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## WHILE IN SAN ANTONIO DON'T FAIL TO VISIT

WE ALAMO CITY, and the Historic City of Texas, is one of the largest in the State, and the largest city of the United States located so far South. Its altitude and the almost constant breeze make it one of the most famous health resorts of the country.

Originally settled early in the Eighteenth Century, by Catholic Spaniards, and the scene of many a bloody battle in those early days, it has an historic interest to all Texas patriots. The Alamo, in particular, is dear to the heart of every Texan, for here the martyr patriots, Bowie, Crockett, Travis and their followers, gave up their lives for Texas Independence. The Alamo, recently purchased from the Catholic authorities, is now the property of the State, and is in charge of a custodian who takes pleasure in conducting visitors through the structure and explaining on the ground the various incidents and points of interest of the siege and fall of the Alamo.

Beside the Alamo, San Antonio has numerous Missions, founded at various times, from 1731 to 1756, by the Catholic fathers, most of them being now but picturesque ruins, but some still used as places of worship.

San Antonio has always been recognized as a strategic military position. The United States Military Post and Headquarters are located about one mile from the city, on Government Hill, and are well worth a visit.

One feature of the city which savors somewhat of Mexican origin is the numerous Plazas, scattered throughout the city, and affording a pleasing contrast to the many stately buildings. Of these the principal are the Alamo, Main and Military.


Around the Alamo Plaza are located the Alamo, Postoffice, Opera House, Club and various mercantile establishments.

On Main Plaza stands the Cathedral San Fernando, and the new County Court House, while the City Hall is on Military Plaza.

From the original Fort and Mission, San Antonio has grown to an enterprising, wide-awake city of about seventy thousand inhabitants, and is one of the first cities in the State in point of population, wealth and business.




