History and Purpose of COMA Comerciantes Organizados Mexico Americanos

COMA grew from the organizational efforts of Mr. Bidal Aguero, Editor of La Voz Newspaper, and other interested businessmen, whose goal was the founding of a Chicano Chamber of Commerce. The first meeting of COMA was held at Guadalupe Center, with only a handful of persons attending that meeting.

Throughout the first year, Mr. Aguero, who had been appointed as temporary President, presided. A subsequent meeting was held where the following officers and directors were elected: Mr. Ismael Hernandez, Vice-President, Mr. Juan Antonio Reyes, Secretary, Mr. Roy Montelongo, as Treasurer, along with Mr. Marcos Garcia - Ayala, Mr. Ramon Chapa, Mr. Jorge Moreno, Mr. Albert Perez, and Mr. Julio Ysasaga as directors. This "steering" body of successful businessmen and professional provided the leadership which assured the initial success of the "Chmber" and provided twenty initial members.

At the time of inception, office space was acquired through the generosity of Mr. Aguero and Mr. Agustin Medina, owners of La Voz, where COMA began functioning. Now COMA Has a permanent office located at the Myrick Building, at 1215 Avenue J. Mr. Hector de Leon was hired to work as the Executive Director in September 1975. His position was made possible through the CETA Program on the city's SPAG (South Plains Association of Governments). Office equipment was provided by Mr. Moreno and Mr. Chapa as well as other members of the organization. The COMA as well as other art material was designed by Mr. De Leon, who is also a Commercial Artist.

The major event taking place the 27th of February was the banquet of the Comerciantes Organizados Mexico-Americanos. This event that culminates the efforts of the members of this organization is a toast to itself as well as to the community; thanks to the members, the formation of this organization has been brought about.



But, what is COMA? What makes it stand out above other organizations? What is its significance? What are its purposes?

COMA, who centuries represent, Comerciantes Organizados Mexico-Americanos is an organization recently formed by a group of merchants, professionals, and other persons in the city of Lubbock and the surrounding area, whose interests have been based on the economic development and the progress of the Mexican-American community. In other words it is somewhat similar to a Chamber of Commerce, since its activities, purposes and interesdts run parallel to those of a Chamber of Commerce. Nevertheless, the reason for which the title distinguishes it as an organiztion of merchants, and not a Chamber of Commerce is that aisde from having the functions of a Chamber, it also has some alternative purposes, such as the progress of the Mexican-American community.

Lake a Chamber, the majority of COMA is made up of men and women, owners and managers of businesses; COMA is at the service of those persons who are interested in establishing a business or simply in improving their present one. This can be done by using the variety of services COMA offers. Now they can also count on the resorts of the Chamber of Commerce of Lubbock just as other similar Mexican Chambers of Commerce of the state of Texas.

As an organization, similar to others, whose purpose is the advancement and progress of Mexican-Americans, it is a center of activities thanks to the members and their diversified interests.

What separates COMA from other organizations is the deed it offers to all persons interested; merchants or professionals that are interested in the economic development of the community, city, and naturally their own business. In order to take advantage, people need to join together in order to become a group, a union and not individuals. But, most of all, the principal purpose of COMA, like that of other Mexican-American organizations, is the public service to the community, and its contribution to the progress and development of the city.

Outstanding Businessman of the Year Mr. Jorge Moreno



Jorge Moreno was chosen this year by COMA members as Businessman of the Year for his success in business and also his outstanding contributions to Lubbock. Jorge Moreno was born in La Feria, Texas on October 3, 1915. He attended his first 2 years of pre-school in La Palma, Tamaulipas, Mexico and finished primary in Saltillo, Coahuila, Mexico. Colegio Roberts. He then graduated from High School in La Feria, Texas in 1935. Mr. Moreno attended 2½ years of pre-med school at Union College in Lincoln, Nebraska. During the Second World War, he served in the

U.S. Air Force as a pilot instructor and overseas in the Pacific as an Airplane Commander in the B-29 Bomber.

After the War, Mr. Moreno and his family established a dry goods business in Harlingen, Texas and from that the business grew into another dry goods store in Elsa, Texas and a grocery and meat market in La Feria, Texas. In 1951, Mr. Moreno was elected to the City Council in Elsa, Texas. In 1951, Mr. Moreno and his family moved to Lubbock and established La Feria, a dry goods store, for 5 years. In 1957, La Feria was converted to a Record Shop.

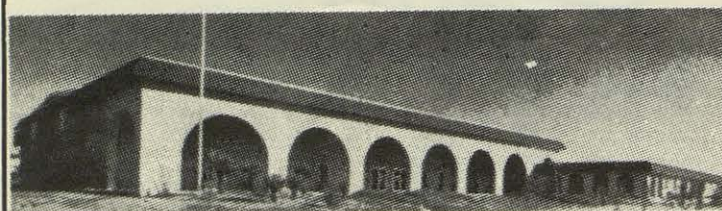

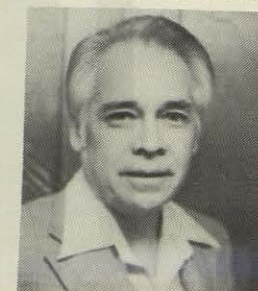
In ending a year as President of COMA, I want to express my appreciation to all the members who have been active and have helped in the various projects that we have had for COMA.

Mr. Ignacio Cisneros

Mr. Ignacio Cisneros, born and raised in Juarez, Mexico, came to the United States at the age of 21.

His first job in the United States was as a dishwasher in an El Paso restaurant. Having previously worked in Juarez, Mexico, as a bank teller, he was determined to succeed in the United States.

A few months after his arrival in the United States, Mr. Cisneros started working as a laborer in the insulation industry. This proved to be the turning point in his employment career. He worked as a truck driver, a warehouseman, worked in shipping and receiving, in purchasing and then 12 years after having started out as a laborer, was made Vice-President of the company. For a man who had been a U.S. citizen for only seven years, this was quite an accomplishment.

At age of 33, with an investment of \$3,000, Mr. Cisneros was cofounder of Star Insulation Company.

Ever resourceful and innovative, Mr. Cisneros took the initiative to design and build much of the firm's operating equipment — some of which is still in use today. An initial investment of \$3,000 is now netting sales of over two million dollars a year.

Most recently, Star Insulation was merged with Perry Gass Company. Perry Gas Company is considered to be one of the most efficient and potentially largest processor of gas in the State of Texas. Mr. Cisneros remains as President of Star Insulation and now serves as a member of the Board of Directors of Perry Gas Company.

It is said that those individuals with foresight are the ones that benefit from

the future. Long before energy conservation became a major issue, Mr. Cisneros was experimenting with energy conservation.

His extensive background and experience in commercial insulation were put forward in the designing and development of a solar appliance that could be manufactured and sold at a price affordable to the average person. After more than five years of testing, and at a considerable investment, the solar appliance that could be manufactured and sold at a price affordable to the average person. After more than five years of testing, and at a considerable investment, the solar appliance is presently on the market.

As a sponsor of the Odessa College Chicano Club, Mr. Cisneros recognizes the importance of cultural awareness. He personally researched and developed a color slide-presentation depicting the beautiful culture and traditions of Mexico. He donated this production to Odessa College in hopes that it would benefit the total student body, faculty, staff and other interested persons.

Mr. Cisneros' business ventures demand much of his time; never, however at the expense of his family or church. In addition, Mr. Cisneros has demonstrated that success in business in the United States is possible without having to reject the valuable language and cultural influences of his Mexican heritage.

Mr. Cisneros has undertaken other business ventures. More recently, Mr. Cisneros was the organizer of an enterprise similar to that of his first occupation in Juarez. In 1977, Mr. Cisneros became co-founder, stockholder, and director of Odessa's bank, the Western National Bank.

However, Mr. Cisneros' interest is not solely business. In his youth, he financed his own education by working as a shoe-shine boy and as a service station attendant. Today, Mr. Cisneros' interest in education is expressed in philanthropic fashion. His pledge of \$25,000 to Holy Redeemer Seminary in LaCombe, Louisiana, has been designated to finance training of prospective Catholic deacons. Mr. Cisneros is also an ordained Catholic Deacon.



Mark White, 37, resigned as Secretary of State to seek the Democratic nomination for Attorney General in the May Primary.

During his five years as Secretary of State, White gained national recognition for his work in modernizing and streamlining the agency's operation while expanding its responsibilities. He was the only Texan and youngest person ever to be elected president of the National Association of Secretaries of State.

As Secretary of State, White has reduced red tape, increased effective services, especially in connection with election laws and voter registration. At the same time, White returned to the state treasury more than \$4.2 million, one out of every four dollars appropriated.

He serves on the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary Advisory Council and the Christian Education Coordinating Board. He served three active years with the 36th Division, Texas National Guard. He earned his Business Administration degree from Baylor and is a graduate of Baylor Law School.

History and Purpose of COMA

Comerciantes Organizados Mexico Americanos

Comerciantes Organizados Mexico Americanos or as it has grown to be known, COMA, is an organization of Chicano businesspersons and professionals which grew out of the organizational efforts of Bidal Aguero. It was in December of 1973, that a group of businessmen called together by Mr. Aguero gathered to organize COMA. This was the second effort to try to follow through with initial plans which were conceived almost one year prior and had failed to materialize into an organization.

The businessmen present at this organizational meeting in December were: Roy Montelongo, Gilbert Flores, Pete Alcorde, Ismael Hernandez, Gonzalo Ramirez, Bidal Aguero, Manuel Alaniz, and Agustin Medina. It was at the urging of Roy Montelongo to act without delay that the organization was officially chartered as a non-profit organization by the State of Texas in February of 1974.

Throughout the first year, Mr. Aguero, who had been appointed as temporary President, presided. A subsequent meeting was held where the following officers and directors were elected: Mr. Ismael Hernandez, Vice President; Mr. Tony Reyes, Secretary; Mr. Roy Montelongo Treasurer, along with directors, Mr. Marcos Garcia Ayala, Mr. Ramon Chapa, Mr. Jorge Moreno, Mr. Albert Perez, and Mr. Julio Ysasaga. This steering body of successful businessmen and professionals provided the leadership

which assured the initial success of the "Mexican American Chamber of Commerce — COMA" and provided twenty initial members.

During the second year, Gilbert Flores presided as President of the organization. It was a year of much success and outstanding recognition. It was during COMA's second year that a state organization, The Texas Association of Mexican American Chambers of Commerce, was chartered. At the first state convention, two members of COMA, Bidal Aguero and Tony Reyes, were elected Vice-President and Secretary, respectively, of the state-wide organization, TAMACC. COMA grew to be recognized and respected throughout the State and Nation.

It was during this administration that members of COMA, Gilbert Flores and Bidal Aguero along with Executive Director, Hector DeLeon, traveled to Washington D.C. for a series of meeting sponsored by the U.S. Department of Commerce—Office of Minority Business Enterprise for TAMACC. Delegates to the Washington meeting met with top administrators of S.B.A., V.A., C.S.A., E.D.A., and the Under Secretary of Commerce. The highlight of the trip was an opportunity to attend a reception held for President Gerald Ford by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce at which delegates met and talked with the President.

In January of 1976, Roy Montelongo was elected President
