After a brief sojourn with the Mercury label, which produced her 1979 album, 'Sunny California', Mary McCaslin is back to a small label with her sixth solo album in twelve years.

Born and raised in California she recorded her first album in 1969 for the Barnaby label, before moving to the independent Philo company, where a further

three albums were released during the '70's.

Cast in the mould of her previous albums, the instrumentation remains fairly conventional, sparse and generally acoustic, although I did notice drums featured on a couple of tracks.

In her choice of songs Mary manages to cover most fields, from traditional to pop and this album is no exception.

She has retained her

Cowboy / Western Vision as the central core of this album. with tracks such as husband Jim Ringer's song 'The Band Of Jesse James', Paul Siebel's 'Pinto Pony' and 'Farewell Lone Ranger', by M. Rust. These tracks are reinforced by three of her own songs including the title cut, although my favourite is 'Northfield' which opens the album; and it isn't even about the James Gang.

From the pop field Mary has drawn Mike Nesmith's 'Some Of Shelley's Blues', a 1969 hit for the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, plus the mid-'60's hit for the Supremes / Vanilla Fudge, 'You Keep Me Hangin' On'.

This is yet another in the string of excellent McCaslin albums • ARTHUR WOOD
