Col E.W. Taylor, Commander R.E.Camp Fort Worth: Your committee appointed to draft suitable memorial on the death of our late comrade James T. Townsend would show : That he was born in Logan county Kentucky in 1844 and enlisted at Russellville that state in 1861 at the tender age of 17th years under that famous cavalry leader John H. Morgan and was attached to the 2nd Kentucky under then Col Basil Ducke.

He participated in the various adventures by flood and field of this celebrated confederate regiment of cavalry following it in the Ohio campaign under the chavalrous Morgan and was captured at the same time he was in July 1863 and came near being executed as a spy because in trying to evade being made a prisoner he incautiously put on citizen's sait over his confederate uniform . His captors carried him to Louis ville and to save being hung as a spy his father, who came to his aid. executed with other citizens a heavy bond and the subject of this sketch was required to take the oath of allegiance to the Lincoln government and was placed under strict survilliance till near the end of the war when he eluded his captors and was preparing to come South with a party of Confederates when the surrnder of Lee occurred which ended his event

In 1867 he came with his poeple to Fort Worth from Kentucky and cast his lot with us as one of our best known citizens of the olden days of the infant city and has ever been foremost in forwarding the interest of our city in making a mark as a careful and conscientious good and law abiding member of our community.

Up to the last moment he acted this p part and died an ideal death, literally in the harness of duty. On wednes day the 23rd day of May 1906 he was serving as a juryman in our district court in an important case on tradl and that night when he went home was taken with an affection of the heart so that he was compeled to let the court know next mor ging that he court hot finish his duty as jury and by noomthat day on the the hay of May he, after a few moments of suffering passed to the great beyond.

Therefore resolved that in the loss of our kind-good comrade we are deeply sensible of a bereatement which we bear in common with his family with true Christian resignation. Resolved further that they have out most heartful condolence and can but look to a sorce higher than we for solace in this hour of deepest distress. 7.1 Primm


