THE BIGGEST ONE INVOLVED VETERAN SLUGGER FRANK ROBINSON, WHO WILL BE WARING A DODGER UNIFORM MEXT SEASON INSTEAD OF AN ORIOLE OUTFIT. ROBINSON IS THE ONLY PLAYER IN HISTORY TO NED THE MOST VETERAND WILLIE MAYS AND MARK AARON INCHED CLOSER TO BABE RUTH'S RECORD 714 HOMERS. THE FEELING WAS THAT AARON MIGHT REACH RUTH BEFORE HE PUT ON HIS SPIKES FOR THE FINAL TIME. FOR MAYS, AGE BECAME A BIG FACTOR.

NINETEEN-SEVETY-ONE WAS THE YEAR THAT JACK NICKLAUS MISSED BY INCHES OF WINNING A COUPLE OF GOLF TOURNAMENTS HE WANTED BADLY. IT WAS ALSO THE YEAR THAT LEE TREVINO FOUND OUT HOW GOOD HE IS.

EVERY GOLFER DREAMS OF SWEEPING THE BIG ONES---THE MASTERS... P-G-A...U-S OPEN...AND BRITISH OPEN.

ON THE LAST SUNDAY IN FEBRUARY, NICKLAUS WAS ON THE VERGE OF BECOMING THE FIRST GOLFER TO CAPTURE THE WORLD'S TOP FOUR GOLF TITLES AT LEAST TWICE. THE SCENE---PALM BEACH GARDESN, FLORIDA...THE FINAL ROUND OF THE P-G-A CHAMPIONSHIP.

THREE BOGEYS IN THE FIRST FIVE HOLES ERASED A FIVE-STROKE BULGE TO A SINGLE STROKE OVER BILLY CASPER, WHO DROPPED AN 13-FOOT BIRDIE PUTT ON THE FINAL HOLE. NICKLAUS. FACE TOLD THE STORY AS HE SLOWLY WALKED UP THE FINAL FAIRWAY ON THAT APRIL SUNDAY IN GEORGIA. A COUPLE OF CLUTCH 12-FOOT BIRDIE PUTTS MADE THE DIFFERENCE AND THE 33-YEAR OLD COODY FINISHED TWO STROKES AHEAD OF NICKLAUS AND JOHN MILLER. SO ENDED NICKLAUS. BID FOR A GRAND-SLAM IN 1971.

BUT THE U-S OPEN WAS NEXT AND NICKLAUS WAS IN THE THICK OF THE STRUGGLE ON THE RUGGED AND HISTORIC MERION COURSE JUST OUTSIDE PHILADELPHIA.

QUITE A YEAR, FOR A FELLOW WHO ONCE HAD TO BORROW 200-DOLLARS IN AN ATTEMPT TO QUALIFY FOR HIS FIRST U-S OPEN IN THE EARLY 605.





IN 1945, THE EAGLES PLACED A THREE-YEAR CONTRACT IN FRONT OF VAN BUREN...BUT HE SAID NO...INSISTING ON A ONE YEAR PACT WITH THE REASONING BEING THAT HE HAD YET TO PROVE HIMSELF IN PRO BALL.

IT DIDN'T TAKE LONG FOR HIM TO DO JUST THAT. THE EAGLES WERE PLAYING THE THEN CHICAGO CARDINALS IN PHILADELPHIA. VAN BUREN WAS ON THE KICKOFF TEAM AND STARTED THINGS OFF BY RETURNING THE BOOT TO THE REDBIRDS 47-YARD LINE.

ON THE FIRST PLAY FROM SCRIMMAGE VAN BUREN GOT THE CALL. THE ST. LOUIS DEFENSE HAD THE INTENDED HOLE PLUGGED...BUT THAT DID NOT DETER THE FORMER L-S-U FLASH. VAN BUREN PUT HIS SHOULDER DOWN AND NEVER STOPPED. AFTER HE HAD LEFT THE CARDS FORWARD WALL IN HIS WAKE HE---AS THE LATE VINCE LOMBARDI SAID---RAN FOR DAYLIGHT.

THAT WAS THE FIRST OF TWO TOUCHDOWNS VAN BUREN WAS TO SCORE IN JUST SIX MINUTES OF PLAYING TIME AGAINST CHICAGO THT DAY. FROM THEN ON THERE WAS NO QUESTION THAT STEVE VAN BUREN COULD MATCH MOVES WITH ANYBODY ON THE PRO GRIDIRON. AC1158A8-29CDT
