ADDRESS BY THE HONORABLE A. M. AIKIN, JR.

The Honorable A. M. Aikin, Jr., Vice-President of the Convention and his The Honorable Party were announced by the Doorkeeper of the Convention and were escorted to the rostrum.

Convention as follows: the

We have designated this fourth day of our proceedings as Vice-President's Day. The occasion for which we have set aside this time only nominally honors the office of the Vice-President of the Texas Constitutional Convention of 1974. Our real tribute is to the man who holds that office - and deservedly so.

No man or woman in this Chamber has inspired the respect, the admiration and, yes, even the envy of his colleagues and constituents as has this man - respect for his integrity, admiration for his ability, and envy for the good that he has accomplished not for a select few, but for every minority and majority in our State.

Although the man we have selected as Vice-President has been deeply, personally, and intimately involved in State government for more than 40 years, he is not a fixture of the Capitol; he is the foundation of it. Tenure alone means only that the electorate is satisfied with a public official's service; the Vice-President of this Convention has never been satisfied with popularity; he has been a worker, a doer, a tireless advocate of the causes in which he has believed.

There are, to be totally candid and frank, few real statesmen among us; but A. M. Aikin, Jr. is one. He shuns demogoguery in favor of reason; when others about him play politics, he displays patience, prudence and competence.

If there are any among us who do not love this man for the beauty of his spirit, for his kindness, for his loyalty, for his counsel and for his wisdom, I have not met him.

Delegate Aikin and I first met when I was a child, using the back hall of this Chamber as a playground...when he was, as he is now, one of the most able and respected

members of the Legislature. Although my elders at the time knew him to be a gentleman and a lawmaker of the greatest capacity and the highest repute, it was then that I first learned that A. M. Aikin, Jr., was a gentle man.

Only later did I discover that he was largely responsible for my education and that of millions of other Texans, and that he could be credited with the creation, the implementation and the continuation of services and programs of State government which have benefited generations of Texans.

A. M. Aikin, Jr., is one of the most notable builders of Texas. That is why we, his colleagues and friends, saw fit to hang his portrait—and his alone among incumbent legislators—in the Senate Chamber. And that is why today we have moved the portrait to this hall for the duration of the Constitutional Convention.

I welcome the opportunity to serve with Vice-President Aikin. Already his advice and counsel have given me inspiration. He is now and will continue to be my right hand in this Convention.

If I have dwelled too long on what this man, his service to Texas and his assistance to me mean to me, it is only because I am proud that he stands next to me. I am comforted in the knowledge that he will participate in the leadership and procedural decisions that will confront me. And I am happy that he will be an indispensable element in all that you and I will do.

While I have probably expropriated the sentiments and perhaps many of the comments that the President of the Senate had hoped to express, it is most appropriate that the Dean of the Senate and the Vice-President of this historic Convention be formally presented to you and to the people of Texas by the Lieutenant Governor of Texas...The Honorable William P. Hobby, Jr.

Governor Hobby ...

The Honorable William P. Hobby, Lieutenant Governor of the State of Texas then addressed the Convention as follows:

Certainly no one in this Chamber needs to be told that holding public office is a demanding role, sometimes frustrating, sometimes exhibarating.

There are two real sources of satisfaction in public life. One is the kind of satisfaction alluded to by Judge Calvert in his very fine address to this Convention yesterday. That is the kind of satisfaction of knowing that, while we pass this way but once, we have seized the opportunity to do all we could to leave this world a little better place than it might have been but for our efforts.

The other great source of satisfaction is in the personal friendships and associations one is privileged to make. They are perhaps deeper than the ordinary friendships, because they are tested, tempered and fired in the heat of conflict. In public life, there is no doubt that the measure of the character of a man or woman is more quickly, and usually more accurately, taken than is the case elsewhere.

And so it is with the man whom it is my

honor to present to you this morning. Senator Aikin is a man, not only of unparalleled rectitude and integrity, but he is, in the finest sense of that overused term, a gentle man.

In addition to that, he has a rare capacity for friendship. Indeed the privilege of the association with and friendship of A. M. Aikin is one of the highest privileges attendant upon service in the government of Texas.

Delegates, I now present to you your Vice-President, Senator A. M. Aikin, Jr.

The Honorable A. M. Aikin, Jr., Vice-President of the Convention, then addressed the Convention as follows:

Governor Hobby, Mr. President and my colleagues, Delegates to this Convention:

I appreciate more than I have words to express the high honor you gave me in electing me Vice-President of this Convention. I do not have a long speech, but I hope I may express to you some of the things I feel all of us would like to see accomplished.

The people who came to the territory which was to become first the Republic and then the State of Texas were plain people. Their day's work was mostly concerned with survival. They had no time for frills. They did not yearn for days when they would have great wealth.

Our predecessors did not need materialistic goals. They shared a goal more important than those which guide too many of the people today. All they wanted was the chance to live in freedom.

They fought, and many died, to build a democracy for Texas as others had fought and died to build a democratic system of government for a young nation called the United States. To live free, they knew they had to have a democratic government—a government of, by and for the people.

Their wisdom, earned often at great cost, told them that only by directing their government with their own hands and voices could they guarantee their own freedom. When people guide the activities of a government, it cannot impost unwanted shackles upon them.

Once again, the people have exercised their right to direct the activities of their government. A majority of the people of Texas, by a 500,000 vote margin, have called this Constitutional Convention. It was not the brainstorm of public relations professionals. It was not the creation of the political scientists. It was the people who left their homes—went to their voting places—and cast their ballots in favor of this Convention that have caused us to be here today.

It must be obvious to you as it is to me that they did not seek this Convention as a whim or because they wanted to give their legislators busy work to occupy our time between sessions. They called this Convention because they felt our constitution needed some revision, and we shall do our best to comply with their wishes expressed at the polls.

Just as the first Texans were concerned with basic things—I believe we here in the next weeks should devote ourselves to

considering the simple principles and basic structures of our government.

We have a mandate from the people. We must rewrite our Constitution. Each of us has, I would expect, his own interpretation of why the people want a new constitution. I think they recognize the difficulty which this government, already functioning in extraordinary times, must face by virtue of a constitution designed for another century.

The people want good government. Those of us currently serving in this state government have, I hope, accomplished a good deal toward this end. I think the people understand that by calling this Convention, they are enabling us to revise our basic document, the organic law, so that we have even greater ability to insure the best of government to the people of Texas.

I sincerely feel that a very high percentage of our people want the best government we can have, and I also believe the Delegates to this Convention sincerely want to see the best document we can write produced by this Convention...one that we can support and recommend to our people for adoption.

It is my sincere hope that we can disagree without being disagreeable.

It is my sincere hope that we will be patient with our colleagues who may not see something exactly as we do.

I hope that we will show our colleagues the same courtesy and respect that we want for ourselves.

It is easy to sit on the sidelines and complain and fuss about things, but it is something else to be a constructive, even though critical, worker to make things better, or to make our colleagues know we mean to do the right thing as we see it.

It is good to discuss issues regardless of how controversial they may be, but let us always remember our colleague has a right to his or her opinion.

There are some of the recommendations of the Revision Commission that I feel are too far reaching; there are some provisions of the present Constitution which they have omitted that I feel should be retained and in some instances strengthened, but I think that the Commission on the whole did a fine job and the document they presented is a vehicle with which we can work, and I am appreciative of the work done by the Commission and congratulate them on a fine job.

Please let me say a word about you, my colleagues. I have been a member of this legislature since January 1933, and am now beginning my 42nd year.

Some of the finest men and women I have ever known, I have met and served with here in this House and Senate. Some of the finest people I have ever met have been right here in Austin. I sincerely believe that it is possible for us to come up with a document that will meet with the approval of our people. If we have a disagreement, let us sit down around a committee table and resolve our differences, keeping in mind that we are all trying to do the same thing—write a Constitution that our people will approve, and that a majority of this Convention can recommend.

Please let me mention the committees

which I saw yesterday afternoon and last night until almost midnight. I sincerely feel that every effort has been made to balance the committees so that all views will be represented in each committee. More than 140 of the 181 members got their first choice as requested on the card sent out by the committee.

I do not know the English language well enough to really express to you how deeply I appreciate the high honor you have given me, and I shall just say to each of you—I am indeed very humble and most grateful and will do my best to serve to the best of my ability.

At the conclusion of the address by the Vice-President, the President presented him with the gavel which had been used on yesterday during his election as Vice-President, and a copy of C.C.R. 8, providing for today's ceremonies.
