films featured during literature symposium

Tech's Comparative Literature Symposium—Jan. 28-30 "From Surrealism to the Absurd" will be augmented with films sponsored by the Union.

Films of works by great modern playwrights will be presented during the symposium throughout the day

Two films by Samuel Beckett will be shown at 10:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. Jan. 28-29 and one by Eugene Ionesco will be shown at 12:30 and 4:30 p.m.

"Eh Joe" by Beckett features George Rose and the voice of Rosemary Harris. It is an excellent rendition of the Beckett piece originally written for BBC television and produced here in 1966. Directed by Alan Schneider, the play was produced by Glenn Jordan for the New York Television Theatre.

"Film" also by Beckett was the last movie made by the great comic master Buster Keaton. It is a one-character play without dialogue. It is the winner of awards at Venice, Tours and Oberhausen. It is also directed by Schneider and is edited by Sydney Meyers. Photography is by Boris Kaufman.

"The Goad" also by Beckett, was directed by Paul Joyce. It is Beckett's mime for two players. This screen adaptation by young English filmmakers won Beckett's hearty approval and laughter.

"The Lesson" by Eugene Ionesco is the final presentation of the series. Fred Gwynne won an Emmy Award for his performance in this piece. The satire, pathos and shock of Ionesco's intriguing piece are finely maintained in this excellently acted and directed production. The movie was nominated for Emmy Awards in Acting, Direction and Set Design, 1967.

films depict early 20th century

"America Enters the 20th Century," a series of award-winning films by NBC, will be presented by the Ideas and Issues Committee beginning Jan. 24. The films will be shown each Saturday at 2 p.m. in the Coronado Room. These motion pictures dramatically and accurately present the people, places and events of the years 1901-1950.

The films picture the sights and sounds of a growing nation as they become the mainstream of life in the United States from the great influx of immigrants at the turn of the century, to the eruption of war in Korea. From the early automobile to the development of rockets — these films vividly depict the changing face and character of America.

"The Innocent Years" will be shown Jan. 24. Covering American history from 1901-1914, this film deals primarily with the industrial growth of the nation. It is the time of the early automobile, big business, humming factories and industrial giants.

"The Great War," set for Jan. 31, shows the development of World War I in Europe and A merica's imminent entrance into the war. Final scenes show American troops returning from the conflict, believing they have fought the war to end all wars and have at last made the world safe for democracy.

"The Jazz Age," Feb. 7, is the era of prohibition. "Normalcy" means speakeasies, jazz and the movies. The film depicts the flapper, racketeers and gangs, flaming youth and the Charleston. The nation is on a wild bootleg binge—singing

and dancing its way toward Black Tuesday. The movie covers the years from 1919-1929.

February 14 "Life in the Thirties" will be presented and the series ends March 7 with "Not So Long Ago."

Students will be admitted on their ID's.

Coffee House will open again on the Tech campus Jan. 29-31 and Feb. 26-28. The two previous programs brought through the national Coffee House Circuit have brought wide acclaim from student audiences.

January's Coffee House will feature Dave Bradstreet, 22-year-old folksinger. February's program spotlights Leatherwood and Lisa, psychedelic rock group who have performed on campuses throughout the world.

The Thursday night Coffee House will be open from 7:30-10:30 p.m. and Friday and Saturday night hours will be extended from 8-11:30 p.m.

The Special Events Committee plans to schedule student entertainment between circuit performers.

January's Coffee House will be held in the Ballroom and the February Coffee House will regain the usual setting and atmosphere in the Coronado Room.

Pre-registration for Tech students will be held on campus the week of January 26-February 4. Registration fee of \$2.50 will admit the student delegate to the four seminars of his choice.

Tickets for the opening banquet, Thursday evening, February 5 at 7:00 p.m. can also be purchased during pre-registration for an additional \$2.50. It is not necessary to be a registered delegate to attend the banquet.

Outstanding Australian officials will deliver key addresses and lead in seminars.

The honorable H. Neil Truscott, Consul General to the Western States of the United States has had wide experience in his country's foreign service both in Australia and in other countries. 
