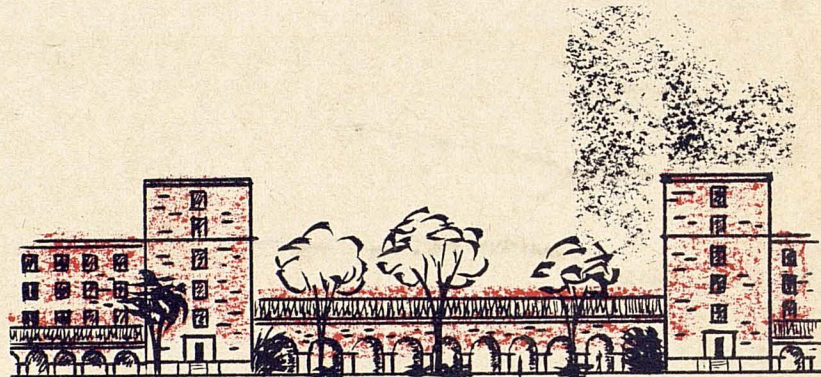

## TEXAS TECHNOLOGICAL COLLEGE 1923 - 1963

OPENED FOR OCCUPANCY at the beginning of the fall semester, the new residence hall at 19th Street and Boston Ave. houses 808 women, and was built at a cost of \$3,813,000. A second hall for 808 women, to be located west of this one, will be completed and ready for occupancy by the fall of 1964. The second hall will be constructed at a cost of \$3,750,000.

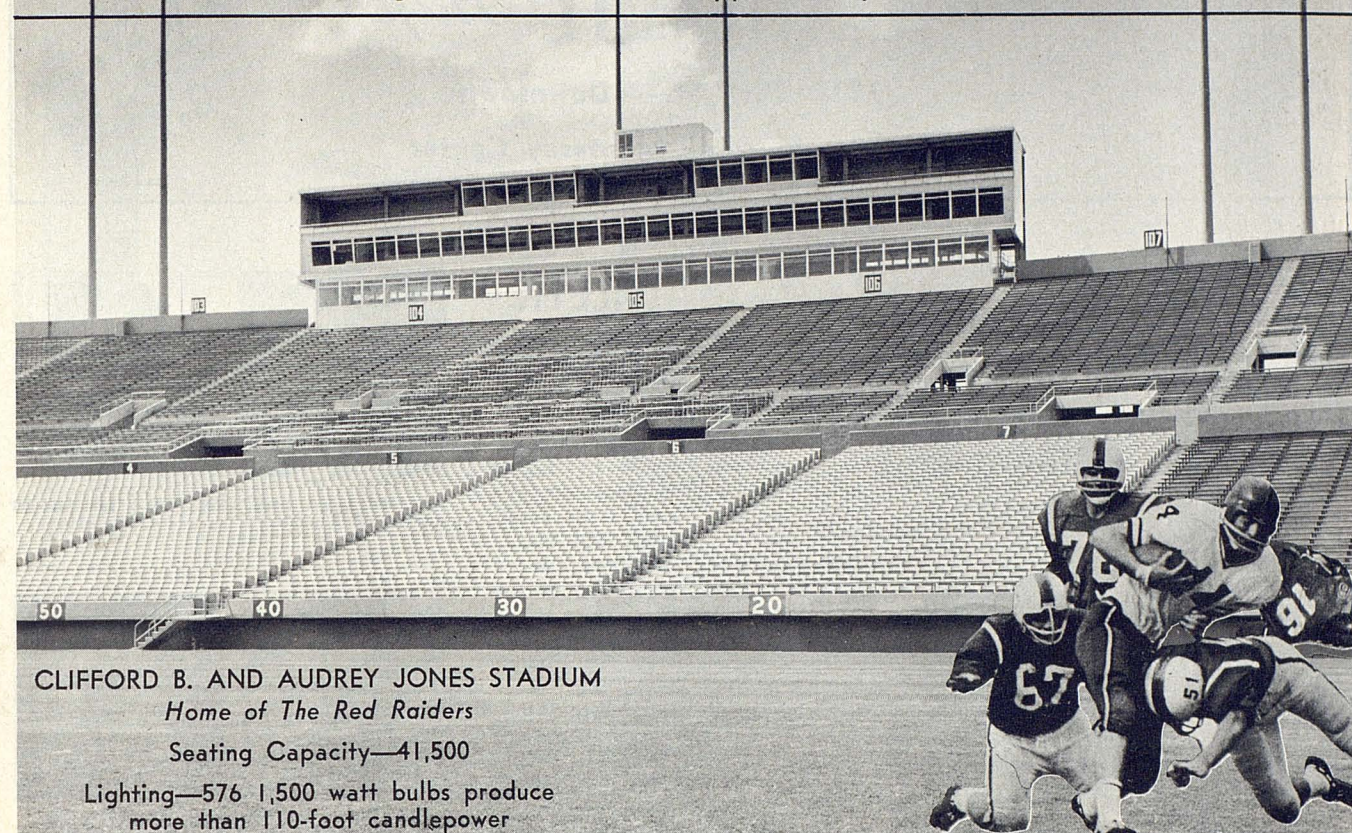

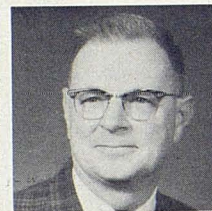
### ATHLETIC COUNCIL

Head Coach

King previously was an assistant coach at Tulane, Texas A&M, University of Texas, and Texas Tech. After three seasons with the Red Raiders, he was promoted from his No. 1 assistant's post to the top job in late November, 1960. At the University of Texas he lettered at guard. He compiled an enviable record at Kenedy and at Enid, Okla., high schools before going into college ranks.



**JOE BLAYLOCK** — (Mississippi Southern '50) — Played halfback Wiggins, Miss., High School, Pearl River Junior College, Mississippi Southern . . . coached Perkinson, Mass., High School, Perkinson Junior College, Magnolia, Springhill, La., before joining Tulane staff in 1960 . . . to Tech in '62. Army, European Theater. Offensive ends, passing game.



**MERRILL GREEN** — (Oklahoma '54) — Played halfback. Played two seasons at Fort Sill as quarterback. Coached in '56 at Wichita University, Missouri '57 before accompanying Frank Broyles to Arkansas in '58. Played on national championship football and baseball teams at Oklahoma, grid team at Fort Sill, Chickasha, Okla., High School. Offensive backs.



**HARRY BUFFINGTON** — (Oklahoma A&M '42) — Blocking back . . . from Pryor, Okla., pro ball with New York Giants, Brooklyn Giants . . . coached at Sherman and Bonham High Schools, later assistant at Austin College, succeeding Ray Morrison as head coach and athletic director in '53 and '54, thence to Oklahoma State (A&M) as assistant . . . to Tech in '63. Defensive line.



**BERL HUFFMAN** — (Trinity '28) — Halfback. Coached White Deer, Lubbock High before joining Texas Tech staff in 1935. Went to Univ. of New Mexico in '47 . . . Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce mgr., '52-'55; director, State Economic Development Com.; Alamogordo, director, Industrial Development Corp., '57. Air Force, '42-'46. Grapevine H.S. Freshman football, varsity assistant, head baseball coach.



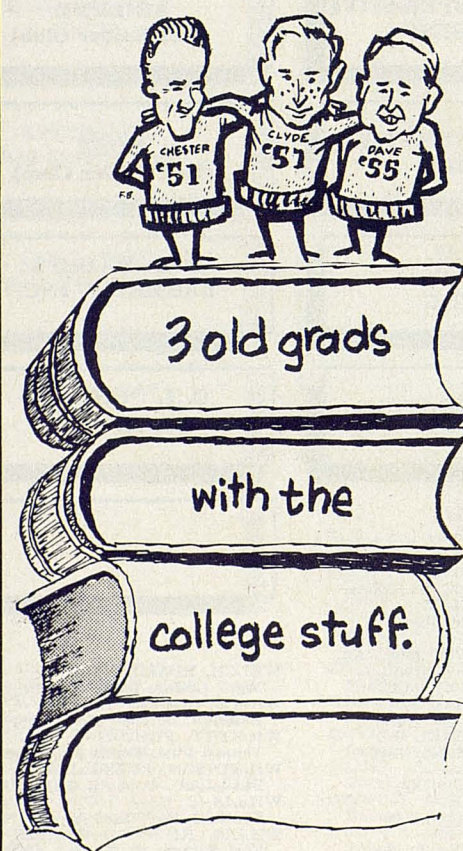

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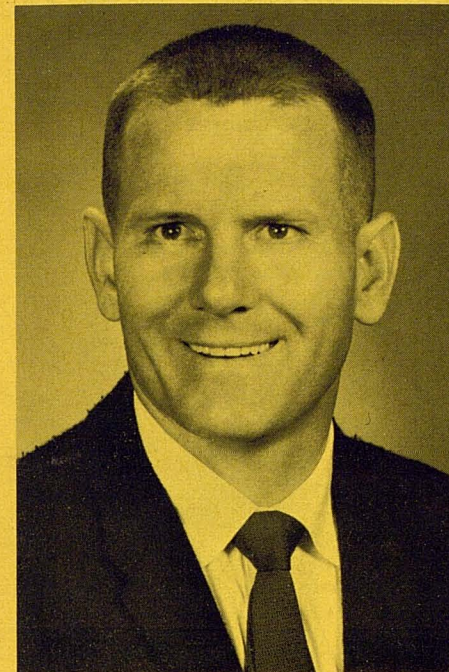
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## Texas Tech Intramurals for Men Expands

Edsel Buchanan has been the director of the intramural program for men since arriving on the campus as a full time staff member in September, 1956.

At that time, the intramural program sponsored 13 sport activities and about 18 per cent of the undergraduate students participated. Under his direction and the strong support of the administration, the program has grown to 27 sport activities, and last year 45.5 per cent of the students were in one or more of the activities.

Intramural activities include boxing, softball, track and field, curling, league bowling, golf, handball, touch football, badminton, volleyball, wrestling, Olympic weightlifting, odd life weightlifting, tug-o-war, table tennis, horseshoes, cross country run, decathlon, paddleball, soccer, swimming, scratch bowling, trampoline, basketball, fencing and basketball free throws.

The required personnel to administer the program has increased with the scope of the program. Currently the staff includes Miss Dorothy Robertson, secretary; Willard Holsberry, assistant director; Jimmy Prichard and Larry Hughes, graduate assistants; and Buchanan.

It is their aim to ultimately involve every student in at least one intramural activity during the year. Through their constant and coordinated efforts, this goal comes closer every year.

The backbone of the program is its team sport activities, with 66 per cent of the participation in intramurals in this area last year. The cost per student in the team sports was only 32 cents, an amazingly inexpensive expenditure when balanced against the over-all value of the program to Tech and to the individual student.

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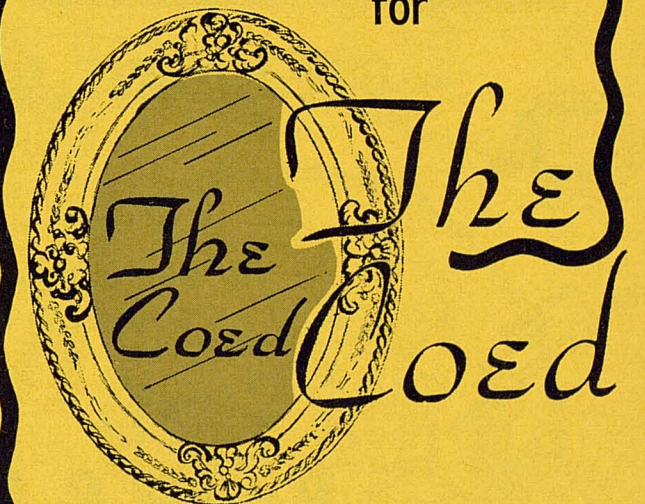

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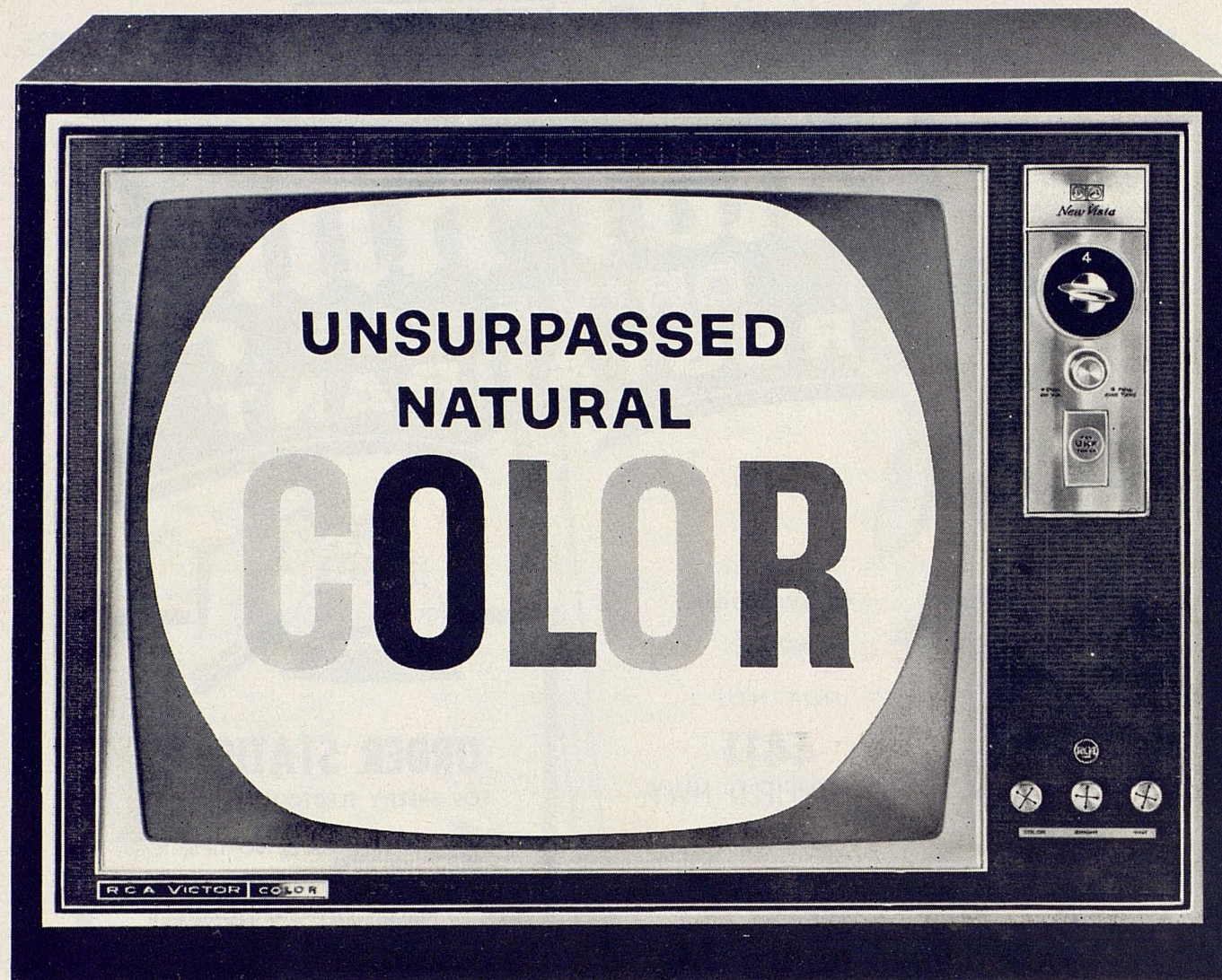
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## Valuable Members of Texas Tech Athletic Department

Athletic Director Robison coached Texas Tech (his alma mater) to its first SW Conference basketball championship in 1961. He serves on the rules committee of the American Basketball Coaches Association.

Academic Counselor Prestwood sees the viewpoint of player, coach and instructor for he has been all three. He supervises study halls four nights a week and confers with athletes and their professors regularly.

Broken bones or simple bruises of Tech athletes receive the careful attention of Dr. Wallace I. Hess, physician and surgeon, who has been physician for Texas Tech athletic teams for the past several years.

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# The Federation Movement

## A New Era for American Sports!

A new concept in the conduct and administration of amateur athletics in this country has taken deep root. It is evolutionary. It is sound. It is an inevitable development as participation in our ever-expanding athletic programs grow.

It is known as the federation movement.

At the moment, it embraces four sports: track and field, basketball, gymnastics and baseball. In time, it will undoubtedly embrace others.

Each field has its own federation. In each, which is the evolutionary part of the concept, the educational community at last has its proper representation through the National Collegiate Athletic Association, the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations, the National Junior College Athletic Association and other representative agencies. Conservatively, these three organizations, with other federation members, represent more than 85% of the amateur interests in the United States.

The question has been asked: Why new federations? Why? Since kerosene lamps also provided light, why electric lights?

The answer to the federation movement is simple. Those who are the primary contributors to amateur athletics, the schools, believe—nay, now insist—that they

have the right to share in the responsibility of establishing policy directly affecting their own programs. They have not had such right in the past. They have merely tagged along. It is the basic philosophy among educational institutions that educators and administrators alone determine the course of their athletic programs within the framework of the over-all educational concept. There can be no retreat from this—no further indifference either.

The federation movement allows all nationally recognized organizations to have voice and vote in establishing basic policy in each sport. It provides, further, that no two organizations within a federation can ever gain control.

Each federation is autonomous. Each operates independently. A few national organizations belong to all four federations. Others belong only to the federation which directly concerns their sport.

The movement is not limited to educational institutions. It has a place for all. Even in these beginnings, most major amateur sports organizations have joined as partners. The one strident dissenter has been the Amateur Athletic Union. It has steadfastly declined all invitations to join.

Through federation programs, the country cannot help but benefit. There will be improved development opportunities, increased competition, enlightened administration. We as a nation cannot help but have stronger representation in international and Olympic competitions.

Here is a brief look at the individual federations:

**United States Track and Field Federation (USTFF).** It was organized July 24, 1962, and consists of 10 national organizations. In less than a year it has sponsored three national championship meets, a national track clinic and has embarked on an extensive development program for all age groups. It is organized in more than 40 states, with each state conducting its own program of develop-

ment and competition. The Gulf Coast Federation (Texas) conducted a cross-country meet, for instance, which drew 475 runners and the Michigan Federation held an indoor track meet which drew 625 boys and girls. Outspoken in praise of the USTFF has been Executive Secretary Cliff Fagan of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations: "We (high schools) have always had the biggest potential but, until the federation movement, we have never fully realized our potential."

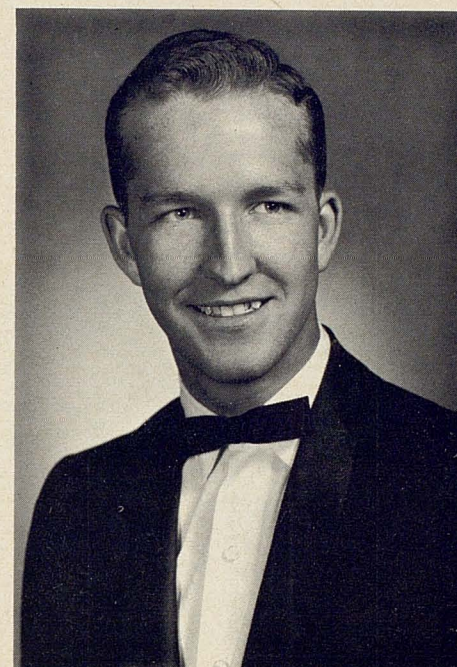
**Basketball Federation of the United States (BFUSA).** The 10-member federation, organized July 1, 1962, represents almost all of the organized amateur basketball played in the United States. It has been recognized by the international governing body and will assume independent international sanctioning privileges beginning January 1, 1964. It has a definite program to improve this country's image internationally through better representation in world games and increased international competition. Several countries have already indicated new interest to send their teams to this country in the season just ahead.

**United States Gymnastic Federation (USGF).** The federation, organized December 9, 1962, has already become the dominant force in gymnastics in this country. A national championship was held in June. Clinics have brought expert gymnastic instructions to coaches and competitors. The federation has embarked upon an intensified national program to popularize gymnastics, particularly among school-age boys and girls.

**United States Baseball Federation (USBF).** The federation has a basic two-fold program: (1) to help amateur baseball in whatever way it can and (2) to provide the United States with an organization to promote baseball internationally. Under the auspices of the state department, the USBF last summer provided a group of collegiate baseball coaches and players to conduct instructional clinics in Central America.

The new school year brings great new opportunities to the entire federation movement.

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## Wildcat Passing Has Netted Opponents Winning Scores

What Robert Burns said about the plans of mice and men a long time ago turned up again this year in Kansas State football. The Wildcats have turned out to be a passing team with their fate hanging on the strong right arm of Quarterback Larry Corrigan and on the catching ability of Ralph McFillen, little split end. It wasn't planned that way. Pre-season hopes partly stated and partly dreamed by Coach Doug Weaver — centered around rushing capabilities of a big backfield with varied specialties.

There was Willis Crenshaw, 210-pound senior fullback. He figured as the Wildcats' best back and a strong candidate for all-Big Eight. In the second game of the season — after he had averaged 7 yards a carry in the opener — he was shot out of the lineup with a severe leg bruise. He sat out the next two games, and has played only part time in the last three.

Then there was Ron Barlow, 220-pound sophomore halfback. On sheer size, speed and power he rated pre-season raves. He ran 71 yards in the opening win over Brigham Young; then came back with 42 yards against San Jose. A foot injury in the third game — against Colorado — slowed the big plunger to a near walk.

Even Doug Dusenbury, 192-pound junior left half, although he hasn't missed a game, has been hampered by leg bruises beyond normal.

Those three big 'uns hurting, Weaver took the only out he had — rely on passing. Corrigan, established as a passer over two previous seasons, stepped front and center in K-State's offense. As a result of his throwing and the receiving of medjet ends ends McFillen and Spencer Puls the Wildcats moved to the head of the Big Eight passing.

In some games passing has kept the Wildcats well within range, kept them contending until the end, but it hasn't been able to earn them a win. Against San Jose Corrigan and his understudy, Ed Danieleley, combined to hit 7 out of 12 throws for 72 yards, but a pair of critical

fumbles hurt scoring ambitions and K-State was shut out, 16-0. The two hit 10 of 18 tries against Colorado for 110 yards, but the Wildcats lost, 21-7. Next game, with both Barlow and Crenshaw out of action, Corrigan opened up. He threw 34 attempts, hit 15 for 146 yards and one touchdown, but Missouri prevailed, 21-11. Then came the Nebraska game and a 16 of 32 day for Corrigan, but two tries backfired as Nebraska intercepted and ran them back for easy touchdowns.

Said Coach Weaver: "When you put that ball in the air so much, you know you're gambling — that some may well be intercepted. What hurts is that they were run back for touchdowns."

That didn't happen against Oklahoma in the sixth game. Other problems came up. The Sooners put a heavy rush on Corrigan and blanketed the little Wildcat receivers well. Result: K-State threw only 11 times with six completions for 55 yards, and the Wildcats' air game was unable to produce.

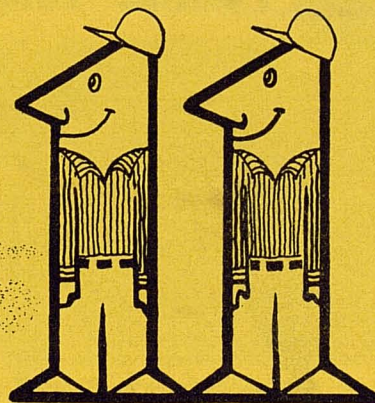
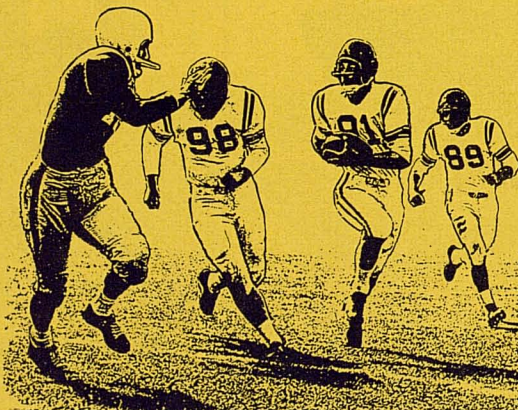
With his air route threatened and big rushers rusty from bruises and inaction Weaver refused to let down on his big stock of enthusiasm.

We are close to being a good football team," he appraised. "We are playing everybody closer and we are playing well. Everyone who knows me and our staff realized that we are not ever going to settle for a loss and be happy about it, or congratulate ourselves for just 'playing well.' It is important in coaching, however, to recognize when your players are playing their best, and this has been the case in most games."

With Weaver in his fourth season at K-State, following a regrouping in Wildcat football in 1960, it is apparent the Wildcats are closing the gap on other Big Eight teams. And, while Weaver's plans for a big set of backs this season did go the way of many 'best-laid plans,' K-State's football improvement plans are slowly coming to fruit.
