2-151-61 Beaumont Enters THE Texas Legislature has, we realize many problems to contend with. The problems are such that they require almost total study and concentration. They determine, to a large degree, the future of the state and its citizenry.

But it would seem that the lawmakers could spare just a few minutes on a question that will provide no political returns, will not make the state financially better off and will not gain much of anything except the gratitude of quite a lew citizens of one of the nation's largest cities and, as to government, it's most important one.

We refer to the proposed constitutional amendment giving residents of the District of Columbia the right to vote in presidential elections.

It seems the least Texas can do for Washingtonians who, under present laws, are citizens of the United States in every other respect except at election time. They pay taxes, their sons serve in the armed forces, they are subject to all laws that other Americans live under - but they can't help choose the top two leaders of the coun-

amendment until i go as for as it should perhaps. It doesn't, for example, give Washingtonians home rule. Nor does it provide for legislative representation. All It does is provide for them the right to vote for president and vice president. That's not asking too much.

The Texas Legislature should give that little. More than 19 other states have done so. Why can't Texas?

Clarify Stand
"The League of Women Voters, a nonpartisan organization found-

a nonpartisan organization founded in 1920, does not support or oppose any political party or candidate," Mrs. Stuckey said. "Its purpose is to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government. The league publishes and distributes factual information on candidates and issues to help prepare the voters to cast an informed vote.

"The league may take a position on issues, as a result of member-ship consensus, based on study and discussion of factual information. A league position is arrived at independently and bears no re-lation to the positions of the candidates, factions or parties.

Support Party System "The league believes that the party system is an integral part of our form of government. It urges its members, except for its leaders during their terms of leaders during their terms of league office, to work as individuals in the parties of the

choice."

The league resolution on constitution study will be submitted at the county Democratic convention in Beaumont Monday.

It points out the Texas Constitution was adopted in 1876, has 121 amendments now totaling 40,000 words, and cannot be changed except by a vote of the people. The resolution urges the next Legislature "to establish a constitutional commission which would initiate a research program on the Texas Constitution and state government directly affected by the Constitution."
