It all eleps much, and feeds chiefly on the brack of the juniper buffers to winter, the flow ferces him for drink; and, in fummer, he drinks water, which he laps like a dog. The flavages cat his felhs, and clottle themselves with his fur, after depriving it of the guills and brilles.
