Comrade Bridges was one of those sturdy citizens who helped to establish order in a desecrated land. He, as thousands of others Confederate Soldiers, returned home to meet a situation that required fully as much courage to overcome as it had to face the guns of the enemy for four years. Courageously Comrade Bridges met those conditions and lived a long and useful life. He didd at the home of his daughter, Mrs C. E. Waller, 814 West Second Street, this city, Thursday afternoon December 14, 1916 and was buried in Mount Olivet Cemetery Saturday December 16th.

Comrade Bridges is survived by three daughters: Mrs R. C. Chance, of Readley, Mrs. R. H. Lunnsford, of Seymour, and Mrs. C. E. Waller of this city.
