarding this situation and their position. Then, we would like to present a simple list of some of the options (if indeed there are any) in the form of a survey of popular opinion—either in the local press or in front of Hwy. 6 supermarkets.

Since this is a matter of the greatest urgency and concern in our area, we would like very much to have board approval for our project under the "emergency item" clause. As we are a new unit it will provide us with our first real study and effort to inform the public. We sincerely hope you agree and will give us this opportunity.

EDUCATION, Karen Miller

The LWV believes democratic government depends upon the informed and active participation of its citizens. In order for citizens to be informed about policy proposals it is necessary to have access to information in a timely fashion. While the Open Meetings Act requires governmental bodies to post agendas a certain period before the meeting, the law does not require the body to provide background materials to the public prior to board action.

I propose that the LWV-H examine the practices of Harris County School
Districts in the area of citizen participation in school districts through a
survey and possible visit to the major districts in the county. I am Legislative Chair of the PTA in Harris County and have discussed the proposal with
our current President Barbara Sims. If PTA is interested in participating, I
believe we could accomplish the survey with minimum LWV effort, and also
assist local PTA councils with information on the application of Open Meetings
and Open Records procedures. The PTA meets in mid-April. I think the survey
could begin in May or June, but given the crunch of current activities, more
realistically this survey could take place in the fall.

I understand practices vary in the county. I stopped by HISD during a board meeting last week where a lengthy board agenda with background material was available at the information desk. My district, Cypress-Fairbanks, distributes only the topics of discussion to patrons during the board meeting. Some board meetings occur at night and some during mid-day, which obviously is difficult for patrons to attend, particularly if they live a great distance from work.

I contacted several Leaguers who expressed interest in the project as well as one <u>Post</u> reporter who is eager to publish the results.

Some gray areas exist in the application of the Open Meetings Act to school districts and I am concerned that some patrons may not have access to information in a timely fashion.

I would be willing to chair or co-chair a committee to do the survey this summer or fall. I cannot commit the PTA until our mid-April meeting.

Jeanette Vanderwater called the meeting to order at 10:15 a.m.

BOARD MEMBERS PRESENT: Jackie Alfred, Charlotte Amrhein, Belinda Chagnard, Anne Deidrick, Alison Dieter, Melba Drake, Mary Elder, Betty Foote, Mary Gillette, Helen Hunter, Jean Lustgarten, Fauncine Martin, Dawn Petershagen, Fran Smith, Jeanette Vanderwater. Also present were: Mary Remenchik-Office Search Ct., and Denise Isaac-Finance Cte.

AGENDA - Accepted with no changes. So moved by Belinda Chagnard, seconded by Mary Elder, passed.

MINUTES - Accepted as written. So moved by Belinda Chagnard, seconded by Helen Hunter, passed.

Executive Committee Meeting minutes of 1-9-89:

Page 3, sentence beginning "Helen told us that the Report to Members is due April 1st."

5th line from bottom of page, sentence beginning "Mary Gillette reported that the Natural Resources Committee is meeting..."

TREASURER'S REPORT - Jean Lustgarten

Jean asked us to note the income for the month of December...the "December" letters brought in \$2,565 for a total of \$4,055 for the year...from our members over and above dues. Jean said this makes us proud of our members. Jeanette Vanderwater again asked us to look at the net worth...it has dropped to \$8,000, money is needed. The Treasurer's Report was filed for audit.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT - Jeanette Vanderwater

Jeanette reminded us to be sure and read the Calendar of Events; please keep all deadlines in mind so no calls will have to be made. Long-range planning will be discussed at our March meeting. National mailings will be passed around and will be talked about later.

Jeanette advised the Special Events Committee...has not found anyone willing to chair it. She had talked with a number of people, but no luck. Patsy Cunningham really does not have the time. Mary Gillette does not plan to discuss at their Monday budget committee meeting inasmuch as nothing has been resolved. Jeanette will put on the "back burner" for the present; the committee is still intact but there is no one to coordinate it.

A Sierra Club reception is to be held honoring Ken Kramer (touted as the best lobbyist in Texas): February 2, 5:30-7:30 p.m. This is a fund raiser to benefit him. The invitation bearing all details will be in the office.

Legislative -- room reservations. Each member will take care of their own room reservation. Carpooling will be discussed later.

(We had a break at this point to partake of delicious snacks, etc.)

OFFICE SEARCH - Mary Remenchik

We were all provided with a Fact Sheet (see attached) giving us an overview on the office search subject. The area covered encompasses the corner of West Loop and Hwy. 59...Galleria...Richmond Ave. (about 11 buildings previewed). Space is running between 70-75£/sq.ft. The prices could possibly be negotiable. The committee must make a decision on whether to move or not; Mary needs to know the feeling of the board. The timing involved will not permit the committee to get back to the board, and they need a free hand to make the best decision.

<u>Fran Smith</u> commented that no specific questions have yet been asked about storage space.

Jackie Alfred speculated that rent will probably continue to go down, and our rental budget is set now, even if our rent stays the same or goes down. We must evaluate what we get for this money. If necessary, amenities are worth some additional.

The comment was made that our present office is not really centrally located for our membership.

Alison Dieter reminded us that one major disadvantage is that Barbara Swartz really hopes not to face a move.

Jean Lustgarten expressed ambivalent feelings about moving. She comes in about once a week which is about a 25-mile round-trip.

Novelle Doherty commented that our "free storage space" in the present building is only because of its vacancy rate. Bulk of the membership is primarily outside the Loop. One advantage of a move - if it is to the Galleria area - would be a good address, and we could P/R our move.

Belinda Chaquard called our attention to the Treasurer's Report: our net worth has decreased and our present space fits our money problems: lower rent would help us. If we do decide to move, let's have a money-raising effort and have the additional moving expense ahead of time. In essence, money is a very real consideration. In respect to "image," is our mission to keep people informed or just for our members? Further, transportation could be a problem for Leaguers who use the bus to get to the League offices.

Mary Elder asked if anything has been established about how long a new lease would be for on our Montrose space...? Mary Remenchik said, "No, not until we really know our options...65t/sq.ft. is not really that big a deal. This could possibly come down further, plus asking for painting, cleaning, etc. A 3-year lease is an industry norm. The committee would prefer a 3-year lease although Montrose is very difficult for those members who live far out.

Fran Smith urged thoughtful evaluation about whether we want to remain where we are. The current space market is a good time for us to look around. We do not know what the future market will be like. We do not know - really - the percentage of our members who come to the office...or who might come to a new location.

Dawn Petershagen echoed Fran in that it is a good time to look because of the amount of rental space presently on the market. If we move, now is the best time. She mentioned the Galleria area and north. Mary Remenchik said this latter is really a "fringe" area, that the Loop or Hwy. 59 give best access; members are mostly northwest and southwest.

Anne Deidrick wondered if things will continue to deteriorate in our present location/building.

Helen Hunter mentioned that security is poor for the stairwell areas and there has been some theft, also.

Charlotte Amrhein commented that we can afford where we are now; our money situation may change in another three years.

Mary Gillette said the higher moving costs could offset the lower rent, and while there is no loading ramp at Montrose (those heavy! mail bags for the VOTER), we still have to go to the main post office with our mass mailings.

Belinda Chaquard referred to the deterioration of the building...she overheard the building manager telling someone that the entire building is to be renovated...

Mary Remenchik asked that all of us fill out the office vote form she provided for guidance of the Office Search Committee. Results of this vote will be tallied here, today, and the Office Search Committee will be guided by its outcome.

STATE CONVENTION - Jackie Alfred

Jackie said plans are moving right along. Thanks to <u>Jeanette Vanderwater</u>, a great registration form is ready to be printed and go out. <u>Denise Nosal</u> will head up the Guest Relations Committee. Janice Owen had to resign from Registrations; Kay Guenther will co-chair. Jackie still needs one or two businesses that would be willing to make business-expense deductible donations for hosting the Friday night cocktail party. <u>Fran Smith</u> was asked if any of her chemical company contacts might be persuaded to do this...? <u>Phyllis Frye</u> has made a \$500 contribution. <u>Dawn Petershaqen</u> made a suggestion about offering to all convention attendees blood pressure screening...a good idea. Dawn would like to set up a table for this screening for the Health Care Committee promo; will ask the hospital where she works for favors to give away (non-profit hospital). Okay for the two days of the convention.

Jackie Alfred reminded us that our budget can help our allotted 52 delegates for the convention. If all delegates can come, we would account for one-third of the convention attendance...State board predicts attendance of about 150-to-170. \$1,400 is budgeted. Novelle Doherty and Jackie Alfred would like to have \$200 from this amount to use in a discretionary manner so that LWV delegates and workers will be taken care of during the convention... to upgrade our room to a suite for the convenience of all, and to provide hospitality to visitors. Each delegate could be reimbursed \$25 toward convention registration fee at the maximum allowable delegate count.

Jackie asked for approval of the \$200 discretionary amount — passed.

Jackie asked for approval of the \$25 amount to each delegate to defray convention registration amount, as well as for workers in behalf of LWV-H. This amount was amended to \$22.50-Firm and any balance in the convention budget would remain in the treasury. The only requirement of members receiving this \$22.50 reimbursement is that they attend a majority of the plenary sessions. (There are other expenses that a delegate can choose to pay for: meals, etc.) Eligible to be delegates are: board and off-board members, committee chairs, members-at-large. Approval was given. Discussion continued on this subject:

Jackie Alfred told us that the \$37.50 convention registration fee was literally for registration only. Therefore, the offer to reimburse our members for a portion of this fee is a valid effort to fill our delegation. Mary Gillette asked if we had to spend all the budgeted money, could we save some of it? Jackie pointed out that this money is important in enhancing a person's interest in the League, and it does affect the level of enthusiasm. Dawn asked about parking and Jackie told us there is no parking fee. Jackie will provide an article for the VOTER on the convention.

At this point Jeanette Vanderwater gave us the results of the Office Search Committee vote form (completed by board members):

- 9 Stay (need best deal we can obtain)
- 3 Move
- 3 Move, if good deal could be struck

BYLAWS - Belinda Chagnard No changes.

PROGRAM ACTION - Anne Deidrick

Phyllis Frye will chair the Administration of Justice Committee. Action cannot be taken on Block Grants and Child Abuse. Action will be taken on Financing City Government <u>after</u> consensus. Rhoda Haddox will continue writing her letters...Jackie Alfred was asked if letters should also be sent to our local legislators? Any letter to the President should come from National. Jeanette Vanderwater felt a VOTER article was needed on this.

Alison Dieter asked why we could not put a consensus question on city finances...? Mary Gillette said the language adopted at the 1988 Annual Meeting reads: "A <u>study</u>...where the money comes from." Not the <u>spending</u> of city funds. <u>Jeanette Vanderwater</u> asked what we are going to recommend in the Annual Meeting Workbook? <u>Mary Gillette</u> referred to Page R-2 of the board report...Mary moved that what is written be recommended to the membership, seconded by <u>Anne Deidrick</u>, passed. Mary advised that the Buffalo Bayou Coalition would like our mailing list. It was all right for them to have it - by general consent.

MARCH UNITS - Melba Drake

Melba referred us to R-2EF. With the mayor's acceptance to being a panelist, the panel is firm. The panel composition is:

Kathryn Whitmire, Mayor

George Greanias, City Controller

John Privett, Pres. of Tax Research Assn.

Ms. Cheryl Dotson who is Deputy Dir. of Finance & Administration was instrumental in getting the mayor to be on the panel. Melba told us the FOCUS should be entitled "More Than You Ever Really Wanted to Know About City Government!" The FOCUS is being edited now. Melba asked that we consider the proposed questions for the units. Melba Drake moved acceptance of these questions, Novelle Doherty seconded. Jeanette asked for any questions: Alison Dieter did not understand the first sentence of Question #5. Mary Gillette will re-word. Melba's motion passed.

Betty Foote referred to the March General Meeting...commenting that Mayor Whitmire does not go to that many meetings. Betty wondered if we were too rigid and unbending on our time limitations...can't we be more flexible? Reasonable accommodation within certain time frames will be observed toward guests whenever possible.

ORGANIZATION - Helen Hunter

Helen suggested that the small room for the General Meeting might not be large enough...if we cannot get the large room, it is possible we will have to go somewhere else. Helen will talk with Mary Matula about this.

The deadline for the VOTER is February 10.

Melba Drake mentioned that First Presbyterian Church has a large hall that would accommodate a larger crowd. Mary Elder will check with its secretary. Novelle Doherty suggested checking with Laura Mewhinney if the charge (at her church) is not too high. Helen Hunter will check out these suggestions.

Helen advised we will need some coffee pots, the office coffee pot is not working right. We must provide our own. <u>Helen Hunter</u> will make the coffee, and the cost of a coffee pot will be looked into. The sound system will also be used at this meeting.

Helen reported another member who will be a part of the VOTER Committee. Her name is <u>Kathryn Pruitt-Bruun</u>. She and her husband have joined (from Missouri City). They plan to be a part of State Convention preparations. She will go in on Saturdays to help <u>Mindy Travillian</u> with the VOTER.

Minutes of Executive Committee Meeting Monday, Feb. 10, 1989/12:30 pm/League office

Present: Jackie Alfred, Charlotte Amrhein, Anne Deidrick, Melba Drake, Mary Elder, Mary Gillette, Fauncine Martin, Jennie Mae Rall, Jeanette Vanderwater, and Alison Dieter.

Jeanette Vanderwater called the meeting to order at appx. 12:35 p.m.

Impressions of Child Abuse Public Forum held 2/9/89:

Melba: It was great! I learned a lot.

Anne: Gave concern of People For Justice.

Mary E.: The implication of CPS and other group budgets. The crux of the problem--no budget is adequate.

Good turnout. Location good. Refreshment superb.

Jeanette advised that <u>Helen Hunter</u> would be our new president pro tem, and thanked <u>Mary Elder</u> who had finished serving in that capacity.

The VOTER deadline was then discussed...it was originally scheduled for April 13 (just before convention). Jeanette suggested a VOTER deadline of April 7 at noon. This would give Mindy Travillian time to prepare the VOTER prior to convention. Helen Hunter pointed out that some things might not fit "neatly" into the VOTER (with the revised deadline on us), however, this should not upset us. Any additions can just go in any place there is room. Jeanette suggested that we might have a "Convention Supplement."

Re the City Government consensus. This report will not go into the VOTER: Anne Deidrick's report will adhere to the April 17 deadline. It will be ready to be approved by the board on April 28 and handed out at the May 11 Annual Meeting.

Jeanette asked if the membership could approve a local consensus at the May meeting? Or, must we wait until the next May? Here again, we could have a hand-out as part of the Annual Meeting workbook, and a consensus could be taken.

It was agreed that the board report deadline will be April 17 and the VOTER deadline would be April 7.

Jeanette then called upon Alison Dieter for a report on the Hunger Grant. Alison told us that they do not yet have a place to garden. She told us also that the Health & Human Services have an excellent plot at the Metro Multipurpose Center. However, it has been determined that they will need to install a lot of underground water lines. The director is willing for us to do this providing we can circumvent the sprinkler systems already set up there. The proposal has been sent to a Mr. Dedeaux at Health & Human Services in hopes of working out an arrangement.

Regarding the Bonnie Brae property, apparently the city does not want to deal with this. Alison has had no response to her inquiries. In fact, she does not know if the mayor has even read the proposal or not.

Mary Elder wondered if the sprinkler system at the Multi-purpose Center might not be incorporated into a water system for the Community Garden...? Alison felt that it might work for us.

Jackie Alfred asked if there wasn't some way that all the "stonewalling" by the city couldn't be reported in our VOTER as we feel this might be one way the mayor would learn of the situation...it has been reported that she does read the VOTER. Melba Drake affirmed that the mayor is "interested in hearing what other people think I do," and such a VOTER article might inform her of our difficulties in working with the city.

Alison Dieter left Exec. Cte. meeting to go down to the office to prepare a VOTER article on the difficulties we are experiencing with our Hunger Grant Community Garden project. Alison's article will be ready today. Before leaving, Alison told us that she'd had a reply from her letter to Mrs. DeMenil. Mrs. DeMenil replied that she would be interested in our project but that it would be months before she could get on it.

Jeanette Vanderwater asked for comments on the Long Range Planning Report...we had copies that we shared in going over the report.

Mary Gillette referred to item 7 on Pg. 3 of the report. Mary felt this should be either reworded or modified. Local "new studies" are the only ones we can control. These are nearly always a means of getting new members into the League.

Jackie Alfred remarked that we are spread so thin now with studies that we have trouble keeping up with those currently on our program. This Item 7 caused a division of thought on the long range planning committee, also. The overall idea was to help prioritize what we are going to spend our time on.

Jeanette Vanderwater told us that this will be resolved at board meeting and will be presented as recommendations to the Annual Meeting -- after being voted on.

Anne Deidrick asked Mary Gillette if Mary would like to delete Item 7. Mary responded, "yes."

Melba Drake commented that we could get a working committee going on new study items, then that would help attract members into the League and keep them active (Item: CRITERIA, 4, on Pg. 3).

Jackie Alfred commented that we can't have everything on the plate at the same time and prioritizing must be done.

Jeanette asked that we be thinking of a better way to state Item 7. Then she directed our attention to the top of Page 2, asking us to add the word, "Financial" after ...a solid (financial) base.

This preliminary discussion of the Long Range Planning Committee suggestions should speed their discussion at board meeting.

Jackie Alfred told us that Jo Williams should be given an enormous amount of credit on this outline. She forced us to see that these are objectives, and what strategies are necessary to reach the objectives.

Mary Gillette asked what time period "long range" encompasses? Jackie said probably a 5-year plan that would have yearly updating. Mary felt this should be in the long range planning report.

<u>Jeanette Vanderwater</u> said this report will be a recommended item at Annual Meeting.

BUDGET - Jeanette Vanderwater had brought several copies for us to discuss. (Mary Gillette, Mary Elder, and Jackie Alfred have copies.) This budget will be part of the board report and will be discussed at our next board meeting. We are merely discussing whether this should be in the board report as is or make a few changes.

Jeanette - Under Income, add "Restricted-Hershey Fund, \$2,000"

Mary Gillette wondered if this wouldn't "bounce" up the income by \$2,000?

...making A-1 \$9,000 (Income \$39,320).

Page 2-LWV-H

Item A-Dues \$18,000...could be a bit high. In our long range plan, this is a goal we will try to reach, so perhaps we should leave this as is.

Expenses

N-1, Equipment maintenance and leasing (reword the explanation)

N-7, Administrative will include a 4% increase

0-3, Add: ...and "board report."

Mary Elder questioned clarification on postage...N-3 under explanations: "Includes postage meter rental of \$57.50 (4 times a year), bulk mail permit, as well as postage not charged elsewhere."

N-12 - explanation on page 4, add: This is 61% of items N 1-10.

Mary Gillette interjected that it is important to keep track of how our time is spent over each 3-month period. This was a suggestion after a State LWV audit this year.

Anne Deidrick asked about the \$6,500 rent; this is explained on Page 4.

Jeanette Vanderwater referred to Section 0 -- would like to add under Page 4:
0-6: 43% of 0-1 through 4.

P - Money allotted will not cover all expenses

Q - State PMP and National PMP

Can Ed Fund pay % on National dues

Can Ed Fund pay % on State dues (was voted down at State)

A choice could be given: 100% from LWV-H or...

75% " "

Jeanette said if the Houston delegation wants to pay a portion of the PMP from the Ed Fund, let's try for the 1990-91 year. Mary Elder will bring this up at board meeting.

Jeanette affirmed that it was okay to bring this up but does not want to put in our budget.

Jeanette referred to R-5: 67% of Items 1-3

The LWV-H budget is \$2,000 on the PLUS side!

Jackie Alfred mentioned in-kind expenses and in-kind income (from non-reimbursed expenses), #3 on recommendations. Line items in budget stating these kinds of donations? Yes, but only if given to th Ed Fund. Jeanette stated that in-kind transactions must be in-and-out recordings; this serves the purpose of giving a better picture of what money is being spent in the name of the League. It can be a personal IRS deduction (for Ed Fund). For the system to work, every expense must be supported by expense slips. Mary Gillette said this is also good when applying for grants. It shows not just the organization, but individual members.

Mary Elder also pointed out that there can be a difference in a person being able to absorb out-of-pocket expenses...the only way we can get a real picture of what it costs to run the League. Mary Gillette suggested we see what the board members feel about including in-kind donations.

Charlotte Amrhein told us how she keeps track of her own budgeted items: she has a book with one page for each item.

Helen Hunter attended a Great Decisions meeting (in Ft. Bend County) and picked up two new members. They are anxious to start a unit there, however Helen suggested they become members of a Houston unit and start their own League when they had more members from their area. They plan to attend our general meetings, too. Helen will help and encourage them. Helen also said she would mention that they might want to put out their own Voters Guide. That area now includes: Missouri City, Stafford, and Sugar Land.

Helen also reported that Kathryn Bruun's mother had a stroke and Kathryn will not be able to help with the **VOTER**. She will be moving out of town to take care of her mother.

Melba Drake reported on the March meeting — the mayor will be a panelist as well as George Greanias and John Privett. Jeanette Vanderwater noted that the speakers should know they will be televised by the city's Access Channel. A time limit for the speakers should be set, if possible. Melba advised that each panelist will talk appx. 15-minutes and then there will be a 30-minute Q&A session. We plan to adjourn at 11:30 a.m. Melba asked Anne Deidrick and Mary Gillette to handle screening the written questions from the audience. Both ladies agreed to do this. The timekeeping will be handled discreetly; Jeanette suggested a "flash card" with a 2-minute "warning."

Melba Drake was inclined to think that a well written letter would be a satisfactory replacement for a formal briefing. She would like to meet with Anne Deidrick and Betty Foote to make a definite decision on this...whenever such a meeting can be arranged. Melba advised that Helen Hunter had secured our room at the Central Presbyterian Church in Fellowship Hall. The sound system will be in use. Other business organizations, civic groups, etc. will be invited (these from other lists obtained). The FOCUS is in the office now. Helen Hunter asked about food or coffee? Melba Drake and Mary Elder will bring some Danish and coffee.

<u>Jackie Alfred</u> reported that the convention plans are well underway. All the graphics are now in the office. The greatest need now is to try and get our people to be delegates. There will be a **VOTER** article on this.

Jackie told us that the Convention application form must remain uniform and soon will be sent out to those who <u>call in</u> and want to go as a delegate or to just attend.

To be a delegate one must attend a majority of the plenary sessions. Floor committee members would have a hard time being delegates. Jackie and Novelle Doherty will bring up at board meeting the amount of reimbursement if we do not have our full complement of delegates.

Jackie specifically urged us to come to the Saturday night function. It's a "Birthday Celebration" honoring past State LWV presidents. There will be skits introducing these women and they will each give a brief talk.

Jackie reported that all the committees are staffed!

Helen Hunter asked that all VOTER material be in duplicate: please put one copy in Mindy's file and one copy in Helen's file.

Charlotte Amrhein reported that "the calling continues?" She told us that Jeanette had obtained \$500 from Coca Cola Foods, and Charlotte had obtained \$500 from Pennzoil (these girls are mighty persuasive - thanks!).

PROGRAM VP, Anne Deidrick

I represented the League this month at a meeting of the Interfaith Task Force on Allen Parkway Village (APV). The purpose of this coalition of Jewish, Protestant, and Catholic groups is the mediation and resolution of the APV impasse. People of widely divergent views attended the meeting, but the merits of the various positions were not discussed. Facts were presented, the problem of the need for more low cost housing was defined, and solutions were advanced.

Mayor Whitmire presented the administration point of view on the disposal of APV. Mr. Othello Poulard, an officer of the Center for Community Change, headquartered in Washington, a nonprofit corporation which helps empower grass roots minority groups to become more skilled in solving their problems, spoke on behalf of the APV Residents' Council. The Council, headed by Lenwood Johnson (who spoke briefly) feels that the residents should be given priority in solving their own problems.

It was a spirited meeting with several challenges to the mayor, especially by Gladys House of the Freedman's Town Association, but Kathy met them with good grace. The next meeting of the coalition will be March 16 at Mt. Horeb Baptist Church in the 4th Ward. I recommend that any of you interested in this vital and divisive issue attend.

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WOMEN'S LEGISLATIVE DAYS, Jennie Mae Rall

As you know, this by-yearly conference brings women from all over the state of Texas to Austin to learn what issues of importance to women will be addressed by the current Texas Legislature.

The three workshops, out of 29 offered, that I attended were geared to how women (and men) could impact the legislature as its members debate the appropriations process, the merits of putting the needs of people first, and the revamping of the laws affecting the Texas Department of Commerce's ability to increase exports.

At the first session, beginning at 1 p.m., February 13, 1989, I must have spotted at least a dozen persons from Houston in the LBJ Library Auditorium listening to Ms. Ann Lewis, Keynote Speaker, addressing politics and women's issues. Her talk was followed by a lively question and answer period. It was not apparent whether the many statewide League people I recognized were there as LWV representatives or in a capacity of serving one of the other forty plus co-sponsoring organizations.

After a break, we returned at 3 o'clock to learn about lobby skills from a real pro—the Honorable Ann Richards, Treasurer of Texas. I'm sure we will find ourselves attacking issues a la Ann Richards many times in the future. Of course, I brought back brochures for you education and health and human services buffs. These should help in contacting the appropriate legislator as you work to maximize federal dollars and to change the Texas Folly of sending \$1.59 to Washington, in comparison to New York's \$.75, and the fact that Texas consistently ranks last among all the states in drawing down federal spending. I was also lucky enough to be in the right place at the right time and acquired a copy of Fiscal Size Up. Legislative Budget Board report on 1988-89 biennium Texas services, which gives us the fiscal outlook on many League issues.

Jeanette Vanderwater called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. A quorum was present.

AGENDA - Jeanette asked about Melba Drake's report on the March unit and General Meeting info being in the LWV Ed Fund board reports rather than in LWV-H...? Mary Gillette told us that the proper placement should be so stated when turning in a report, and this would be properly under LWV-H.

Belinda Chagnard moved the Agenda be accepted as amended, <u>Jean Lustqarten</u> seconded, passed.

MINUTES - Minutes of the December 2 meeting accepted as read. So moved by Melba Drake, seconded by Helen Hunter, passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT - Jean Lustgarten

Jean pointed out the report was as of December 31, 1988. <u>Jeanette Vanderwater</u> noted that the Ed Fund net worth has come along fine with the profit made from the **Voters Guide**. Jeanette requested Jean to increase the amount budgeted for the **Voters Key** another \$2,000. This was okayed at a previous meeting. Report was filed for audit.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT - Jeanette Vanderwater

Jeanette told us that four members will be attending the Chamber of Commerce luncheon...so far: <u>Jackie Alfred</u> and <u>Mary Elder</u>. <u>Mary Elder</u> will check with others to be sure four attend.

Jeanette then mentioned the YWCA luncheon for "Outstanding Women of 1988" (this info came from Eleanor Tinsley's office). Gwen Essinger is our nominee. Betty Foote mentioned the City of Houston Mayor's Award and Gwen would certainly be eligible for that also. Information must be in by January 31 on our nominee. Betty said she'd check with Gwen for a copy of her biography and qualifications. Novelle Doherty wondered if the "Y" would provide us a copy they have on file...Betty will check this out.

PROGRAM STUDY - Anne Deidrick

Anne reported that <u>Betty Dertel</u> is out of town...however, everything is set for our General Meeting. There is a report in the <u>VOTER</u> upcoming which will give the details. <u>Jeanette Vanderwater</u> commented that the front page of the <u>VOTER</u> "looks great." The discussion questions are set. <u>Jeanette thanked Betty Foote</u> for her efforts in seeing that food is provided. At this point, Betty asked if a briefing would be required? <u>Anne Deidrick</u> did not really know, so <u>Betty Foote</u> will continue trying to reach <u>Betty Oertel</u> to find out. It was Anne's feeling that probably a briefing would not be required.

Helen Hunter told us that in addition to the units bringing food, we would need our own coffee pot.

Anne Deidrick - Local Studies, 1988-89. Child Abuse will be carried for another year. Karen Miller is concerned about the bond issue, and will write a VOTER article on it so that members will be more informed. Also she is interested in establishing some sort of "Set of Principles" pertaining to bond issues (for other VOTER articles). In summary, as Mary Gillette presented in her board report, we are recommending one local study. Child Abuse. Mary Elder so moved, seconded by Novelle Doherty, passed.

Mary Gillette told us about a telephone call she'd had from a Ms. Palacios of TEXACO asking about putting together a "brown bag" lunch every other month for their own employees to discuss serious topics...we are to provide the speakers. Can we? No. Ms. Palacios wanted the League to just present topics for serious study. Mary wondered if she should continue this discussion with Ms. Palacios and maybe act as a low-key advisor? Other questions: Do we want someone from our Speakers Bureau, do they want just some of our interests, etc. The answer to the foregoing seems to be "yes." Mary Gillette did not want to commit us to something without discussion with the board.

HUNGER GRANT - Alison Dieter

Alison reported they are still looking for land. Some land has been found that belongs to the city (on Bonnie Brae). It was to be used for a new library. We are in a process of trying to obtain permission to use the land...a proposal has been sent to the Mayor's office. Nancy Neuman can be asked to call the Mayor's office in our behalf...ask Barbara McCormick first, however. Mary Gillette suggested that the Park People might be able to help us...ask Glenda Barrett for help with hints on how to contact the Park Board for help. Ann Hamilton also might be able to help out in this area.

Mary Elder asked that Margaret Wedge be kept informed on this project so she can get publicity out on it. Alison told us that she's also meeting with the Neartown Association, Bob Randall, who is very appreciative over being informed about this project.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS - Mary Elder

Mary told us that <u>Margaret Wedge</u> could not be here so Mary will report in her absence. <u>Helen Hunter</u>'s book is in the Radcliffe Library now. Margaret is interested in seeing if this can be used as a "lead-in" for some convention program. Everyone who comes to the convention needs to know about this book.

Jackie Alfred said Margaret needs to check with her as she needs the names of people to contact at the TV stations — if anyone knows about someone in the media, share this information with Jackie. Jackie would like to set up some TV interviews during convention. We have camera-ready copy of the National League logo; this could be used simultaneously with a "blurb" about our organization.

Jackie would also like to get in touch with other organizations who have common interests with us and send them some publicity about the meeting coming up as well as other subjects and meetings in the future. If you know any names, please pass them along to Barbara Swartz and Margaret Wedge.

Mary Elder reported on the Kingwood meeting...a forum for the Humble ISD candidates. Jennie Mae Rall, Mary Elder, and Hope Dyson (who was moderator) attended. Hope was great! on short notice. The entire meeting worked out just fine and there was a good turn-out. This forum was a joint effort between the PTA (Sue Wood, former LWV member) and the AAUW. A VOTER article will be done by Karen Miller.

VOTERS KEY - Belinda Chagnard

Belinda told us that three bids have been obtained. We will have to do some typesetting:

Hart will lower their bid to match Gulf Printing and will not charge any freight to Austin (for printing). There will be a \$15/page charge for type-setting which equals \$330 (worst case). Belinda believes this is a good price.

Hart advised that it would take 2 to 3 weeks for them to have them printed and back to us; Gulf can do it in two weeks. The time is no problem. Belinda said she'd do the best she can on the price...it is less than we thought it would be.

Hart has the ability to print the Voters Guide, also. Same quality stock or better. We will talk with them in the future about this. Belinda wanted to know if it is all right to go with the 40/K copies...or, 45,000-50,000? The best figure to order seemed to be the 40,000...OK!

Belinda Chaquard advised that letters were being sent out by the end of February to businesses and nonprofits we have previously dealt with, asking them to purchase our VOTERS KEY - 50d apiece with a discount for large orders. They are not sent out to any level of government elected officials; these people are bound to use them. Belinda said these people probably get free copies. Novelle Doherty thinks we should give them copies and solicit an order for distribution to constituents. Belinda said this can certainly be done as part of the sales campaign...OK!

Belinda Chaquard brought us back to the printing...should she go with Hart Graphics? She will check with Eddie Tamborello (Gulf Printing) on the typesetting price...and, she will handle Andre very diplomatically. More later.

Belinda reported that a member had called in asking whether or not we could publish election results either in the VOTERS GUIDE-order or Sample Ballot-order? She seemed to be having trouble finding this information. Mary Gillette felt that this was not our responsibility; Dawn Petershagen felt that our job was to educate...this is not our job and besides, we cannot afford it. FINANCE - Charlotte Amrhein

Charlotte reported that "our president has been pursuing many accounts and is bringing in the money!" She had received a beautiful letter — really complimenting us — from TEXACO and a check for \$2,000 (to Ed Fund). On 1-26-89 TEXACO took us (Charlotte and Jeanette) to lunch at Damian's to formally present this check. The lady who was with them wants to go with us to Legislative Days in Austin (she is the one who makes out the check!). Jeanette Vanderwater said a membership application should be sent to this lady. TEXACO has never been enthusiastic about supporting us in the past...this is a real break-through. Jeanette reported that a pitch has been made to Texas Eastern and she will follow through on this effort. Charlotte closed her report by reminding us that fundraising takes a lot of time.

Alison Dieter told us that she'd written a letter on LWV stationery to Mrs. DeMenil -- asking for a contribution of land.

GOAL: TO INCREASE OUR INFLUENCE IN THE FORMATION OF PUBLIC POLICY IN HOUSTON AND HARRIS COUNTY BY

- 1. INCREASING VISIBILITY AND EFFECTIVENESS THROUGH CITIZEN EDUCATION AND ADVOCACY;
- 2. DEVELOPING A SOLID FINANCIAL BASE;
- 3. STRENGTHENING OUR MEMBERSHIP IN NUMBERS AND PARTICIPATION.

OBJECTIVES for "Increasing visibility and effectiveness through citizen education and advocacy" are as follows:

A. ESTABLISH LOCAL PRIORITIES FOR STUDY AND/OR ACTION IN THE AREAS OF GOVERNMENT, SOCIAL POLICY AND NATURAL RESOURCES. THESE PRIORITIES WILL BE REVIEWED EACH YEAR.

STRATEGIES for implementing this OBJECTIVE are:

- In annual planning, schedule a particular month for Board suggestions, and a subsequent time for membership reaction, to a specific number and naming of study/action priorities for each year.
- Plan some unit and general meetings as "action" meetings (i.e., Go and See meetings, Workshops, Legislative Action [lobbying, letter-writing, interviewing], etc.
 - 3. Increase Networking with other organizations in each priority area.

B. USE LOCAL MEDIA CREATIVELY TO ACHIEVE HEIGHTENED VISIBILITY

STRATEGIES for implementing this OBJECTIVE are:

- 1. Plan "photo" opportunities for all study and action topics.
- 2. Use "media" conferences systematically.
- 3. Submit for publication in local newspapers guest editorial columns on League Program topics periodically.
- 4. Publicize the "Not for Women Only" fact.
- 5. Use all committees and members in Public Relations endeavors.
- 6. Educate public about the purpose and functions of the LWV.

The <u>OBJECTIVE</u> for "<u>developing a solid base</u>" is: INCREASE THE FINANCIAL BASE TO SUCH AN EXTENT THAT LEAGUE PROGRAM WILL BE ACCOMPLISHED COMFORTABLY AND WITHOUT DEFICIT BUDGETING.

The STRATEGIES for this OBJECTIVE are:

- 1. Develop a well-planned and effective fundraising campaign, which includes the following:
 - a) Make face to face contact
 - b) Keep current requests in front of corporate committees. Never let up!
 - c) Cultivate contributors. This cultivation is a 365 day a year, long term, multi-year process.
- Increase working and dedicated membership on the Finance Committee.
 It's too big a job for a few people.
- 3. Communicate that all members have a role in raising finances.
- 4. Using the fanancial talents of working members and community business leaders, hold one meeting each year to develop additional fundraising strategies.

The OBJECTIVES for "strengthening our membership in numbers and participation," are:

A. INCREASE NET MEMBERSHIP BY 10% ANNUALLY DURING THE NEXT FIVE CONSECUTIVE YEARS.

The STRATEGIES for this OBJECTIVE are:

- 1. Encourage every member to set as a personal goal bringing in at least one new member each year.
- 2. Send membership forms/brochures with VOTERS periodically for handy use by membership.
- Encourage all active members, and particularly Board members, to work on retention of present membership. (Make them welcome. Find "a place" for all).
- 4. Plan more meetings at the 5:30 7:30 p.m. time.
- 5. Have LWV material available at co-sponsored events.

B. INCREASE ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP PARTICIPATION BY 10% ANNUALLY DURING THE NEXT FIVE CONSECUTIVE YEARS.

The STRATEGIES for this OBJECTIVE are:

- 1. Continue to list specific service needs in VOTER.
- 2. Encourage each member to make a personal commitment to do at least one League service during the course of a year.
- 3. Appoint someone (or a committee) to be in charge of planning participation opportunities and phoning members about them.
- 4. Plan a few more "festive" events. Have a longer social time at regular meetings. Lighten up.

CHILD ABUSE, Betty Dertel

January 11th I became a grandmother to a beautiful (one month early) girl, Kelsey Christine Kroll. As you can imagine planning details from Austin of February's meeting was hectic.

The topic of our general meeting is child abuse. The problem of child abuse is so immense that we decided to focus our discussion on the dilemma surrounding separating the child from the abusive family member. This is never a pleasant subject to talk about but we must become knowledgeable, it will touch all of our lives. Abuse is happening in our families and next door to us.

At the general meeting you will be exposed to three people who have the safety of children as their priority. Judy Hay is the spokesperson for Children's Protective Service and will tell us what is actually happening now. Dr. Rita Justice, therapist, will talk about what is best for the child. Randy Burton, attorney from a community organization called Justice for Children, will discuss the concerns of the community.

This should be a lively meeting. Randy is not well "looked upon" by the workers in the child abuse field. He's considered unrealistic in his approaches. He tried working in the system as an assistant district attorney and became frustrated and formed "Justice for Children." The same of the sa

We need good publicity--the press will love the combination on the panel. The abuser and the abused . . . can they live in the same household? Will the Questions for the units:

Children's Protective Service received a report from you that your neighbor is abusing his child. Who should be removed from the home? The child being abused or the person doing the abusing?

- 1. What are the advantages and disadvantages to removing the child? The abuser?
- 2. Where does the child go and for how long? Where would the abuser go and for how long?
- 3. What kind of therapy should be given to the child and for how long? The abuser and for how long?
- 4. When should the family be reunited? Or should parental rights be severed? Can the family be healed?

CITY GOVERNMENT, Melba Drake

The City Government Committee has planned a panel of three speakers addressing the subject of Financing Houston's City Government, 1989 and Beyond, for the March 10th public forum. There will be the usual question and answer period of about 30 minutes. We have invited George Greanias, City Controller, John Privett, President of the Tax Research Assoc., and Mayor Kathryn Whitmire/or Cheryl Dotson, Deputy Director of Finance & Administration. Mr. Greanias and Mr Privett have accepted. The Mayor has not responded, but should she not be able to be a panelist, Ms. Dotson has graciously accepted to speak in her stead. We feel Ms. Dotson would be a fine speaker for our discussion. The FOCUS is in the preparation stage.

Proposed questions for the units:

- 1. a. Property taxes now constitute half the sources of revenue for support of the General Fund Budget. Do you consider this over-reliance, underreliance, or about right in reliance on this revenue source? b. Should we continue reliance on property taxes or are there other sources of revenue?
- 2. In FY88 the city instituted a zoo fee. To what extent do you think fees and charges for city services should recover the cost of the service provided.
- 3. An argument for expanding the state's sales tax base cited by the Select Committee on Tax Equity is the growing need for local-government revenues. Do you agree or disagree with the local administration's support of this means as a desirable source for financing city government? Discuss pro and
- 4. Financial policies adopted by the city last year state the tax supported debt service costs should not exceed 20% of the total revenue of the annual General Fund Budget. Currently the debt service incurred by sale of Certificates of Obligations for equipment purchases are not included in this 20% debt service cap. Should they be? Should they be voter approved? Should there be a limit on debt service costs?
- 5. The city has a goal of reserving an unappropriated ending general fund that is equal to 5% of maintenance and operating expenditures. Should this standard be written into a binding policy or law? Why is it important in the financial management of the city?
- 6. Cutting expenditures and increasing proficiency while providing more and improved services is a common dilemma of most cities. What suggestions do you have for Houston in dealing with this challenge?

Jeanette Vanderwater called the meeting to order at appx. 12:35 p.m.
Announcements: Jeanette has received a letter from the Austin League offering "Bed & Breakfast" for Legislative Days, February 13/14. The deadline for taking advantage of their offer is January 20...the cost is \$15/night.

Jennie Mae Rall asked all who did not plan to attend Legislative Days to bring in their applications so she would have them to pass out at our General Meeting this Friday, 1-13-89.

Jeanette Vanderwater advised there were 25 copies of the audit report in the office now. One has been given to Shell, and if other contributors request one they are available.

Jeanette said the League office will be closed this Friday, 1-13-89. Barbara Swartz is on the State Board and it meets on that date.

Jeanette told us that as of January 1st our membership was 528. This figure was sent in to both State and National. It was noted that this figure is down 22 members from last year. Jeanette said that she, Novelle Doherty, and Helen Hunter had discussed this matter this morning and it was pointed out that all of us need to constantly think "membership!" Please pass along any ideas for member involvement and retention.

Jeanette told us that <u>Marquerite Claghorn</u> in behalf of Great Decisions has asked for mailing list labels - by tomorrow - to publicize Mr. William E. Colby's talk on February 2nd re Ethics in International Relations. This event

has been publicized in our January VOTER. The group agreed that we could not provide the labels, but we would want a follow-up article for the February VOTER. Anne Deidrick will pass this information along to Marquerite Claghorn.

Jeanette Vanderwater told us that Alison Dieter, as project director of the Grant Program, will be going to Washington in March. Alison Dieter told us that the Washington trip was for the Food Research & Action Center...the invitation to attend came from the National League. The two meetings would dovetail. Also, Barbara McCormick is going to attend and she and Barbara could room together and save on expenses. The registration fee of \$150 can be paid out of the Hershey Fund and Alison's transportation is paid out of the grant, so the extra room time and meals for the "piggyback" meeting would be paid by Alison. Executive Committee was in agreement with these plans.

VOTER deadline is Friday. 1-13-89. Anne Deidrick advised that Betty Dertel needs the front page, plus she will have an article inside as well as discussion questions. Helen Hunter plans to come back to the office after general meeting so that the office will be open for Mindy and anyone else needing to meet this VOTER deadline.

Novelle Doherty advised that she and <u>Jackie Alfred</u> would be discussing Legislative Day plans. <u>Jeanette Vanderwater</u> would like a **VOTER** article on this item. Jeanette asked <u>Jennie Mae Rall</u> about City Hall Observer Corps... Jennie Mae advised that Melba Drake will have a **VOTER** article.

January Board Agenda deadline: 1-16-89

February Board Agenda includes (1) budget and (2) long-range planning. Deadline is February 13.

At the January board meeting, decisions will be made on how to use the convention money in our local budget (appx. \$1.400).

Local bylaws (Jennie Mae says this item has been handled)

Office search (Mary Gillette says the Budget Committee is working on an expense figure...in case we do move). A move would not be "free."

Plans for March general meeting and unit meetings...Mary Gillette reported that Melba Drake is working on March now.

Jeanette asked if we had been reading all the information received from National? Such as going over the Leadership Training kits...nooo. Jeanette said we have most of the tapes mentioned in National's material; she will read the material and deal with it later. This might be brought up at next board meeting, mentioning any recommendations, comments, etc. on the National mailings...could be an agenda item. (There is information for new board members...training in May.)

Helen Hunter requested a number of items that should be added to the January board meeting agenda (needed for the annual meeting workbook):

Bylaws

Budget

Nominating Committee Report

Rules for adoption of program...each board member should review and make suggestions (which would have to be approved by the board)

Deadline for the above is March and Helen will have this in her board report.

Helen told us that the Report to Members is due. Both on-board and off-board members should have their reports to their respective vice presidents by March 20. Helen noted it was all done in a timely manner last year and she is shooting for a repeat performance!

Helen Hunter pointed out there is a problem with the VOTER deadline and the board report deadline/Jeanette explained that in April the VOTER deadline is on the same Friday as the State Convention start...and the following Monday is the board report deadline. Perhaps we could have a pseudo deadline ahead of time...Helen commented that Mindy is extremely involved during this period. Jeanette asked that we be thinking about a solution.

Charlotte Amrhein reported that "things are getting better!" Jeanette Vanderwater told us that she was genuinely enjoying the companies she is dealing with; that personal contact is definitely making it better. Jeanette more fully explained the personal contact approach for us (don't argue with success!). Charlotte told us that she'd appreciate the help of anyone who could do some calling. Jeanette advised Charlotte to call Alice May Berthelsen; Novelle Doherty suggested calling Sharon Friedman...Charlotte will do. Mary Gillette reported that the Finance Committee is meeting Wednesday (Mary, Glenda Barrett, and Fran Smith) to discuss what we want the engineers to do at their upcoming Resource Recovery Conference. Jeanette Vanderwater asked if Fran Smith could help with financial contributions by contacting her friends in the chemical industry perhaps get together with Charlotte).

Mention was made of the Texas Environmental Coalition meeting, January 28, in Austin, Texas.

Jennie Mae Rall commented that she was impressed while on the Occidental tour with how hard Oxy works to do the right thing, and that their tour guide didn't fail to mention some of their "careless" neighbors! Jennie Mae also advised us that she was moving February 1st into a two-bedroom apartment. Because of this move, she has become amazed at WHAT! can be put into a 3-bdrm. apartment! Moving to Three Fountains II, just a few doors away from her present location.

Novelle Doherty told us that Intercontinental Hotel has changed hands: she is meeting with caterers next week. Novelle hopes that nothing will be changed or that prices may even be <u>less</u>. The rooms and facilities are under contract...just the meal functions and catering are up in the air. This is now the J. W. Marriott.

Novelle told us that she'd have in her board report an article asking for \$200 from our convention money (\$1,400). She and Jackie would like to upgrade our room to a suite...for the convenience of our Houston delegates. At this time it was pointed out that information should be disseminated that "anyone who is a member of the Houston League can be a delegate." They must attend all functions if they are a delegate. This information should be put into a VOTER article, and enumerating delegate requirements. Also, there may be some financial help with registration. Mary Gillette suggested this could be a great way for newer members to become acquainted with the League organization. Further, P/R should be "scattered" throughout all our material from now on. Jeanette's goal is to have 52 delegates from our League.

Novelle reminded us that we will need a lot of workers for this State Convention, and many will probably be doing "double duty."

Anne Deidrick advised that Melba Drake's questions will be in by this coming Monday, January 16.

Mary Elder told us that <u>Sue Woods</u> called from the PTA Council-Humble ISD (Deerbrook unit). They are going to have a school board candidates forum at the North Harris County Community College, January 17, 7:30 p.m. They asked us for a moderator and a timekeeper. <u>Hope Dyson</u> is working with <u>Sue</u>. They want someone outside the community. The audience is going to be asked to prepare the questions which will be selected for the candidates. <u>Mary Gillette</u> pointed out this sounds like a program that is being set up in an organized fashion, and further that 1960 area Leaguers should be contacted to fill the positions of moderator and timekeeper.

The report of the Nominating Committee will be given at the February board meeting.

Charlotte Amrhein advised us of the illness of an LWV member, Della Schaffer, who has a severe back problem. Della is a member of the Midwest Unit. Take a minute and drop her a card. Then, super happy news: Charlotte is getting married in February! Lucky man!

Jackie Alfred initiated a brief conversation about the possibility of our hosting an "ice-breaker" party on Friday night of State Convention. Sponsors, appx. head count, physical needs such as badges, types of refreshments, etc. were mentioned. No decisions made, nothing settled.

Happy New Year to everyone and it looks as if the year is off to a great start. The members have contributed about \$3,200, most to LWV-H, in December and the first week of January. This represents unrestricted donations only and is a little more than a third of our goal. The membership numbers however are not as rosy. We lost 22 members in 1988, down from 550 to 528. This is something that we all need to work on, not just Novelle. I want everyone on the board to think about what you, as an individual board member, can do to attract new members and to keep the ones we have. I have decided to call all new members about four months after joining to find out how things are working out. Think about what YOU can do!

The Austin League is offering "bed and breakfast" for Women Legislative Days for \$15 per night. Reservations must be received by January 20. Call the office if you are interested.

We received a request from the Fort Bend County Women's Center for ideas on an individual for the Executive Director. Call Betty Oertel if you have any ideas.

We need to make a decision about the "Special Events Committee." We have tentative plans to sponsor a roast in fall 1989 or spring 1990, but the chair, Shirley Quisenberry, has been forced to resign. I have talked to Alice May Berthelsen who strongly thinks we should do it, but is in no position to chair the committee. I have talked with Doris Towne who has some reservations about our ability to "pull this off" and is completely tied up with her job with the Area Council on Aging. I met with Patsy Cunningham who does this professionally for the March of Dimes. My feelings about her comments follow. "We need to find someone(s) to do this for us. Outsiders have lists, contacts, etc. She suggested that the working chair, honorary chair, and most of the committee members be outsiders. Leaguers would be expected to stuff the envelopes, etc. and do most of the legwork and handwork. We would be expected to stay in the background. A "wine and cheese" affair with 1000 guests could be put on with donated printing, program booklets, & invitations, which would net the League about \$5,000. Price of tickets would be about \$20 and board members would be expected to sell 10 or more each." The draft of the Houston League's Long Range Plan is included with this board report. BYLAWS

of the

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF HOUSTON, TEXAS

Amended, May 1987

ARTICLE I. NAME

Sec. 1. Name. The name of the organization shall be the League of Women Voters of Houston. This local League is an integral part of the League of Women Voters of the United States and of the League of Women Voters of Texas.

Sec. 2. The League of Women Voters of Houston shall be an area League.

ARTICLE II. PURPOSES AND POLICY

Sec. 1. Purposes. The purposes of the League of Women Voters of Houston are to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government and to act on selected governmental issues.

Sec. 2. Political Policy. The League shall not support or oppose any political party or any candidate.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

Sec. 1. Eligibility. Any person who subscribes to the purposes and policy of the League shall be eligible for membership.

Sec. 2. Types of Membership. The membership of the League of Women Voters of Houston shall be composed of voting and associate members who have paid the annual dues.

- a. Voting members shall be citizens at least 18 years of age; members who have been enrolled in the League for 50 years or more shall be life members and shall not be required to pay annual dues.
- b. All others who enroll in the League shall be associate members.

ARTICLE IV. OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

Sec. 1. Enumeration and Election. The officers of the League of Women Voters of Houston shall be a president, four vice-presidents, a secretary, and a treasurer. Officers shall be elected by the general membership at an annual meeting and shall take office immediately for terms of two years or until their successors have been elected and qualified. The president, two vice-presidents and the secretary shall be elected in odd-numbered years. Two vice-presidents and the treasurer shall be elected in even-numbered years.

Sec. 2. The President. The president shall preside at all meetings of the organization and of the board of directors. The president shall be, ex officio, a member of all committees except the nominating committee, and shall have such usual powers of supervision and management as may pertain to the office of the president and perform such other duties as may be designated by the board. A vacancy in this office shall be filled until the next annual meeting by a majority vote of the board of directors.

Sec. 3. The Vice-Presidents. At the first board meeting after the newly elected board takes office, the board of directors shall designate one vice-president who shall, in the event of absence or disability of the president, perform the duties of that office. The vice-presidents shall perform such duties as the president and the board may designate.

Sec. 4. The Secretary. The secretary shall keep minutes of the annual meeting, any general meeting at which official business is conducted, and all meetings of the board of directors. The secretary shall notify all officers and directors of their election, shall sign, with the president, all contracts and other instruments when so authorized by the board, and shall perform such other functions as may be incident to the office.

Sec. 5. The Treasurer. The treasurer shall collect and receive all monies due, shall be the custodian of these monies, shall deposit them in a bank designated by the board of directors, and shall disburse the same only upon order of the board or in accordance with the adopted budget. The treasurer shall present statements to the board at their regular meetings and an annual report to the annual meeting. The treasurer shall keep an accurate roll of the membership and send written notice when dues are due. The books and records of the treasurer shall be audited at the close of each fiscal year.

ARTICLE V. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Sec. 1. Number: Manner and Selection and Term of Office. The board of directors shall consist of the officers of the League, ten elected directors, and not more than ten appointed directors. Five directors shall be elected by the general membership at each annual meeting and shall serve for a term of two years, or until their successors have been elected and qualified. The elected members shall appoint such additional directors, not exceeding ten, as they deem necessary to carry on the work of the League. The terms of the appointed directors shall be one year and shall expire at the conclusion of the next annual meeting.

Sec. 2. **Qualifications.** No person shall be elected or appointed or shall continue to serve as an officer or director of this organization unless that person is a voting member of the League of Women Voters of Houston.

Sec. 3. Vacancies. Any vacancy occurring in the board of directors by reason of the resignation, death, or disqualification of any officer or elected member may be filled until the next annual meeting by a majority vote of the remaining members of the board of directors. Three consecutive absences from a board meeting by any member without a valid reason shall be deemed a resignation. Sec. 4. Powers and Duties. The board of directors shall have full charge of the property and business of the organization, with full power and authority to manage and conduct same, subject to the instructions of the general membership. It shall plan and direct the work necessary to carry out the program as adopted by the national convention, the state convention, and the annual meeting.

Sec. 5. **Meetings.** There shall be at least nine regular meetings of the board of directors annually. The president may call special meetings of the board of directors, and must call a special meeting upon the written request of five members of the board.

Sec. 6. Quorum. A majority of the members of the board of directors shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VI. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Sec. 1. Composition. The executive committee shall consist of the president, four (4) vice-presidents, secretary, treasurer, and at least two (2) directors appointed by the president.

Sec. 2. Powers. The executive committee may make decisions not affecting major League policy and may conduct emergency business between board meetings. All decisions made by the executive committee must be ratified by the board.

ARTICLE VII. FINANCIAL ADMINISTRATION

Sec. 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the League of Women Voters of Houston shall commence on the first day of June each year.

Sec. 2. **Dues.** Annual dues, in an amount to be determined at the annual meeting by a three-fifths vote of those present and voting, shall be payable upon joining the League and thereafter on the first day of the anniversary month of the member's joining the League. Any member who fails to pay dues within two (2) months after they become payable shall be dropped from the

membership rolls. When two or more members reside at the same address in a common household, one member shall pay full dues and each additional member shall pay half of the annual dues.

Sec. 3. Budget. A budget for the ensuing year shall be submitted by the board of directors to the annual meeting for adoption. The budget shall include support for the work of the League as a whole. The proposed budget shall be sent to all members one month before the annual meeting.

Sec. 4. Budget Committee. A budget committee of at least five, including the treasurer as one member, shall be appointed by the board of directors to prepare a budget for the ensuing year. The treasurer shall not serve as chair of the budget committee.

Sec. 5. Financial Responsibility. The president or board-designated vice-president may endorse checks, drafts, and notes in the absence or disability of the treesurer.

Sec. 6. Dissolution. In the event of the dissolution for any cause of the League of Women Voters of Houston, all monies and securities which may at the time be owned by or under the absolute control of the League of Women Voters of Houston shall be paid to the League of Women Voters of Texas. All other property of whatsoever nature, whether real, personal, or mixed which may at the time be owned by or under the control of the League of Women Voters of Houston shall be disposed of by any officer or employee of the corporation having possession of the same to such person, organization, or corporation, for such public, charitable, or educational uses and purposes as may be designated by the then board of directors of the League of Women Voters of Houston.

ARTICLE VIII. MEETINGS

Sec. 1. Membership Meetings. There shall be at least four meetings of the membership each year. Time and place shall be determined by the board of directors.

Sec. 2. Annual Meeting. An annual meeting shall be held, the exact date to be determined by the board of directors. The annual meeting shall:

(a) adopt a local program for the ensuing year,

(b) elect officers and directors, and members of the nominating committee,

(c) adopt an adequate budget, and

(d) transact such other business as may properly come before it.

Sec. 3. Quorum. Eight percent of the membership as of January 1 of the current year shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of the League of Women Voters of Houston.

Sec. 4. Absentee or Proxy Voting. Absentee or proxy voting shall not be permitted.

ARTICLE IX. NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

Sec. 1. Nominating Committee. The nominating committee shall consist of five members, two of whom shall be members of the board of directors. No person shall serve on the nominating committee for more than 2 out of 3 years. The chair and two members, who shall not be members of the board, shall be elected at the annual meeting. Nominations for these offices shall be made by the current nominating committee. The other members shall be appointed by the board of directors immediately following the annual meeting. Any vacancy of the nominating committee shall be filled by the board of directors. Suggestions for nominations for officers and directors may be sent to this committee by any voting member.

Sec. 2. Suggestions by Members. The chair of the nominating committee shall request suggestions from the units and from the general membership for offices to be filled.

Sec. 3. Report of the Nominating Committee and Nominations from the Floor. The report of the nominating committee of its nominations for officers, directors, and the members of the succeeding nominating committee shall be sent to all members one month before the date of the annual meeting. Immediately following the presentation of this report, nominations may be made from the floor by any voting member provided the consent of the nominee shall have been secured.

Sec. 4. Elections. The elections shall be by ballot, provided that when there is only one nominee for an office, the election shall be by voice vote. A majority of those qualified to vote and voting shall constitute an election.

ARTICLE X. PROGRAM

Sec. 1. Authorization. The governmental principles, adopted by the national convention and supported by the League as a whole, constitute the authorization for the adoption of program.

Sec. 2. Program. The program of the League of Women Voters of Houston shall consist of (a) action to implement the Principles and (b) those governmental

issues chosen for concerted study and action.

Sec. 3. (a) The board of directors shall consider the recommendations sent in by voting members at the regular February board meeting and shall formulate a proposed program. Program items limited to special governmental jurisdictions or geographically designated areas within the Houston League must be recommended to the board by a voting member resident in that jurisdiction or area.

(b) The proposed program shall be sent to all members one month before

the annual meeting.

(c) Program items recommended for adoption by the board of directors shall require a majority vote of members present at annual meeting.

(d) Program items submitted to the board of directors at the regular February board meeting but not recommended by the board of directors may be adopted at annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of members present provided consideration is ordered by a majority vote of members present.

(e) Emergency program items submitted to the board of directors at a regular board meeting by a voting member before the annual meeting but not part of the proposed program may be adopted at annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of members present provided consideration is ordered by a majority vote of members present.

(f) Program items limited to a special governmental jurisdiction or geographically designated area within the boundaries of the Houston League must meet the following requirements: (i) The item must receive a favorable majority vote of the members resident in the area and who are present at the annual meeting; and (ii) The item must then receive a favorable majority vote of the entire annual meeting membership, as outlined in (c).

Sec. 4. Change in adopted program, in the case of altered conditions, may be made provided that: (1) information concerning the proposed changes has been sent to all members at least two weeks prior to a general membership meeting at which the change is to be discussed and (2) final action by the membership is taken at a succeeding meeting.

Sec. 5. Member Action. Members may act in the name of the League of Women Voters only when authorized to do so by the appropriate local, state, or national

board of directors.

ARTICLE XI. NATIONAL CONVENTION, STATE CONVENTION, AND COUNCIL

Sec. 1. National Convention. The membership or the board of directors at a meeting before the date on which the names of delegates must be sent to the national office shall select delegates to the convention in the number allotted to the League of Women Voters of Houston under the provisions of the bylaws of the League of Women Voters of the United States.

Sec. 2. State Convention. The membership or the board of directors at a meeting before the date on which the names of delegates must be sent to the state office shall select delegates to the convention in the number allotted the League of Women Voters of Houston under the provisions of the bylaws of the League of Women Voters of Texas.

Sec. 3. State Council. The membership or the board of directors at a meeting before the date on which the names of delegates must be sent to the state office shall select delegates to the council in the number allotted the League of Women Voters of Houston under the provisions of the bylaws of the League of Women Voters of Texas.

ARTICLE XII. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

Sec. 1. Parliamentary Authority. The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the organization in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws.

ARTICLE XIII. AMENDMENTS

Sec. 1. Amendments. These bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the voting members present and voting at the annual meeting, provided the amendments were submitted to the membership in writing at least one month in advance of the meeting. The board of directors shall consider the recommended changes to the bylaws which were sent in by voting members two months prior to the annual meeting and shall submit their recommendations to the general membership along with those changes they have been asked to consider but do not recommend.

POLICY - LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF HOUSTON - JUNE 1989

This policy should be reviewed annually by the local board.

In addition to the Principles of the LWVUS, local, state, and national bylaws, the LWV-H adheres to the policies below.

Civic Participation

Only members appointed by the board or president may represent the League in other organizations. Those members may give only the League positions, which may or may not be their own.

League members are encouraged to attend and participate in meetings of governmental bodies as private citizens. Those members appointed to boards or commissions as private citizens may, of course, give their own opinions. They should strive to help the public to recognize that this may or may not be a League position.

Political Participation

The president, the community relations VP, and the voter information chair shall refrain from conspicuous partisan activities during their terms of office.

No board member shall run for elected office without consulting the board.

All members of the LWV-H are encouraged to participate in partisan political activities.

To protect the nonpartisan standing of the LWV-H, the name of the League shall not be used in such a way as to imply endorsement of or opposition to partisan political activity or any candidate for elected office.

Community Organizations*

To join or form a coalition or inter-organizational council, the following steps are required:

- 1. Discussion with the president, or vice-president designated by the president, preliminary to written request for board approval.
- 2. Written request should include: a) aims of the group, b) other participants, c) proposed scope of action, d) justification for League participation, e) any other pertinent information.
- 3. An acceptance to participate should include the following statement: the LWV-H acts only within the scope of League positions, and the name of the League may not be attached to any action taken without League permission.

President

The president is the official spokesperson of the League and no other person may speak for the LWV-H unless so designated by the president. It is advisable, however, that the president consult members of the board before making public statements for the League. All official League communications and publications must be cleared with the president. Any requests for public action (i.e., appearances before groups, radio, TV, etc.) must be cleared with the president. Correspondence and public statements must go out over the president's signature. No contact can be made with any public official in the name of the League without previously advising the president and appropriate vice-president, except for the purpose of sending routine thank yous.

Public Relations

All media contacts, including those of committees and units, must be cleared through the board member in charge of public relations, who, in cooperation with the president and appropriate vice-president, shall decide if and when an official release will be sent to the media and be responsible for briefing the media. A release will need prior approval of the president.

Board and Executive Committee

All League members are welcome at the board and executive committee meetings. At board meetings off-board committee chairs have the privilege of the floor concerning their items.

The request for time on the agenda and the nature of the topic to be discussed should be cleared with the president prior to the meeting, and put in writing, preferably in the board reports. Round robin shall be limited to items of information that do not require board action. Guests may be invited to the meeting to answer questions or make presentations lasting up to 10 minutes.

The board is empowered to make policy decisions.

The executive committee is empowered to make decisions not affecting major League policy and to deal with emergencies. Minutes of the executive committee meeting are published in the board report. Decisions must be ratified by the board.

Three unexcused absences from board meetings will constitute an automatic resignation from the board.

Publications - Local

Board approval is necessary before a League project is submitted for publication. Any publication published with League sponsorship, whether or not it is written and printed by the League, must have approval of the president.

Every FOCUS should include the following statement: FOCUS is prepared by the League of Women Voters of Houston and costs fifty (50) cents per page plus postage and handling. This material may not be printed or reproduced in whole or in part without the permission of the League of Women Voters of Houston.

DIRECTORY

The DIRECTORY is for the personal use and convenience of members. Board approval is necessary for any other use. Bylaws and local policy shall be printed in the DIRECTORY.

Program

PROGRAM FOR STUDY AND ACTION is the complete program published every year after the annual meeting and after state and national conventions. It is used in local program planning and at annual meeting.

The Principles of the League of Women Voters are part of this publication, the Program for Study and Action.

Budget Policy

Budget adjustments shall be approved by the board. Expenditures over \$500 which have not been budgeted shall be proposed at one board meeting and voted on at the following board meeting.

No member of the board or committee chair may be paid by the League for professional or secretarial services relating to the conduct of a League project.

All grant projects must be under the direct supervision of a member of the board of directors.

Finance

Contributions are solicited from members and from the community. Contributions are not sought, but are accepted, from candidates, elected officials, and political party officials.

Committee Membership

Members of LWV-H committees must be members in good standing of the LWV-H.

Financial Aid

Full or partial membership dues may be waived in special circumstances. Decisions for such waivers will be made by the president, a vice-president, and the membership director.

Hiring and Service Contract Policy

No person shall, on the basis of race, sex, color, or national origin, be excluded from consideration for employment or providing of contract services.

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF HOUSTON EDUCATION FUND March 1976 THIS TRUST AGREEMENT between the League of Women Voters of Houston, Inc. and the undersigned Trustees, WITNESSETH: Founder hereby irrevocably grants and transfers unto the Trustees the sum of \$300.00, to have and to hold unto themselves, their successors, and assigns, in trust nevertheless, upon the following uses and trusts: ARTICLE I Ivame The name of the Trust shall be League of Women Voters of Houston Education Fund, hereinafter referred to as FUND. ARTICLE II Purpose of FUND The purpose, or purposes, for which the Fund is organized are: To receive, to hold, and to invest contributions and funds, and to distribute such funds for educational uses and to conduct such other activities as are supplemental or incidental thereto, and are not in conflict therewith. No part of the net earnings of the Fund shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual and no substantial part of the activities of the Fund shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation. Nor shall the FUND participate or intervene in (including the publishing or distributing of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office or be partisan in its approach to political compaigns. In the event this trust is dissolved all the assets thereof will become the property of the League of Women Voters of Texas Education Fund, a trust organized in Austin, Texas. In the event the League of Women Voters of Texas Education Fund shall at any time become no longer qualified to receive the assets under the provisions of Sec. 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States of America, the Trustees shall prescribe a substitute therefore, which is so qualified, and in any event, the assets shall in the event of dissolution of this trust, become the property of an organization which is tax exempt under Article 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code or a similar statute then in effect. ARTICLE III Board of Trustees A. Organization. The affairs of the FUND shall be managed by a -1Board of Trustees, which shall enjoy full discretion in said management except as otherwise provided in this instrument. Said Board shall consist exclusively of those persons who, at the same time, constitute the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Houston. Accordingly no person shall remain or become a member of the Board of Trustees of the FUND unless such person is at the same time a member of said Board of Directors; and each person holding membership on said Board of Directors shall, by reason of such membership, be a member of the Board of Trustees of the FUND and shall remain as such while, but only while, retaining office as such Director.

- B. Election and Term. Election or appointment to the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Houston shall automatically invest the Director in question with membership on the Board of Trustees of the FUND and for the term of office corresponding to that as such Director.
- C. Vacancies. Office as a member of the Board of Trustees of the FUND becomes vacant only as the holder ceases to hold office as a Director of the League of Women Voters of Houston and accordingly shall be filled by such person as the League shall designate as a Director to fill such vacancy on its Board.
- D. Annual Meeting. An annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the FUND shall be held at the time and place designated by said Board. At such annual meeting, any affairs of the FUND may be acted upon.
- E. Interim Heetings. Interim meetings of the Board of Trustees of the FUND shall be held contemporaneously with the meetings of the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Houston except as the Board of Trustees may, from time to time, decide upon a different time and place for particular meetings.
- F. Quorum. A majority of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- G. <u>Voting</u>. Each Trustee shall have one vote, and the vote of a majority of the Trustees present at a meeting of the Board of Trustees duly called and at which a quorum is present shall be necessary for the exercise of the powers of the Board of Trustees hereunder.
- H. Removal. Removal from office as a member of the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Houston shall automatically remove said member from membership on the Board of trustees of the FUND.
- I. Annual and Interim Reports. The Trustees shall submit an annual report of the finances and activities of the FUID to the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Houston, and shall furnish the said Board of Directors such other reports as it may direct.

ARTICLE IV

Power of Trustees

The Trustees, without application to any Court for more special authority therefor, shall have full discretionary power in the

- A. To receive and accept gifts and donations from the general public or any other source for the purpose of the FUND, hereinabove expressed, and for administration in accordance with the provisions of this Trust Agreement.
- B. To receive and accept for administration in accordance with the provisions of this Trust Agreement, gifts and donations from any source, for an express purpose; provided such purpose is within the scope of the purposes of the FUND hereinabove expressed.
- C. To disburse all funds of the FUND, whether received as gift, donation, or income, to effectuate any of the purposes of this FUND as hereinabove expressed.
- D. To sell, without notice, at public or private sale, and to exchange, mortagage, lease, pledge, partitition, appraise, apportion, divide in kind, borrow on, or hypothecate any and all of the trust funds and properties, whether realty or personalty, upon such terms and conditions as they deem best, and in so doing to execute all necessary deeds or other instruments. No person dealing with the Trustees shall be required to look to the application of any money or other property paid or transferred to the Trustees.
- E. To retain any properties, securities, or investments now or hereafter transferred to them and to invest and reinvest any such assets or any fund or moneys coming into their hands as Trustees, in stocks, bonds, securities or other properties, real or personal, without being limited to investments which are prescribed by law for trust funds and without liability on the Trustees' part for any loss or depreciation in value of any such investments; provided, however, that the Trustees shall not make investments with a view toward obtaining short-term trading profits.
- F. To hold or register securities in their names as Trustees, or in the name of their nominees, or to take and keep the same unregistered and to retain them in such condition that they will pass by delivery.
- G. To borrow money for any purposes in connection with the administration of the Trusts and to encumber or pledge all or any part of the trust properties as securities therefor.
- H. To pay all reasonable costs, charges, and expenses incurred in the administration of the trusts, including reasonable expenses for the Trustees in attending meetings of the Board of Trustees.
- I. To pay from principal or income such assessments, expenses, or sum of money as the Trustees deem expedient for the protection of any of the trust investments.
- J. To employ such agents, attorneys, and counsel, including investment counsel as may be reasonably necessary or desirable in managing, protecting and investing the trust funds, and to pay them reasonable compensation therefor.
- K. To contract with others and to stipulate in the contract or contracts against the personal liability of the Trustees.

L. To vote, in person or by proxy, any stock held in trust and to exercise any and all rights of stockholder, bondholders, and security holders, with respect to any stocks, bonds or other securities held in trust, including the exercise of subscription rights and conversion privileges, and to participate in consolidation, merger, reorganization, or financial readjustment or any corporation or corporations, including the exchange of securities and stock in connection therewith.

M. To defend suits at law or in equity or before any other bodies or tribunals, affecting the trust; to begin suits and prosecute the same to final judgment or decree; to compromise claims or suits or submit the same to arbitration; to maintain actions to foreclose mortgages which may at any time from part of the trust or, in lieu of foreclosure, to accept deeds from the owners.

N. To do any and all other acts and things necessary, proper, or advisable to effectuate the purposes of the FUND.

Notwithstanding the foregoing grant of powers, the Trustees shall not engage in any prohibited transaction within the meaning of Section 503 (c) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provisions of any subsequent United States Revenue Laws), norshall they accumulate income in such manner as to involve denial of tax exemption under Section 504 of the said Code (or the said corresponding provisions).

In the exercise of any of the powers herein conferred the Trustees shall be free and wholly exonerated from liability on account of any honest error or judgment or by reason of acts or things done, suffered, or omitted in good faith and without willful default or neglect.

ARTICLE V

Funds and Properties

A. Separation. The Trustees shall keep all property of the trust as a separate and distinct fund and in such manner as to be identifiable and shall not intermingle such funds with their personal funds or funds for other purposes. In no event shall any funds or property of the FUND be used for the general purposes of the League of Women Voters, or for any purpose not hereinabove provided.

B. <u>Depository</u>. The cash funds of the FUND shall be kept in an account maintained in the name of the FUND in such depository as the Trustees shall from time to time select. Such depository shall be hereby authorized to pay out from the funds on deposit on the signature of any individual who may from time to time be given a power of attorney for such purpose for or on behalf of the Trustees.

ARTICLE VI

Compensation

The Trustees shall not be entitled to any compensation for services rendered as Trustees, but a reasonable and proper compensation may be paid to any Trustee acting in a professional capacity in behalf

ARTICLE VII

Duration

The duration of the FUND shall be perpetual, subject to termination only by vote of the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Houston or by the following circumstances:

In the event of the dissolution of the League of Women Voters of Houston, thereby making it impossible for the new Trustees to be elected, the then existing Board of Trustees of the FUND shall become self-perpetuating. Thereafter, any vacancies resulting from resignation, death, or inability to serve shall be filled by majority vote of the remaining Trustees. The FUND shall be automatically terminated upon failure of any such self-perpetuating Board of Trustees to fill any vacancy within a period of one year. Termination may also be effected by a unanimous vote of any such self-perpetuating Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE VIII

Applicable Law

The trust herein created shall be administered in the State of Texas and to the extent feasible shall be kept in said state. It is the intention of the parties hereto that this trust agreement shall in all respects be construed, and interpreted according to the laws of the State of Texas, and that the parties in all things in respect thereto be governed by such laws. This Article, however, shall not be deemed a limitaion upon any of the powers of the Trustees, or to prevent their investing in properties, real or personal, located outside the State of Texas.

ARTICLE IX

Special Power of Trustees

The Trustees shall have power, by unanimous action in writing, and subject to approval by the Board of Director of the League of Women Voters of Houston (if the said organization is in existence), to make such clarifying, administrative, or other amendments to the Trust Agreement as are consistent with the purpose of this Turst; provided, however, that no amendment shall be made to Article II, relating to purpose, nor to Article VII, relating to duration, nor shall any such amendment grant to the Trustees any power expressly denied to them in Article IV.

ARTICLE X

Acceptance

The trustees by joining in the execution of this agreement signify their acceptance of the trust. The trust upon execution hereof shall be given effect as of March 26, 1976.

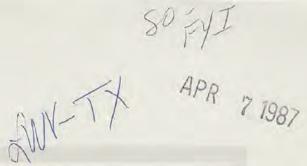

If you receive the name of a nationally recruited member twice, with two different expiration dates, use the initial date as the correct expiration date. There are several glitches that can cause a new direct mail member to be reported twice, but only the initial date is counted for the records.

Chandler Davidson and Sharon Plummer are a special case. They had not sent in the full dues amount for a household membership when they first submitted their membership application. Nevertheless, since they asked how much a household membership would be and promised to pay the remaining amount as soon as they know the correct dues amount, we sent on both names to the state League. When the remaining dues were received, Mr. Davidson's name was reported again to guarantee that he got on the rolls. It makes sense to me to count the initial expiration date reported to you as the correct one.

We are combining our direct mail and our <u>National Voter</u> roster on one computer file during the months of <u>April and May</u>. Once those two lists are together we can then address ourselves to the work of verifying the expiration dates.
