Infantry Regiment Wilcox Brigade, Jacksons Corps, Army of N. Va. His record in the service as shown on our Roster over his own signature states;

" I was in the battle of seven Pines and the seven days fight around Richmond, was wounded at Sharpsburg and at Chambersville in arm and shoulder. I was suffering from the latter wound unable to do duty when the surrender occurred." ~~x this~~ This is a remarkable fine war record and emphasises the patriotic devotion of our Comrade to the grand cause of the Confederacy.

Some forty years ago he moved to Ft. Worth, Texas, where he has lived an upright and honorable citizen, rearing a respectable family, Two Sons and One daughter survive him. He joined the R. E.
