TEXAS TECHNOLOGICAL COLLEGE Welcomes You To JONES STADIUM

Texas Technological College was founded in 1925 as a co-educational institution by the 38th State Legislature of Texas.

The main campus occupies 300 acres, while the remainder of the 2,008 acres is used by the Division of Agriculture for research and experimentation. Permanent buildings — valued at more than 20 million dollars — have been designed in the Span-

ish Renaissance motif and include the Administration Building and structure for Agriculture, Home Economics, Journalism, Music, Chemistry, Science, Agricultural Engineering, Veterinary Science, Petroleum Engineering, The Museum, The Library, and Electrical Industrial and Architectural Engineering, and Civil and Mechanical Engineering.

Other permanent type campus buildings include the Gymnasium, Stock-Judging Pavilion, Beef-Cattle Pavilion, Bookstore, eight dormitories, Extension Division, Home Management Home, Speech, and Jones Stadium, and a number of temporary buildings. A new \$542,000 Student Union Building was opened officially April 12, 1953.

Recent athletic plant expansion, completed and planned, includes: a 9-lane cinder track and a practice football field, finished this summer; a coliseum seating 10,000 for basketball, begun by the City of Lubbock; a baseball diamond, already started; a million dollar gymnasium for men, with a 50-meter swimming pool, a women's gymnasium, and tennis courts, authorized this year by the Board of Directors.

Research programs are included in Tech's over-all program. Tech is the head-quarters and has the fibers branch of the Cotton Research Committee of Texas. Beef cattle feeding formulas, fertilizers, and insect control are also studied. Since the beginning of Tech's Doctoral Program, other research activities are being undertaken in the fields of geology, chemistry, history, English, government, psychology, and education.

Students at Tech are offered training in fields varying from Textile Engineering to Music Theory. The college is divided into six academic divisions: Agriculture, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Engineering, Home Economics, and Graduate Studies.

The students are offered training in Air Force, Infantry, Engineers, Signal Corps branches of ROTC on the campus. Upon graduation, and the completion of an ROTC course of study, the student receives a reserve commission as a second lieutenant in his respective branch of the service.

According to official files, more than 52,000 people have attended or graduated from Tech. The enrollment grew from 1,043 in 1925 to 6,274 in 1953-54. Men outnumber women on the campus three to one.

The government of Texas Tech is vested in a board of nine directors, appointed by the governor for six-year terms. The administration is made up of Dr. E. N. Jones, Tech's sixth president; two vice presidents, Dr. G. E. Giesecke, who is in charge of academic administration, and Marshall L. Pennington, vice president and comptroller; and a council of deans, one from each of the six divisions.

Besides Chairman Charles C. Thompson of Colorado City, board members include Thomas F. Abbott, Jr. of Fort Worth, George E. Benson of Lubbock, W. H. Francis, Jr., of Houston, C. T. McLaughlin of Snyder, Fred H. Moore of Dallas, Raymond Pfluger of Eden, Robert B. Price of El Paso, and W. D. Watkins of Abilene.

RED RAIDER CAPTAINS . . .

JERRY JOHNSON (16) — 175, 510, 20, 3L., Sr., Hale Center—Seeking his fourth Red Raider letter, Johnson already holds the school's record for total offense, 1027 yards gained in 1952. Johnson lettered four years in basketball and football at Hale Center, making all-regional in both for two seasons. Played considerably as a freshman at Tech, throwing tie-breaking touchdown pass in Sun Bowl against College of Pacific. Johnson's long passes broke open the Tulsa game last fall, and his field generalship and running pulled the Raiders out of danger in the Houston contest. Gaining 266 yards rushing and 428 passing, Johnson's 694 of total offense was second only to Boby Cavazos' total last fall. His 47-yard punt return against Auburn is a Gator Bowl record. Majoring in physical education.

HOWARD HURT (63)—205, 6-0, 24, 1L, Sr., Borger—Like predecessor Don Gray as left guard and co-captain, Hurt is a veteran of Korean fighting and oldest

man on team. Hurt made second team all-state for Borger High in 1947, enrolled at Texas University and lettered there in '49. He withdrew to enter Marines and served in Korea. Upon discharge last summer, he decided to go to college closer to home and enrolled at Tech to study geology. Was a mainstay for Tech's "shock troops," as the No. 2 unit called themselves, last fall and had a lot to do with slowing down Auburn's offensive in the Gator Bowl.

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DeWitt T. Weaver ... Tech Athletic Program

In his first three years as a head coach, DeWitt T. Weaver guided the Texas Tech Red Raiders to two Border Conference championships and a pair of bowl triumphs, and has been elected conference "coach of the year" twice. In addition, following the Red Raiders' 1953 season he was chosen "Southwesterner of the Year" by the Texas Sports Writers Association.

Weaver came to Tech in February, 1951, following two seasons as associate coach in charge of the line at the University of Tulsa. Previous coaching experience for the former University of Tennessee guard and captain (1936) was as an assistant at Tennessee, Centre, and Mississippi State. Weaver was born in Nashville, Tennessee, in 1912 but spent most of his early days in Jacksonville, Florida, scene of Tech's January 1 Gator Bowl triumph over Auburn.

Coach and Mrs. Weaver, the former Mary Sheffield

of Jacksonville, are the parents of a daughter Kitty, 12, and a son DeWitt, Jr., 15.

Recent developments in Texas Tech's athletic program are mentioned on the opening page of this program. An idea of the scope of the athletic set-up Weaver directs is given by a listing of the duties of the coaches pictured on the following page.

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

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TONIGHT'S GAME . . .

Texas Tech is host tonight to its nearest collegiate grid neighbor.

President of West Texas State is Dr. J. P. Cornette, who came to that post in 1948. He, like Dr. E. N. Jones, Texas Tech's president, is a former dean at Baylor University.

Under Dr. Cornette's administration West Texas State has expanded its physical plant as well as its curriculum. Last fall more than 2,300 students studied on the Canyon campus and at the Amarillo center. Within the past three years a new Student Union addition to the cafeteria has been completed, a new field house and a new library are in use, improvements have been made in the Administration building, new tennis courts have been built, and two additions are now being made on men's and women's dormitories. Degrees are offered in 30 areas of study.

Fans tonight will see a young team with spirit sharply coached by a veteran mentor, Frank Kimbrough. Scouts say that despite the Buffaloes' 19-18 loss to McMurry last week, West Texas State is stronger than last season. With Bubba Hillman directing a passing attack against Tech's untried aerial defense, the Buffs' are capable of providing stiff competition.

Like Tech, the Buffaloes will use a two-team system, substituting complete units at regular intervals. West Texas will use mainly the Chicago Beartype T formation.

Watch closely this year's edition of Buffaloes. Kimbrough is building in much the same way he did for the 1950 powerhouse that defeated Tech 28-13. His starting team is liberally sprinkled with sophomores who are likely to be Border Conference contenders in a year or two.

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
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
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
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BASKETBALL


