(5 years), present president of Midcounty Fair Assn., president of Sabine Area Parochial League (2 years), president of St. Elizabeth Athletic Assn. What support would you give to the formation of a Constitutional Commission for initiating a total research program on Texas state government?

I FAVOR A commission for this purpose and believe the legislators should meet annually until such time that our laws are brought up to meet standards of our times.

What are the three major problems facing Texas today, and what solutions to these problems do you recommend?

1. Water conservation.
2. Schools.
3. Highway safety and narcotics.

I CANNOT recommend a solution at this time; however, I know upon being elected I would like to serve on a committee to bring forth the facts and a workable solution.

What support would you give to the formation of a Constitutional Commission for initiating a total research program on Texas state government?

I WOULD GIVE my wholehearted support to the formation of a such a commission. There exists a vital need to overhaul the government of the State of Texas in view of the fact that we have one of the longest and most involved constitutions of any state in the union, in addition to the fact that it has many antiquated provisions.

What are the three major problems facing Texas today, and what solutions to these problems do you recommend?

1. Honesty and cleanliness in government, including operation of the Veterans Land Program and the Insurance and Banking Commission of the state of Texas.

PROPOSED SOLUTION: Vigilance on the part of the state legislature, and the passing of laws which could pinpoint responsibility on the part of the officials in charge of given programs.

2. Segregation.

Proposed solution: Seek to uphold the existing laws of the state of Texas in regard to segregation, and to find a sensible approach to the problem.

3. A suitable taxation program, including a valid tax on natural resources or a separation of natural resources from the soil.

PROPOSED SOLUTION: Seek qualified legal advice as to the legality of proposed legislation, and seek to pass a bill including a natural resources tax which would in all probability be upheld by the U. S. Supreme Court.

KILPATRICK, GAUTREAU

Two Candidates Answer Queries

The League is sending out the questionnaires and The Beaumont Journal is printing the questions and answers as a means of informing the voters on the positions taken by candidates on issues.

The questions and answers from Mr. Kilpatrick and Mr. Gautreau follow.

For State Representative, District 9, Place 1

RUFUS KILPATRICK

Age: 40.

Address: 1719 Parry St., Beaumont.

Occupation: Owner-operator of Kilpatrick's Flash Transfer and Storage Co.

QUALIFICATIONS, including education, business and professional experience, and participation in civic groups:

1. Own and operate a successful business.
2. Active in Central Church of Christ, American Legion, VFW, Downtown Optimist Club, Chamber of Commerce, YMBL, and Elks Lodge.
3. Served on Citizen's Committee organized to promote school improvement.

WHAT SUPPORT would you give to the formation of a constitutional commission for initiating a total research program on Texas state government?

I believe that we should have a continuing research program for the improvement of our state government. Changing times cause a need for a change from time to time in our governmental operations. Competent research in this matter is the one sure method of detecting these needs.

WHAT ARE THE three major problems facing Texas today, and what solutions to these problems do you recommend?

1. Water. The conservation of our natural water supplies is an absolute must for our state legislature. I recommend a sincere and deep study in this matter. Following such a study, the facts which come to light will guide the legislature to the answer to the problem.

2. Education. More adequate financing of our educational system will give us better facilities for the young Texans who will be our leaders of tomorrow.

3. Highway and other transportation. In this matter, we must make an adequate survey of the tax revenue resources of Texas, then proceed as best possible to relieve the traffic congestion so prevalent today.

1. Business, or commercial college in bookkeeping and office technique—higher accounting and business administration.
2. Thirty years in business administration.

Past-President Rotary Club of Port Arthur, past vice-president Sabine Area Boy Scouts of America, past-president South County Welfare Assn., past-president, Serra Club of Port Arthur, past-president Texas State Association of Building Owners and Managers. Presently, second vice president Chamber of Commerce of Port Arthur.

WHAT SUPPORT would you give to the formation of a Constitutional Commission for initiating a total research program on Texas state government?

I would support such a movement.

What are the three major problems facing Texas today, and what solutions to these problems do you recommend?

1. In the field of human relations the problem is acute.

THERE IS A need for expansion and improvement in our school system; perhaps higher compensation for school teachers and unquestionably more adequate facilities. There is a need for a broader recreational program for the youth of the land. Our eleemosynary institutions would bear investigation and study with a view to bringing about corrective measures and improvements.

I would be guided by the recommendations of the experts in these fields of government and be guided accordingly.

2. Conservation of our natural resources, especially the water supply.

THERE IS A crying need that something concrete and adequate be done, statewide, about our water supply and I would be guided by the Texas Society of Professional Engineers who have made extensive studies in the field of water conservation and I would initiate and support movements to improve and control the available supply of water.


3. The present state of our government under existing and constitutional law.

Procedure Given

The League of Women Voters, through Mrs. Sam B. Lyons, publicity chairman, outlined the procedure to be followed by Texas

citizens in the above categories, as follows:

"If since Jan. 1, 1960, you have become 21 years of age, or as a new resident of the state of Texas have fulfilled the residence requirements of one year in the state and six months in the county, you are eligible for a certificate of exemption, without cost, which will entitle you to vote in subsequent elections this coming year. By appearing before the county assessor and collector of taxes, no less than 30 days prior to the election in which you desire to vote, and by stating your name, street address, town, length of residence in the state, county and city, age, race, citizen-

ship—that is, native born or naturalized, birthplace and occupation—you will be issued such certificate of exemption.

If You Move...

"If, after receiving your poll tax receipt or certificate of exemption, you have moved to another county or to another election precinct in the same county, you may vote in an election in the precinct of your new residence by presenting your poll tax receipt or certificate of exemption, or affidavit of its loss, to the precinct judges of the election, provided that you now reside in the precinct in which you offer to vote, and have lived in the county six months and the

state one year.

"However, if you desire to vote in a city of 10,000 or more inhabitants, you must first present to the county assessor and collector of taxes your poll tax receipt or certificate of exemption, or affidavit of its loss, not less than four days prior to the election in which you wish to vote, so that your name may be added to the list of qualified voters of the precinct of your new residence."



Port Arthur Group Supports Research on Texas Constitution

PORT ARTHUR, July 30 (Spl)—Mrs. Harry Stuckey, president of the Port Arthur League of Women Voters, said Monday the organization is supporting a resolution calling for the Fifty-fifth Legislature, meeting in Austin in January, 1957, to establish a Constitutional commission which would initiate a research program on the Texas Constitution.

However, she said, the organization is not supporting a resolution opposing "any and all measures which will tend to increase the concentration of power in Washington" which was adopted at some of the precinct conventions here Saturday. It was erroneously reported in The Enterprise Sunday the League of Women Voters was supporting this resolution, too.

Clarify Stand

"The League of Women Voters, a nonpartisan organization founded in 1920, does not support or oppose any political party or candidate," Mrs. Stuckey said. "Its purpose is to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government. The league publishes and distributes factual information on candidates and issues to help prepare the voters to cast an informed vote."


"The league may take a position on issues, as a result of membership consensus, based on study and discussion of factual information. A league position is arrived at independently and bears no relation to the positions of the candidates, factions or parties."

Support Party System

"The league believes that the party system is an integral part of our form of government. It urges its members, except for its leaders during their terms of league office, to work as individuals in the parties of their choice."

The league resolution on constitution study will be submitted at the county Democratic convention in Beaumont Monday.

It points out the Texas Constitution was adopted in 1876, has 121 amendments now totaling 40,000 words, and cannot be changed except by a vote of the people. The resolution urges the next Legislature "to establish a constitutional commission which would initiate a research program on the Texas Constitution and state government directly affected by the Constitution."
