Jan 1st

"Do the work that's next you,
Though it's dull at whiles;
Helping when you meet them,
Same dogs over stiles."

Friday

I would like to make the above my motto, and hope that I shall not make an entire failure this year.

We had a very sudden storm last night just at dark, a hard wind and rain, so day has been clear, cold and windy. I spent the morning up town, shopping with my sister, and called on my brother, P. W. and G. J. Reynolds. Their families rather as they were out. In the afternoon I called on Mrs. Burns, she is trying to have la grippe.

The young folks are getting up a leap year party for to night, I hope they will make no leaps in the wrong direction.

Sat. 2

This day has been very calm and pleasant. I spent in the day trying to put things to rights, after the holiday frolics. I forgot to say that Mr. Conrad, and uncle Joe. Matthews dined with us yesterday.

Sun. 3

The wind was cold and raw to day, and as I have a cold, I thought best to stay at home, for fear of grip.

Mon. 4

This has been a lovely day, and I wanted to get out but was so busy with house work, that I had no time. until nearly eight. May and I drove around to Mrs. Lee's on an errand. Mrs Armstrong & Bettie made us a call this afternoon.

Tues. 5

I walked up town this morning, found Mrs. Burns in bed, in the afternoon, I took my work and visited Insie & Bettie R. Sue Myra and I went to see Bettie and mother, and had a good visit.

Wed. 6

This morning I commenced pasting in a scrap book that I intend to fill with a bit of frontier history, and little family letters, and such things as I think

will interest the coming generations of the Reynolds, Matthews and Bartholomew families.

I called on the Vandervoorts this afternoon, they are going to leave town next week, and we are sorry to lose them. I stopped in to see my friend, Mrs. Burns, and found her sick.

Weather pretty cold again to day

Tues. 7

I put in the whole morning on the scrap-book and part of the afternoon. I was tired of the house thought I would walk over to Prices.

I shot a large blue heron as I went over. I had to come back for my gun, and that gave me little more exercise than I bargained for.

Leon, (my girl) was with me, and I left her to watch it while I was away. I broke one wing and leg, and ^{the} thing was on the fritz, it took a quarter of a yard of lace off of my bonnet. The bird measured exactly six feet from tip to tip.

Fri.

8. It is just eight years to day since we came to Albany. How time has flown, and how many sad changes since then. But time waits for none of us, and the gray hairs come, and the children will grow, and before we are hardly aware of the fact we have grown sons and daughters, and some little toddler is lisping "granma, Mam-ma" as my little Fern says, bless her heart.

This has been a pleasant day, and I thought thought that I would call on some of the neighbors this afternoon, but concluded not to, as my dresses fit me closer than usual this winter, since I have been in such good health, and I have had no new ones yet, but am afraid I'll have to.

I spent in the most of the day with my scrap book, and am getting on quite well with it.

Jan

Bird & Groom over slept.

Sat 9 This morning I swept, dusted, covered a wood box, and scolded May about darnning her stockings, that was the hardest job of all.

I went shopping this afternoon, and called on Mrs. Rye, and Mrs. Ball, Mrs B. was out, and Emma said, (she had went to start) O. Mrs Bartholomew don't go, we are alone. Emma is such a little woman.

It has been real cold and raw to day, cloudy all day.

Sun 10 This morning opened up cloudy and ugly, but fair'd off, bright and pleasant. I went to Sunday School and stayed to Episcopal services, which always tire me, because of their length. May went home with Jessie Vandervoort, and Elmer B. came home with me.

Mon 11 This morning was freezing, and grew colder all day. It is 24 now, I fasted again this morning, and this afternoon, I faced the weather to tell the Vandervoorts good by, and stopped a few moments at Phins. Uncle Ben was there, had struggled out in the cold, and could not go back home. Poor old man, he is very weak, and certainly cannot stand the storms much longer,

Tues 12 Colder than ever to day, mercury at 17, but I do not seem to feel it as much as I did yesterday, the wind has not blown so hard, and then I have been doing the house work to day. Leon is sick, and I don't feel very well myself, but the work has to go on all the same. I have sewed a little to day.

Wed 13 This has been a very nice day but quite cold. I sewed most of the day.

Thurs 14 I stayed at the methodist parsonage last night. Justice Armstrong married this morning at 6:30 or rather that was the time set, but Mr. Hindell overslept, and was

a little late, and then he forgot his license and had to go back. Nellie got up at four, and made fires, and made beds, and swept and I think she helped about breakfast, and ate our breakfast at leisure.

Mrs. Q. held up bravely, until they got off and then she broke down and had a cry.

I know that they will miss her very much. I came home at half past eight, and helped some about the house work, as it is washing day, it was too cold the first of the week and the girl was sick besides.

I felt a little tired and sleepy this afternoon. Paula Matthews and Stella Eastman were here a bit ago to see if they could have a party here tomorrow night.

May went home with one of her mates from school. Mr. B. is out eating oysters with his companions at the Lodge room; having a good time I presume, and I, well I am going right off to bed, and dream, if I can, that there are no lodges of a secret order, in the land big and where I hope to go, some day in the "Sweet by and by", when my final farewell, this earth I have said,

Jan 15 I made two cakes this morning, and brushed up a little for the young folks, and have had a headache all day too, looking over as I always do when I am a little sick. Myra and her boys were over yesterday, and J.L.M. dined with us.

Jan 16 Well, the people came last night, but it was nine o'clock, I think that is altogether too late to meet for a good evening's fun, but they all seemed to have a good time. There were fifteen, besides Laura Dodson, who was spending the night with May. Leon Center was playing his pranks as usual, and making lots of fun. We did not get to bed until twelve o'clock, but I have felt real swell all day.

I went to see Mother and Susie. Ma has another touch of the Grip. Susie is in bed with it, and George is trying to be. She just got in yesterday from a two weeks trip, in the cold country, and was in snow and ice all summer.

I finished up two night dresses this week, and am making an old fashioned dress for May to wear in a concert. She is not well to day, hope she will not have the grip. It is not near so cold as usual to day, belindly this afternoon. Son is off to spend the night with a friend.

Jan 17 Drizzling, and raw all day, and something of a northeasterly to night. I walked to church and Sunday school, and at four o'clock I went to Bro Armstrong, and went with them to night services. I guess I would have had a bad time getting home if my better half had not come and brought a lantern.

May is sick to day, and did not get out,

Gusta Reynolds got home to day, from Colorado where she has been nearly four months,

18 The moon set down to twelve to day, and a snow storm on hands, slackt last night, and snowed all day. Hard weather on stock, and people who are short of fuel and poorly clad. I feel so thankful for the comforts I enjoy. Plenty to eat and wear, and such good rousing fires to sit by. I know that I am not half thankful enough. O thou faithful friend, help me to be more deserving of the many great blessings that I enjoy.

My health is so much better this winter, than it was ever before, it seems too strange for me to be able to work all day, and not feel so tired, that as to be obliged to lie down.

I finished up a grey dress to day, for May to wear in a concert. She is to be an old woman.

Jan 19 To day has been bright and beautiful, but very cold. This morning I let down the bear in one of May's dresses, and helped Bills (our hired man) get a possum

Bess broke thru the ice
neighbors had set adire

out of a tree, and he killed him with an ax as he thought, and went up town, and when he got back, old possum had gone off into the neighbors field, he trailed him in the snow.

This afternoon I went to Campbells to see Gusta, and found her just starting over home. I stayed awhile at C's, and then went to Gusta. Bess was at school, and when she came home she was dripping wet, had been on the ice, and broke with her. Some of her clothes were frozen on her. I wonder that half as many children live to be grown as I do,

Jan 20

All the snow disappeared to day, or very near all, quite a difference in the temperature. I went to Mrs Garretts to have a dress her fitted this morning, went from there to the bank and wrote a letter, and it was almost noon when I got home. I made a canton flannel night gown this afternoon, for Bonnie, and he will think he has on a bad guilt-when he gets in it.

We gave the possum to old uncle Sam, the colored preacher, and he was pleased, Bill dressed it and it hung out of doors and froze and it looked real nice. I told the old man that I might go up and take dinner with him to morrow.

My better half is about half sick, I hope he will not have the grip.

Jan 21st Thurs day. I went over the creek, the other side of the park (about a mile) this morning, to see Mrs Bob Morris. She has a baby born Monday, a freezing snowy day, and not a rag of clothes to put on it, not enough of cover on the one bed, I only heard this morning the neighbors had been and fixed her up some, and I carried a few things. Bob set the heel on fire with a hot rock yesterday and then poured a bucket of water on it to put it out, and the building froze it a wonder they are not dead. but I found her

May 8 14 yrs. old

with the snuff bottle in bed with her, looking cross as an apple, Bob was whistling around happy as a clam, trying to button a pair of shoes on the other little one, less than two years old. Not a chair in the house, just two small boxes,

After dinner I went again, and carried the same dinner, and a chair, found Bob eating bread in a small pan, just large enough to get his two hands in. He fried his meat in a stone skillet on the fire, and then baked his bread in it; That skillet, a tea kettle, and a tin pail, were all the cooking utensil that I saw. The bread had was drawn up near the fire, Bob sat on one box and had his dough pan on the other, right at the head of the bed, and the little kid stood right against it.ugh, I don't think I could eat anything there.

I went from there to Armstrongs a few minutes and found Mr. A sick. I also spent part of the afternoon at Gustav's. Bess had no bad effects from her cold bath, but Jessie is not well. Little Russell is grubbing over here.

Jan 22 Friday, This morning I went to Phins to see Florence, She was real busy sewing, and I brought a little dress home with me to make.

Parson Sam brought us some possum and potatoes to day, and they were real nice.

This afternoon I called to see Mrs. Melters new boy, and we sat and got Mgra to, and we went out to see Mrs. Woods, and when we got back, I run in to see Mother a few minutes. Billie went to uncle Daves to day.

23 Sat. This morning I was dizzy and sick, and it took me all the forenoon to get warmed up, but have felt much better since dinner. I made a flannel skirt.

Mary is ~~14~~ 14 years old to day, and Maidee, Robbie, Elle, Annie Merle, Nettie and Jessie were over in the afternoon and took tea with her, and then she went home with Maidee. She put in all the morning practicing for

the concert. The day has been very pleasant

Jan 24 Sunday. This has been a lovely day. I went S. School, church, and the Christian Endeavor meeting, at half past four.

We were aroused about 3 o'clock this morning by E. P. Davis, and Mr. B. had to go up to the bank to get a paper for him, as he wanted to get off on the train on pressing business.

Bonnie finally sent for the Dr. to day, and took some calornel. There are a great many down with Seagrippe, and pneumonia. I presume we will have a serious time before the plague quits us.

Jan 25 Monday. The first thing I heard this morning was, that Gustie Reynolds was sick, so as soon as I got my breakfast, I went over, found her in bed with grip. There did not seem to be much that I could do, so picked up the soiled clothes and had Matt bring them over for me, and I went into the snow. The first time in a long while, and I am a little tired to night, although I have written three letters which makes thirteen for me this month.

Jan 26 Another very pleasant day. I went to see Susie R. this afternoon, she is still trussing with the grip and Uncle Jack, their general factotum, is down with the same. After supper, May and I, went to see Gustie, she is better, but the baby had a hot fever, and she had the Dr. come over

Jan 27 Wednesday, warm and sunny to day. Gustie had a hard chill, and was real sick last night and to day. I was over this morning, and this afternoon, Gustie is better. I feel quite weary to night. Mr. King was buried to day.

Jan 28 Thursday The sick are on the mend. Florence and Ben were over to day, and this afternoon Florence and I went to see Gusta, and from there to Phine, a few minutes. Thermometer reached 80 to day.

Jan 29 Weather to day in the sun was simply hot, getting ready for a storm & presume.

March 4th at noon My horse would not be caught, and I walked up to Georges, and got very warm. I called to see Dr Moody, who is quite sick.

Mr. Pierce went through his operation alright and is doing nicely. I finished a night-dress to night. My sewing gets done by littles, in these days of La grippe,

30 Saturday Well, the first thing thing this morning I went to see Mr Armstrong. He is down again. Got home at eleven o'clock. Weather is cloudy and warm, feels very much like Spring.

I went to the matinee at the three o'clock, given by Mrs Grumpe's music class, and it was very good. Mother and Bettie were over a few minutes this afternoon. I finished a school apron for May.

Jan 31 Sunday I have a headache and feel weary this morning, and did not go to Sunday school nor church. It is cloudy, and windy, but not very cold, but looks like it might be fixing for a storm, of some kind, I wish it would rain.

Feb. 1st

The day opened up with a warm drizzle. But the sun has been shining most of the afternoon. I visited the dressmaker, Mr. Pence. Susie R., Mrs. Kindle, and Annie Lee. She has a boy this morning. I helped in the kitchen a good deal to day as it is our washday, and fixed a dress for May. There seems to be always something to fix.

Feb. 2

The concert last night was quite a success. This morning was raw and misty, but this afternoon was pleasant. I weighed 149 lbs. this morning. I bought some buttons from Piner Brody, and I weighed 151 with them in my hand. It is the first time I ever bought buttons by the lb. He asked what I would give him for a lot of loose ones that were in the box, and I said 25 cents, and he says, they go,

I went up to George R. this morning, and found them all ailing, and the cook leaving.

Jan 3

Wednesday. The day has been pleasant but cloudy. I painted a little to day, and went to Gasus this afternoon, and got a little out of patience, at some poachers who were in our field shooting birds. I would like to have the pleasure of shooting the game on our own grounds.

Thursday. The wind has blown very hard to day. I walked up town this morning, and it was very unpleasant. I went to the bank and found that I could not help a little so I was glad to put in an hour or two checking statements. I walked out in the pasture this afternoon, but found no game. I commenced copying an old journal, kept by S. P. Newcomb during a trip down south in Feb. and Mar 1864. I want it printed. To night I went back to the Bank, and helped Mr. B. mail statements.

Feb 5 Friday. Cloudy and colder to day. I worked at my copying all the morning, and this afternoon, I went to Hills. Myra was there, and we went to the cemetery out at 4 o'clock. From there we went to see Mrs. Lee. I took Myra home, and ran in to Georges a minute. He and Bettie had just returned from Conrad's ranch. Yes, I took Bettie Hindle's clock to her, a bridle present that was behind the time getting in.
We had a nice salt water fish for dinner.

Feb 6 The first thing I did this morning was to shoot a squirrel, and we had him fried for dinner. He was as tender as a young chicken. I finished my copying to day, and painted a morning glory on a blotter, that is three blotters that I have painted this lately. Early this morning it got very dark, and the clouds looked like it would blow dreadfully. Then it thundered and began to rain like it was going to be a down pour. But it rained very little, and blew over, and we had a bare sandstorm instead.

Feb 7 Sunday This has been a lovely day. May was a little sick, and took some medicine last night, did not go to Sunday School, but went to see Mrs. Woods this afternoon, with Gustie B. Gussie and myself. Found Mrs. W. quite feeble. The Dr. and wife were there, also Mrs. Gillett and a Mrs. Hafford. I feel rather tired after my drive. Ella Reynolds is sick. We drove up there also.

Feb 8 Monday I put in most of the morning in the kitchen. Lizzie Woods was here a little this morning, and J. A. Matthews, and Fox Jr. came in about noon. This afternoon I went up town to shop a little for my sister, and then went to see Ella. Found Mrs. Matthews there, and Rosa and Mrs. Heller (Mrs. Johnson) came in. Ella had a good deal of fever. Quite windy to day,

Feb 9 Tues. I have headache, and feel a little out of tune to day, and have been trying to take things easy. I have commenced to cray on a landscape, and did a little on that, and crocheted some on a

cape that I have on hand, also borrowed some towels
and handkerchiefs. Uncle Joe M. took tea with us
and sat a while to night.

Feb 10 Wed. I crayoned a little this morning. Rosa &
Mrs. Keller were over after some shrubbery,

I went up to Wills this afternoon, to see their
new boy, who arrived just in time for breakfast
this morning. Ella is improving some, uncle
Jack has been up nearly all day. He says there
is no use to ask if I am well, looking at one will
do, says I have a front on me like a balloon.
Quite complimentary (?) Susie and the boy are
doing nicely. He is a fine tea strainer.

Feb 11 Crayoned all the morning. Gustie, Lou and my
self, went up to see Susie this afternoon, all doing
well, but Ella looks thin and bad. Lou is
most sick to night. P.A.M. is with us to night
Weather has been rather cold to day.

Feb 12 Friday. P.A. and his son Joe went home to day.

Weather looks very much like Spring, but I fear that
we will have a cold snap to kill fruit. Gustie and Susie spent the day. Gustie said
that she came to see if I had a little baby. I took
her to see her and Susie's baby yesterday, and she
thinks she ought to find one here too.

Been very windy to day

Feb 13 I almost finished my picture, and finished a
night dress that I cut yesterday. Another warm
blustery day, and a little rain about sundown.

Feb 14 Sunday Some colder to day. I went to Sunday
school and church this morning, and walked over
to Phino this afternoon. Found John Matthews
and family there, but Phino family were out
riding. John's wife is on her way to Southern Texas to
visit her mother

Aunt Martha

Feb 16 Yesterday morning, I received a note saying that Mrs. Woods was not expected to live but a few hours. So took Mrs. Gulledge down there with me, and we stayed all day. Towards night, Bettie R. and Lydia came down. Myra took Mrs. G. home, and Bettie and I stayed. Mrs. H. seems better to day. We got home at noon. I brought mother over, and she went to Gasties this afternoon, and I shall have to go too, or go to sleep.

Feb 17

This morning I went up to Mr. Armstrong's, and Mrs. A went with me to Betties, to hear from Mrs. Woods. She staid with her last, and said she was not as well. I called at Mrs. Shannon's to offer a crumb of comfort to the poor old lady who has had a great trial recently in the shape of an illegitimate grand daughter, a beautiful child, but nowel come of course. Its mother, a young girl about 17 years of age, took and not more than half arted, looked very pale and weak, but was sweeping and making beds, and the child only two weeks old. I am very sorry for them, I went to Gasties a little while also,

Feb 18

Friday, yesterday morning I went to Dr. Powell's, they have a very sick baby, probably will not recover. I went in to Phineas a few minutes. Mother and Gastie and Lizzie were over in the afternoon. This morning I went to Dr. Powell's, and Hall's. The sick babe seems about the same. It was real raw and damp this morning, but is plasanter this afternoon. I certainly will be glad when the sick are better, we have had rather a rough time this ~~winter~~ winter with Grippe

Feb 20

Saturday I sat up with the baby last night, and I thought at 7 o'clock this morning, that it could not live two hours, but it is better this afternoon, but it may choke to death at any time. The main trouble is its throat. It is distressing to see the dear little fellow suffer so, and he looks at us just like he want to have us do something to relieve him. Dr. Stout from Cisco was there. He is a very fine looking well preserved old gentleman 70 years of age. Very enteraining. He sleeps in his chair without any trouble. Mother, Lizzie Price and I, went to see Mrs. Woods this afternoon

I went to bed very early this morning, and slept until eleven o'clock, but I feel sleepy and tired to night, guess I will go to bed early. I left another at Powell's.
May is out visiting, and it is getting time she was back

Feb 22 Monday. I went to Woods yesterday afternoon, sat up all night, Mrs. W. slept most of the time, and seemed to rest. I got into town just as the Mill whistled 7 o'clock. Left Lou sick yesterday, and this morning she was broken out like marshes, but better. I went to bed at nine, and slept till eleven, but feel very dull and sleepy now. Aunt Callie (colored) was over helping today, I gave her all the odd victuals, and my washing to do, as my help is sick.

Feb 23 Tuesday. I attended the funeral of Capt. Lorsche daughter in the this afternoon. She was about 16 years of age I think. It is a hard blow on the family. She used to go to school here, and the school children were all there. A very large attendance, I am very sorry for the family, she will be sadly missed, but we all have to go through the same sad experience some times. I have been doing the work to day, and feel the effects. Lou and May are both under the weather. Rosa R. and her mother, and the children were over this afternoon. It has been very warm to day.

Feb 28 Sunday. I have been so busy with the sick, that I have had very little time for the journal. Mrs. Woods died Thursday, the 25th at 3 45 P.M. Very easy at the last, and perfectly conscious all the time. She asked to be turned over, then asked the time, and in 15 minutes she was gone.

She was perfectly willing, and anxious to go, said the sky was all clear. On Wednesday she asked us to sing "How firm a foundation," She asked Mr Camp (her brother in law) to pray, and at the conclusion of the prayer, she asked him to turn her over. She did not seem to suffer anymore, and died without a struggle. She was buried Friday, and the day was cold and rainy. She leaves seven children.

Friday night we attended a reception at George Reynolds, in honor of Mr Webb, who is going to leave Albany soon. Mr B. is almost sick again. May did not go to school

last week, was a little sick, and I think, is getting a little lazier about going. I went to Sunday School and church to day, but do not feel very well. Have not gotten over the sitting up I guess.

29 Monday I drove over to Wills, Campbells, and Georges this morning, and did not get back until two o'clock. Found a water heater for the bathroom, and my Kodak here, but I have got the headache too bad to read the instructions to day. Had four callers this afternoon

March 1 Tuesday, I have a dreadful cold, and am almost sick to day. Mr. B. has taken more cold and coughs very hard. I guess I will have the grip after all. Mr. Quill took dinner with us to day. He says he is going to be kin folks to us, after all. So I guess he has made up with Miss Wilson but she is not any kin to us. She is a Matthews relation though and they are pretty thick in our family. I did some work on my silk quilt to day. It seems a little odd not to be obliged to go somewhere to see the sick, I was at Sheltors a while Sunday night, they have a sick baby.
This has been a lovely day.

Mar 2 Wednesday Another pleasant day, no sign of rain. Mr. Quill took dinner with us again to day, we are on a track with him for a buggy horse, and he brought one over for me to try. So I drove a little ways out this afternoon. I did quite a lot on my quilt to day.

Mar 3 Tuesday. It has been cloudy and raw all day, I spent the day at the bank, checking and mailing statements, and I have had a bad headache all day. P. A. M. spent last night with us. I killed two quail yesterday evening, the first time I have had a posse at anything in a long time. I shot them from the yard fence, while they were running.

Mary has gone to to spend the night with Rubie C. her mother and the other children have gone up on the Clear Fork to visit.

Mar 5 Sat. we had a pretty good rain last night, it

washed the creek out, and every thing looks much better to day, but I am feeling rather miserable and do not feel like getting out to look at things.

Yesterday I went up to the photo gallery, and intended to do some work with my Kodak, but I got it out of fix the first thing, and that ended it. Mr. B. tinkered with it last night, but I don't know whether he will be able to fix it or not. I sat for a picture, and I guess it will be a sight as usual. It was rather damp and raw yesterday.

The wind blows a good deal to day,

Mar 6 Sunday. Dr. H. S. Little preached for us to day, and it seemed good to have services in our own dear little church again.

We had a good sermon as we always do from the Dr. and a full house. My best half was unable to go, as he is still in the clutches of sciatica. Mother is coughing real hard again, and looks badly, but was out to day. Our Sunday School is getting slim on account of sickness. Mr. Harrell was out with his new bride. Weather is very much cooler to day. The fire is real comfortable. (Price and Gassie were over a little while to day. Gassie is a great hand to come to aunt & sister.)

Mar 8 Tuesday. Yesterday was rather cold and raw, In the afternoon I went over to see how Mr. Biggs was, and found him still in bed, but able to smoke a pipe. He got thrown from his cart Sunday night as I went to church and got considerably jangled up. I presume he was drunk as he is usually in that condition. His poor care worn wife was taking the best of care of him, I called in Sunday night, and found her on her knees by the bed, bathing his bleeding face, and he was tossing in a drunken sleep. So many sad things to encounter in this life.

To day I went to the picture gallery and had Mr. Rogers try my Kodak, and I made a couple of snap shots at my horse and buggy, and got him to develop them. I think I will like it when I get the run of it, and my head gets to feeling better. I am not feeling very well lately.

I went up to Campbells this afternoon. She and the children have been up to the Clear Fork. I asked Archie if he had a good time. He said "yes, but I slacked off of

a haystack and hurt me.)

Mar 9 Wednesday. To day has been real windy and cold too, but I called on the Webbs and Armstrongs, and met Mr. Boyle and family at the train, and went with them up to George R. Mr. B looks like he needed a rest, and his wife looks very thin, but that is not surprising, as she has two small children to look after.

Mar 10 Thurs. Boyle took dinner with us to day. He seems to be the same as of old, but he says that he has got wiser than thunder since he went to Oklahoma, because he has to deal with so many mean people. We had a little garden planted to day, and the corn is just in the ground.

Mar 11 Angie and Bess were over last evening, and Lizzie and Jessie were here awhile this morning. Gus saw Lou making pins, and she said she was going to stay till after dinner.

I spent the afternoon at Georges. Susie was there spending the day. I'll get in from North to day. Mother came home with me. She is coughing real hard again.

Mar 12 Sat. Myra was over this afternoon, and I went with her as far as Mrs. Halls as she went home. Emma Rose was having a candy pull, with about a dozen little girls. Mr. Webb came over to bid us good by while I was away, but I sent him at Halls, and he brought me home, B. She is very pleasant, but very hard of hearing.

Mar 13 Sun. This has been a beautiful day, warm and bright most of the day. May and I drove to Chison Springs this afternoon, and when they came back May and I went to see Mrs. Best. She has a babe two months old, and has something the matter with her back, and can't walk. It must be very trying for her. Cannot dress herself, nor lift her baby. She has a very sweet babe. She sits in her chair and rocks it.

Mar 14 Mon. It was real warm last night, but the wind is in the north and is much cooler to day, and rather disagreeable. I worked a little bit at the photograph gallery this morning, and cut a dress for myself and May this afternoon. May was not at school this afternoon.

Yns. 15 Wet, cold and sleeting. The trees are covered with ice.

Our weeping willows look like they would break. This will give things a general setback, and the poor cattle will die. Thermometer at 31. Sunday it was 74.

Have been busy with chores to day. May did the machine work, weather too bad for her to go to school.

Mar 16 Wednesday. Sleeted and rained all night and all day and snowed between times, looks like mid winter, icicles hanging every where, and it keeps the man busy making fire. Mother has been busy this week cross stitching a dress for Maide Campbell. J. A. M. took dinner with us to day. He has not been at home since he went to North. I finished the dresses to day except the buttons and holes on mine. I finished my silk quilt Saturday, that is, it is ready for the lining.

Mar 17 Thursday I sanded off and on all day, and shaved a little. Icicles on the north side a foot long.

I had a nice black suit come last night. The waist was a little too large and I fixed it, and did odd jobs to day.

May has been at home all the week, and been doing some sewing.

Mar 18 Fri. Last night I had a chill, from some cause, and I feel weak to day. The nearly all vanished to day.

Mar 19 Sat. This afternoon I went to the photo gallery, but did not do much as usual. Mrs. Armstrong, Mrs. Hendell and Lizzie Woods called while I was away. I got home real tired.

Mar 20 Sunday. I have a class of six small boys in Sunday School. Joe Reynolds, Price Mullin, Alford Stansbury Frank Cook, Beeson & Archie Campbell. Price won't be still a minute, and Frank always has something to say. I talked some about wine drinking to day. Frank says my papa drinks wine when he has the headache. Archie shrugged his shoulders and said. My ^{papa} don't drink it when he has got the headache, and cousin Barnie don't either, does he cousin Tom?

May, Leon, Mother and I walked over to Price's this afternoon. It has been tolerably pleasant to day.

Mar 21 Monday. Went to the gallery this afternoon, and

tried to retouch a negative. Went from there to George's a little while. Found Mrs. Joe. Matthews there, and Susie Vallie. Boyle's children are sick. Mr. Boyle, Will R. and Mr. Sam Webb went hunting to day.

I called a few moments at Phineas', found Rosa in the wash tub. I tried to get Emma Young to come and help me with house work, as Leon is going away soon, but failed.

Mar 22. We had a hard rain last night, and it was dark all the morning, but clear this afternoon. I took some pictures of the horse and jersey, don't know what kind of objects they will be until they are developed, will do that to morrow, if weather is good. Mr. B. did not come home to dinner to day, and it is lonesome without him. May went to school this afternoon.

Mar 23 Wednesday. This morning I went up to the gallery and developed my negatives. The cows were alright, but the horse was a little too close. It was real cold all day, and rained some. I knit this afternoon, am knitting a quilt pattern, from directions in the Free Press Household and think it will be real pretty, but tedious.

Mother is very busy cross stitching a dress for May, Jessie spent the day with us.

Mar 24 Thursday. Skinned, and rained last night, all night I think. The creek is up big, and I tried my stockade on it, don't know how it will pan out, as it is my first in cloverly weather. There are pools of water in the plowed ground it is thoroughly wet now. Barnie staid up town and we had cabbage for dinner. He does not like to smell them, and we pick our chances. P. A. M. took supper with us to night, he is not feeling very good, over the progress in his house and especially some changes made in his absence, after he had already brought carpets to fit the rooms as they were.

Our cistern overflowed and soaked our cellar last night

I took off a hen with fourteen chickens to day.

Ma

Mar 25 Friday. Mr. Boyle was over to day, and I took

a picture of him and Mother, and developed them, also the one view of the creek, I lit the light on the view, and it is not very good. It has been real warm to day, and the ground has dried off fast. I walked up town and got very tired don't feel well any way.

Mar 26 Saturday. I took a picture of Son, and of Mrs Armstrong and Ella, and developed them, and printed a few, and tried my hand on retouching, but did not make a very good job. Son had a bad spell of headache, and toothache last night, but seems alright to day. The wind has been quite cool, and a good deal of it from the west.

Mar 27 Sunday. A lovely day, I did not go to Sunday School, but went to church. Had some company in the afternoon, Mr. and Mrs Rogers, the artist, Mrs Goldington and Geo. and Billie. Billie proposed that I go to Hot Springs with them, and perhaps I will. Gustie and her girls took dinner with us.

Mar 28 I worked at the gallery this morning, took two pictures of mother before I went over, and developed them retouched one, and printed a little.

It has been very windy and disagreeable to day. This afternoon, I collected my wardrobe, and did a little packing. Laid out some seams, and tried to fix things so I could get into them. May staid with Sala last night.

Mar 29. Awful wind to day, from the west. Myra and childress were over this morning. Gas came in just at noon, and left after dinner. It is a hard day to drive in. I am about ready now for the journey to tomorrow. A short horse is easy carried, Son is going at the same time. May will bring horse with her to help her.

Hotel Haz. Hot Springs Ark. Aprst 1892

Geo. R. and wife. Lula Matthews and my self. left Albany Wednesday Mar. 30. A cold morning, got breakfast at Cisco, changed cars at Dublin, and came near getting left, on account of a cranky track man, had the train wait a few minutes. Geo. left his overcoat on the Central train, but it grew warmer all the time. We got to Fort Worth at three P.M. and did some shopping, got our supper, and left at 6.40. Got to Texar Anna for breakfast, but as it was rather early we took ours on the train and had to wait till we got pretty hungry, as the porters was rushed with business. We got here at one o'clock yesterday, and after being worried a good deal with drummers, we walked and hunted for ourselves. We took our dinner at the Avenue, but could not get rooms. We are very comfortably located here, I took a bath yes terday, but am not well enough to day for one, wish I was, as I do not wish to lose any time. I was very tired when we got located, have a headache, and ache generally to day. Geo. and Bettie have been to bath to day, Paula and I will not begin before Monday. It was so warm that I did not half rest last night, and I got very little the night before. I seldom do the first night in a sleep. The guests of the house had an entertainment in the Parlor last night, but we were too tired to attend, but could hear parts of it. It rained last night and to day, and the water is still rippling through the streets. The houses are built right up in to the mountains. There is a family here from De Leon, came in with us, when we can't think of their names, we call them the Brownies, They make a good deal of fun for us.

We took a long walk down town this afternoon, and looked the shops, and found every thing very high priced. Went in to a shooting gallery and took a pop with an air gun. I missed the mark, but George set the band playing. The rest of them walked on farther up after we got to our stopping place, but I was too tired to go on. The air feels very refreshing, and I should like to have gone on.

Apr 2 Saturday. Paula and I, climbed a mountain this morning, and gathered violets, and rested on the pine needles which reminded me of my childhood. This afternoon we went to a dog and pony show, which was the best thing of the kind that I ever saw. We stopped at Townsends and did a little shopping, and as we were tired, we took a car

home. My appetite has been very good, and we get good meals here.

Apr 3 Sunday. Lula and I went to the Presbyterian church this morning. It is quite a nice little church. It commenced to rain about noon, and rained very hard, had to light the gas in the dining room. We are on the third floor, and you can walk out onto the ground the back way.

Apr 4 Took a bath this morning. Got some letters from home, and wrote some. After dinner, we went downtown and did some shopping, and took a car to the end of the line south, and back to our hotel. Better does not feel very ^{well} to day. Had a hard rain last night, and this morning.

Apr 5 Tuesday took a hot bath before breakfast, and I was a little sick after it, guess I will not try it again. Had a hemorrhage from the bowels, and felt real weak awhile. We took a long walk this afternoon. Climbed a mountain and saw some of the boiling springs.

Apr 6 Wednesday. Part in the morning walking and bathing. Been raining all the afternoon. Charles Alpress called this afternoon.

Apr 7 Thursday. We were down in the parlor last night to an entertainment, which was pretty good. It rained last night very hard, thundered and lightened, till I thought it would wash the town away. The bath maid said some ladies at the St Cloud were so frightened, that cried till they vomited. It is clear and bright this morning. Our friend from De Leon changed her boarding place to day.

Apr 8 Friday. Had my corns taken out yesterday, and then took a long walk, and my feet feel tender this morning. We were out to an entertainment last night, a negro minstrel Primrose and West. It was very good. I bought some goods yesterday for a dress, and aim to do a little work. I am getting too lazy for any use.

Sat. 9 There was a little negro in the parlor last night.

about 8 years old, that preached for us. They passed the hat and thanked the audience for \$1.35. This afternoon we took a long walk. York in the Eastman & Park hotel, the Peely institute, and took a car home, as we were tired, at least 3 or 4.

I weighed 147 lbs the day I came, and 152 to day. five lbs in ten days. Geo. gained 3 lbs. and Buttie and Sula are on the back track a little.

Apr 10 Sunday. I thought I would skip my bath and go to church, but I had a fresh cold, and concluded I had best to try to bathe it off. We breakfast so late, and have to wait so long at the bath, that we do not have time for bath in the morning. I went over at the Avenue Hotel with Sula to call on some old friends.

Apr 11 Monday. Yesterday afternoon we went to the Park to see a balloon ascension, it went up about a thousand feet, and the man came down alright.

This morning we had to wait so long at the bath, that it was noon when we came back. It was quite cold yesterday and to day. I have had the steam on all day.

It rained again last night, and is cloudy to day. I sewed a few stitches, but not many, am dreadfully lazy.

Apr 12 Yesterday Son and I took a donkey ride with Mr. and Mrs. Dougherty & their little crippled son, Ben, and Mrs. Hills and Son. We rode to the top of Ozark mountains, up Happy Hollow. We must have gone ride seven miles in all, and we had the jolliest time, if I did get awfully tired and dreamed bad dreams last night, I feel pretty soon to day. There was another entertainment in the parlor last night, - Tricks and vantrilognism.

Apr 13 Wednesday. Sewed a little this morning, and took a walk this afternoon. Real cool yet. Rained last night and has been dark and muddy all day.

Apr 14 Thursday. Last night there was a woman in the parlor make jewelry out of wire, and I invested in a few pieces for the children. There was some very good music in the office, rendered by a blind clarker on a guitar, and two little girls

danced. I had a letter this afternoon from ^{my} son saying

that his children were sick, and his wife not well at all, and I am almost home sick over it.

Bettie and Son have gone downtown. Tonight I would stay at home this time. Pretty cold to day.

Friday

Apr 15 Thursday This has been a lovely day. A party of eleven of us went donkey riding this afternoon, took a long ride. Some of our friends would not go because it was good Friday. George R was along with his tall hat and one of the little boys said he looked like clover, that had got away from a show.

Apr 17 Sunday (Easter) Staid in doors all yesterday

In the evening we went to the Eastman Hotel, to hear the music, and see the people, spent a couple of hours.

Mrs. Richardson and children came in to day, rather last night. We all went to church this morning, and been lounging this afternoon. It has been cloudy, damp all day.

Apr 18 Monday Took a bath before breakfast, Son and I and Dr. Rushing, walked up almost to the Park. Then climbed the mountain and gathered violet, walk a mile & in some. After dinner Bettie and went to call on Mrs. Hegginsbotham, and it was a long hard mile, and the day has been very hot Leon has gone to the Arlington to a hosp. It looks very much like a storm was on hand, and rained some, and they almost backed out. She had some very good music tonight in the parlor, and as usual it almost made me home sick. The tears had to come a little.

I packed a few of my things to night, and it would not surprise me, if I had to pull them out before we get away. I drank coffee to night and am not a bit sleepy, but will go to bed as it is late.

Apr 20 Wednesday Yesterday I was not well, before breakfast bathing does not agree with me.

There was a hen bag social in the parlor last night, and wound up with a little dance. It rained

hard last night and all the morning. Am afraid at all

wash out roads and delay us. But then I will not cross bridges yet. I finished my dress today, and we ^{went} down town this afternoon and did a little shopping.

Had lots of music in the office and hall to night. I have almost got my trunk packed, and hope to bid good bye to Hot Springs tomorrow, although we have met some very pleasant people and shall be sorry to leave them.

Albany

Apr 24 Sunday We left Hot Springs last Thursday at three twenty P.M. We waited an hour at Malvern, had a hot box and was an hour and a half behind at Texarkana, but got to North on time, Friday morning for breakfast. Met May Matthews, Ella Puglachi, Rubie Campbell and Dr. Powell at Coopers, also Mr. and Mrs. B. H. Rose. The first news that greeted us was the death of Jim Carter, which was very much of a shock to us. Leon Everett was there and came in with us.

Home looked very sweet to me. The lawn was so green and the roses blossoming, and I was so glad of that, on account of the funeral, which was at 2 o'clock yesterday, and I never saw so large a one in the town. He was liked by every one and I don't think he had an enemy anywhere.

The young ladies marched after the pall bearers with flowers and tenderly laid ^{them} on his last resting place. I cut a large basketful of roses and buds, all that I had, and to day the bushes are full again. I feel like living in the yard.

Went to Sabbath school, and heard a good sermon by Dr. Mc Lelland, of Comanche, Brownwood,

Apr 25 Monday Was real busy all the morning. In the afternoon I made five calls. Sallie, Jessie, Myra, Bettie and Rose. Rosas baby is sick, and Betties face is real bad Dr. thinks it is erysipelas, and she feels discouraged.

I have felt very well to day.

Apr 26 Tuesday, I was too sore to get up almost, I felt too well yesterday, and did just a little too much.

I went to the picture gallery this afternoon and worked a little. Went from there to see Phia's baby. It was very sick

last night, they thought it would die, but she is better to day. The wind has been very disagreeable.

Apr 27 Wednesday. Unusually windy all day, rained a little last night, weather hot. Judge Conner and Mr. Mack were over to dinner with us. I feel much better to day.

Apr 28 Thursday. I took a few views of the house and bridge this morning, and went over and developed them, and while I was at the gallery Fannie Woods and her two little sisters came in to spend the day with me, so I came back home. Mrs. Estelle Kendal came also. In the afternoon I took another view, with my visitors in.

Apr 29 Friday. Last evening Judge Conner and Mr. Mack came over for some flowers. I made up four large bouquets and I had made quite a number and sent away, during the day, and still I could hardly miss them.

I painted some prof'y and did a little work at the shop this afternoon. Sallie Dr. is not at all well. I was over to see her a little while, I finished up a dress for May. Weather is dry and windy. Looks discouraging.

Apr 30 I painted and washed out picture all day, and am tired to night. Took a negative of J. A. Batties house this morning. Wind still blows. Mr. and Mrs. Armstrong were over last evening, both are rather under the weather. May went swimming this afternoon with a few girls.

May 1st Sunday. Hot and windy, very disagreeable, went to Sunday school, but not to church. I have not heard from my children since I came home, and I feel a little anxious, but is no use of course.

May 2 Monday. Worked at picture to day, finished up a lot. Went to Sallie's ^{Bethel} and Phine's a few minutes after I got through. Windy as usual.

May 3 Tuesday. Worked at shop this afternoon, was busy all the forenoon at home. Wind, wind, and dust.

May 4 Wednesday Finished more pictures to day, and visited Mrs Armstrong this afternoon. Went to an entertainment at the opera house last night.

May 5 Thursday. We were awakened at an earlier hour than usual this morning, and perfectly shocked to hear that F. E. Conrad had shot himself, at eleven o'clock last night, at my brother George's. We dressed hurriedly and went up, and could scarcely believe it possible, until we saw his dead body. George and Billie were waked up more than I ever saw them, and we have had very sad things to happen. It was something so terrible, to have a good, honorable Christian man, a brother-in-law, loved and respected by all who knew him - to do such an awful thing, in one's house. That pistol shot, and those awful groans, will always ring in their ears.

Mrs. Matthews, J. A. and Sallie M. Dr Powell and Bro Armstrong went to the ranch for his family. What a ride that must have been 18 miles in the night - after such a tragedy, to break the news to his wife and children. Oh! will such things never end. His wife bore it with a brave Christian spirit, but it is a heavy cross to bear.

May 13 Friday Gus & family came over to day. The children have grown so much since I saw them I found my ankle this afternoon by a board breaking in the back floor and letting me fall over the steps.

May 14 Saturday This is May Matthews twelfth birthday, and we gave her a little picnic under the trees at the creek, with twelve little girls. In the afternoon the boys came over eleven of them, and (Hall and Elmer forgot to come) and had ice cream and cake, and I took a picture of them.

May 15 Sunday Gus went home to day. I was too sick to play out to go to Sunday School.

May 24 Tuesday I took Minnie and children over to Phineas to day. The baby was very sick for several days and Fern had a cold.

May 29 I have been sick since Tuesday night.

Not able to do anything but rest. Have not seen Minnie and children since, am getting anxious to see the babies.

June 1

May 31 Wednesday. Had a good rain yesterday and last night, and it is cold enough to sit by a fire today.

Gus came over Sunday, and took his family home Monday. I miss them very much. I had May drive me over to Sallis a little while yesterday. Emily has been very sick. My head troubles me a great deal.

June 5 Sunday. My head is still buzzing, no lets up at all. We had quite a cool spell lately. Deill came in yesterday with his bride.

Yours & I. I am still under the weather, and the cook is sick.

June 8 ~~Wednesday~~. May is down to day. The three of us would not make half a hand. Weather pleasant.

June 9 Thursday. You went home to day, and I went visiting to keep from work. Went to Sallis & found a regular crowd.

June 11 Saturday I finished up some pictures at home to day.

June 12 Sunday. I am going to church this morning.

It has been quite a while since I went, have been feeling too miserable. We had a very hard rain yesterday, and the creek got pretty high. I took some pictures of it, do not know whether they are any good or not, as I have not developed them yet.

Thursday we had the kitchen and little bed room papered and ~~painted~~ painted, and they look pretty clean once more.

July 4th 92

We had a grand picnic to day at the park, hundreds of visitors and a pleasant time, although the morning was very threatening. There has been a merrymaking here for a week or two and it certainly did a big business to day. Brother Ben says that Albany will have something to date from now. The barbecue and merrymaking go round.

July 5 The fireworks last night were lovely. Some of them tried to have a dance, but I think it was a failure.

We had a hard rain last night, and the creek got up around the bridge, and through the big gate.

Mary staid last night with Pearl Coddington and got caught on the other side a while. I got some pictures of it while it was up.

Gustie and children staid with us last night, and we have washed, cooked peaches, and done lots of work to day.

July 6 Wednesday I was dreadfully tired to day, after the picnic, and a hard day work.

July 7 Thursday. I took several little girls to the merrymaking last night, for a last ride, all went in our phaeton, and Mr. Mack asked Barnie to day if he had ordered a new one. He helped load us in last night and thought of course we would break down.

July 10 Sunday Went to see Mr. Quill to day. He has been very sick the past ten days.

July 11 Carrie Moore. ^{and Joe} Mary M. and Ella R. staid with us last night, Went to Woods this afternoon, and got John to come up and help with the work.

July 12 Tuesday. Went to see Mr. Quill this morning. He is a very sick man. Went to Missionary meeting in the afternoon, no one there but mother Sallie and Gustie. Guess the others forgot it. Barnie and I came home yesterday by train, after meeting, she had been there all day with Mary who is very low. Don't think she has many days left.

Mother stayed with us last night, and is here again to night;

13 Wednesday Trill died to day, and it was quite a surprise to us, as Bernie told us at noon that the Dr. said he was doing well. I suppose that death ought never to take us by surprise. It is sad for his young wife but worse things could happen to her.

July 14 Thursday to day we attended the funeral and witnessed the last sad rite ^{paying to} of our friend. We came home and wondered if it were possible that we would see him among us no more, it is hard to realize.

Mother went with Ben to the ranch to day

July 15 Friday Boyle's family and Horace Wilson came in last night, and Geo Mrs Wilson was here and had been for some time,

This is the 25th anniversary of Geo. and Buttis marriage, I rode 40 miles on horseback to that meeting, poor I am a greyhaired grandmother. How fast time flies.

July 17 Sunday Went to hear John W. Hall preach to day and I thought he did first rate for a young preacher. John W. went home to spend the night, Bessie and Dasette came home with us

July 21 Thursday Weather very hot. Workmen in the house building chimneys. and every thing in a mess.

July 24 Sunday We got one chimney finished ^{yesterday} today, and it is very nice. Sallie concluded to let May go to Rockport with her uncle Geo. So I went over to Rockport yesterday and helped her sew, it is quite a job to get one ready at a day notice. Campbells and uncle Joe's family are going also, and Phins family go to Arkansas, and Will to Dakota. That will just about break up our Sunday School.

Aug 28 & The 28 of July, May and I went to Rock

Morton. Had a very hot day for it and got there in a hard rain. We stayed till the 3^d of Aug. and went to the Clear Fork and stayed two nights and a day at my Bro Ben's. ~~At~~ ^{On} Aug. the 5th we came home. Stayed in Griffon till six o'clock and got home after night. Found the chimneys finished and the mantle up. Gustie and Miss Simpson kept house while I was gone.

Miss S. left the 25.

(This is Ethel Matthews fifth birthday, and we gave her a party yesterday. Nine little girls spent the day here.)

Ethel and her three sisters Bessie and Jessie Reynolds, Rubie Campbell, and Emma Bull, and Annie Leon Powell, we put in a quilt for the Orphans home in Dallas) and invited our Missionary society over to quilt in the afternoon, but while we were eating dinner it commenced to rain, and rained hard nearly all the afternoon. The children seemed to have a good time in spite of the rain. They had apples, candy, pecans, peanuts, Almonds, ice cream and cake, and Annie Leon ate till she said it did not taste good.

George Coats came over after Emma, and to bid us good bye, as he is going back to Baltimore.

Susette went home with Bessie, and the others staid all night. Sister was here with her children, and the creek got to full for her to go home. The three, Mother Sister and myself quilted some after four o'clock.

We quilted a quilt the fore part of the week, and one the week before.

The wind has been blowing all day from the south but the sun has been shining all day. I did not go to Sunday school to day. May went over with the girls.

Aug 29 Monday, I went to Gastie a few minutes this morning. She is moving to the Quill place in Rail Road addition, it is a pleasant neighborhood. I engaged Julia Pate to work for me. She is to come the first of Sept.

Aug 30 Tuesday. I washed out pictures all the morning and quilted some in the afternoon. Billie and Lula came over and helped with the quilt-yesterday

Aug 31 Wednesday Got the quilt out early this morning. Myra came over to help, but was too late. I went up town with her, and in the afternoon I mounted picture. Sallie and her girls were over in the afternoon, and later John and I drove to Woods, and killed a rabbit and four doves. My sun horse is not afraid of the gun.

Sep 1 Thursday We packed a comfort this afternoon and had a number of callers besides. Mrs. Mullen, Mrs. Howesley, Mrs. Coffey & Rosa Reynolds. Julia Pate came today to work for me, I hope we will manage to get on alright.

Sep 2 Friday May and I drove all the morning hunting plover, and only killed four, drove over some fearful rough country.

Sep 3 Mother and I went on the other side and made some calls this morning. I found Jessie Price here when I came back. Julia complained of being sick, and went home this afternoon. I engaged Emma Young immediately, I wonder how long she will stick. I cover'd a box with plush to day, and made a very pretty handkerchief of it.

Sep 4 Sunday It commenced raining about mid night and rained till nearly noon to day. The creek got very high, but soon run down. It was cool enough for a little fire this morning, and we tried one of our new grates.

Sep 7 Wednesday Mr. G. P. S. & E had their entertainment here last night. Quite a number were over and all seemed to have a good time. Had ice cream and cake, and some good music. I made a visit to the Armstrongs this morning and went plover hunting this afternoon, got four after riding hours over a rough country.

Sep 8 Thursday Lizzie Woods and her sisters spent the day with us; the little ones staid here last night & have not done much to day.

Sep 9

Friday I washed out some pictures to day,

Sep 11 Sunday Rained, and no Sunday School. I walked over to Phineas and Sallie's this afternoon,

Sep 12 Monday School opened to day, and I went up to see them start out.

Sep 13 Tuesday Mrs. Kendall spent to day with us It was our missionary day too, but I am not well and have a man in the house painting so did not go. Mother went over,

Sep 15 Thursday, Bessie B. and Mrs. Conrad spent the day with us, and I was most too sick to get dinner they had to finish up
Mr. Holstien was here yesterday, after some artist material,

Sep 16 Friday, I tried to find some help to day, but failed, I have been having toothache, and am about to fag. Lizzie Price was over this afternoon

Sep 17 Saturday The workman got the book case in and finished it up to day. It has been in the works several weeks. It is very large and roomy.

Sep 18 Sunday, Feeling miserable, and did not go out to day. It has been real warm for several days

Sep 19 Monday, Just about worked myself down to day Myrl and Gustie were over this afternoon, Real warm

Sep 20 Tuesday Worked at picture all the morning, and part of the afternoon. Lizzie was over, and I tried to get a picture of the baby, but failed. Mother and I went to Sallie awhile, found her painting

Sep 21 Wednesday. Been working at pictures all day.

When out at house work, and received one dollar and fifty cents for some of them, the first I have taken in. Sandy Haggart is here to night, and will probably remain. Mrs. Bayne & Gustie were out soliciting help for Mrs. Spence this afternoon. The wind has been blowing pretty hard the past two days.

Ma has been knitting a cap, and has about finished it off to day.

Sep 22 Thursday. I just kind of loafed to day, went visiting this afternoon. Florence is real deaf with a bad cold. Susie has fever, and Sellie is not feeling well. Danie has water in his yard now and is very fond of it, and well he may be, he just got it in to day. Gus came in to night.

Sep 23 Friday. I took Kodak shot at Gus and his team as he was leaving this morning, also one of the bridge. Been working on my silk quilt to day, lasting saddle stitching.

Sep 24 Saturday. Some night-bloomers opened last night, and I got a flash light negative of them, I printed some of them to. May M. was over to see them, and I wanted her to be in the picture, but she was afraid of the flash.

I went to Sellie's this afternoon to see Mrs. Baggers. She is over from Griffin with a sick baby.

Sep 25 Sunday. We attended an ice cream supper, given last night for the benefit of the Albany Band, and I have felt unusually tired to day, not that I did anything, or walked very far. I went to hear Mr. C. strong preach to day. Weather hot. mercury at 93 at 4 o'clock P.M.

Sep 26 Monday. Martha Royal came to day to help me, I hope she will stay. I worked at pictures done to day, and lopped around a good deal.

Sep 27. Tuesday. I have felt real miserable all day, but

went over to Sappho's this afternoon. She gave me a little party, as it is my forty fourth birthday, and I feel like I might be a hundred instead, & I shall have some teeth taken out tomorrow, and perhaps I shall feel better. Gustie R is in bed, Bessie babe is sick, and D. A. M. is almost down with his back.

Sep 28 Wednesday. Hot weather holds on, 83 now, and it nearly six P.M. I had too miserable looking teeth extracted today, and think I will be better when the sorcerous leaves my jaw. I stitched some racking to the lining of my silk quilt today.

Sep 29 Thursday. Finished my quilt-to-day and feel much better since I lost my teeth. Went to see Gustie this afternoon now she is quite sick. Mother was perfectly out done with Jessie, she had been so mischievous.

Sep 30 Friday. Martha & I made two small mattresses today, I have not been so well today, got cold in my jaw. May go to stay with Gustie tonight.

Oct 1 Saturday, I put in most of the day at Gustie's, she is not so well today. I almost made a dress for Bessie today, I took dinner at Phin's, as it was ready when I called in on my way home.

Oct 2 Sunday Got up with a pain in my shoulder. Went to Sunday School and church, went to the baptist this time.

Oct 3 Monday. I took Gustie up to Bettie's and we spent the day. Came by Phin's to see Florence our girl, born the 1st.

Oct 4 Tuesday. Tired out working at pictures, been printing from Bettie's negatives, taken in Dak, and Alaska, been using new paper also, don't know how I will succeed.

Oct 5 Wednesday. Finished my pictures to day, and they look real well, better than I expected.

Oct 6 Thursday. Have been doing very little to day as I am tired from yesterday's job.

Oct 7 Friday. Gustie, and Myra spent the day with us, and the three small children, Benson, Archie and Gussie, Mr. Edgar was over also and put up some garters, and the children were very busy with him.

Oct 8 Sat. I spent the day with Sallie, and took some pictures of the children, there and at Phins. I developed them to night, and they look real good.

Oct 9 Sunday. Went S.S. and church this morning. The Woods girls come home with me to dinner. Went to Sallie's and Mrs. Armstrong's this afternoon. It is much cooler to day.

Oct 10 Monday. Printed pictures all the morning and this afternoon. Mother and I packed two comforts Martha helped some.

Oct 11 Tuesday. This morning I washed out my pictures and afternoon we went to missionary meeting, had a better attendance than usual. Mother staid over with Sallie. Mrs. Armstrong & Gustie were over awhile after I got back, I mounted my pictures to night, and Mr. B. burnished them.

Oct 12 Wednesday. Wind blew real hard last night and is still blowing (noon) I made some quilt, top and linings this morning, and rushed off, and got nearly to the gin. to have them filled, before looking to see if it was running, and found it was out. I do not feel a bit well to day. Got my cotton this afternoon & filled a buck.

Oct 13 Thursday. Mother and I tacked the beds this

morning. I am almost sick to day. Will R and family returned from Dak. yesterday. Mrs Warren, Mrs. Boren, Mrs Ball, and Mrs Campbell called to day, also

Oct 14 Friday ^{Yrangle Sampson}

I tacked a comfort to day, and had some baking done for a childrens party to morrow

Oct 15 Sunday. Susie M., Jessie and Anne R had a birthday party here yesterday. 25 children over in all, and they had a rollicky time of it, and seemed to enjoy themselves very much, but it is hard to fill that many in ice cream, thirteen quarts was not enough.

I feel a little weary to day, but went to Sunday School and church. Gus came over Friday and went back to day.

Oct 16 Monday. Commenced two comforts to day, put the cotton in, and partly tacked them. Bird has bloomed a good deal. May is still out of school

Oct 17 Tuesday. I went up town this afternoon to get my teeth worked on, but the dentist was out of town, so I made Mrs Muller a visit. Mother went to Phins, is not at all well. Anna and Caroline R staid with us last night.

I finished a comfort to day, to night rather

Oct 18

Wednesday. It was raining when we got up, and it has rained all day, and is quite cool. We have been sitting by fire all day, and I finished my comforts, and commenced on sheets. I have two dozen to hem, and Martha is going to do them, she is real good and willing.

Gus said he was going to bring his family over the last of the week, but I fear the weather will prevent. We need the rain badly, but I want so much to see the children.

Oct 20 Thursday. Still raining, Ben was over to day.

Oct 21 Friday. More rain, I have made over an old dress for May, and Martha hemmed sheets & I have had a good deal of cold this week. The school celebrated Columbus day this morning, but it was raining, and I did not go.

Oct 22 Sat. The band gave a concert last night, and we all went in the lumber wagon. It was a very good entertainment, but we had to wait till nine o'clock before it commenced, and it was raining a little when we started home, and I think it rained all night. The creek got very high to day. I took a negative as usual, and developed one of Gus that I took last Saturday.

Oct 23 Sunday This has been a dreary day, drizzling, and dark. We have put in most of the day by the dining room fire, Will Paer has been over with the boys,

Oct 24 Monday Sunshine to day, and I got the washing out as usual. I printed a few pictures this morning, and did a little fancy work. Sallie brought another over this afternoon.

Oct 25 Tues. I put in the morning shopping with Sallie, and ate dinner with her, afternoon we made out our Missionary report, and visited at Myra's, and I made the dentist a call, which is near a pleasant one to me, I came home minus a tooth. Mother is busy working a dress for her great grand daughter.

Oct 26 Wednesday. I went over this morning to paint with Sallie, and found her sick with a cold. She began work, but had to give it up, I did a little, and helped back another comfort when I came home. I think that winds up the business. Martha has gone home to visit to night.

Lizzie spent the afternoon with us, and I took a picture of her boy.

Oct 27 Thursday, I went over and painted a little more to day. Sallie is a little better. Weather fine

28 Florence and her children came over to day. I went to the dress makers with this afternoon. I went out last night to hear a political speech by P. Browning

29 Florence went back this morning, and I called at Bullo's, Armstrongs, and Bostics, got in about noon real tired. Worked at picture some since dinner, and a little on a dress for May.

30 Sunday. Walked to Sunday school, and helped to get dinner, and feel tired as usual. It has been cloudy and trying to rain all day.

31 Monday. I put in the morning hard at work and went to paint in the afternoon, found Sallie ready to go driving. I painted a little while alone and found it slow work. I was too tired to do any how, so I quit and made a call at Powells, and drove Florence around to gather up her sewing at different places, getting ready to go home to morrow. Also went in to see the new boy at Mrs T. J. Kindels, arrived this morning.

Nov 1 Tuesday. Had a new cook stove set up this morning. It looks real nice. Weather warm

2 Wed. I went all around among the kin this morning, short calls. There is quite a northerly and real raw. But family did not get out yesterday, but started to day, bad as it is, I painted a wee landscape this afternoon, on a horn, for Elmer

3 Thursday. My children came in yesterday, and I was proud to see them, especially the babies. They are looking real well. They ^{met} Ben's folks at Griffin, and said their baby got very cold.

This morning was rather damp and raw, but the afternoon was pleasant, and we went visiting. Fern is very nervous and timid, and was afraid of several things.

Nov 4 Friday We visited at Hill B's this morning

and took dinner with them, and went to Gas' in the afternoon. Hill family, Sallie and children, the Conrad boys, Matt Reynolds, Rudy C., Ben G. and Mattie Manning, all went to uncle Jas's this afternoon, on a little pican hunt. It is very nice and pleasant, but am suspicious of the weather this time of year.

Horn and David had big roush to night, they are very sweet children.

5 Saturday This morning was quite cloudy and dark, and rains some. But it cleared up soon and Gas took his family and started home and it has acted like April weather all day a lit- the shower and then sunshine, and about 4 P.M. it set in to rain pretty steadily. I hope my chil- dren got home before it commenced, they were not very well fixed for wet weather, and the children are so easily made sick.

I finished the dress & was making over for May, and the horn I commenced to paint.

We had a were serenade by the Cornet band last night, Martha did not wake up, and she said she was dead, she wakes so easily that I thought of course she was hearing it, and did not go to wake her up, and we were so busy running around getting dressed and making lights,

It has been real lame one to day without the babies
6 Sunday This is a bright and beautiful day, but the wind blows rather hard. It rained enough yester- day to make the streets quite muddy. Went to Sab- bath school and church, our school was pretty slim so many gone to the ranch.

7 Monday Very busy all the morning. Afternoon I was up town this afternoon, but Sallie and Susie at Mrs Bull's, we were to take a painting lesson, but did not get our canvas stretched on account of so much election excitement, it is has been running pretty the last few days.

Nov 8 Tuesday To day will end the battle at the ballot

box, I hope it will be for the best in all things. We went to the court house last night to hear a political debate between Mr. Foster and Mr. Webb. The house full and all enjoyed it. Both made a long talk, and Mr. Webb was very interesting. We did not get home till eleven o'clock.

This is our regular missionary day, and we met at Sallie's and had a very good meeting. We discussed the question of calling a preacher, but did not decide. I have a headache and feel real tired to night. Mr. B has gone up town to see if he could hear from the election. It is raining to night and rained some this morning and slicked a little, and has been real cold to day.

9 I was a little under the weather to day.

10 Thursday This is Susie & Bettie's birthday and Monday the 24 will be Barnes, and Sallie had us over with her to supper, the six of us, also Mr and Mrs Webb, Judge Conner and Mr Mack and Mr Farche. We had quite an enjoyable evening. Spoke few over the election.

Nov 11

Friday I went to see Bettie and the baby this morning also Mrs Webb. This afternoon Sallie, Susie and myself went to Mrs Ball's to paint on some roses. I did not make much progress.

12 Saturday This morning I had a call from old Uncle Sam and aunt Julia, (the negro preacher) and took a picture of them.

This afternoon I went to Mrs Gregg's to a musical, by Mrs Crumpe's class.

Mother and Susette came over and stayed all night with us. Mrs Marcell called to day.

13 Sunday Martha went to Marion to day. I went to Sunday School and church, and to a congregational meeting at half past two, and at four

I went to Mr. Armstrong's, and witnessed the baptism of Mrs. Kindell's baby, Mrs. Campbell. Dr. Powell and Rev Mr Collard were present also, besides a few young folks.

- Nov 14 Thursday Mr. B. is fifty one years of age today. He brought a young friend over to dinner who is twenty one today and he got his license today to practice law. His name is Nathan Tracy from Eastland. I took a picture of him.
I went to paint this afternoon,
- 15 Friday, I went to Campbells, Halls and Sallies this afternoon, May M is quite sick.
- 16 Wednesday Weather very warm. Sitting with out fire to night. I took a picture this morning, of some flowers, and myself, in the unthatched room, and got a good negative.
I went to call on Mrs. Mc Clung this afternoon, she has twin babies, and is almost a stranger in town.
- 18 Friday, There is quite an excitement up among the children today, on account of a show in town, which I do not imagine amounts to much.
- 20 Sunday, Yesterday, I gave Ruby Campbell a birthday party, and had our Sunday School class in the afternoon. It was a beautiful day, and they frolicked out of doors most of the time, and I seemed to enjoy them selves.
I tried to get a picture of them, Mrs. Holowell was buried this afternoon, I went there from Sunday school at dinner at George's. It has been quite warm today I was rather uncomfortable all the afternoon, and we are sitting without fire to night.

Nov 21 Monday. Nothing in particular done this

morning, but every thing in general, as usual on wash day. Painted this morning afternoon, and met Mrs. Charles Coats at Mrs. Bullo's.

22 Tuesday. Took a negative of a group of girls, in masquerade costumes. Stilla and Magone, Lillian Grace Lee and Lula Mathews. Called on Mrs. Coats this afternoon.

23 Wednesday. Washed and painted a lot of pictures this morning, worked so hard, that I was too tired to paint much in the afternoon.

24 Thursday. Bettie Sals, Joe & George Conrad and Matt Reynolds ate Thanksgiving Turkey with us to day. Had a pleasant day with Bettie and Lou. The weather is very warm.

25 Friday. Another very warm day. Wind blew very hard this morning. Painted again to day.

26 Saturday. Finished two dog pictures to day, and shopped this afternoon. Called at Phins and Sallie's. Very warm.

27 Sunday. Mr. Ayers from Brownwood, preached for us to day. Dr. McSolland was sick, and of course we were disappointed.

I went to Coffees this afternoon, Uncle Ben is very feeble. Poor old man, I do not think he will last through the winter.

The folks are all gone to church and I am alone to night. A little cooler to night.

Went to Coffees

28 Monday. Took a picture for Martha this morning, and painted this afternoon, and went to the dress makers, also.

29 Tuesday. I went up town this morning, went to uncle Sam's (colored) and took them a picture

of themselves and I never saw any one so proud.

And Julia said I declare Miss Susie I would not take ten dollars for it.

Nov 30 Wednesday November vanishes to night, and the beautiful sunny weather may vanish also for a while. It has been an unusually warm and bright November. I actually suffered with heat to day, while I was painting.

I wish it would get cold enough to clear the flies out any way, they ^{are} worse than they were in Summer.

I took a negative yesterday, of Mr. Bell & three musical instruments, and Miss Woods with a guitar. They have a honeysuckle for a background, and look as if they might be two strolling musicians, Playing Listen to the Bell in the Woods

Dec 1 Thursday I worked with pictures all day and had good success with most of them. It is hard work too when one sticks to it,

2 Friday I went to Gusties this morning, ~~the~~ and I drove up to Uncle Sam's (colored) and downtown, and back. Bonnie and I took dinner with her, and I painted again this afternoon. The mail forty, Harpers, Scribners, and Century, came to day, and from the binders, and they filled quite a space in the library. I see the store biggest steer that the boys are going to ship to Chicago.

4 Sunday Was quiteowell all day, did not go to Sunday school. To night Mr. B told me to get ready to start to Coon Rapids Tuesday morning.

So I drove over to Sallie Phins Gusties & Bessie and told them, and made arrangements for May to stay with Bessie, and Gustie will come over and take care of the cream.

Dec 5 Monday. Been very very busy all day, packing

and getting things in shape. Mrs Armstrong and Luther called, also Mrs Coffey. We will stay with Sallie to night to be near the train.

6 Tuesday. Every child was up before us to go to the train with us, but just as we started it commenced to rain, and they had to stay. It rained in torrents, and the ground was a sheet of water when we got to Moran, and rained off and on, all day. We got breakfast and dinner in Cisco, and supper in Ft Worth, and Dr. A. Matthews at Worth.

7 Wednesday. We got our breakfast in Texarkana and laid over until two o'clock, per instruction from John Bartholomew, waiting for a pass, but it did not come. So we took the Leonorball and got to St Louis in time for our train the morning of the 8th. The Iron Mountain is a very rough road. We met Mr & Mrs Burns in St Louis, but had only a few minutes to talk with them.

Weather real cold, snow and ice hanging over the cars, and been riding through snow all day,

Dec 9 Friday Grand Union Hotel. Got here at 8:30 and could ^{not} get out to Bristol without some trouble, and getting in very late, so concluded to rest here. We have a very nice and comfortable room and the bed will catch me very soon.

10 Bristol. Got here at two o'clock, was delayed an hour and ^a half. First four miles out, found Harriet very weak, but no worse than we expected, and she did not seem excited as I feared she would. Slept better last night after our telegram came, than she had in a long time.

11 Sunday. But our trunk did not come and I did not go to church. Mr. B did. Lots of ice and snow and we think it real cold. Mrs Bowdy came to night to comb Harriets hair. She is the only person in town

who can do that job. So Heath thinks any how

Dec 12 Monday. We drove to the cemetery, and down town, and the air seemed very raw and sharp, and we both felt it pretty badly. Our trunk came to day.

13 Tuesday Last night we went over to Mrs J. H. Sutherland to see Tullie, she had just heard of our arrival, and was very glad to see us. She is the same old Tull, Mrs M is a very pleasant lady. Yesterday was bright, but is cloudy again to day. Last night we crossed down stairs, and slept in the parlor now, on a bed lounge, and have a fire in the mornings. It was too cold for our Southern blood upstairs in a cold room. The both caught cold Monday, and are not feeling very well to day. I ripped up and pressed my silk dress to day, to have it made over.

15 Thursday Miss Sikes, Bonnie and I, went through the spoon factory to day, and it was a sight worth seeing. Saw every thing from the raw material, to the plating, polishing, and boxing, and I bought a few pieces and wish I had brought more.

16 Friday To the day we three went to Hartford. Bonnie followed us around till after we got our dinner, then he quit us, and we didn't see him any more until we got home at four o'clock. We shot ped, and walked, and looked until we were tired out. Then we got a little tea in Brown & Thompson's restaurant, and went home.

17 Saturday. To day I was tired and did not go out. My things did not get in from H. till afternoon, and I was busy showing them to Harriet. She can't get out to see anything, and it does her good to see something near.

18 Sunday. Went to church this morning, and to A. J. Muzzis for dinner. Mr Charles and his wife there. Charlie looks about as usual, has the same old pained expression, that he wore when he left.

Texas, and suffering yet, with the same disease,

nobody knows what. He seemed very glad to see us. Mrs M had a number of friends to dinner & had a number of good things to eat also.

Dec 19

Monday. We went with Louise to the Methodist church class night, Nellie and the Muggies were with us, and we heard a good sermon by Dr. Prince.

This morning we made a lot of calls, and caught a fresh cold while we were at it, It seems very cold to us, although the people here don't seem to notice it, they call it fine.

20 Tues. This morning I went down to have my dress fitted, and in the afternoon we went to Polkville to see some of the fair, snow over everything, and cold of course. We had some splendid bears and geese at Harry Bartholomew's, and played a game of Hoo-
-ma or Hopity.

21 Wed. Went to Hartford again today, Miss Licks was going with me, but was sick and could not go. So my good husband took pity on me and went along. We got through in good season, and back to the depot in time to wait awhile, and while waiting I met Mrs. Heills, the lady I met at Heat Springs in Apr.

22 Thurs. We took the car with Mrs D A Matthews and Julie last night and spent the evening there. Had a very pleasant visit. To day I packed up our traps, and such an amount of things as went into that trunk, one would hardly believe

23 Friday. We left at 8 o'clock, and got here at noon, as soon as we got located in the hotel. Mr. B went down town to attend to some business, and I got out some fancy work and settled down, to try to keep warm and busy, and watch the continual stream of humanity going and coming, on the streets below.

Dec 24 Saturday. I intend going downtown to shop a

little, and look up a friend, but Mr B says it is too cold for one to get out, so I will settle again and go to work, and wait for 2 o'clock, then we will start for Texas in earnest. I will be glad to start, I am tired watching people rushing so much, like they did not have another day to live or was in great hurry to get in out of the cold.

I suppose it is because they are all in rush at the last moment preparing for Christmas



Albany Jan. 1st 1893

Sunday, A new date, and how odd it seems to write it, and how thankful I am to be spared to see another New Year. It has been a very pleasant day, sunny and beautiful, I went to Sabbath School, and took charge of my little class of boys, or rather of my big class of small boys. (twelve in all, but some were absent today) after a three weeks absence, on a visit to the frozen State of Coma.

Jan 2 Monday. Staid at home till late in the afternoon, then went over to see Uncle Ben, and the Coppers. Uncle was out for the first time in two weeks they said. The dog has been lovely. I printed some photographs this morning.

Jan 3 Tuesday. I cleaned silver this morning, and intended going to missionary meeting this afternoon, but was so tired that I thought the best missionary job that I could do, would be to stay at home and rest, and I did.

Jan 4 Wednesday. Susie and Will, and Mule and Walt were over and took dinner with us today. They are having their house changed, are not able to do any cooking at home. Had a nice visit with Sue and drove over to Ella's with her, Berthe and Gustie were over a little while, Martha came in the night.

Jan 5 Thursday. Ethel Mathews and Eugene Reynolds are both sick, and I was going to see them this afternoon. Went by Coppers to see Sallie Reynolds.

Jan 6 Fri. I spent the morning, and part of the afternoon at Sallie's. Ethel is better, and Eugene also. Went to Coppers, and Pius with mother and Ezra. Weather very pleasant.

Jan 7 Sat. Went to Sallie's and took some negatives of

the children this morning, and in the afternoon I took some of May and Georgia Coffey. I developed seven, and feel a little sore to night, as I worked out of doors, and there is quite a north wind.

8 Sun. Went to Sunday school, and to the Methodist church. Heard the Rev. Armstrong preach. Mother came home with me. Miss Mule, Suzzie and Joe M. came over and spent the day, and they frolicked till we didn't hear the train come, and missed the mail. And has been rather cool, but pleasant. Rev. Col. Armstrong came over this afternoon awhile.

9 Monday. Washed pictures all the morning, and took mother back to Sallie's this afternoon. Went to Mrs. McClellan's to pay a bill, and visited awhile, and called on Mrs. Ball on my ^{way} home. Poor lonely woman, husband away so much. It is bound to be a dreary life. I finished reading. A sweet girl graduate to night. That is four books this year.

Two of Miss Alcott. I love to read her works.

Prof. Hayes was over this afternoon, to consult Mr. B. about May's studies. Miss Spears has been insisting on her taking up some, that we thought useless. The day has been perfectly lovely, and I had a letter from my children to night.

10 Tuesday. Another beautiful day, I finished up my pictures this morning, and went to Sallie's this afternoon to see the new baby, that arrived about nine o'clock this morning. The children are delighted except Joe, he is disappointed because it is not a boy.

But Suzzie's arms are wide open to receive it. I left her rocking it. I called in to see Mrs. Burns on my way home. She looks badly, and Mr. Lee is sick.

11 Wednesday. Worked all day at pictures, and went to see Sallie just before night. Ethel is sick again to day. Heather still fine.

Feb 1st Yesterday was very warm, mercury reached 80,

but it went to 20 to day, and is snowing.
The 14th of last month, I went to Throckmorton,
on the back, facing a hard & cold north west wind,
got pretty well chilled and worn out.

Found David very sick, been sick a week with
high fever, and hung on until the 20th then he
could bear no more, and took his flight to that
Beautiful Home, where there is no more sickness.

But we miss the sweet child so very much
and can't help grieving some.

After he was dressed, I held him on my lap while
they fixed a place to lay him, and Fern came and
looked at him, and asked if he was well now, I told
her yes, but she could not understand it when we
put him in the casket. The dear little sister will
never know what she has lost.

Harriet B. died on the 23rd and the 25 I came
home, and staid one night, I hated so much to
leave the baby, and hated to go away again and
leave my husband, he was feeling so blue and
lonely, but felt that my children needed me most
just then, so I went back, just in time to see him
breathe his last. He laid him away on Friday, and
the next day I persuaded them to come home with
me, They were a little reluctant about it, as every
thing had gotten so behind hand, and run down
every way, but I knew they were worn out, and a few
days would not make much difference with the
work, and might make it a little easier for them
to bear when they went back, They went yesterday

Feb 2 Throldg, Thermometer at 14 this morning and the
ground white, but now 4 P.M. the snow is all gone
and mercury near 40, such sudden changes, are
enough to make one sick. May is under the weather
this week, and has not been to school since Monday.

I took a picture of the snakes to day, I was
not a bit well last night and this morning
or I should have tried to have gotten a sun
conpicture

Feb 3 Friday Pretty cold all day. wind sharp from

the north. I printed a few pictures this morning, and this afternoon I went over to see how Martha and Sally were getting on. Went over to Phineas and found him most sick with a mashed thumb, and Rosa was ready to start to my house, with her mother and Mrs Butler, to have some pictures taken, but I thought it was rather cold for out of door work, as I have no place for indoor posing.
I cut an apron to day, from the bazar,

4 Sat. Finished my apron to day, and washed out some pictures, and took a negative of Mrs Hadley Roberts baby. It is a ~~real~~ sweet little child. I got no Throckmorton mail to night, and feel a little disappointed, as I am quite anxious to hear from my children. We have had such bad weather since they left, and their home going will be so sad, I can't keep back the tears, when I think of the darling boy that is gone, although I know that he is safe, and free from all pain now.

5 Sunday, Dr H. Selland preached for us to day, a very good sermon, about the fulfillment of the prophecies. He and uncle Joe took dinner with us, and we had a pleasant visit. The wind has blown furiously all day, but not cold.

6 Mon. Went to church again last night - wind still going high. This morning was warm when we got up, but soon got freezing cold, temperature went up in the afternoon, but is cold again to night. I made a school apron for Lucy this afternoon, made a nice one for myself Saturday. Heard from my children to night, Fern sent me word, that she had some dishes & way, I have a cold to night and feel a little poorly from it.

7 Tuesdays Cold all day. At three o'clock it began to sleet, and kept it all the afternoon.
I worked on aprons all day. Have more cold and feel dull

Feb 8 Wednesday Cold, gloomy, and disagreeable, but

all over the ground, but moderated some to day,

I drove up to see Mrs. G. C. Armstrong this afternoon, I had to do something in self defense, & began to think that I would have a spell of blues.

I found her alone, and she said she was feeling just the same, almost persuaded to face the storm in sheer desperation, I had a pleasant visit.

Dr. Powell called in and spent a while with us

From there I went to Gastrie, and staid a few minutes, and then home. John is not well to day, and did not go to school. I am tired and ready to go to bed now, and it only half past seven.

9 Thursday Had a carpet taken up, and one room cleaned to day. It has not been very cold, but the wind has blown very hard. Bills took John home to day, he is not very sick, but did not feel like going school.

10 Frid. Rather a raw day, looked some like rain this mornin. I did a good deal of work in the kitchen this morning. Have a real strong girl, but I get terribly out done with her slovenliness.

Went to Sallie's this afternoon, She and another and Gastrie were busy sewing. Mrs. Bull created a sensation to day, by whipping Theo. Mack on the streets, I am ashamed of it, and sorry for both of them, May is at Mr. Dyer's to night, they are having a candy pull there.

11 Sat. Finished another apron this morning. In the afternoon, I printed a few pictures, when I could get a little sunshine, which came at rare intervals. It has been raining, sleetting and shining all day. I went over to Coffey's to see uncle Ben, he looks very feeble. Had some callers while I was away, of course.
