Founded... with a Purpose

The Salesmanship Club's Camp for underprivileged children was founded in 1921 at Bachman's Lake. Originally the camp was given over to the orphans of Dallas for recreation each summer; but as the population of Dallas increased it was decided that the underprivileged children living in homes of the very poor, needed the camp more than orphans having the care of well established homes. At the present time, a thousand underprivileged children are guests at the camp each summer, coming in groups of 100 for a ten-day period.

The original members of the Club worked hard to start the camp, clearing weeds and timber from the site, and doing much of the labor themselves. As the years went by, the new members put their shoulders to the wheel and the physical equipment at the camp increased, improvements were added, and at this time the buildings and equipment are valued at approximately \$26,000.00.

Many of the children who come to the camp are undernourished. Every child is given a complete physical examination by a staff of doctors who are members of the Club. Only those children free of disease are invited to attend, and the well-balanced diet which they are given, in nearly every case increases their weight, makes them healthier, stronger and happier. This boost to their health

gives them a weapon to help withstand the illnesses of winter.

A well-trained staff of counselors are in charge of the children each summer, and they are given instruction in the various crafts as well as in the many games. The children are taught swimming in a large pool, which is a part of the playground equipment. The counselors' chief aim is to foster good sportsmanship among the children and to make them into better citizens.

All of the members in the Club take an active part in the activities of the Camp. Their efforts are directed by the officers and directors who are elected annually, and by the Camp board which is appointed each year by the president. The present officers and directors are: Jordan C. Ownby, president; Alfred Webber, first vice-president; John Higginbotham, second vice-president; Hal A. Gullledge, secretary-treasurer; Morton Bigger, Meyer Donosky, A. L. Exline, J. Howard Hayden, George Loving, Laurin P. Marlow, W. R. Moore, Jas. K. Wilson, and T. M. Watson. The present Camp board has the following members: Jordan Ownby, ex-officio chairman; Alfred Webber, chairman; Sam B. Dickinson, in charge of registration and transportation; and T. M. Watson, in charge of maintenance.

The first "Dream Game" played in Dallas was originated and sponsored by *The Dallas News* in 1936. The game was played at the Texas Centennial Exposition, it being the purpose of *The News* to organize some sporting event of magnitude which would draw a large crowd to the Exposition. That year, the College All-Stars composed of All-American caliber football players and seniors at their respective colleges the preceding year, defeated the Chicago Bears, the outstanding professional club at that time, by a score of 7 to 6.

In 1937, *The Dallas News* arranged another dream game for the Greater Texas and Pan American Exposition, at which time the College All-Stars, gathered from the leading colleges in the country, again defeated the Chicago Bears, this time the score being 6 to 0. Matty Bell and Dutch Meyer coached both these winning teams.

This year, *The Dallas News* through their sports editor, George White, offered the Salesmanship Club the opportunity of sponsoring the third annual dream game, the proceeds to go to the benefit of the underprivileged children of Dallas. The Salesmanship Club accepted the sponsorship of the

game, and arranged for Jimmy Stewart, manager of athletics at Southern Methodist University, to manage the game for them. Stewart has done an excellent job for the Club, particularly in his signing up the best available players in the country.

To George White, who worked diligently in helping the Salesmanship Club secure the sponsorship of the game and has constantly given the game top billing on *The Dallas Morning News* sports pages, and to Jimmy Stewart, who has done a magnificent job of managing ticket sales, signing coaches, and securing best available talent for the team, goes the heartfelt appreciation of the Salesmanship Club.

In deepest gratitude, the Salesmanship Club commends Jere Hayes, sports editor for *The Dallas Times Herald*, Red Webster and Flint Dupre, sports editors of the *Dispatch-Journal*, for their invaluable support of the game. Not merely because the Dream Game is one of the biggest sports events in the Southwest, have they worked unselfishly and untiringly to help publicize this event, but because the success or failure of the promotion of this game means so much to the underprivileged children of Dallas, these men have given their best efforts. **THANKS A MILLION.**

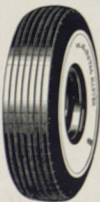

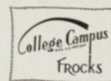

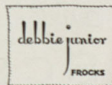

- 1 Holding by defensive side.
- 2 Crawling.
- 3 Attempt to draw opponents off-side.
- 4 Delaying game.
- 5 Taking more than two steps after fair catch.
- 6 Illegal tackling or blocking.
- 7 Offside.
- 8 Encroachments on neutral zone.
- 9 Feint to snap ball.
- 10 Illegal possession.
- 11 Interference with opponents before ball is put in play.

LOSS OF FIFTEEN YARDS

- 17 Holding by side in possession of ball.
- 18 Hurdling.
- 19 Coaching from sidelines.
- 20 Intentional grounding of forward pass.
- 21 Interference with fair catch.
- 22 Substitute communicating before first play.
- 23 Throwing fair catcher.
- 24 Tripping.
- 25 Leaving field during one-minute intermission.

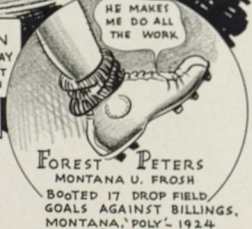
