




View is westward, Tech campus about 1927-30. Main Street in left foreground.

TEXAS TECHNOLOGICAL COLLEGE 1923 - 1963

RESEARCH HEADQUARTERS for a large portion of Tech agricultural activities will be the \$500,000 Killgore Beef Cattle Center at the Tech Research Farm near Amarillo. Ground was broken May 2 for the new facility, which will be a center for research on beef cattle breeding and feeding. Scheduled for completion in May, 1964, the Center was made possible by a grant from the estate of the late Florence Lee and C. L. Killgore, pioneer Panhandle ranchers. It will contain some of the most extensive laboratory facilities for livestock research in the nation.






Dads Association Membership Exceeds 500 . . . Join Now

"To the end that the College of our sons and daughters may become better known to parents; that the wishes of parents may be made known to the College administration; and that the needs of the College may be recognized by the citizenship; I will support the Dads Associations as follows...."

With these words, fathers of Texas Tech students annually pledge their support to the Texas Tech Dads Association and their Loyalty to and interest in the College.

The Dads Association, organized in 1957, is a voluntary organization of fathers who join primarily because of their interest in their children and in lending their support to the College in its endeavor to provide the best educational opportunities possible for the students.

Dr. R. C. Goodwin, Tech president, has said, "Membership in this organization provides excellent means for the parents of the students to become better acquainted with the College. Those of us at Tech want you to know about our present developments of which we are most proud. We also want you to know our needs in order that you may assist us in further strengthening our educational programs in which your sons and daughters may be interested."

Among the activities of the Dads Association are the publishing of the DADS NEWS at least three times a year, giving parents information on the College; backing an Annual Dads Day Program for parents to visit the College; and sponsoring the athletic Hall of Honor, giving recognition to persons who have brought credit to the athletic program of Tech;

Another project is an Endowment Fund for \$250 scholarships to worthy students in need of financial aid. More scholarships are given when funds are available.

When the Dads Association became a part of Tech history in the fall of 1957, the annual Dads Day at Tech had been observed for four years. A dinner meeting that day in the Tech Union drew 360 fathers, who voted unanimously to organize the group under the leadership of Dr. William H. Gordon and a group of interested fathers who had worked months in preparation.


The first officers were O'Brien Thompson of Amarillo, president; Tob Abraham of Canadian, vice president; Earl Collins of Lubbock, secretary, and Marshall Howard of Liftefield, treasurer.

At that time the number of dads who paid \$10 to become life members reached 110. The number who paid \$3 each to become contributing members for a year was

Along with the officers, 34 association trustees were elected, one from each of Texas' 21 Congressional districts, one from out-of-state and one for each district having more than 100 students at Tech.


Since that first year, the Dads Association has grown to a membership of 512 life members and between 500 and 600 annual members.







"Courage, Competition and Character"

M any years ago when I became actively involved in intercollegiate athletics, I tried hard to clarify in my own mind the role of intercollegiate athletics in the university or college. This was not a casual exercise on my part, because I was involved in the development of a relatively new campus of the University of California, and also because of the increasing pressures on all of us of preparation for World War II, and the increasing emphasis on research and graduate work at a University which was destined to become one of the most remarkably developing institutions in the Nation.

Thus the University climate for athletics was a changing one. There developed much more emphasis than ever before on academic achievements, the Nobel Prize, election to the National Academy of Sciences, creative and research activities. One might have expected that intercollegiate athletics, particularly in football and other highly competitive and much publicized areas, would begin to fade into the background until it was practically a minor activity in the University. In large metropolitan areas, the development of professional football and basketball offered a new threat to the popularity and prosperity of the traditionally crowd-pleasing major collegiate sports.

That this fading out of the picture by intercollegiate athletics has not taken place is in itself a remarkable phenomenon of our times. There are real, deep-seated and meaningful reasons for this, of which I will present the three that appear to me to be the most significant. At the same time I will present reasons why the current emphasis on intercollegiate athletics must not be allowed to diminish.


The three reasons to which I referred earlier are basically related to the three most significant characteristics of the modern intercollegiate athletic picture. These are contained in my three word title, "Courage, Competition and Character". To one who is active in the field of international scientific affairs, and who is more than casually aware of the problems that we face as a nation, these three words summarize the real needs of our time. For this nation to survive as a leader among the free nations of this world, we must have courage, we must be able to compete and we must maintain the best in our national character.

Intercollegiate athletics is an area of activity in which all three of these are intimately involved. Both team sports and individual effort require courage, character and the competitive spirit. The demonstrations that one sees of these important elements in our modern existence are easily understood. The language of athletics has almost universal appeal, thus the lessons to be learned are relatively easily communicated. I like the space program because it provides us with a simple mechanism for bringing the beauties of science to the public. I like intercollegiate athletics because it provides an equally effective and simple technique for bringing to the public the meaningfulness of the competitive spirit, character and courage.


Our space activities demonstrate our willingness to cooperate with other nations. Our emphasis on sports, particularly in our colleges and



universities, shows the world that we value the attributes to which my title refers. Taken together, these make for a nation in which other people can have real confidence.

G. C. (Mule) Dowell

Morgan was twice a member of the Texas Tech
coaching staff. He became an assistant football coach under Pete Cawthon in 1930 and also served as head basketball coach from 1931-34. After stints as line coach at Auburn and Rice, he returned to Texas Tech as head football coach in 1941, serving until 1951, when he re-joined the Rice staff as assistant football and head baseball coach. He was killed in a truck-car crash near Bay City March 3, 1962.

Dowell, now a Lubbock automobile dealer, was a Texas Tech fullback in 1932-34 and a track man in 1934-35. The Royse City product later played professional football for the Chicago Cardinals and served as an officer in the Naval Air Corps in World War II, winning the Legion of Merit with the Combat V. Now a member of the Texas Tech Athletic Council, Dowell has been extremely active in civic affairs. He has been secretary of the Lubbock School Board, chairman of the Airport and Auditorium-Coliseum boards and a member of the Recreation Board.

In the Hall of Honor they join: Ransom Walker (deceased), Elmer Tarbox, Walter Schlinkman, Dean W. L. Stangel, Pete Cawthon (deceased), Hurley Carpenter, and Marsh Farmer.

No tribute to these nine could be worded better than the qualifications as stated by the sponsoring or-ganization of the Hall of Honor, the Texas Tech Dads Association:

". . shall possess or shall have possessed, in addition to outstanding ability in a sport or sports, other qualifications such as sportsmanship, character, integrity, and be a person who has brought distinction to Texas Tech or served the school with distinction in its athletic program."



The Bruins led the Southwest Conference in offense through the first two weeks of the 1963 season, combining a tricky running game with what may be a better than ever passing attack. Last week touted Arkansas fell to Baylor 10 to 14.

The 1963 Baylor roster is sprinkled liberally with West Texans. Odessa's James Ingram is a starter at end for the third straight season. Fred Allen of Abilene, a starter, and Lewis Sessums of Sundown are major factors in the Baylor tackle picture. Curtis Leggett of Menard is starting center, Stacy Mathis of Goree a starting guard, Weldon Price of Monahans a top center.

Eddie Whiddon, fleet sophomore from Amarillo, is a starting defensive halfback, Lawrence Elkins of Brownwood, a starting offensive flanker back. Sophomore Knox Pittard from Mozelle is a flanker back, and

Senior Dalton Hoffman of Ballinger is the starter at offensive fullback.

The Bears have had better running this season than a year ago, with a bigger line, better line depth, and a group of younger but larger running backs than last year.

Hoffman is joined by Junior Tom Davies and Sophomore Mike Marshall to give the Bears their most promising depth at fullback in a number of years, and Whiddon, Senior Kelly Roberts and Sophomore Henry Pickett have given Baylor improved running at the halfback position.

Quarterback Don Trull, a bona fide All-America candidate despite presence of many fine quarterbacks on the national college scene, is having his best season, is well ahead of his pace of last season when he led the nation in passing and set new all-time Southwest Conference records for pass completions, pass yardage and total offense
