My Dear Daughter,

We received Sallie's letter today, and were quite relieved by it, as we could not account for the delay.

Your Ma's health is as usual. She has been troubled for some days past with sore mouth. it is better, under Aunt Lile's treatment. I was somewhat unwell for several days after my return home, but as well as usual now.

Mr. & Mrs. Kirtly, have left gone to Penn County. Your Aunt Mollie, is with me, on her way home as she calls it. She will be about two weeks. I will probably go home on this boat, and will in that event meet Sallie and Mrs.throp, at Nashville. Your Ma, & Rich, will have a lonely time of it. We have no news of local interest. The fall of Richmond is glorious news over which all ought to rejoice.

I have not yet determined to move to Flunneburg. although the question is so far settled that I will do so if I can sell our

house. I have not seen the parties
who were talking of purchasing,
since I came home.

I am going to make an effort
to sell and Mice do so if possible
Dr Ellis, says he will go too if I
do. This latter he don't want spoken
of. He is trying to sell, but if I
can sell he will go whether he
sells or not.

I write with much labor on
account of the boat shaking.

Fox Springs Ky April 5th 1863

My dear niece

I received your most welcome letter on last Monday evening and thinking this about as good an opportunity as I shall have soon of answering it I will avail my self of the time for so doing I have got all of my little folks to bed. (but I dont know how long master Tommie is going to stay there as he is a privileged character and gets up when he pleases) your uncle and Josie has gone to Lewis and the girl that is living with us and myself are all that is up and I have no doubt I shall get very sleepy before I get through so if you find my letter rather disconnected I know you will have the goodness to excuse it. In the first place I must assure you that I was delighted to get your letter I had been looking for one so long I had began to entertain some thoughts that you had forgotten me but since receiving yours such thoughts are dispelled our family have had only tolerably good health this winter your Uncle has not been very well since last August but able to be about all the time he has suffered very much with rheumatism in his knee so much so at times that he could scarcely get about, for the last week or so his health has not been as good as usual but having business in Clarksburg that he was obliged to go to attend to I thought it best that Josie should go with him he has grown so tall you would hardly know him he is if any difference taller than his Pa and weighs 419 ^{lbs} the children have all grown very fast this winter and the worst of it is we have had no school this winter for

them it is now a year since Josie has went to school a day consequently he is so backward and out of practice that he is almost ashamed to write to you but thinks he will try, but among so many correspondents I judge his epistle would appear pretty lame we tried last fall to get a private teacher but did not get one we have had no school in our district since last august we have too many children to send them all away to school we will soon have seven children that is old enough to go to school as Mary and Emma will be six years old in may we would have sent Josie away to school after we found we could not find a teacher in this part of the country but owing to the unsettled state of the country we could not make up our minds where to send him unless he had went to Decatur with Ella, I got a letter from her last thursday she was well but her aunt Susan was sick in bed the most of the time and had been for two or three days Ella says their examination commences next tuesday evening they are making considerable preparation for it, her Pa has given her leave if she chooses to stay three months longer, as school will commence again soon, she is very anxious to see us all but if she comes home she can not go back again as I do not want her to travel so much alone Josie is too young and inexperienced to go back and forth for her and her Pa is not able so I expect she will conclude to stay as she would so much rather go to school there than in Flemingsburg we want to see her very badly but knowing that it is for her good to be there we must be reconciled to it. Your uncle Albert got home last monday his health is not good nor has not been for some time he looks very pale and thin he has chronic diarrhoea.
