

May 10 1888 Missouri

[4 mi. from Paris, Monroe Co.]

Dear Children  
with the expectation that you are anxious to hear from us I have now set down to let you know that the fifteenth day after we left the mouth of Sandy we arrived at brother Lee's all safe and well only bad colds we could have made the trip five or six days sooner but we was detained at Hanible on account of getting a wagon to haul us out we had a disagreeable trip as could be expected on this season of the year we had very high winds all the time we found all of our friends here well in health and appear to be doing well your sister Eliza and family are well Granville went from here this morning and he says he want to see you here night by last M<sup>r</sup> I was quite much disappoind when I came to see this country I found it a higher prairie country than I expected to see take in general it is the most beautifull part of the world I ever saw but still it has some faultys but timber is a great deal plainer wear than I expected to find it land is hard to git here it is all taken up in this part there is none to be enter in of any account in less than thirty miles of Paris there is a great many offering to sell farms and estates second handed upon very good terms on account of heavy taxes scarcity of money is just reached here and it seems as if a great many is smartly in trouble Mr Sharp has purchased a farm one mile and a quarter acres in Paris one hundred and sixty acres eighty five under stone and eighty in timber and it bout for the balance first with feed & twenty five acres in orchard all ready broke up and laid of one way ready to plant out in when he got it and he is now planting it the dwelling house is built in the same manner of crossed only one room is smaller than the other and a brick chimney at each end and it is thirteen by twenty with with brick chimney on each side A large paved yard and all with good buildings and good grass yards with locas trees and good stables a fine corn crib is a beautifull high the sheep eat all the year round hardly

we live with in one mill of methodis camp ground and  
three quarters of baptis meting house we have singing  
school every saturday and sabbath school every sabbath  
and walk away school all the week their is A baptis  
preacher lives in sight of us the people all akears to try  
which can do the best especally the young ones this  
is a great place for youngsters to git information young  
george shortridge is come out the most you ever see  
any one for the time he has been hear he is an assstant in  
the singing school and Sunday School and is very smart  
jusen is a very amible girl indeed frankling is the  
principiest one A mong them I believe he has throw  
a way all that cashfullness the neighbours in general  
appears to be down we have just moved to our place two  
days ago but it dont feel like home to me but I am  
as well satisfied as could be excepted from to be consider  
ing how many children I left behind I shall look for you  
to come when you said you would some of my neighbours  
allered that I never would be as well fixed again and I do  
just wish they would come and see me now and see if  
they would swap sebations I do wish some of you there  
would just ride up and take a peep at brother lewiss  
farm I think you would have big sandy but I believe  
that country is the best to make money in and this the  
best just for farmers we have got one cow and one  
milk a litter head of hogs on the place we bought  
our land and brother lewiss going on one simle and no  
persons cant tell neither of us in here the greatest rain  
heat & cold over the road mill but it is very cold  
and backin and spring ever since I built in it is  
very dry heat now we did at milled barnways three  
days ago we a long they treated us mighty well frankling  
said when I come to you and Sally that I must remember him  
and his wife say you they are all mighty blessed tell every  
body that he is dead & lost moving here that never known  
what trouble and fatigues is till they try it tell little  
george Simms & had him bear to go to school I want you to  
wight to me often I should like to know if you  
I woudt do as I do from then this appear to be a good place

his trade remember me to all my acquaintances and  
when you write to me write every thing that you  
think I should like to know Sally with Jones is just  
at the point of having a heir and her father is about  
to drive her off about it her little daughter is very ill  
and seems like they have taken a great deal of pains with  
her you must come and see me if ever you can possible  
tell all the children we all want to see them now  
at present but remain your most affectionate mother  
until death





Agreement between John P Jones, and his  
 wife Cecelia Jones, of Ashland &c, and of  
 W.C. Ireland of Greensburg, as follows. viz.  
 The said John P Jones, has this day sold <sup>8<sup>th</sup>  
 Ireland, lot No 30, Range 3- Most or Muches-  
 ter <sup>in the town of Ashland</sup> ~~in the same~~ sold to S<sup>r</sup> Cecelia  
 Jones, by W<sup>t</sup> Sampson & wife, by little bond.  
 This bond is imperfectly executed, and Jones  
 wife are to procure a proper acknowledgement  
 and then assign the same to said  
 Ireland who is to pay the balance of the  
 purchase money, two hundred dollars, and  
 some interest. They also sell said Ireland  
 the  $\frac{1}{2}$  of lot No 31, adjoining the one above  
 named, being the same Conveyed to said  
 Cecelia Jones, by S. W Martin & wife, by deed  
 dated 12<sup>th</sup> July 1868.</sup>

The Consideration of this  
 sale is Eight hundred and fifty dollars,  
 of this two hundred to be paid Sampson &  
 wife, and the interest due them, and the  
 balance to be paid within four months. viz.  
 Six hundred Fifty (\$650) to Mrs Cecelia Jones.  
 The party of the first part to Convey, by good  
 and sufficient deed, when purchase money is  
 paid, to the  $\frac{1}{2}$  lot. and relinquishments to  
 lot 30, and also as to this assign the sum of  
 Sampson & wife, as above stated.

Whereas by the judgment of the Boyd  
Circuit Court, in the action of White  
& Hill, against Fletcher & Wood, W. C.  
Inland was appointed a Commissioner to  
see lot No 29, Range three West in the  
town of Ashland, situated on the corner of  
Winchester and Third Street. Same in contest  
in said Court. The Commissioner having  
made sale of said lot and improvements  
theron, and reported the sale to the Court.  
At the November term 1868, the sale and  
report was approved and confirmed. The  
purchaser ~~having transferred~~ William Bolman,  
transferred his purchase to W. C. Inland  
and directs the deed to be made to him.  
The Court at the June Term 1869, appointed  
John Hampton, a Commissioner to make  
a deed of Conveyance to W. C. Inland.  
Now therefore-

This Indenture made  
this 26<sup>th</sup> day of June 1869, between  
John W. Hampton Commissioner of  
the first part, and W. C. Inland, of  
the second part.

Witnesseth: That  
for and in consideration of the  
promises and the further considera-  
tion of one dollar, the said Hampton

as Commissioner, hereby sets his Commiss.  
to W. B. Inland, lot number twenty-nine (No  
29) Range three (3) just in the town of  
Ashland, being on the corner of Winchester  
and Third Streets, fronting on Winchester  
fifty feet, and running back same width  
one hundred and forty-two and one half feet (142 $\frac{1}{2}$ )  
to an Alley. Together with all and  
singular the improvements, and appur-  
tenances to the same in any wise appertain-  
ing. To have and to hold the same to  
the said Inland his heirs and assigns  
forever. The Commissioner, hereby Commiss.  
all the right title and interest of  
C. S. Fletcher, and John D. Wood, and  
warrants the title as follows and from  
then generally. The Commissioner  
not making himself personally liable  
in any event.
