the case with any other similar company. This whole system has cost the Company less than \$300 per year, including the wages of the store-keepers on the ranch and farm, and we believe that this is the best money the Company has ever expended.

At the beginning of the year your board of directors thought it would be money well expended if they could exterminate the Prairie Dogs on the ranch and in pursuance of this ide we had poison put out and succeeded in killing great numbers of prairie dogs, as is apparent from the fact that our President on his trip through the ranch this fall noticed many prairie dog towns practically exterminated and the grass growing strong where formerly there were many sections almost barren by reason of the large prairie dog towns. However we realise that we were a little bit late in executing this idea and the gree grass coming a little earlier than usual in the Spring rendered our attempt at exterminating the dogs, to a certain extent, unsuccessful. This winter however, we will remedy this and have instructed the General Manager to begin killing the prairie dogs on the 5th day of January, 1913, and we believe that with the killing of this winter we will practically have cleaned up the ranch of prairie dogs, and that if this policy is vigorously pursued next winter there will be no prairie dogs left on our ranch. We are convinced that the emoney used for thus purpose is most wisely spent, as the grass which is thus reclaimed will pay us immense profits on the expenditure and besides the value of the land is largely enhanced in the eyes of the purchaser,

We have been very fortunate in having fine rains at the proper season of the year and as a result we have had unusually good grass, and the cattle are in fine condition. Again we have been singularly fortunate in the steady advance of prices on all flasses of cattle. On July 1st we contracted the sale of all our three year old steer (with the usual cut-back privilege) at \$50 per head for delivery in November; and under the terms of this sale

we sold and delivered 1320 head of steers for the sum of \$66,000. This we are reliably informed is the highest price ever paid for three year old steers in one brand where the steers had never had anything but grass, and the buyer bought them on the range. We also sold a little pver 512 head of aged dry cows, which brought \$38.00 net on the open market. We also sold our old bull at \$50.00 per head delivered at the railroad. We have also had several propositions looking to the price of our steers for Spring delivery but your Board thought best to make no prices on our coming three year old steers. We simply mention this to show that the trend of the market is upwards and we could probably contract the sale of our coming three year olds at an even higher price than \$50.00. We therefore anticipate that the price on acttle during the coming year will be as good as this year at least and will probably bring a little higher price.

clder bulls and in place purchase 12% head of yearling registered bulls, in the purchase of which our Bresident and G. M. Slaughter took trips to the most important herds in Missouri, Kansas and Texas, and we believe that the bulls purchased are fully as high grade as any formerly purchased by the founder os the Company. We mention this to show that we are keeping up the quality in the cattle on the range. For these bulls we expended approximately \$15,000, and feel rather proud of the fact that the purchase of these bulls was so carefully looked after that we could sell the whole bunch for a nice profit after having used them this last season upon our herd. We now have for use on the ranch 35% head of registered and pure breed bulls, among which number there is not a single bull which will not give us several years of service, thus ensuring sufficient males for our herd.

At the begginning of the year we decided that it was best to sell the old automobile which we had, as it ewas practically worthless and we did so in exchange for three lots in the city of Lubbock, which were originally worth \$400.00. We then purchased a Flanders 20 for the General Manager in attending to the Company's business. We were compelled to make this purchase or suffer the less of \$25.00 for each trip of the General Manager to the ranch and return to Lubbock and we thought it wise to have our own car.

As our dipping vat was old and unsatisfactory we had a new one installed, which is probably the most complete vat of its kind in West Texas. It is built of concrete and has a new engine and boiler for the heating of the water, and we have had our cattle run through this vat a number of times, and we believe that the cost of dipping cattle, although the same has amounted to quite a sum of money, to have been well worth the expense as we think it is only a question of time until we eradicate the Scab disease on our ranch. We have also dipped practically at cost, the cattle of our neighbors with a view to rendering the cattle on the ranches around us free of Scabs. We believe that proper dipping is a very wise policy and we trust that the Company will continue the policy which we have continued and improved upon.

Company we showed at the Royal Fat Stock Show, Kansas City, obtaining several blue, red and white ribbons and sold the cattle which we showed at a good price. The cattle attracted a good deal of attention as they showed exactly what we have on the range and we believe that this advertisement is worth the expense. We also shipped the big steer known as Big Jim which was pure breed Hereford milk-pen calf raised at the Headquarter ranch, to Roswell and fed him during the fall and summer and showed him at the Royal at Kansas City with the other cattle and at the International at

Khicago. This steer weighed close to 3000 lbs and was pronounced by competent judges to be the largest steer ever shown at the Royla. He therefore attracted on account of the extraordinary weight a great deal of attention and was written up in a great many papers, thus giving the Company a great deal of the best kind of advertisement. After he was shown at these two shows and we had achieved the result we were aiming at we sold Big Jim for \$400.

In pursuance of our policy of keeping up the improvements on the ranch to the highest grade , we put down during the year two teaks wells with a large tank so as to water part of the land that had not been sufficiently watered. We also re-built the house at the White-Face Camp, which was unfortunately destroyed by fire and have kept the fences in thorough repair. We ordered the sale of 50 of the brood mares on the ranch, as we thought that the herd of 100 was too large and would likely grow wild in such a large bunch and we believed that 50 broad mares was enough from which to raise our cow ponies. This sale has not yet been made but we have been practically offered \$50.00 per head and the sale will probably be consumated this spring. We believe it would be a wise policy to place on the ranch under protection, at least 100 tons of baled hay from the farm for use during the winter. We were unable to attend to this matter this fall and would recommend to to the next directory that this matter be looked into and that proper feed be placed upon the ranch so that we will be insured against any grave loss in the event that we should have a hard winter. In this connection we repart that we are carrying fire insurance upon everything belonging to the Company upon which we could get a policy.

In June of this year we adopted a uniform brand which is "Laxy S" on each thigh, and in addition the number designating the year to be placed upon the shoulder. For this year the figure 2 was ordered upon the shoulder to designate that the calf was branded in 1912; the grade calves to be branded with the figure 2 upon the

left shoulder and the thoroughbreds to be branded on the right shoulder with same figure. We adopted this uniform brand because we believed it is to be best advantage of the Company to have one brand for its cattle and we adopted the branding of the last figure of the year upon the shoulder because we can thus absolutely tell how old the oow or steer may be. against the Company before the end of the fiscal year, December 1st, and the Secretary in addition and In pursuance of the order of the stock holders at their last annual meeting to sell allholdings in New Mexico at not less than \$250,000.00, in June of this year we granted to R. L. Slaughter and R. M. Slaughter an option to sell the farm and other properties in New Mexico, at about 5% above the \$250,000.00 maximum praced by the stock holders, said option to expire October 1st. These gentlemen were unable to sell any of the property at the price which was placed upon them, and in the effort to sell we obtained a great deal of information concerning their actual value. Just before the expiration of the option we granted an extension of the option on the Gamma grass pasture until December 1st, on account of the fact that it appeared that the sale of this pasture might be consumated. However, the sale fell through and we therefore report that no part of the holdings in New Mexico have been sold, osults.

We believe that it is the best policy for the Company to sell all "Creepy" cattle each fall, and we believe it a good idea to dispose of all cattle in the fall that will apparently not get through the winter alive, or all cattle that are not in such shape that they will be worth no more money after feeding and grading them a year. Pursuing this pelicy we have ordered the sale of all "Creepy" cattle and all cattle that will probably be worth no more money than they are worth this fall. We believe that this cleaning up of the cattle on the ranch is a good ide because the prospective buyer will see nothing but failry good cattle in fairly good condition, and we believe it best to sell any cattle that will not increase in value rather than let them die on the range or dispose of them a year later at the same price that they would have

brought the year before.

In pursuance of our custom inaugurated last year we e published the usual notices in all of the papers where the Company does business in West Texas and New Mexico, giving notice to all persons to present all bills or claims against the Company before the end of the fiscal year, December 1st, and the Secretary in addition addressed a letter to every person with whom we had done any business, urging the prompt mailing to the Secretary's office, all bills, accounts or claims that anyone might have against us. Asaa a consequence of this we are reasonably sure that we have paid all bills and accounts and indebtedness contracted before the 1st day of pecember, 1912, and that the money now in the bank to the credit of the Company belongs to the Company and is a clear earning to theecompany for the fiscal year ending December 1st, 1912. have used our utmost endeavor since we have been acting as your directors to have all bills paid as promptly as possible in order that we might get rid of the bill and also in order to take advantage of any discount which we might be able to obtain on account After harmering at this for nearly two years ef quick payment. we have, we think, achieved unusually satisfactory results.

Last year we entered into a contract with W. D. Twichell, and
State Surveyor, to survey a Plat the ranch lands. This Spring this
was done and we now have an absolute survey of all of our holdings
in Hockley and Cochran Counties, Texas, and we have a copy of the
proper field notes on every league of said land, the original of
said notes have been put on file in the General Land Office in Austin, Texas. The work done by this gentleman is of the highest
character and receives the highest backing of the General Land
Office of Texas and the highest approval of the courts of Texas.
Incidentally we might add that under this survey the State Surveyor
gave us 875 acres of land in addition to that called for by our
Deeds from the founder of the Company. As a matter of investment
therefore the surveying of the land has proven to have been a

very good one, as we not only have a very good, in fact an absolutely accurate survey and the quieting of all boundry disputes by the eternal fixing of the lines of our ranch but as the Survey only cost aproximately \$1600 and gives 875 acres belonging to us that we never had before, and valuing this land at \$5.00 per acre we have added to our ranch by the expenditure of \$1600 aproximately \$4400 worth of land.

We beg to report that the suit of the Yeakum County

Vs C. C. Slaughter, whereby Yeakum County attacks the constitutionality of the patents to all our land, was tried in the

District Court in Ft. Worth this fall and resulted in a complete

victory for our Company. The plaintiff has of course appealed

the case but Mr. Henry C. Coke, our attorney, advises us that

there is nothing in the suit to alarm him and that he anticipates

no trouble in defeating the case in the higher courts.

We had an opportunity of contracting the sale of all the hay still remaining on the farm, at \$14.00 per ten and same is being sold under said contract as fast as the railroad company can furnish cars.

As we were of the opinion that we had too much live stock on the farm we ordered the sale of all cattle on the farm except six cows, which we are retaining for farm use and these cattle will be sold shortly.

We are informed that the Santa Fe cut-off new being built will give us a station on the Banta Fe located about 22 miles from our ranch headquarters, this next year. This will be a great advantage to the Company as it will reduce our freight expenses greatly as at present we are oblige to haul freight 58 miles from Lubbock, Texas. In the event that the railroad is finished we would recommend a warehouse be built at the said station which would be a great benefit to the Company and result in saving a great deal of money.

In apportioning the dividend for the year ending 1912 we find that the Company was in the following finantial condition

Against this we have found that there was no claim whatever execpt The contingent claim of Mr. Henry C. Coke, our attorney, for his fee in defending the suit of Yoakum County vs C. C. Slaughter, for which we will owe him \$2500.00 whenever the suit is settled. This suit has not yet been finally determined and Mr. Coke will not take any part of the payment at present, and indeed the debt is not yet due, as the case may nhang in the courts for several years before finally adjudicated. We therefore decided that it would be safe for us to decalre a dividend of 100 per cent on the capital stock; in other words, \$100,000.00, which would leave us in cash and quick assets approximately \$20,000.00 surplus. We therefore declare a dividend of 100 per cent on the capital stock, which we trust will be satisfactory to the stock holders.

In conclusion we desire to state that we fully recognize the grave responsibility of the trust which you have imposed upon us and believe that the results which we have achieved, and the information which we have in the office will show any stock holder that we have not been false to that trust nor shirked any responsibility whatever.

We congratulate the stock holders upon the present condition of the C. C. Slaughter Cattle Company and beg to thank them for the honor which they have conferred upon us.
