MINUTES OF MEETING OF REPRESENTATIVES

The following representatives of the institutions of the Southwest met at the Oriental Hotel in Dallas, Texas, Wednesday May 6th, 1914, for the purpose of considering the formation of a Southwest Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

C. A. Gantt, S. R. Spencer-Baylor University; Ben Owen--University of Oklahoma;
J. C. Snipes--Southwestern University; John Corbett--Oklahoma A. & M. College; R. J. Potts-Texas A. & M. College; T. W. Atkinson, J. B. Broussard--Louisiana State University; D. K. Saddler, R. J. Nelson--University of Arkansas; W. T. Mather, L. Theo. Bellmont---University of Texas.

T. W. Atkinson was selected Chairman and L. Theo. Bellmont, Secretary-Treasurer of the temporary organization.

As a basis for discussion, a Constitution, By-laws and Eligibility was presented, carefully studied and changes made.

A motion was made and adopted that a Southwest Intercollegiate Athletic Conference be formed of the institutions represented that can play under the letter of the rules. Mather, Owen and Atkinson were appointed as a committee to work with the Missouri Valley Conference and the South Intercollegiate Athletic Association to the end of framing a uniform summer baseball rule to govern the institutions of the Missouri Valley Conference, the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association and the proposed Southwest Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

Corbett and Bellmont were appointed as a committee to suggest rules to govern the track meet of the Conference.

The Secretary was instructed to report the proceedings of the meeting to the institutions not represented.

A motion was made and adopted that the temporary organization be continued until the next meeting in December.

It was voted that the next meeting of the Conference be held in Houston the second Tuesday in December and that the expenses of all representatives at the Houston meeting be pooled.

Meeting adjourned.

It was voted to make effective at once the graduate rule to reads as follows: "No man who has taken a degree from a college of standard rank shall be permitted to participate in intercollegiate, athletic contests.

MINUTES OF SECOND METTING OF REPRESENTATIVES OF EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS INTERESTED IN THE FORMATION OF A SOUTHWEST INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE.

December 8,1914

The second meeting of the representatives of the educational institutions of the Southwest interested in the formation of a Southwest Intercollegiate Athletic Conference was held at the Rice Hotel, Houston, Texas, December 8, 1914, with the following present:

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Upon motion, it was voted to make effective January, 1, 1916, the three year rule.

It was voted that the Summer Base Ball Rule shall read as follows: "No Student

John Corbett, as Chairman of the Track Committee reported progress and was granted time in which to arrange the track events.

It was voted that the first annual track meet be held in Austin, Texas, the second Friday in May, following a cordial invitation given by the University of Texas to hold the meet in that city.

The Secretary-Treasurer was instructed to draw on each member of the Conference for the annual dues.

The secretary-Treasurer was further instructed to have the rules printed in plamphlet form and the eligibility blanks prepared.

Meeting adjourned.

MINUTES OF THE FIRST ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SOUTHWEST INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE.

Held at the University Y. M. C. A. Building, Austin, Texas, May 14, 1915.

The meeting was called to order by President W. T. Mather, with the following representatives present:

Baylor University, Henry Trantham; C.A.

Gant. Southwestern University; R. W. Tinsley,
University of Oklahoma; R. G. Soutar; Rice
Institute, P. H. Arbuckle; University of
Texas, W. T. Mather.

The minutes as read were approved, the constitution, by-laws and amendments were gone over carefully and the wording in certain instances changed, the object being for greater ease in interpretation.

It was moved and seconded that it is the sense of the conference that the foot-bal training camps shall be held at the place where the institution is located and shall not open earlier than 10 days before the beginning of the annual session of that institution. Definite action was postponed until the following afternoon.

The intercollegiate rules for basketball were adopted by vote of the members.

The conference by vote, gave instructions that the following clause be added to the eligibility blanks-"This card does not refer to scholarship eligibility".

The secretary was instructed to write the authorities at Southern Methodist University in reference to their control of the athletics of the institution, certain questions having arisen in reference to it.

It was voted that Rule 14 of the rules of eligibility shall read as follows:

CONDUCT OF COACHES AND PLAYERS

ON THE FIELD.

"Any player, coach or trainer using insuling language to a player or an official in any intercollegiate contest shall be immediately required to leave the grounds; either the umpire or the referee shall enforce this penalty.".

The matter of location of the track meet for 1916 was ordered postponed until the following afternoon.

The following officers were elected; A. C. Love, Texas A. & M. president; Ben Owen, University of Oklahoma, Vice-President; P.H. Arbuckle, Rice Institute, secretary-treasurer. The motion was made, seconded and carried unanimously that a vote of thanks for most efficient service rendered be extended to Dr. W. T. Mather, the first president of the Conference.

The meeting was adjourned to meet the following afternoon:

The conference reconvened in the Y. M. C. A. building at 5 p. m., with the new president in the chair.

Moved by W. T. Mather, of the University of Texas, seconded by C. A. Gantt, of Baylor University and duly carried that Article XV of the By-laws read as follows:

ARTICLE XV. CONDUCT OF PLAYERS, COACHES OR TRAINERS OF THE FIELD.

"Any player, coach or trainer using insulting language to a player, or official in any intercollegiate contest shall be required immediately to leave the grounds on which the contest is being held. The umpire or referee shall enforce this penalty".

University, seconded by W. T. Mather, of the University of Texas and duly carried, that Article KIII of the By-laws read as follows:

ARTICLE XIII. SUMMER TRAINING CAMP

"No Institution shall maintain a summer training camp except on its home grounds, and such a camp shall not commence more than ten days prior to the opening of the annual session of that institution".

Moved by W. T. Mather, of the University of Texas, seconded by C. A. Cantt, of Baylor University and duly carried, that

the president of the conference and secretary be instructed to re-arrange the rules, etc., of the constitution and by-laws in logical order as they see fit.

Moved by C. A. Gantt, seconded by R. G. Suter, of Oklahoma University and duly carried that the next annual track meet be held at Kyle Field at the A. & M. College of Texas.

On Motion of W. T. Mather, of the Unixersity of Texas, seconded by R. G. Saton, of Oklahoma University and duly carried, that a committee composed of the President, the secretary and the representative from Oklahoma University be a committee to recommend rules for the track.

Moved by W. T. Mather, of the University of Texas, seconded by R. G. Seton, of the University of Oklahoma and duly carried that the results of the track meet are now final and that the points brought up by Mr. Freeland, referee of the track meet, with reference to Isaacs of Baylor University and Inderson of Oklahoma University be not considered.

Moved by R. G. Satton, of Oklahoma University, seconded by P. H. Arbuckle, of Rice Institute and duly carried that a vote of thanks be extended the University of Texas and the officials of the track meet for the manner in which the meet had been conducted.

Moved by W. T. Mather, of the University of Texas, seconded by P. H. Arbuckle, of the Rice Institute and duly carried that Mr. Treeland, be tendered a vote of thanks for

the manner in which he officiated in the track meet today. The conference adjourned. President. The result of the main vote taken on the time of operation of the graduate rule was 5-2 in favor of suspension of rule until January 1, 1916.

meeting of December 11, 1915.

The meeting of the Southwest Intercollegiate Athletic Conference called by President A. C. Love, convened at the Oriental Hotel, Dallas, Texas, December 11th, 1915, with President Love in the Chair.

The members were represented by the following: Oklahoma A. & M. College, by Mr. Gallagher; Texas A. & M. College, by Mr. Love; Baylor University, by Mr. Trantham; Hice Institute by Mr. Rice Institute, by Mr. Arbuckle; Southwestern University, by Mr. Tinsley; University of Arkansas, by Mr. McConnell; University ;University of of Oklahoma, Texas. by Mr. Mather.

> Others present were Mr. Disch, Mr. Bellmont of the University of Texas, Mr. Rix of the Southwestern University, Mr. Wantt of Baylor University, Mr. Priver of Texas A. & M., Mr. Gumm Texas Christian University Mr. Newton, Trinity University, Mr. Cashion and Mr. Allen of Austin College, Mr. Martin Simmons College and Mr. Ferry of Daniel Baker College.

The representatives from University of Texas, University of Arkansas and Aice Institute were voted to constitute the Committee on Appeals.

It was voted that the S. I. A. C., become a member of the National Collegiate Association and the Secretary was instructed to draw on the treasury for membership fees. .

The motion was made and seconded that the date of the annual meeting of the S.I. A.C., be changed from the May date to the first Saturday in December, and that the

final vote be taken at the annual meeting in accordance with the Constitution. The Secretary was instructed to send notices of this change to the members. Motion carried.

It was decided that the matter of rules for wrestling should rightly be taken up by the Conference. It was moved and seconded that A. A. U., rules be adopted by Conference, these to be amended to read that the number of events and classification be a matter of arrangement between the Institutions conducting the contest. Motion carried.

By vote of the Conference, the President and the Secretary were instructed to draft a rule to govern cases where eligibility blanks are not submitted, or dues or fees are not paid -- these being infractions of the rules. This rule when formulated is to be presented to the members of the Conference by mail vote. Carried.

Testimony in the case of Leverett of the University of Arkansas who had played professional baseball in Arkansas was then taken up. It was decided that he had played on a team working under the National Association, thereby violating the rules of the Conference and therefore he must be declared ineligible for competition in the Conference.

Dr. Mather of the University of Texas expressed a desire that the Conference receive regrets of the University of Texas in regard to the Bailey baseball case. It was moved and seconded that the University of Texas be complete exonerated from all blame in the Bailey case. Carried.

The Conference voted that no conditional examinations be allowed. This to be covered

section 2, Rule III of the Rules of Eligibility.

The Section covering withdrawal from school because of sickness either personal or in the immediate family was interpreted as follows:

"In case of withdrawal for sickness, the student so withdrawing must take the examinations for the term during which he withdrew before becoming eligible for competition". Carried.

It was moved and seconded that any student who has played on preparatory team after the thirty day restricted period of 1915 be ineligible for competition during the season of 1916. Carried.

3 p. m.

Adjourned meeting called to order by President Love.

President Love read communication signed by Lionel Moise to football officials of the State attempting to organize for the purpose of raising prices for services. It was agreed upon by the members that the old scale of prices should prevail.

Moved by Tinsley, seconded by Bellmont and duly carried that with men entering college with minimum requirement for Freshman class, but taking some special course shall be permitted to participate in Intercollegiate Athletics under the rules of the S. I. A. C. It shall be understood that the same regulations in reference to the competition of Freshman shall exist under these conditions. Motion to adjourn carried.

The second Annual meeting of the Southwest Intercollegiate Conference convened in legents Building, Texas A. & M. College, College Station, Texas, May 13th 1916, with President A. C. Love in the chair. The representatives present were:

The minutes as read were approved.

The Committee on track was held over to act through 1916-17 and the members were requested to act in conjunction with the similar committee from the Texas Inter-Collegiate Association. This committee consists of the representatives from Texas A. & M. University of Texas, Univ. of Oklahoma, Rice Institute.

Mr. Trantham of Baylor University presented the facts in reference to the Stonerod case and this report was accepted by the Conference. The request was made of Mr. Trantham that the official statement be sent to the Secretary to be incorporated in the minutes. Moved by Mather, seconded by Marinoni.

Mr. Marinoni of the University of Arkansas presented the case of Mr. Ellison who had played baseball with the Univ. of Arkansas against a team outside of the Conference. A letter from President Fu-

trell was read by Mr. Marinoni in which these facts were stated. Tinsley moved that the report be accepted. Mather seconded. Motion carried.

Mr. Merinoni moved that Article VII of Constitution be changed to include games with all organizations -- this to be presented at the December meeting. Seconded by Mather. Carried.

Amendment to Rule IV, Section 3, Rules of Eligibility Section 4. For the enforcement of the above scholarship qualifications reports on the scholarship be submitted every two weeks by the instructors and lists of eligible men be furnished other teams bi-monthly Hoved by Bellmont. Seconded by Tranthan. Carried.

The matter of eligibility of Mr. slabest of the University of Ohl home was said to be a gym assistant at the University. This case was presented by Dr. Mather, Univ. of exas. A ruling being asked for, the Chair ruled that Mr. Slaback was ineligible, having received pay for assisting in athletics. Mesults of his competition will stand as no protest was filed prior to the holding of the contests.

Protest filed against Mr. Miler, who had attended Central State Normal School, was disallowed as the school from which he transferred to Oklahoma Uni. did not grant degrees.

Mather moved, Tinsley seconded that the eligibility blanks of the Uni. of Oklahoma be accepted. Carried.

Mather moved, Marinoni seconded that the President of the Conference write to the President of the Unit of Oklahoma in reference to the continued dilinguency on the part of the University athletic authorities and asking that he part is being account to the part of

member of the Faculty be selected by him to attend to the submission of cards, lists and other details.

Love moved. Marinoni seconded that in accordance with the letter sent to the members of the Conference on March 8th. 1916. by A.C. Love and in accordance with the understanding at the called meeting of the Conference at Dallas. December last, the date of the annual meeting as provided for in Article VIII of the Constitution be changed to Thursday after Mil the first Monday in December of each year and that the meetings be held in the City off Dallas. Texas. This change making said Article VIII read as follows: The Annual Meeting of this Conference shall be held in the City of Dallas, Texas, on Thursday following the first Monday in December of each year at such hour and place as the President shall designate! Carried.

Love moved, Soutar seconded that in accordance with the letter sent to the members of the Conference on March 8th, 1916, by 4.

C. Love (which said letter is in accordance with Article XI of the Constitution of the Southwest Intercollegiate Athletic Conference) the word "Intercollegiate" be stricken from Article I of the Constitution and that the Conference shall hereafter be known as the Southwest Athletic Conference. Carried.

Love moved, Tranthan seconded, that students that are members of the National Guard and have been called for service before the end of 1915-16 session shall not be ineligible because of the leaving school before the close of the session, provided the passing the required number of hours at the time of leaving . Carried.

Love moved, Tinsley seconded that the Secretary be instructed to have the minutes of this meeting and the records made at this track meet and the first i track meet printed on a sheet or sheets the same size as

ber be mailed a number of copies of same. Carried.

Love moved, Marinoni seconded that Article V of the By-laws of this Conference be amended by the addition of the following as Section 2: Section 2. Each member of this Conference shall keep a complete record of the students who participate in each game, and at the onlof each planing season, shall send to the Secretary of the Conference a list of said players, showing which sport said student took part. Carried.

Loved moved, Tinsley seconded that the secretary be instructed and is hereby authorized to purchase such office furniture as may be necessary for the proper filing of the lists of players and of the eligibility cards of each sport. The President is hereby instructed to send all eligibility cards to the Secretary for filing at the close of the playing season of each sport. Carried.

Love moved, Arbuckle seconded that the following words be added to the section numbered 11 on the climbility card: "Do you hold a degree from any college or university?

What College or University?

Carried.

Love moved that Rule 1 of the rules of Bligibility be amended by adding the following as Section 2:

Section . "No student, otherwise eligible shall be allowed to participate in the intercollegiate contests in more than two sports in any one college year."

Motion failed for want of a second. It was moved, seconded and carried that it is

Southwest conference is not ready for the mmediate operation of the two-sport rule.

The request was made that the students that enter the A. & M. College of Texas in Septembe, 1915, in the two year courses offered by that institution, be made eligible under the rules of the Conference. Mr. Marinoni moved that this motion be submitted to a mailed vote. Tranthan seconded. Carried.

Dr. Mather moved that the president and the secretary of this conference meet with the president and secretary of the Texas Intercollegiate association in an effort to combine the two organizations. Seconded by Tinsley. Carried.

Dr. Mather moved that a conference tennis meet be instituted, proper rules formulated, with suitable awards to be given by the conference. This work to be left in the hands of committee to be selected by the president. Tinsley seconded.

Dr. Mather moved that a tennis committee be selected by the president. Tinsley seconded. Carried. The president appointed on this committee, the representatives from Toxas, Southwestern University, Baylor and Oklahoma University. The location of the first meet was to be determined by the committee.

The Rodman ducertien was adopted as the official discus of the Southwestern conference competition. Mather moved. Soutar seconded. Carried.

Dr. Mather moved that the javelin be substitued for the hammer in all conference meets. Tinsley seconded. Carried.

Dr. Mather moved that the baseball coaches shall be restrained from going less than 10 feet from the base lines. Soutar seconded.

Dr. Mather moved that a committee from the conference be selected to draw up a blank, containing data pertaining to the past athletic career of the conference. This certified list to be sent to other schools. Tranthem seconded.

Bollmont move, Soutar seconded, hat the operation of the Preshman rule of the conference as to dice Institute and wouthwestern University be deferred until the male enrollment of these institutions shall be 400, at which time all rules of the Conference shall apply. Carried.

The invitation extended by the University of Oklahoma to hold the Conference Tract meet at Norman, Okla. in 1917 was accepted. Belmont moved. Marinoni seconded. Carried.

President J. C. Futrell was elected president of the conference; Mr. Henry Trantham, Vice President: P. H. Arbuckle, Sec-treasurer.

The committee on appeals was voted to consist of the following: A. O. Love; R.G. Souter; A. D. Linsley.

Bellmont moved that a vote of thanks be extended to President Bizzell for the cordial hospitality extended by the authorities at A. & M. College.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Southwest Athletic Association Held at Dallas, Texas, Dec. 7, 1916.

The annual meeting of the Faculty representatives of the Southwest Athletic Conference was held in the Adolphus hotel at Dallas, Texas, on Dec. 7, 1916. The meeting was called to order at 10 a. m. by President J. C. Futrall of the University of Arkansas.

Members had been furnished copies of the last meeting. These were adopted without being read in conference. All members of the conference paid their annual dues of \$10.00 which entitled them to participate in the meeting.

The first business presented was a petition by A. P. Mays to be reinstated as an amateur after playing two games of baseball with the Corsicanna team, a team recognized by the National League. The case of R. L. Moses was also presented to the Conference, it being similar to that of Mays except that Moses played with a professional team under an assumed name before entering college. After considering these cases carefully, a motion was made to reinstate the two men. Carried.

REPORT

At the meeting of the Conference members held last spring at College Station, the representatives of Texas University was appointed to suggest a policy of conducting an annual tournament between the members of the conference. The place of meeting during the 1916-17 season has already been determined, the Conference accepting the invitation of the University of Texas to conduct the match in Austin this season:

The eligibility rules of the southwest Conference to be enforced.

The time for the annual tournament to be the third week in May.

The place of meeting to be the Conference members. The teams to restricted to four players.

Contests to be conducted in singles and doubles. Contests to be eliminative. Each player or pair drawing for place.

The Institutions entertaining the meet to provide courts, new balls and nets.

The Conference to provide two silver cups to be awarded to the Institution winning in singles and doubles, and three gold medals for the individual winners and three silver medals for the runners-up. Each competitor's name shall be written on a separate card or paper and placed in a bowl or hat, drawn out at random and copied on a list in the order in which they have been drawn. The way this is done is to draw the names from a hat as usual and if two players of the same college or school are drawn in the first or second round the name of the second is put back into the hat and another name drawn. This is repeated until the first two rounds are all

The institution enteraining the meet shall select the officials which however, must be satisfactory to all the schools entering teams.

The question of the time that the Conference members would be allowed to begin training for foot ball was discussed. The following motion was passed as representing the sentiment of the Conference: No training will be permitted by Conference members before September 15, The Conference also expressed its disapproval of the practice of soliciting attendance of high school athletics on account of their othletic proficiency

by passing the following motion: "The Conference expresses its disapproval of officers of an institution either Faculty members or Coach, soliciting high school athletes to attend their Gollege or University."

The following motions were passed with reference to the eligibility card, constitution, etc. Moved that two questions be added to the eligibility card, (1) What was the normal number of hours required in your class and course during your last semester in attendance? (2) In how many of these hours did you pass at the time you took the work in class? (3) It was also moved that the entire constitution, eligibility card and by-laws be revised by the Secretary and that 1000 copies of the constitution and by-laws be printed and distributed to the members.

Moved to authorize the following committee to supply to the office of the President a form for members to use in reporting lists of eligible players to other members, also a form to be used by all members in reporting to the Secretary certain information concerning each member of a team at the end of each playing season. The following committee was named. Mather, Tinsley, and Love. Upon receipt of the report the President is to submit same to a mail vote.

The President appointed the following committee on appeals- Mather of Texas University, Trantham of Baylor, Owen of Oklahoma University.

The committee on track rules was continued and requested to report to the President's office as soon as possible. The President was authorized to submit the report to a mail vote as soon as received.

Motion was made and passed permitting high school graduates now enlisted with national guard to count a year's residence with an institution provided they

are mustered out in time to spend approximately one half year in the institution. Motion to allow students from Junior Colleges entering instution of the Conference higher than Freshman classto participate in athletic was lost. A motion extending the privilege of playing Freshman to members of the Conference where the enrollment of male students in regular college classes is under 400 carried. The above motion has reference to the four college classes.

The Conference moved to reconsider the vote taken earlier in the day regarding the suspension of May Moses. Motion to reconsider Carried. The discussion of these cases showed that neither player accepted any money and apparently both were ignorent of any prohibitory rules at the time they played. After considerable discussion a Motion was passed to reinstate the two debarred members. The discussion led up to the following motion which was passed: Moved that all such petitions (petitions of May and Moses) be referred to a special committee for each case by July 1 and that this committee be authorized to investigate and report its findings at the next annual meeting."

Minutes Of The Annual Meeting Of The Southwest Conference Held at the Adolphus Hotel at Dallas Texas on December 6th 1919.

The meeting was called to order by the President Mr.J.C. Futrall and it was found that there were members present. Okla.U. being the only member absent.

The meeting was called to a halt in order to collect the Annual Dues of ten dollars from each member present. This was done and the following schools paid their Annual Dues;—Arkansas University, Texas University, Baylor University, Oklahoma A.& M. College, Texas A.&.M. College, and Rice Institute. Rice Institute was not a member at this time but paid their dues so they could vote after their petition had been acted upon.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

There was no old business to be brought up at that time.

Next came the report of the Committee on time participation blanks and Mr.A.C.Love gave the report. The report was not as full as it should have been on account of the me mbers of the Committee not knowing that they were to act. It was then moved and second that the above Committee be continued and that Dr. Bantel representing the University of Texas be substituted for Dr. Mather, who represented Texas University last year, and the Mr.E.C. Gallagher of Oklahoma A.& M. College take the place, of Mr. Tinsley on the committee; and it was further stated that it be the sense of the meeting that each member of the Conference supply each other member with a copy of the list of men who rep resented their institution during the season in athletics. A copy of this list was to be sent to the Secretary of the Conference for record in the conference files.

Mr Love of Texas A.& M. College asked to make some explanation in the case of Mr Warren Collins a student of his institution. He made a lengthy talk and was followed by Dr. Bantel of Texas University and then was he in turn was followed by Mr. Bellmont formerly of Theas University. After considera ble discussion it was voted by the Conference to close the matter under discussion.

It was decided at this time if Rica Institute was to take part in the meeting she should be elected to membership. This was done why an unanimous vote.

It was moved and seconded that Rule 6 Section Lword "three", on line four be changed to "four", and that the last sentence of the rule be struck out and that the word "three" in line six be changed to "four". Motion Carried.

It was moved and seconded that Sec.1
ArAtcle 5, page 7, be dropped from the rules and that we eliminate section Article 5, and that we furnish list of the men who are elibible to compete in a thletics to the other schools bi-monthly. Carried.

The President instructed the Secretar y to make a note in the minutes that the Freshman Rule had been dropped. This was the result of a mail vote of the conference taken in the Summer of 1917. It was also voted by the conference to allow freshmen participating in war times four full years of participation.

It was moved by Mr. Bantel and seconded by another member that the following resolution be added to the minutes. Resolved that the students who participated on track athletics during the second of 1916-17 and no other form of Intercollegiate Athletics in that year shall not have such participation counted as one year. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded and carried

that a new rule known as 4 B, be added to the By-Laws; as follows:

4 B. Students who have left any institution of this conference to enter the war service of the United States Government shall upon their return be eligible for athletic competition just as if they had been in the institution during the time of their war service, provided that this section shall not operate in any way to shorted their time of residence necessary of to remove scholarship disabilities. The residence mentioned above has to do with the transfers from one school to another.

The following proposed changes to the Sonstitution and By-Laws of the Southwest Conference were submitted and in accordance with the requirements of the constitution were laid upon the table to be acted upon at the next regular meeting of the Conference.

Constitution, Art.9, Sec.1: Change this section to read as follows; "At all meetings of the Conference each institution shall be represented by one delegate, who shall be a regular member of the faculty of the institution he represents".

Constitution, Art.ll Amend this article by adding the following—"Provided that the proposed changes in the constitution may be acted upon at any time or meeting of the conference without thirty days notice if such notice is waived in writing by all members of the conference."

It was moved and seconded to add the following resolution: to the meeting "Resolved that this Conference dissaproves of all athletic practice and instruction of athletic teams on the Sabbath." Motion lost tie vote.

Art.17 By-Laws page 12. Change this article to read as follows; "All basketball games between members of this conference shall be under the rules adopted by the National Commettee and all track meets shall be under the rules of the American Athletic Union, except as provided for in the By-Laws of this Conference

The Secretarywas instructed to send a copy of the minutes of this meeting to each member of the conference.

It was moved and seconded and carried that if a man be dropped from an institution on account of scholastic deficiency, he shall not be eligible to compete in athletics, until he shall have completed one full years work passing in two thirds of the work taken. Carried Unanimously.

It was moved and seconded that the incoming President be a committee of one to investigate to the matter of Oklahoma U. starting football practice earlier than the timm set by rules of this conference, and that if such charge was found to be correct he was to call the matter to the attention of the President of Oklahoma University.

The Treasurers report was then read and accepted by the conference.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

The year just closed has not been devoid of interest in the realm of inter-collegiate athletics. The special problems incident to the mobilization of college men for military service and the conduct of athletics in the S. A. T. C. have been successfully met, mainly by the ingenuity of the regularly constituted authorities of the several institutions of the Conference. The dislocation of schedules occasioned by military orders presented a peculiar situation, which was accepted by the institutions in a spirit of accommodation and good fellowship. The policy of the Conference has been to maintain existing standards of sport as far as possible under the changing conditions and to observe as far as practicable existing regulations and agreements.

Certain changes in the rules, however, have been

First. This year, as last, Freshmen have been admitted to participation in all inter-collegiate sports.

Second. For the accommodation of discharged soldiers and sailors the term of service in the army o or navy has been accepted in lien of actual residence in college as contributing towards athletic eligibility.

Third. Since the establishment of the S. A. T. C. the thirty day Rule has been suspended, in so far as it may affect S. A. T. C. students.

Upon complaint of a member the President conducted an investigation of certain alleged irregularities in connection with the conduct of the annual track meet held at Norman, Oklahoma on May 11th last. It was established first, that two events- viz., the pole vault and the broad jump- were conducted in a manner at variance with the published regulations of the Conference: and secondly, that four places were awarded to contestants in all events, instead of three, as provided by the rules of the Conference. The President, therefore, declared the pole vault and the broad jump to be entitled to no award, and recognized only first, second and third places in the other events. On appeal of the University of Oklahoma the matter was referred to the Committee on Appeals, which unanimously sustained the decision of the President.

An interesting question was presented in the case of Knox Williams, a student of the University of Texas. After completing his Freshman year he returned to college and remained until shortly after Christmas, when he was forced to withdraw from school on account of illness. In the following autumn he returned once more to the University, ohly to find that he could not at that time find work leading to his degree. Being prevented by financial considerations from remaining in school merely for the purpose of maintaining athletic

eligibility, he withdrew until the spring semester following, when he applied for permission to play base-ball. The request was granted on the ground that the student had shown a willingness to comply fully with the conditions imposed by the Conference; that he had acted in good faith throughout; and that the burden of providing profitable scholastic work rested upon the University. Moreover, the President felt justified in acceding to the request on the further ground that the Freshman rule had been suspended in the meantime and many first year men were actually playing on the teams.

Last spring Southern Methodist University applied for admission to the Conference, reserving the privilege of admitting graduate students to its teams. The application was not favorably condidered by the several members of the Conference (with one exception), and the President so advised the Faculty representative of S. M. U.

In conclusion, I would urge the Conference to consider carefully the advisability of reverting to prewar conditions as rapidly as possible.

Particularly, it appears desirable that the Freshman rule should be enforced in the session beginning next autumn, or as soon thereafter as the emergency for which it was set aside shall have ceased to exist.

It is recommended that the Conference provide for the inclusion of hand-grenade throwing in the recognized track events.

- (1) The committee agreed that Baylor was guilty of an unethical practice in her fullfilment of her contract with Phillips University for a football game at Enid, Oblahoma October 21, 1922.
- (2) The committee recommends that the Conference request Baylor to refund to Phillips the difference between the amount given to Baylor for the expenses to Enid and return and the amount taken in by Phillips in their sales for this game.
- (3) The contest shall count as a loss for Baylor and a Fictory for Phillips
- (4) Competetion in this game shall a unit as a years competetion for all Baylor men.

It was moved by Mr. Ashburn and seconded by Mr. Smith that we adopt the report of the Committee as read. After much discussion it was agreed that the Conference would consider each paragraph separately and each one was taken up and adopted. Then it was moved and seconded that we adopt the report as a whole. Carried.

The Orlahoma A. & M. College asked for some ruling on some questions of eligibility. These were answered by the President

The T. I. A. A. ask that the Southwest Conference consider the following proposed amendements.

"A student who participates in Intercollegiate athletics in a senior college prior attended is barred from representing another senior college in intercollegiate athletics thereafter

(Note) This will not effect the student who has not pirticipated in intercollegiate athletics in one senior college on transferring to another senior college from participating in intercollegiate athletics at the college prior attended, provided that he lives up to the one year transfer rule.

It is moved and seconded that we adopt the above ruling. Motion lost.

It was moved and seconded that S. M. U. be asked to make

a report of the findings of the investigation committee into the athletic Situation at S. M. U. This report to be complete.

Mr. Jones representing Southern Methodist University replied by reading a partial report of the findings of the majority and minority report. This was not satisfactory to the Conference and the Southern Methodist University was asked to produce the majority report and rof. Branscomb started to read it. Then a representative of the Southern Methodist University asked if this report could not be given to a committee and not be read before the entire gathering, as there were others present who were not representatives of the different schools of the Conference, This was done and a committee composed of Ashburn, Tatkins and Schmidt were to read the report and submit their findings to the Conference.

It was moved and seconded that the report of the Committee be adopted as read. Four voting "yes" and three voting "no" since the report recommended that S. M. U. be suspended from the Conference the motion was lost because it takes a two-thirds (2/3) majority to suspend any school from the Conference.

Scholarship requirements applying to Varsity teams shall apply also to Freshman teams.

Discussion of No. 12 of the report for a settlement between Baylor and Phillips controversy. Moved by Ike Ashburn and seconded by

J. S. McIntosh, that settlement shall be based on one (\$1) dollar admission. Motion carried unanimously.

No. 13 of report was discussed but no action was taken.

No. 17 and 18 of the report were discussed. Moved by J. S. McIntosh and seconded by Ike Ashburn, the President shall appoint a Committee to work out the details regarding a full time Supervisor of all Athletic Matters connected with the Southwest Conference. Motion carried unanimously.

The President appointed for this Committee, J. S. McIntosh, and B. N. Wilson. This Committee shall also be empowered to consider questions of loans and other sources of income.

Was moved by J. S. McIntosh and seconded by J. H. Caskey to amend Article 28, that a student transferring from one institution of collegiate rank to another, or from one institution of collegiate rank to one of non-collegiate rank and back to another of collegiate rank, shall not be

eligible to compete in Inter-collegiate Athletics. until he has been for one year a student in the Institution to which he transfers. Motion carried unanimously.

It was announced by B. N. Wilson, F. A. Schmidt, and F. W. Redlich that the above mentioned schools, (Arkansas University and Oklahoma A. & M. College), feel that they are not given a fair consideration regarding schedule arrangements of Major Sports.

This matter was discussed and the belief was expressed by the President that future arrangements may solve this problem satisfactorily.

J. S. McIntosh, S. M. U., makes a plea to the Conference, that Southern Methodist University be permitted to play a post-season, intersectional flotball game. After this matter was discussed, it was moved and seconded that each school take this matter before their councils, and vote by mail as soon as possible, provided the faculty of S. M. U. requested such permission.

A report was read by the Secretary of the Association of Athletic Directors, or Athletic Business Managers, F. A. Schmidt, Arkansas University.

REPORT:

At the suggestion of Dr. Penick the following Athletic Directors and Athletic Business Managers met at 4 P.M. Dec. 5th, in the University Club Rooms: Mr. N. C. Wright of T. C. U., Mr. L. T. Bellmont of the University of Texas, Mr. Frank Bridges of Baylor, Dr. Blackwell of S. M. U., and Mr. F. A. Schmidt of Arkansas.

The purpose of this meeting was to organize with the approval of the Conference an Association of the Athletic Directors or (Athletic Business Managers) of the Southwest Conference. This organization is to work on schedules and all business transactions that may come up between the institutions of the Conference.

Dr. R. N. Blackwell was elected President, Mr. Frances A. Schmidt was elected Secretary.

It was voted that this association meet at 4 r. M. on the day before the regular annual meeting of the Conference.

Mr. Bellmont and Mr. Bridges were appointed to draw up a simple consitution and by-laws governing this organization. The name of which is to be the Association of Athletic Directors of the Southwest Conference.

The following recommendations are made by this Association to the Southwest Conference.

- 1. That William B. Ruggles, Sport Editor of the Dallas News be appointed official statistician of the Conference, to act without pay. Proper blanks are to be furnished by Mr. Ruggles to all members of the Conference so that each member can send in the official box score of each conference game in all sports. It is required that each member send in this information to the statistician within a reasonable length of time following each contest.
- 2. For the basketball and baseball season of 1925 that a Committee of three be appointed by the President of this Association of Directors, to draw up the schedules for all members of the Conference. The expense that may be incurred at the meeting of this committee is to be shared equally by each Institution in the Conference. Each representative is to furnish this Committee with all information regarding regulations and conditions at institutions so that a fair and impartial schedule can be worked out.
- 3. That the Southwest Conference have a permanent Secretary, without vote. It is recommended that Mr. James Sullivan of Texas A. & M. College, be elected to this position.

(Signed) F. A. Schmidt.

Moved by Ike Ashburn and seconded by J.S. McIntosh, that the first recommendation of this report be adopted. Motion carried unanimously.

Moved by Ike Ashburn and seconded by F. W. Redlich, to leave the arrangements of Athletic Schedules to the Athletic Directors. Motion carried unanimously.

Election of New Officers.

Moved by Ike Ashburn and seconded by B. N. ... Wilson, to re-elect Dr. D. A. Fenick as president. Motion carried unanimously.

Moved and seconded by same parties to elect Dr. E. W. McDiamid of T. C. U., as Vice-President. Motion carried unanimously.

Moved by J. S. McIntosh and seconded by Ike Ashburn to elect F. W. Redlich, Sec-Treasurer. Motion carried unanimously.

Moved by J. S. McIntosh and seconded by E. W. McDiamid, to have a committee of five (5) members, three (3) to be officers, the other two (2) to be appointed by the President, to meet in the near future for investigation the feasibility of securing a supervisor for the Conference, and have a permanent, paid Secretary. Motion carried unanimously.

Committee composed of J. S. McIntosh and B. N. Wilson reported in regard to engaging a full time commissioner for the Conference.

The plan was tentatively approved by the Conference provided the Athletic Committees of the several institutions approved. A. committee consisting of J. S. McIntosh, Watkin, and McDiamid was appointed to function in enforcing the new regulation about the player's sources of revenue, in case the vote for a commissioner was unfavorable.

Moved by Ike Ashburn and seconded by J. S. McIntosh to adjourn. Motion carried unanimously.
