In the name of God, Amen, I Thomas
Hampton, of Pittsylvania Co., make following
Will & Testament -

I give to loving wife Tract of land I now
live on with all appurtenances thereof,
at her death to be divided as follows:

To son Henry, a certain tract in Sunny
County, North Carolina, on Blues, wherein
he now lives, containing 656 acres.

To son James, a negro boy Bob, to the
tract wherein I now live, to be divided
between him and my son John Hampton,
containing by portion 195 acres.

Also to son James my riding horse, and one
young roan mare, one buckskin jum,
and $\frac{1}{5}$ of all stocks.

To son Preston the 200 acres wherein
he now lives, to him, or any heir he should
choose except his wife Elizabeth Hampton.

1 Rige gun and $\frac{1}{5}$ of all stocks.

To son John Hampton one negro man
Dick, and my Still, one feather bed, and
furniture, one Roan horse, and all household
chimbers, and $\frac{1}{5}$ of all stocks. "And one
more feather bed to John."

To son-in-law, and daughter James and
Margaret L. Colquitt, 100 acres wherein
they now live, and one negro woman Hannah.

1st daughter Nancy Young, one negro
man Daniel, at her death to go to eldest

son Thomas Hampton young -
executors wife Sarah and sons Preston & John -
dated July 28, 1790
Thomas Hampton (Seal)

Son Thomas, deceased, widow now Nancy

Deed dated Nov. 4, 1809.

James Hampton and wife Hannah of
the State of Kentucky, sell to -
John Hampton of Pittsylvania, for the
sum of £ 90, 97 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres on Cascade
creek, "being half of the improvement
where Thomas Hampton for many
years occupied".

Deed dated July 14, 1806 —

Preston Hampton and Eliza his wife
of County of Pendleton, State of Kentucky,
sell to John Hampton of Pittsburgh,
in the sum of £ 200 for a tract of
land in Pittsburgh, on Concourse Creek,
containing 200 acres, where Preston
Hampton formerly occupied, being the
part that was willed him by
Thomas Hampton, dec'd —

October 22, 1798 —

Mr Preston Hampton received
 negro boy Aaron in full of all claim against
 the estate of Charles Connor dec'd and
 doth agree to set up no further
 claim for the widow's Dower —
 Jeremiah Wade —

John Hampton also purchases a piece of land from
James Colquitt, so he seems to have brought
from his brother & sister their father's old estate,
he being the only one to remain in Pittsburgh.

Received of James Ireland one dollar and
fifty cents in linen at being in ~~out of~~ his
acc^t, on schoolting,

Eliza Crelcher

July 24th 1823

Being requested by Mr Ireland Senr. to

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS,

THAT I, *Joshua Soule* one of the Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in the United States of America, under the protection of Almighty God, and with a single eye to his glory; by the imposition of my hands and prayer, have this day set apart *William Hampton* for the office of a **DEACON**, in the said Methodist Episcopal Church, South, a man who, in the judgment of the *Kentucky* Annual Conference, is well qualified for that work: and he is hereby recommended, to all whom it may concern, as a proper person to administer the ordinance of Baptism, Marriage, and the Burial of the Dead, in the absence of an Elder, and to feed the flock of Christ, so long as his spirit and practice are such as become the Gospel of Christ, and he continueth to hold fast the form of sound words, according to the established doctrines of the Gospel.

In Testimony Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal, this *Twenty seventh* day of *September* in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and *Forty six.*
