53 - John Hampton of Salisbury
had died from Henry Michael Mills

for land on Muddy Creek - n.s. Yorkin

11 Oct 1799, John Hampton of Salis-
bury, Sadder, had died for land at
Salisbury from John Patens -

13 Feb. 1804, John Hampton, son of
John Hampton Decd, surr, had 83
acres on n.s. Yorkin from Ephraim
Hampton. No further dates -

54 William Hampton, of Salis-
bury had died 21. July 1792 fr.
David Miller for lot in Salisbury -
28 March 1797, Wm H. of Salisbury
had died from Owen Nealey.

Sept 1801, Wm Hampton of Salisbury
Silver Smith died for 300 acres
on Grants Cr - for Edw. Yarbrough
1813 again mentioned as Silver Smith

No further dates -

52 William Hampton, son of
David Hampton (d. 1758). Besides
the land inherited from his father
had grant #552A in both sides Crane Creek
from the State of N.C. 14 Dec. 1785; &
25 Oct. 1786, another grant on Mud-
dy Creek.

28 July 1788, Wm Hampton wife
Rachel sold land on Crane Crk
to Jacob Vainpoole.

Will of William Hampton Sr. Plantation
dated 19 Apr. 1813 - prob. Rowan
County Augt 1813. Heirs estate
to wife Rachel; sons David,
Jesse (now in state of Ky), John
& William; daus. Hannah
wife of David Gordon, Mary
wife of Allen Stokes, and
Milly Hampton.

55. David Hampton, had
grant for 30 a. land 10 Oct. 1783
Rowan Co. Jan 2. 1817 he was
living in Rowan Co. N.C. & Nov.
1817 in Jefferson Co - Ky. - Penn
records relate to settlement of father's
estate, Palm & Clarke Co. Ky.?

57. John Hampton, on 29 Oct.
1814 sold his 1/7 of his father's
estate. He seems to have
died before Jan 2. 1817 leaving
wife Nancy & three children
all under age as in no
other way can we account
for the minor heirs mentioned
in the following deed for
land formerly owned by William
Hampton Sr - as none of
them bear the name of the
children of Wm Hampton Jr.
& the deed shows the other 2
sons of Wm Sr to be living -
2 Jan 1817. deed to Michael
Peeler, from David Hampton
Allen Stokes Agent for Jesse Hampton
Hannah Goadsby, Mary
Stuckee, Moses A Locke (probably
husband of Milly Hampton who

subscribers named and
the guardians of the following
David, John, William, Joseph
Orsilla, Rachel Anne,
Susana, Wade, Edward
& Eleanor Hampton, of
Rowan County. Oct-10, 1815
Jesse Hampton of State
of Ky gave Allen Stokes
his brother-in-law, Powerfully
to recover his share of the
justice estate.

38. William Hampton Jr ^{Plaintiff}
deceased his father but a short
time. His will dated 19 Apr-
1814. prob. 22 May 1814
names wife Polly, & following
children:

mentions land he purchased
from Gordon. His wife

Polly Hampton was a daughter
of Col. James & Esther Brandon,
son, as shown by the will
of Esther Brandon, widow of
Col. James Brandon dated
4 June 1816. prob. Feb 1822.
which names among her
daughters Polly Hampton.

In the census of 1790 there
were John [Sr], Ephraim &
William Hampton [Sr] heads
of families, showing that
the sons of these all married
after 1740.

Ephraim Hampton, was
no doubt a nephew of Col.
Andrew Hampton of Rutledge
Co. N. C. John Hampton of Frederick
Co. Va. ^{Barren Co. N.C.} David Hampton
of Brunswick Co. Va. and
very probably was the son
of their brother Thomas Hamp-
ton as he named his eldest
son Thomas.

He appears to have lived
near his uncles Andrew
and David, and to have married
the daughter of his uncle William
namely Lemender, which is a
most unusual name, and
was the name of William
Hampton's wife as shown
by the deed record of Brun-
swick Co. Va.

Ephraim Hampton doubtless
accompanied his uncle
Andrew to N. C. as in 1754-55
he was Ensign in Capt Andrew
Hampton's Co of Granville Co. N. C.
Militia. N. C. Cal 51-Br 14 22-p

from here he seems to have
gone to the ^{then} adjoining County of
Rowan where his uncle
David Hampton had settled.
He probably held land here by
grant, as 25 Oct 1783 when
he purchased 100 acres from
Wm Poole, on east side of Mad
River near Muddy Creek
he was styled "Ephraim Hampton
of Rowan Co. Planter".
In 1804 he sold land to John
Hampton grandson of his
uncle David.

His will was dated 18 Jan 1813
prob in Rowan in May 1814
+ names wife Lemender (dau
of Wm Lemender Hampton of Brunswick
Co Va?). sons, Thomas, Robert,
Ephraim + Oliver + daughters
Fanny Shaw, Sarah Smith
(also spoken for as Patsy Smith),
Lemender Hill + Pitter
Brown.

1. Ephraim Hampton Jr & 2. Mrs Fanny
 Hampton Shaw & their families
 settled after the death of their father
 in 1813 in ~~Lawrence Co. Ala.~~
 Sanders in his "Fluck Fire in
 Alabama" says "That in the
 first quarter of the 19th Century
 they settled in Poplar Log Cove,
 Lawrence County a family by the
 name of Hampton who were
 cousins of the Shaws in the
 northern part of the county.
 The head of the family was
 Ephraim Hampton who was
 "the principal man in the
 cove. He was a justice of the
 peace, owned a cotton gin
 was well informed in politics
 and had considerable influ-
 ence". He was a soldier under
 Gen Jackson in the Creek War.
