We've remarked before that Austin music has better lines of communication with Europe than with the continental USA. This month, MCT features French label New Rose, its major Austin star and its rockabilly roster, a particularly striking example of the phenomenon, but there are many other examples, from the UK (Joe Ely, Butch Hancock, David Halley, Jesse Taylor, Ponty Bone, Texana Dames, Kimmie Rhodes, Freddie Steady), to Finland(High Noon), to Japan (Charlie Sexton), and beyond.

• A recent Austin item, Calvin Russell generalised, rather patronisingly, that Europeans "equate raw with real, unpolished with uncompromising," as if this were quaint and eccentric. Generalising in return, it can be said that in Europe production values don't enjoy the same dominance over content as they do shown a consistent genius for synthesising and in America, where, as minimal exposure to mass re-exporting American grassroots music, media demonstrates, you really can polish a turd.

generalisation-tend to be far more independent minded, cynical if you like, than Americans. Not only are advertising & promotion much less effective, but big buck advertisers and promotors have very little influence, resulting in a incomparably freer press. Advertisers spend their money and take their chances. A megahyped major label dog can get butchered or ignored, while a small indie's no advertising budget release can get major attention-

the rise of Michelle Shocked on Cooking Vinyl is a classic example.

· Maverick, or at least unconstrained, critics and their maverick, or at least open-minded, readers, actively seek out music that doesn't have to be raw and unpolished but is real, uncompromising, honest, heartfelt, vital, innovative, exciting or meaningful. Pace-setting European indies flourish by taking chances unthinkable to blinkered major labels and injudicious for American indies, cut off from mainstream publicity outlets.

• Indies look to America (and Africa, Latin America and round the world) because that's where the vitality is. Britain, in particular, has overlooked at the macro level. But, in general, Europeans—once more, a massive Europe's short on genuine invention and talent, while the World Music movement has dramatically increased the demand for the Real Thing. Getting back to New Rose, rockabilly fans, for instance, wherever they are, depend on European indies for both reissues and new releases from American artists.

> • Many bemoan Austin music's lack of commercial success, but we feel that European indie interest is a truer validation of what Texas has offer. Music is, after all, an art form, and anybody who puts financial rewards over artistic recognition is pure and simple a phony.

probably none odder. Apart from a couple of Europe. I think I'm kind of an interesting pages of MCT reviews and previews, a recent Statesman item, in which his name was consistently misspelt, and some British reviews, the whole raving stack is in French or German. Whether talking about Calvin Russell's first New Rose album, Crack In Time (reviewed MCT #19), which has already hit 60,000 sales, or his gigs, European critics-and audienceshave seen precisely what America, including Austin, has missed-"poetry, violence and sensitivity"-the existentialist hero as Texas rock 'n' roller.

• Sixty thou (and rising) is a mess of albums. "Calvin is doing fantastically well," said New Rose boss Patrick Mathé during a SXSW break. "Right now, everywhere in Europe, he is bigger than Joe Ely, bigger than any Texas artist, well, perhaps not ZZ Top, but that's all. We shipped 2,500 copies of the first album, the next one, we will ship 25,000 and I am sure, absolutely sure, it will go gold." That's Stories From The Fourth World (see Reviews), cut for \$6,000. Born in Austin 42 years ago, Russell's life and hard times are etched in his face. From near starvation as a hippy singer-songwriter in 70s California and some serious Texan and Mexican jail time, it's been a long haul. Now that things are breaking his way, he's actually feeling "a little numb" as he adjusts from scrambling for Austin dates to coping with the intricacies of being flown to Amsterdam for a single concert.

There are thicker press kits in Austin, but •"I have no idea why they like me so much in person. I've had an interesting life, and I guess they look at me and figure I've got some interesting things to say." Russell's stock in trade as a songwriter is tough minded sensitivity, a poetic view of life stripped clean, by friction with the real world, of illusions and pretences, transmitted through the medium of particularly intense and relentless rock & roll. To some, his vision may seem harsh, violent and abrasive, to others it's a rare and welcome alternative to the cloying sentiment, hollow pretentions and shallow emotions of the over-privileged and under-experienced who dominate popular music.

> •Russell is still reaching audiences. "We're in Japan now, apparently they flipped over old Calvin. We'll be going there at the end of the year. I don't care about Austin, or getting an American deal. What we've got going, touring four months of the year, that's enough for me.' The Fourth World? "That's right here inside or under the First World. That's us, you and me, all of us who don't have any say. We can see them, but they can't see us too good.'



FEX **CALVINRUSSELL** SOUNDS FROM THE FOURTH WORLD

(New Rose, all formats) Has success mellowed 'Snake' Russell? His second album opens with a love song! But about as unsentimental as you can get-"I'm sure that another man could keep you happy, if I didn't." This time round Russell, or Russel as the Statesman will have it, isn't quite as in your face as on his first, another way of saving that if you don't like this one, you'll really hate the other. Once again with the extraordinary team of Gary Craft lead guitar, David Waddell bass, Leland Waddell drums, Joe Gracey producing, Russell relies more on other people's songs, burning his own jagged brand on Jubal Clark's Love Stealer, Steve White's Crossroads and Rich Minus' Rockin' The Republicans and Last Night, though Josh White's One Meatball, in two versions, one (CD only) acoustic with Tomas Ramirez on sax, is an odd choice-Robert Johnson's Hell Hound On My Trail would be more like it. Standouts are Maybe Some Day (Things Will Get Better), with a blistering guitar intro by Craft that, heresy of heresies, bears comparison with Link Wray, and Crossroads, but the whole album carries forward the New Rose project of redefining Texas rock & roll. Not for the nervous. IC

RECORD & TAPE REVIEW **LESLOKEY** LOKEY MUSIC

(independent cassette)

The good news for Texas music lovers is that After her Austin trio, Child Bearing Hips, Lokey, just in from New Mexico, was born in Mercedes, Texas, raised in Port Isabel. The bad news, for singers, songwriters and acoustic guitarists at least, is that this extraordinarily gifted young woman is looking to settle in Austin. Listening to her "Acoustic Rock & Righteous Blues," her vocal power, passion and whisper to a scream dynamic range remind one irresistably of Janis Joplin, but this is a Janis who can also write and pick, though not always arrange. Lullaby 4 Love (a total knockout), Sad & Beautiful, Wax Museum and All Kinds are outstanding songs superbly executed, with Lokey responsible for all the excellent guitar work, but Howlin' ("I just might rip your heart out, And feed it to you, baby, Cause that's the kind of thing I like") is marred by excess background noises, as, to a lesser extent, is Let Me Live. The eight tracks end with avery sexy little cabaret number, Incredible; on top of everything else, Lokey is gorgeous. If I don't mention this, you won't give me points for sensitivity when you see her (try MCT Presents, Chicago House, May 5th), you'll just figure I need new glasses. With all she's got going for her, it's hard to see how she could keep from becoming a star. IC

FTHEL-ANN RAMBAMBI

(Elephant Patch, cassette)

broke up. Ann Powell returned to North Carolina, rediscovered her roots, and is doing things with country music that are impressive. exciting and-more I listen, more I'm convinced-important. Reminiscent of Link Wray and Mordecai Jones' idiosyncratic early 70s Accokek, Maryland albums, but with far stronger and denser lyrics, her post-modern hillbilly singing, songwriting and arranging reclaim the region's own music from the Middle American wasteland, and reinvent it as bluecollar poetry. With a distinctive and attractive voice, like a Brenda Lee who'd learned phrasing from Mary Travers, and some singular backing, some of Powell's songs, most specifically If You Do You Love Me, the amazing Pollvanna Cowgirl, You Need Some. Just A Little and, my favorite. Wait'n Wear, are nothing less than brilliant. She's less successful tackling cosmic subjects head-on (Like It Too Much, Moon Stand, Hide In Light) and some of the harmonies could have been mixed down, but if you can imagine a female, mountain and, frankly, maturer, even more intelligent version of The Flatlanders, you'd be getting the idea. Tell me this is the future of country music and you'll make me a happy cowboy. JC

KIRT KEMPTER STANDING ON THIS BRIDGE

(Red Dog, cassette)

Building from his 1990 debut, Kempter goes full scale with eight original songs, an instrumental, a Robert Service poem arrangement and songs by David Garza and Nancy Scott, featuring some predictably terrific musicianship from Marvin Denton, Greg Whitfield, Mike Mordecai, Chris Searles and, outstandingly, Rich Brotherton, Kempter turning in some sweet violin. Most assessible with a kind of post-traditional art-folk, Kempter's own Dunnigan's Deal, an Irishman saving his town by card-sharping the Devil. and Service's The Cremation Of Sam McGee are high spots, along with the Bruce Cockburn inspired polit-folker Nicaraguan Rain. For me. he comes sadly adrift with Tortuga, reminiscent of Moody Blues, would have done better to leave the humor to Nancy Scott (the delightful Lost In Austin), his own Hotel Zanuco, about vicious Central American mosquitos, comes across as cute in comparison, and "Checking out Galactic Hookers and Whores" (Catfish Town) is nonsense and doesn't scan. These lapses apart, Kemter's is a distinctive, intelligent and Jackie Newhouse (bass), plus Stan Moore, voice that, with thoughtful arrangements, Curly Joe Simpson, Ted Roddy and Sheila overcomes a rather flat vocal style. Anyway, you have to admire someone with the nerve to and a wealth of authentic guitar effects. Be the rhyme "gets in me" with Albuquerque! JC first on your block to hit the beach.

HIGHNOON

Train Of Miserv/Midnight Shift Rockin' Wildcat/Glory Bound (Rock-A-Billy, EP)

This brght yellow limited edition throwback could hardly have a more authentic source. The primal, barebones rockabilly trio-Shawn Young vocals, acoustic rhythm; Sean Mencher vocals, Telecaster; Kevin Smith slap bassoffer three originals by Young (Train) and Mencher (side 2), plus the Hank Ballard classic. in eminently collectible form, recorded at (The Other) Ed Miller's Texas Tube Room in Fort Worth, so called because of its genuine vintage Ampex tube-based equipment, which adds yet JC another dimension of versimilitude.

RAIAHKHAN TEXAN BY CHOICE

(independent cassette)

"In the land that I grew up, I couldn't find a way, to sing country music, back home in Bombay" (Del Rio). A while back, Frederickburg resident (and fluent German speaker) Khan was featured in the "screwball" section of a Texas Monthly cover story on country music, which was more than a little superficial, if not actually racist, because, for all that he was born on the other side of the world, Khan is country to the bone. What's more, he's nobody's fool; backing him on his ten originals are Jimmy Day steel, David Holt electric guitar, Riley Osborn piano, Jon Blondell bass, with James Tuttle engineering, so the tape, from Day's opening wail, never sounds less than 100% authentic. Khan's light, smooth Jim Reeves-like voice has a perceptible Englishas-a-second-language accent, but no more than. say, Freddy Fender, and a deft touch on phrasing. The stand-out song is clearly San Antonio, I'm Counting On You ("I know she loved you so, I know she loved me too"), with the uptempo When It Rains, It Pours, weepie Lisa Marie and late 50s pop-ish Sandy, Donna and Aufwiedersh'n all sound, if a tad selfconsciously commercial, though the tape winds up with Khan's endearing, and very personal, pledge of allegiance, Texan By Choice. IC

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MORE **PAUL TAYLOR** MATILDA & THE DREAMTIME

(Golden Egg, cassette)

The Didjeridoo, a soul-awakening aboriginal instrument, opens and threads together stories and songs collected by Australian Taylor, an Austin sojourner for the past year. Side One is Aboriginal dreamtime legends: First Sunrise, a native genesis story, explains beginnings and natural ways. Rainbow Serpent tells of human curiosity and nature's awesome ephermeral beauty, while Gurrukman The Frog illustrates hinterland preoccupation with water, not unlike that of our own Southwestern people, and also speaks of the power of laughter and the evil of greed. Brolga (which are birds) tells the legend of a talented dreamtime dancer, abducted by an evil spirit in the form of a willy-willy (dust devil where I come from) and taken into two black holes in the Milky Way. Corroboree is a It's About Time (for a change) carries a bit of contemporary poetry about traditional gatherings. Side Two's colonial and more modern folk tales link the European settlers with native traditions. Swagman's Farewell to Matilda, The Man From Snowy River, Man From Ironbark, The Play and MacArthur's Fart (my fave—I may memorize it). This collection showcases Taylor's storytelling mastery, grabbing and tickling imaginations of all ages. And, ohmigod, that didjeridoo makes group's name. There are more cuts and other this West Texas heart swoon. EM

BOWBRANNON HILARY'S EYE

(Full Contact Folk, cassette) The eleven diverse selections offered by this seasoned, mature singer/songwriter are backed by an array of impeccable players. At times, the subject matter gets too dark and down, and occasionally a lyrical mundanity creeps in to irritate the ear, but the collection as a whole has more to like than not. Brannon's pleasant, flexible voice and classically clean acoustic guitar work shine, although some pieces are a bit overproduced for my taste, and the electricguitar breaks on Storm At Sea, though excellent, could have been curtailed. The title tune, Hilary's Eyes, is sweet and sure to be a sentimental favorite, but for me, Merry-Go-Round, Damned If You Hesitate, Pioneer and Feelin' Fine which come mid-way through, offer the best sampling of Bow's range, heart and creative writing. Gene Elder's fiddle is employed to excellent advantage, especially in the Celtic gypsy wiles of Pioneer. Appropriate harmonies from Primitive Modern's Rick Stockton and Linda Johnson fill out creative instrumentations from Kenny Grimes (outstanding classical guitar), Keith Carperon various basses and Wes Starr on drums. It's good to have Brannon's more recent work so well captured on tape—it's been a while. EM up assault unit of live shows.

PRIMITIVEMODERNS **NOODLESOUP**

(Pinnacle, cassette)

Studios, proving that all the good stuff doesn't originate inside Austin City Limits. These folks do outstanding lead-ins to songs; most all are strong and unpredictable. Feed The Monster again shows off Johnson's vocal flexibility and the group's unusual topics and approaches to songwriting. In fact, all of songwriter/vocalist Rick Stockton's music, like Scott Wade's cover art, is clean and attention-getting, living up to the players, all worth hearing. EM

KINDRED'S SHAKEDOWN COLD SHOT (Pee Wee, cassette)

When you're with the WC Clark Blues Revue, you don't get to do anything else much in the evenings, so Mike Kindred's side project, "hardedged rock played and sung with all the emotional commitment of true blues" by Roddy Colonna (drums), Robert Atwood (guitar) and Kenny Coffman (bass), don't get out too often. The veteran keyboard player (Storm with Jimmie Vaughan, Triple Threat Revue with Stevie Ray, Joe Ely Band, Delbert and Johnny Copeland) also takes the vocals, with Lou Ann Barton helping out on I Get Dizzy, produced, wrote seven of the numbers, co-wrote the title track with WC, and arranged T-Bone Walker's Stormy Monday, with Lewis Cowdray, special guest on mouth harp, arranging John Lee Hooker's Serve You Right To Suffer. Other guests include Booka Michel congas and percussion, and Jon Smith tenor sax, and the playing behind Kindred's authentically raw, abrasive voice is rock solid, Atwood particularly effective on Body Talk and Cold Shot, Smith on I Get Dizzy and Love You, Michel on the jazzy instrumental Pulse, Kindred taking the spotlight on C Jam Boogie. 
(Rainlight, cassette)

Music from San Marcians out of Sailfish As MCT's documentation of Butch's musical siege goes, as he would say, own and own and own, it seems time to give some attention to his tape wraps. We won't spoil the treat by foretelling the messages in #10-14 which are sure to go ... (you know). Meantime, #9 brings 10 more Butch wonders, backed by Spider Johnson's searing saw, plus harmonica duels between Hancock and Gary Primich, Paul Sweeney's mandolin, Larry Lange on bass and Gonzo Fred (no vowels) Krc on drums. > **CHRISTIANE BIRD** THE JAZZ & BLUES LOVER'S GUIDE TO THE US

(Addison-Wesley, paperback)

Like chauvinist locals everywhere, we turn immediately to the home town-under 'Texas,' the only state in an otherwise regional guideand use it as a benchmark to give this ambitious project, 900+"hot clubs, cool joints, landmarks and legends, from Boogie-Woogie to Bop and Beyond," San Francisco yuppie jazz to East St. Louis black biker blues, a mixed notice. One is gratified to see MCT listed as a primary info source, but that's part of an odd mix of streetwise and superficial. Jazz is straightforward enough (Top Of The Marc "\$\$\$"), but Blues are confused. Antone's, "more like a giant family watering hole than a commercial establishment" (huh?), predictably takes pride of place. The Hole In The Wall and Continental Club get recognisable pen portraits, with special mention of CC's boogie-woogie happy hours. But Chicago House simply doesn't belong in this context when Carlin's is merely mentioned in an "Also" round-up and poor old Pearl's and Joe's Generic don't get a look in. But there are loving tributes to The Victory Grill and The Grey Ghost and an overview sharp enough to specify The Black Cat as an exception to 6th Street's "second-rate music clubs." No Bible, but a solid starter for travelling addicts. IC



B MORE DREAM OF THE EARTH WHAT MIGHT HAVE BEEN

(Eclectric, cassette)

I like to think of myself as apolitically correct. socially and environmentally conscious. So I'm always pleased to hear someone who is putting their money where their mouth is, or in Jasmine & Jason Star's case, mouth and money together. The duo's name evokes images of crystal fondling, new age blitherings. Not quite so, the poetic forwardness of the lyrics make this not another hippy-dippy 'effort'. Unfortunately for me, the words were smothered by practiced, though quality, synthodrivel. The truly powerful songs do overcome the production weaknesses at times. Holdfast, a cynical expression of the clamor for money, things and power that threatens the world by dividing people into Smugly Superior and Infinitely Inferior clans, had me singing along by the end. Another cut that made me appreciate this tape more reminds us that animals are being tortured and killed for a nonessential industry, cosmetics. The best way to present this music might have been as theatrical musical—Hair(spray) for the 90s, providing educational images rather than just preaching to the converted. If you think this is a negative review, you're wrong. Environmentally jazzy music is just not my style, but if you like the Earthkeepers, you'll eat this up. $E = Mc^2$

WILLTMASSEY

(MCA, CD/cassette)

'Our' kid's big-time debut will be scrutinized by many local fans for signs of sell-out or artistic corruption; unfortunately most will hear what they expect. Several strong new songs (You Take The Town, Send Up The Smoke), two older favorites (Barbed Wire Town, Coffee Break) plus a couple of the best from Slow Study attest the songwriter alive and creatively fit, the vocalist stronger than ever. It's the production that seldom rises above the ordinary-a dense, unimaginative early 80s sound. The movers & shakers are Springsteen folks, exploiting the path they know-straightahead rock 'n' roll. Downplaying his Austinness and avoiding country/folk accents, the arrangements lack any individuality, beautifully crafted lyric spaces are filled with unnecessary noise and lifeless percussion. Compare the deadened versions of Highway Hearse and Homeless Heart (the most brutalized tune) with the Slow Study originals. But hey, most folks can't do that, and these 10 cuts are waaaay above pop-average. Just 22, with so much publishing potential, he can afford to experiment and it's easy to be led by such successful mentors. Plus Willie T's no fool, maybe his message is in the opening cut "Reality is nowhere near. If you're looking for me, I don't know where I'll be. I ain't here. EM

Not frantic speedsters like Metallica or fluffy pop like Poison, Near Dark are more calculated and deliberate in the Sabbath style, using the power ballad song form frequently and well. The trick that makes it work for them is turning a slow groove into a slow burn, Dreams of the Witchhouse is the standout. The album's inconsistent and suffers in places from weak vocal production, nonetheless songs like Painless, my personal favorite, show an ability to write focused, coherant, hard rock songs worth listening to. Near Dark work hard and keep getting better. Ric

Creative networking and the refreshment of inspiration are unparalleled. Both are valued and praised for being down-to-earth, personal, friendly, intense but laidback—Texas—ambiance. The Hill Country setting makes Kerrville more family reunion or summer camp than alternative business conference, but together they form a healthy yin/yang balance.


