Now if you can reach them ask them the weight of Machine, and the local freight rate to Portales, and Bovina or Hereford which would be about the same I think to the Two last places, also; ask them what the Carload rate is, If the difference is very great, I could probably order some Wind-Mills and some piping and a casing from the same place and put in enough of ~~XXXX~~ either stuff to make up a car-load. If you can get these questions to them in time ere the ship, ask them to look it up and let me know and I will give you enough to fill up the car, I am afraid the Local will eat up the Gasoline Engine, but dont know whether a Mixed car of stuff would be much better. Now if the Rates to Bovina will amount to a great difference, I could receive it there. I am using the Rail-Road Eclipse Mill and they are made at Beloit, I also got all my Piping and casing there, Two cars last year I am going to leave here Sunday for Wichita, Kans, to take the Scottish Rite 32 degree, and will be at Wichita, 15.16.17.18. from there, I will go to Nebraska after a 1400\$ cow and probably buy a few heifers so as to make a car-load. We are all fairly well over here and hope this will find you all equally as well, write me when you can, Tell Dick I took the Commandery last night, and that the 5th libation was alright.



Or I will put you up 20 head of our fullblood Hereford bull calves (to be castrated) at \$25.00 per head, you to select them; and if you take first premium at St. Louis World's Fair, will give you your money back on the 15 head.

Dear Pa:-

I wrote you in a hurry from Indian Canyon. Bob had to go back to Midland to court, and Jack had to go to Big Springs to court, so I saw there was nothing I could do except to wait on the material to get there and was anxious about my part of the ranch so pulled out and came back to meet the Vat and give it directions how to go. I left Indian canyon about 8 AM tuesday morning and it was raining, rained on me all day to Tahoka, and then nearly all night and wednesday I left Tahoka to come back to my ranch and it rained all day. I met the Vat on the Jones Co land, and it was riding in good shape, and with exception of a dent in the side, and one small leak it was alright, both of which can be very easily mended before Bob puts it in the hole. Wednesday night I made it to Zavalla, and that night it rained hard, next morning I went out and measured a wash tub that was in the yard and it measured 6" of water. I drove all over Zavalla and every lake was full. The steers are doing as fine as could be expected I judge that 25% are making some ♂♂ pone on root of tail. This heavy rain there will puff them some and will soften them for awhile, and if it had not rained was going to have Ed come after some of them, but think now that we better wait until about the 15th to pull the tops to the R.R. I drove on up to Slaughter and looked through the yearlings, they had seem surface water although the rain was lighter than at Zavalla, but grass good and they are getting quiet and putting on alright. The tank at Slaughter was nearly running over. I learned that the rain had put out a good deal of water in scraped out lake. Went on to Boyds and he was branding there, had branded 1300 calves, and had only rounded at Prairie Dog, North mill and Bull Camp and his mill. Boyd says so far that the calves are showing up more according to roundup than they did last year and he thinks will have a good crop. The calves are growing faster than I ever saw calves grow in my life, some of them it takes two men to bulldog them down. The cattle are looking as fine as I want to see them at this time of year. There is no surface water except at the Bull camp on this part of the pasture although they have had good grass rains, and grass is fine. The high grass that we burned looks like a wheat field, I think this makes it better for the cows, dry ones, and will put hard flesh on. Penny counted the cattle in the white faces, viz:- Silver Lake 1140 Cows-33Bulls = 1173

it mounted and send to you at the office. He had been going down hill for
a week, dont know what was the matter. Have had rain here every day for a
week I am told and has damaged a great deal of hay, but such is life.
The train has just come in so will write you more fully on tomorrows train.
Let me hear from you. hope you are all having a nice rest at the springs
with love to all I am your son, sorge.

Dear Sir:-

Yours of 25th. to hand-In reply will say that I would prefer that you come down and select the calves. You want to come to Portales, N.M. and I will meet you there or have some of my boys to watch for you. The cattle are about 60 miles from the R.R. It would be rather hard to arrange for the calves to learn to eat while on the range, but we might manage to move them to the rail-road and put them in small pasture and let them stay with their dams for awhile and get on feed. We can talk that over when you come down. I have just come in from the Ranch where I have been branding and the calves are showing up very well, have had very good rains and are now beginning to grow very fast. I branded 522 bull calves in the herd you are to select from and if we cant pick out a nice bunch of 20 out of this number-I dont know where we could beat them. I shall count on you leaving there about the 5th of Aug, but if anything should prevent you leaving at that time, come on down as you can. The calves would show there best about Oct. but I think they ought to altered in august. If you know of any feeder or friend that would like to come down with you bring them along and wire me at Portales, N.M. when you

I have about 3000 very nice 3 and 4 year old steers that would make fine feeders-If there is any feeder friends that you would like to have come down with you bring them along as I can take care of as many as you wish to bring with you, and will show them some nice cattle not only ours, but my neighbors also. I believe you could make arrangements with the A.T.S.F for transportation here and back if you state to them you are coming down to buy feeders. I know this is being done by others, so mentioned the fact to you. While you are down here if you have the time would be glad to have you run over to Roswell with me and see this little valley.

I hope to show you something as nice on the range as nice as can be put up off any grass in the U.S., but you come and judge for yourself.

Write me here when you leave K.C. and whether you have any one with you and how many? Hoping to see you soon,



I have just got back from the ranch, everything is looking fine. I have some 1000 head of the Running Water Steers on the Cochran Co Ranch, they are looking fine and I think are fatter than they have been for several years and are something like the quality of the dehorned steers, a decided improvement of anything we have ever put on the market as 3 and 4 year olds. If you wish to see them meet me at Portales about next wednesday, if you have any body you wish to bring with you to look at them, wire me how many and what day you expect to get to Portales.

The steers over there are in a small pasture and we could throw them together in an hour. You can say to any one that wants a string of feeders that they are peaches are I am no judge. Every one that has seen them say they are better quality and condition than any cattle they ever saw on the range. Yes I would have liked to have seen the steers you have on feed in the fat stock show, but Father has been worrying too much about them, I never murmured when he wanted to dispose of them. Think it best as it is aggravating to keep them on feed so long, and then I dont know whether they will have a class for them or not this fall. My folks are in very good health, bone yours same. Dear Father:-

Your welcome letter received and I was very glad to hear from you, and to know that you were well, for I had heard that you all were sick and that you had been confined to your room, but just after hearing this, I get your letter. I went to R.W. after writing you to look at the steers, and Ed had just got a phone from Lubbock from Jack Alley for him to come after the yearlings. Ed left last Sunday morning for Lubbock after them. I suppose by this that the dip killed the ticks and they were passed on by the inspector. I did not order Ed down, but told Bob and Jack to send man to Lubbock and telephoneale center for Ed to come down, but that there was no use of Ed going down unless the yearlings could be moved. The Steers were looking well, and we thought that we could get about 600 4 year olds that would be good about the 1st. I tried to catch Chase bros. and show our steers, but missed him and he bought Bartons for \$8.00. They were picked up about the country, they took 1000 out of 1200.

I have a letter from Parrington and will wire him today that I will meet him at Hereford the 11th Inst. and take him to R.W. to see the cattle. He says he can use about 2100 which is about all that we have at R.W. I will write C.H.A. Cassidy and Rosenbaum today asking their advice about the steers. Ed and I thought that we could cut 600 that would weigh 1025 in W.C., but they have had rains and they might be a little washy. Think it best to sell them by the 1000 or the whole bunch if we can, although we might get a good big price for about 1000 by topping the weights out the R.W. and Zavalla bunches. McCormack seems to think that he can get \$7.00 for all our dry or uplands and from 4.00 to 5.00 for the draw land. I think you better write him to go to selling it. I would like about \$8.00 to \$10.00 for the old ranch section, that is my idea would be to offer it with 3 or 4 others joining for 5.00. He thinks that from now on is the time to sell. When I got on the train at Canyon, Bud and his folks were on. Bud told me about Nations. Anderson was also on and has gone back to meet Nations and will wire if he wishes to go and look at the steers. I am not going to say anything about the steers at Zavalla unless I strike a man that wants just that many, until I sell the R.W. then will tell him I am ready to show the Zavalla cattle. Have wire from Kauffman to meet him at Portales tomorrow to go after calves, am going to try to sell him the calves from the old & cows, and then sell him the cows so as he can make a car load, and will not have to wean them but feed both until calves quit sucking, then wean and ship cows. Will try to get him to take them right

and a car or two of good steers and try the market - this will pay for bring
bringing his 20 cows and calves to the k... make about a train load with
his car. I think I can get him to do this, as it appears that it will be to
his interest and will not hurt us, will try to get \$35.00 per head
for cows, but might let him jow me down to 25.00.

We have had fine rains all over the country, will raise enough roughness
to winter the line horses and mules and etc. It has been raining slowly here
here all day and seems to be general, of course we dont want the rain here
but cant kick. Everything was doing as nice as could be expected when I
was at ranch last, and there is not abit of loco showing at running water,
but saw a little putting up at Slaughter Co ranch, but not enough to do up
any harm if it does not keep on raining up in the fall.

When you get tired of Eureka, remember we have a very delightful climate on
out here and woul be glad you all pay us a visit at any time,

I believe I can run about 3 or 4 hundred pretty nice cows right away, for
I am like you, when everybody goes to running cows they will drop down to
nothing. I will do the best I can as my judgement dictates and will try to
raise all the money I can off the ranch in the way of cows.

Let me hear from you soon and often, and advise me on all matters pertain-
ing to the business, for I need all the advice that you can give me.

Dear Father:-

I wrote you some days ago and on account of not getting through with some work I wish to report to you, I did not mail it-I have changed the letter a little, where I said in first letter that enclosed pedigrees for you to sign, I signed them by me as manager. I went to work with the old bulls-Clipped the place where they were branded, then got a razor and with the work of a glass traced out all the brands and ~~finds~~ identified all the first purchase and also Security and Donnybrook-Then took the tattoo irons and put the same numbers that were on the thigh and put in the ~~g~~ ears or rather left ear, so from now hence all will have to do is to rope the bull and look in left ear-I run all the thoroughbrds on the farm the same way and now if I should make a change in 'em or should drop off whoever took the farm would have no trouble in identifying the cattle, and when one is bred it is put down in the herd book-We worked three days with the old bulls in finding their brands-they look well and am going to show them in the spring looking like they did when we brought them down from the north. Alfalfa is the thing for old bulls-I sold yesterday 40 cows that I intended to try to sell at El Paso for 35.00 per head, but have to wait until they can kill them before I get my money, which will be 25 days-This will be 1400\$-am getting some enquiry for bulls-Alfalfa King is the sweetest thing you ever saw and I think I have him placed for 500\$-C.C.Slaughter Viola's new years gift is the best thing I ever saw for his age-Constellation is going to be show calf-he is some 5 months old out cow that I bought from Rat.we are going to try to capture the Yearling blue ribbon on Alfalfa King the calf ribbon on either Bredwells Lad or Constellation-the cow on Viola or Bonnie Maid-The yearling bulls are better today than we ever had them The steers are picking up-In fact I am very muchly pleased with everything on the farm, the reports from Ed and Boyd are flattering up to date- Will go to the ranch as soon as I can get things in shape here. This is about all I can say to you now-would be pleased to hear from you any and all times you have time to drop me a line-any suggestions you may make will be apprecciated-Think can sell the 100 acres accross the road if I cut it up in 10 acre blocks for 175\$ per acre-what do you think about this am offered \$5000.00 for Adcock place ~~and~~ 6000.and think I will get it. we paid 3200\$ for it.all well hope you all the same,

I have a man that wants to buy 40 grade heifers to put on a farm of Alfalfa

We have several bulls I want to get a calf out of before taking them back if I can get a cow for them in heat before they leave - Pearl - Protection - the Lars bull (Lee) Donnybrook and Brilliant and little Briton.

I was at the Ranch when the car-load of Dip came here-when I coul'nt get back the Dr. Worgaard was here and he and I went down to look at it-there was 20.20 charges on it-He paid the charges-We went into the car and found that the car had a place in each end of car stove in and some of the barrels were on a tipple, showing that it had quite a jar-the car was leaking in three or four places and the dip was nearly all over the car-I could not re give that kind of car as there is no telling how long the leakage would keep up,as the barrels have been sprung, and if a man had to hold it for 6 or 7 months I do not know how much would leak out and every man that handles in barrels would more than likely have to haul it from 40 to 50 miles from the R.R. to the ranches before the barrels would be opened and when they found that the barrels were short they would a rebate on it-I talked with Dr. and told him that I would not agree to the clause in your contract Net 30 days cash-That I was willing to handle it pay you every thirty days, all sales that were made and take my profit out what was left after paying you for the car-When we talked at the farm you talked that you were going to hold up the prices to at least 1.25 on barrels and 150 cents per gal on smaller packages-When I talked with the Dr. it seems that he thinks that we ought not to sell by barrels for more than 90 cts. This would only allow me 15 cts per gal for the storage and sale of this stuff-I dont think I could do anything with it for that small a per cent-I understood that your company had a man at Portales handling it, but the other day the man was over here and found out that he was handling Car-sul that he offered me Car - Sul at cost-he stated to me he thought that he could sell it for 90 cts per gal either in barrels are smaller pkgs. On the 9th of July it went dry-I think the wind will certainly blow hard enough to dry the land up after the rain, so I have no idea what it is actually doing to last night up & has some rain passed north of here, as the South Hill is a fully dry-anderson went from ponds to prairie & the little lakes has water in them, and he thought it had rained all over the range, hence his thinking that it had rained a good rain. The ground is so awful dry that it will take a good old soaking to do any good. He ran the train at Boyd's Mill this morning one day and it got out of fix and I rushed back here last night so get an engineer to go out with me this morning and fix it if he can & am moving the Slaughter fence, so as to throw out the wall at Slaughter and also Edwards are raising the fence from Boyd's pasture south to Sourdine, cutting the distance between the Martin Co wells and Dunlap-which will make a pasture of about 4 leagues still throw the yearlings I have in Slaughter in this Martin Co pasture and if we get the Edwards it will make an 8 league pasture-I have a letter from Ed which I enclose-^s cannot roundup until it either rains or the wind blows-course it will not take but a week's wind to fix us up so that we can round the cattle are looking very well considering the shortage of water-then the bulkup at one mill the calves get separated from the cows and sometime don't get together fro a few hours-I dont think anything suffering so as to seriously hurt anything yet, but you know how a man feels when you are short of water-The bull camp had a nice grass rain while I was out there-the trouble of the wind not blowing enough to water or run the wheels, in that it clouds us every day or two and the wind lays-in hopes that we got rain yesterday as there was a big cloud here in that way all the afternoon-rained a little on us between here and Portales-right shows here-sprinkling at Portales which I think will last you now as soon as we have rain-



Dear friend:

It is hard to bear to sell your calves up because I understand that you all can save them for a year or two and then sell them on the market when you can get about \$100 per head. I will try to tell you the reasons why I think it is better to sell them now than wait another year or two. There are other reasons you need not be afraid but when you have to pay for the cost of raising calves to carry them over to market you will lose a lot of money. When selling your cows to start a new herd you don't want to buy any old ones - so we will take the ones that are healthy and vigorous at ages from 18 months to 2 years old. We will have a letter from Mr. Johnson of Rockingham who wants to buy a herd of cattle if you could get him over to see you and interest him in buying. I am at your disposal with you - the price paid for the cattle will depend upon the quality of the cattle. I think I will make prices right if the calves suit him. Then it will be up to you to catch them over to your place and see that you can do with them. After he sees your calves and we'll see if he will buy them. Of course he might not come if I priced the calves and he just as well consider it if calves suit him & can't find them elsewhere. I am enclosing a copy of the letter from Mr. Johnson.

Yours received on my return from Chicago-I am sorry to inform you that we lost two of your horses out of the first lot that you sent down, and I think that we will loose two more, but the others look alright and we in hopes that we will not loose anymore-The last lot that you sent we lost nine head the next day after they were turned in-This looks awful, but considering the condition the horses were in and the fact they were alkaliied - I am in hopes that you will not censure me too heavy-my men might have been careless in not riding the ditches as close as they should, but the way the horses looked when they got here - I am of the opinion that nothing would have saved them-I think now that we will not loose anymore-hope not any way-I started 125 head of mares to the the ranch the other day and the boys let them water in salt water about 15 minutes and the consequence was that they lost 15 head in about two days-they were in good fix having been on alfalfa for 5 weeks-One thing we have all got learn and that is not to drive anything on the salt grass after frost-Your horses are getting all that they can eat and I am in hopes that I will not have to report anything like this anymore-- few of them are in bad shape with Distemper-The ones that were not alkaliied are doing as fine as can be and putting on flesh. The first bunch of horses you sent down are beginning to look like horses with the exception of two, which I am afraid will have to be put to it getting through-they were badly alkaliized- one died the next morning and a day or two after we lost another-but from the looks of them I think they are alright with the exception of the two that I mention-low as to the last bunch you sent down-they were the hardest lookers I ever saw to be alive-we put them in alfalfa patch that had not been cut-as nearly knee high-but the next day there was seven of them that could not get up and of course died-this is awful as I hate it badly, but I cannot see that I am to blame for them-one thing you will have to learn and that is not drive horses on salt grass after frost-I sent my stock horses over to the Texas ranch and the boys lost 13 head-they were fat-but the alkali kills them all alike thin or fat-I am in hopes that I will not have to report the loss of anymore-How are the cows doing? The man that came down with the horses said they were locating nicely and were on good grass-please let me hear from you as how they are doing-From the loss of the horses I am reporting to you, does not look like that I am taking very good care of them, but I assure you that they shall all they can eat and that I will do all I can not to lose any one-I could be glad to have you run over and see that I am giving them all the chances a horse ought to have, but you know the condition when you started them down here and then add on to that they had to live on salt grass all the way down here and then you imagine how they looked when they came in here-Hoping that you will pull through in good shape with your cows and wishing you all the success imaginable

Dear Father:-

The next morning after you left I got up early and went out to the yards and talked with all the men that were feeding for the show and with out a single exception they all advised not to send the calves back, as they would get stale-Herrin the man that took sweepstake emphatically said not to send them back-I was very anxious to take them back, but after getting advice of the oldest feedres-I was afraid to go against their advice-Only one man said take them back and that was O.H.Nelson and he was drunk all the time he was there and also had sold a lot of cattle that were going to show next year Coffman had sold his place and as he has 26 head that are very near as good at home and he is feeding the 21 he got this year & after studying the matter over I was afraid that he would have too much to do to look after a place to feed three bunches-The biggest argument of the feedrs were that as the cattle had been crowded for 60 days on sugar that it was harmful to get them back on less feed without making them stale-that the ones that were back and had no sugar or crowded would do better and put the flesh on gradually would be smoother-I talked with Dan Black and he said it would be a hard matter to keep them from getting lumpy-that he had to starve his a few days before coming to the show and also while at the show he kept them off feed-If Coffman had not sold his place and has to give possesin in June I would have had him take the back regardless of what the feeders thought, but it looks like the others would be fat enough with 11 months feeding-Coffman will have to find two places to feed the two bunches he has at home and if we had made him take the others back he would have had to secure a third place, so after thinking the matter over with Coffman we decided to take the advice of old feeders and not experiment against their practical advice-So I told Coffman if he would get to work and give the two bunches he has all his attention and not spare time, labor & expense I would not insist on him taking them back and he has promised to do all he can and push them for all they are worth-The bull calves got in the day before I got back-592 head-they look very well and the boys cut them from the cows and brought them right on without having them to stay out there and travel the fence until the were weaned and I think they look better as they were weaned as they come in and saved all the travel on the fence and then the trip to Portales-they are now getting quieted down and eating alright-I received 449 calves and one part Buffalo stag from Bob-Most of them look fairly well some are quite small-We have had some very cold nights, but most of the time weather has been fine-Both our children have awful colds and we have been up with for three nights they are croupy, but think they are all O.K. now-Hoping this will find you all well-That you got your hay and what things you need for Xmas-I am with love your aff, son, George.

Now you want to pick a warm day and dip your cattle-Before they go in the vat have a man on each side of the shute with a curry comb and curry any scabs they have on them before they go in the vat-If you have a bad case hold him in the dip and curry the scabs good-in about ten days dip them again.

I would make the dip about 4 gallons of dip to 100 gallons of water. or one gallon of dip to every ten gallons of water-I think you better cut out all that show the itch and put them in seperate pasture and dip them careful and curry good in the shute before they go in the vat and repeat in ten days-the other cattle that do not show the itch you can run them through once-I think you better charge the outside people 10 cts per head-12 1/2 would be nearer what it would cost you-I would ask them 12 1/2 cts and if they would not pay ~~h~~ that you can let them dip for ten cts.The vat will cost us about \$50.00 to put it in-Please let me hear from you every week and always tell me exactly how your cattle are doing-Run your pasture as cheap as you can,for times are getting aw~~f~~ful dull-I think you can run that out fit with one man besides your self-I am cutting down forces on all the ranches and the farm.Remember me kindly to your wife and tell her to look out for some honey and apples in a few days-will probably start the apples and honey monday morning to hereford and get someone that is freighting down your way to haul it to you.
