REMARKS.

The above regiment of which I was a member or in which I enlisted, was made up principally in Montgomery Ala. and went into camp at Montgomery City. from there, the Regiment was ordered to Pensacola Florida, at the time of the Evacuation of that place, and the navy yard, the original command at that place having all been ordered away one regiment of infantry which remained to finish getting away the war implements that still remained, and they with the help of our regiment burned out the entire confederate camps, after which the two regiments acted as scouts, guards, and skirmishers, for a party taking up the railroad tracks from Pensacola to Poland about 40 miles, in mean while I was detailed while out home on a furlough, to do government work, in a shop owned by one Mr Joseph Lyne, who had a contract with the confederacy, to make almost all kinds of equipments for the army, all in the city of Montgomery Ala. this place was called a post, Major Wagner had charge of the arsenal at this place, he was also commander of the post; the shop I worked in, and others in the city being tributaries were all subject to his, & Major Wagner's orders, and in that business I remained as a confederate volunteer soldier till the War closed.
