Dear Sir: -

After the death of my mother, several years ago, I found, among her papers, some data regarding her mother's family, and I became so interested I have since put in much time (and some money) in tracing the American families which contributed to our ancestry.

One family I have been unable to trace is the Hampton family. My grandmother (Maria Evans) once told me that her grandmother (or great grandmother) was Wade Hampton's sister: but I can find no account of any marriage.

Some one told me that you had more information about the Hampton family than any one else: so I thought you might help me. I realize that it takes time to look over your notes, and that people, asking for information are a nuisance, - for I have many such requests, which take time and energy to answer.

I am inclosing a small check which I hope will be a slight compensation for your trouble. Did Wade Hampton have any sisters beside Elizabeth and Margaret? My grandmother's grand parents were George and Sarah Evans; and David and Ruth Holt. The Evanses ~~came~~ lived in Pittsylvania and Halifax Counties, in Virginia, until about 1790 - but my grandmother's parents

Elijah Evans and Ruth Stolt were married in Tennessee, in 1804.
There are a number of members of the family named Sarah Hampton Evans. - also a George Hampton Evans born about 1800. The Stalts had children named Henry and Preston. which are also Hampton names.

I will be very grateful, to you, if you can shed any light on the subject.

Since gathering a large amount of data I have thought of writing a series of Colonial stories about these connected families, who were our ancestors and were typical of the restless pioneers who came (many of them) from Europe to the British Isles, then to America, and to the far West. a series of such stories would greatly interest my children and grandchildren if not others.

Thank you for any courtesy you may be able to extend, in the way of helping me to learn more of the Hampton family.

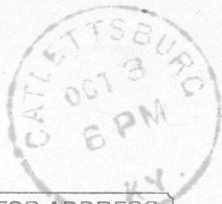
