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
Chartered under a Federal Land Grant Act, the Arkansas Industrial University was first housed in two small frame buildings and enrolled its first students on January 22, 1872. The location at Fayetteville was the result of a \$130,000 bid entered by the city and Washington County and accepted by the state legislature. Not until 1876 was the first permanent building completed - proud Ole Main, built of native stone and copied from the administration building at the University of Illinois. Ole Main remains a useful classroom building today — with its majestic twin towers a traditional landmark. It is approached by Senior Walk, on which are stamped the names of every graduate in UofA history.

Spreading over 260 acres of rolling hillside, Ole Main now looks down on a physical plant that totals in the many millions of dollars (not including a multimillion dollar investment in facilities at Little Rock). The building program at the University over the past 15 years has been astounding — and it continues as the pressures of enrollment and need for new facilities increases.

A modest liberal arts curriculum of 90 years ago has broadened into a University program that includes a network of seven colleges and schools on the Fayetteville campus; three professional schools, the University Hospital and Graduate Institute of Technology at Little Rock; and centers for agricultural and extension work through the entire state. All fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the University now offers a doctorate program in 16 fields and the master's degree in 52 areas of study. A faculty of approximately 500 is maintained at Fayetteville

Operation of the entire University program is under the direction of a 10-man Board of Trustees with one appointment made each year by the Governor of the State. Chief administrative officer is the president - Dr. David W. Mullins, now in his third

The University's first graduating class of seven men and two women has now been joined by over 27,000 former UofA students. During the 1961-62 school year degrees were awarded nearly 1,400 students at the main campus; while another 118 received professional degrees at the University's Little Rock facilities. The fall enrollment of 1961 reached a new high of 7,519 at both sites — a nine per cent increase over the previous year. This included 6,388 at the main campus.



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Basketball Outlook

For the past two seasons Texas Tech has had the leading basketball team in the Southwest Conference. The Red Raiders won the championship outright in 1961, tied for the title with Southern Methodist in 1962, and then won a special playoff to determine the National Collegiate playoff representative.

But chances for this situation to continue appear extremely slim. Lost by graduation are four players who accounted for 79 per cent of the Red Raid-

ers' points during these two seasons.

Obviously, lack of experience will be the Red Raiders' principal weakness. Coach Gene Gibson feels that he will have a stronger bench this season. The Raiders will use single post pattern play and man for man defense.

A tentative starting lineup (with 1962 scoring averages): Milton Mickey (0.9), Bobby Gindorf (7.4), Gilbert Varnell (2.0), Mike Farley (2.5), and Sid Wall (5.1).

Outstanding newcomers are 6-1 Bill Murren, Harold Denney, 6-8, and Glen Hallum, 6-5.



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



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
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Watch Future Raiders In Three Tilts This Season




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
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
