23. David Hampton, son of Thomas Hampton d. Ish Wright, 1730, removed from Va to Rowan County, N.C. Va about 1740, where he owned landly Colonial grant
 His will dated 10 Nov. 1758 was probated in Rowan Co., same year left real & personal property to wife Hannah; daughter Isabell Hunt, and sons John William Hampton.

51. John Hampton, was a Captain of Rowan Co. Militia in 1755. Coming later 1755
 21 Jan. 1761, John H. of Rowan Co. had a grant from the Governor, Earl of Granville, 2633 acres on Second Crk. between Salisbury & Peebles.
 25 Nov. 1790, John Hampton & wife Hannah sold part of this land to Martin Miller. He died between 1790 & 1804

53 - John Hampton, on 2 July 1799
had died from Henry Michael Mill
for land on Huddy Creek - n.s. Yorkin
T 11 Oct 1799, John Hampton of Salis-
bury, Saddler, had died for land at
Salisbury from John Potts -

13 Feb. 1804, John Hampton, son of
John Hampton dec'd, son, had 83
acres on n.s. Yorkin from Ephraim
Hampton. No further date -

54 William Hampton, of Salis-
bury had died 31 July 1792 fr.
David Williams lot in Salisbury -
28 March 1797, Wm H. of Salisbury
had died from Owen Nealy.
Sept 1801, Wm Hampton of Salisbury
Selvansmith died for 300 acres
on Grants Cr - fr Edw, Yarborough
1813 again mentioned as Selvansmith
no further date -

52 William Hampton, son of
David Hampton (d. 1758). Besides
the land inherited from his father
had grants of 552 A on both sides Crane Creek
from the State N.C. - 14 Dec. 1785; &
25 Oct. 1786, another grant on Mud-
dy Creek.

28 July 1788, Wm Hampton & wife
Rachel sold land on Crane Crk
to Jacob Vasspole.

Will of William Hampton Se Plaut
dated 19. Ap. 1813 - prob. Rowan
County Augt 1813. Beaus estate
to wife, Rachel; sons David,
Josce (now in state of Ky), John

55. David Hampton, had
grant for 38 a.-plaid 10 Oct 1783
Rowan Co. Jan 2. 1817 he was
living in Rowan Co-N.C. & on Nov.
1817 in Jefferson Co - Ky - Recd
recd record of will to settlement of his
estate, Lain & Clarke Co. Ky.?

57. John Hampton, on 29 Oct.
1814 sold his 1/7 of his father's
estate. He seems to have
died before Jan 2. 1817 leaving
wife Nancy & three children
all under age as in no
other way can we account
for the minor heirs mentioned
in the following deed for
land formerly owned by William
Hampton Sr - as none of
them bear the name of the
children of Wm Hampton Jr.
The deed shows the other 2
sons of Wm Sr to be living -
2 Jan 1817 - deed to Michael
Peeler, from David Hampton
Allen Stokes Agent for Joseph Hampton
Hannah Gardner, Mary
Stockee, Moses A. Locke (probably
husband of Milly Hampton who

the guardians of the following
David, John, William, Joseph
Dorisella, Rachel Anne,
Susanna, Wade, Edward,
& Eleanor Hampton, of
Rowan County. Oct-10, 1815

Jesse Hampton I State
of NC gave Allen Stokes

58. William Hampton Jr Plant
survived his father but a short
time. His will dated 19 Apr.
1814 prob. May 1814
names wife Polly, & follows

In the census of 1790 there
were John ^{Isr} Ephraim &
William Hauplin [Sr] head
of families, showing that
the sons of these all married
after 1740,

Ephraim Hampton, was
no doubt a nephew of Col.
Andrew Hampton of Ruthland
Co. N. C. John Hampton of Franklin
Co. Va David & William Hampton
of Brunswick Co. Va. and
very probably was the son
of their brother Thomas Hampt-
ton as he named his eldest
son Thomas.

He appears to have had
more of his uncle Andrew
and David, and than ~~mainly~~
the daughter of his uncle William
namely Lemender, which is a
most unusual name, and
was the name of William
Hampton's wife as shown
by the deed record of Bruns-
wick Co Va -

Ephraim Hampton doubtless
accompanied his uncle
Andrew to N.C. as in 1754-55
he was Ensign in Capt Andrew
Hampton's Co of Granville Co. N.C.
Militia. N.C. Col 1st Part 22-p

from here he seems to have
gone to the adjoining County of
Rowan where his uncle
David Hampton had settled.
He probably held land there by
grant, as on 25 Oct 1783 when
he purchased 100 acres from
Wm Poole, on east side Yadkin
River near Muddy Creek.
He was styled "Ephraim Hampton
& Rowan Co. Planter".
In 1804 he sold land to John
Hampton, grandson of his
uncle David.

His will was dated 18 Jan 1813
& prob in Rowan in May 1814
names wife Lemunder, daughter
of Wm Lemunder Hampton of Princeton
& Va. sons, Thomas, Robert,
Ephraim, Oliver & daughters
Fanny Shaw, Sarah Smith
(also spoken for Patty Smith),
Lemunder Hild. & Ritter
Brown.

settled after the death of their father
in 1813. in ~~Lawrence Co.~~ Ala.
Saunders in his "Flush Tide in
Alabama" says "that in the
first quarter of the 19th century
they settled in Poplar Lick Creek
Lawrence County a family by the
name of Hampton who were
cousins of the Shows in the
northern part of the county.
The head of the family was
Ephraim Hampton who was
"the principal man in the
co. He was a justice of the
peace, owned a cotton gin
was well informed in politics
and had considerable influence".
He was a soldier under
Gen Jackson in the Creek War.
