## The Gertrude C. Suppe Hispanic Church Music Collection

#### **Summary Description of Collection**

This collection consists of:

- Nearly 1000 Hymnals and cancioneros.
- Electronic database cataloging more than 400 hymnal books and 14,000 hymns.
- Archival holdings including materials pertaining to conferences, workshops, and denominational hymnal commissions and task forces.
- Audio-visual materials.
- Miscellaneous materials

The dates of these materials range from about 1972 to 1999, with some from earlier times. Among other things, they show some of the changes that have taken place since Vatican II in music for Spanish-speaking churches. The collection apparently is among the most comprehensive extant. It is comprehensive in materials used in both Catholic and Protestant churches.

#### History of the Collection

Gertrude C. Suppe is an ethnohymnologist. Since 1976 she has been actively involved in the identification, transcription, translation, liturgical use, and promotion of Hispanic hymns; participated in workshops and conferences in the United States, Canada, and abroad; and worked with many denominational commissions and task forces. In 1996 she retired as Secretary to the Editor and Consultant to the Ecumenical Spanish Hymnal Committee. Her collection was assembled in conjunction with these activities.

The Collection has been shared with denominational hymnal commissions, task forces, and publishers in the production of at least ten hymnals including

#### **Detailed Description of Collection**

Hymnals and Cancioneros: Nearly 1000 hardbound and paperback Hymnals including about 800 cancioneros (small, paperback booklets with 10 to 30 hymns or choruses in a typical publication). Most of the materials are in Spanish, but a few are either in Portuguese, English, or other languages. Cancioneros constitute the richest source of indigenous church music but often have limited distribution or short publication lives (e.g., the vast majority in the collection appear to be out of print). They often are privately or locally printed and not cataloged (e.g., approximately 85% do not have ISBNs). Thus much of the collection consists of extremely rare sources.

Electronic Data Base: More than 400 books, (which includes both hymnals and cancioneros) and 14,000 hymns, have been entered at the present time. Approximately half the collection has been entered plus some materials not owned by the collection. The remaining hymns and hymnals in the collection gradually are being added to the database. Associated with the data base are physical copies (in hymnals, cancioneros, or notebooks) of perhaps 90% of the hymns and one folio shelf-foot of additional material in indexed notebooks.


Data-base fields for hymns include: title, first line, location (hymnal or other source and page number), copyright holder and copyright date, composer, arranger, author, translator, language, season, occasion, age-level, Mass (if part of), Scripture source of text, rhythm, notes. Data-base fields for books include title, title code, index number to notebook material, copyright owner, publisher, composer, printed by, available from, notes.

The data-base originally was produced using the now obsolete *Cornerstone* data-base software, but its text-format files are easily exportable to all standard data-base and spreadsheet programs currently in use. It also can be adapted for Internet search and availability.

Archival materials: These include Catalogs from publishers, draft hymnals, professional and personal correspondence with composers and others centrally involved in Hispanic church music, programs of concerts and other special occasions, workshop and conference materials, reports of research in the Hispanic church music field, dictionaries, periodicals, clippings, three photograph albums of pictures of events and persons related to Hispanic church music, etc.

**Audio-Visual Materials:** These include 100 cassette tapes of ethno-hymnological sessions, church services, performances, and concerts; two videotapes of church choirs; and about 15 phonograph records.

Miscellaneous materials: These include an autobiographical account of Gertrude C. Suppe's involvement in Hispanic church music and other personal items.



The collection comprises 36 shelf feet and 6 folio shelf feet of books, cancioneros, and notebooks; 8 cubic feet of correspondence and other materials; 100 audio cassettes; two videotapes; fifteen vinyl recordings; and computer files containing the data base.

**Subvention:** A bequest of \$5000 in support of the Collection will be paid towards the costs of cataloging, support, and other archival activities.

User availability of pianos or keyboards with headphones: Not in Bridwell Library. The Sacred Music area has midi capabilities with computer, full-size keyboard, and earphones. This is housed in a separate building (Kirby Hall) in the Theology quadrangle adjacent to Bridwell Library.

User availability of audio/visual (audio tape, videotape, turntable) equipment: Limited. Ideally, all analogue audio recordings would be converted to digital. The Sacred Music area has facilities for all of these.

Resources for conserving and protecting materials from damage from

elements, insects, heat and humidity, etc.: Bridwell has a fully equipped book conservation lab and a fulltime conservator. Archival storage area is temperature and humidity controlled.

Present annual research usage of Unit

by scholars and students affiliated with the institution: Virtually all faculty and students at Perkins School of Theology use Bridwell Library.

Percentage working on Spanish churches or music: At least three faculty work on Hispanic Church research form various disciplines (sociological, historical, and liturgical/musical).

There are three primary, ongoing endeavors related to these areas. First, Perkins has housed the Mexican-American Program for over 25 years. This program, directed by Rev. Minerva Carcaño, provides Spanish- and English-language instruction for ministers, including worship and music courses. The Mexican-American Program is also responsible for the publication of Apuntes, a bilingual journal in the practice of Hispanic ministry. This journal has been in publication for 20 years. In addition, the Mexican-American Program coordinates course offering for a certification program in Hispanic Studies that is an option for Master of Divinity students.

Second, Professor David Maldonado has guided the Hispanic Protestantism Project, funded by the Lilly Foundation, for several years. This project brought together Hispanic theological scholars from all over the country and resulted initially in two books: Protestantes/Protestants: Hispanic Christianity within Mainline Traditions, Ed. David Maldonado (Nashville: Abingdon Press, 1999) and Hispanic Christianity within mainline Protestant traditions: a bibliography. Eds. Paul Barton and David Maldonado, Jr. (Decatur, Georgia: Asociación para la Educación Teológica Hispana, 1998). Dr. Maldonado has just left Perkins to become President of lliff School of Theology.

Third, working with our Continuing Education Department, the Board of Global Ministry of the United Methodist Church will launch a Hispanic Music Certification Program in January 2001 modeled after Perkins' very successful Church Music Summer School. Jorge Lockward and Tercio Junker will head this program. Dr. Michael Hawn will also teach in it and coordinate Perkins' resources with the program. The classes will be held on the Perkins campus.

Number of dissertations and theses on Hispanic topics (history, culture, literature, etc.): I know that we have produced several relevant dissertations in the Ph.D. program, especially in Anthropology, but I was not able to access these to get an accurate count.

Anticipated changes in the next five years relating to research in Hispanic, Latin American, or Church Music areas: Perkins has just completed its ten-year self study with the Association of Theological Schools this academic year. In response to our mission statement, the institution has taken several steps to further respond to Hispanic issues in theological education. The relevant section reads as follows:

The historic presence and current rapid growth of the Hispanic population in this region give the church some special challenges and opportunities. Perkins has a strong and important relationship of mutual support with the Hispanic Church, primarily through the Perkins Mexican American Program and the Rio Grande Conference of The United Methodist Church. Given the strategic location of the school and the opportunities afforded by the current demographic changes in the region, Perkins has a special commitment to assist in the preparation of persons for leadership in the Hispanic church, and to foster constructive theological reflection upon the Hispanic church and community. (Perkins School of Theology 1999-2001 Catalogue, p. 12)

In response to this mandate in our mission statement and in preparation for our self-study, Perkins has already taken significant steps within the last five years. These include the following:

Hiring a Professor of Hispanic Christianity and Culture;

- Building on the heritage of the Mexican-American program when its founder, Dr. Roy Barton, retired, by recommitting to this program through the hiring of Rev. Minerva Carcaño;
- Specialized courses in Hispanic Theology, Culture and History have been added to the curriculum. These include, but are not limited to The Church and the Mexican-American Community and Christianity and Social Justice in the Southwest. These support both Latino students and others who develop an expertise to minister in the Latino context.
- Hispanic perspectives, however, are integral to study at Perkins for all students. This in manifest in several ways including integrating courses into the curriculum that consider Hispanic contexts and heritage. These include a new required course on Church in Its Social Context; an elective, Worship in a Global Perspective; and the regular incorporation of Spanish hymnody and choral literature into the curriculum of Seminary Singers (usually around 20% of the literature). In addition, professors regularly use texts written by Hispanic authors in history, liturgy and theology courses. The Church Music curriculum has just been revised. Among the revisions are the regular integration of Spanish-language hymnody and masterworks (e.g., Misa Criolla) with other traditional choral literature. It is difficult, if not impossible, for master's level students at Perkins to avoid participating in a course that relates to Hispanic Christianity in some way, e.g., using texts by Hispanic authors, studying Hispanic culture and social analysis in the USA, and singing and praying in Spanish in liturgy classes and seminary worship. A bilingual (English/Spanish) service is one of the regular services each week.
- Finally, Perkins is always looking for qualified Hispanic faculty members to add to its ranks. Until the fall of 2000, five Hispanics (two Cuban Americans, one Puerto Rican American, and two Mexican Americans) taught at Perkins School of Theology. This summer we have lost two Hispanic faculty, one to assume responsibilities as dean of a theological school and one to become president of a theological school. Discussions are already taking place as to how Perkins can replace these valuable colleagues so as to continue our witness to and solidarity with the Hispanic community.

Choral Music: Yes. In Meadows School of the Arts.

Organ: Yes. In Meadows and Perkins.

Hispanic history, culture, literature: Yes. In Dedman College. If you do not have graduate majors or concentrations in these areas, do you offer course work in any of them? If so, describe. Undergraduate programs

Music: Yes. In Meadows.

Church Music: Yes.

Liturgy: Not per se, though liturgy is a required course for M.Div. and M.S.M. students..

Topics relating to Hispanic church history, theology, social context, etc.: Yes. There is a certification in Hispanic Theological Studies and an ongoing Hispanic Course of Studies and Hispanic Pastors Mentoring program that is administered through the Mexican American Office at Perkins School of Theology.

If you do not have majors or concentrations in these areas, do you offer course work in any of them? If so, describe. Raquel Martínez has taught a course on Hispanic Hymnody on several occasions, both as an M.S.M. and M.Div. course elective and as a course in the Hispanic Course of Studies program.

Anticipated changes in the next five years relating to curriculum and instruction in Hispanic, Latin American, or Church Music areas: The Sacred Music Program has just undergone significant restructuring in the spring of 2000. Both Meadows and Perkins have agreed on a program that will allow for a greater integration of world music in the Church Music Colloquium and provide for elective hours that may be taken relevant

areas. In addition, the basic liturgy course is team-taught and includes Dr. Michael Hawn. As a part of the basic course Hispanic hymnody and eucharistic services from Mil Voces para Celebrar are regularly integrated throughout the course. As mentioned above, Perkins has just made strategic changes related to its commitment and is the process of integrating these in the coming two or three years.

#### Specific proposals and plans for The Gertrude C. Suppe Hispanic Church Music Collection:

Present a brief proposal for maximizing the usefulness of the Collection both within your institution and by the larger community of scholars worldwide.

Proposal for making the collection known and available to scholars: A first step would be to publicize the existence of the collection through existing publications at Perkins School of Theology. A second step would be to feature parts of the collection in a formal exhibit. Bridwell Library has an exhibit space and sponsors ongoing series of exhibits. In 1992, for example, the Library hosted a major exhibit on the Virgin of Guadalupe, curated by Professor Edwin Sylvest, a recognized authority in this area. An exhibition of the Suppe collection would allow us to invite local Hispanic churches to visit the library and would make it visible to visiting pastors and scholars who attend and teach for the Hispanic Course of Studies and Latino Mentoring programs. Each Bridwell exhibit is accompanied by an extensive booklet developed by the curator of that particular exhibit. Once an exhibit has been held, the booklet developed for it becomes a tool to announce the collection to a broader audience.

An additional avenue of promoting the Gertrude C. Suppe Collection is through articles and advertisements in the bilingual Hispanic journal published through the Mexican-American program of Perkins School of Theology, Apuntes. The Summer 2000 issue celebrating the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Mexican-American Program is included with this proposal. Apuntes is in its 20<sup>th</sup> year of publication.

Bridwell Library offers a Visiting Scholars Program that allows scholars to be in residence for a month or more of research. In the spring of 1998, Brazilian Methodist music and worship professor, Simei Monteiro participated in this program. Several pastors from the Rio Grande Conference of the United Methodist Church, the Spanish-language United Methodist Conference, have participated in the Bridwell Scholars

Program. These are two strategies for not only making the larger scholarly audience aware of the collection, but for providing a way for scholars around the world to come to Dallas to make use of it.

Notes of the maintenance and treatment of the materials: Given the diversity of materials in the collection, it may be necessary to disperse the collection physically for efficient storage and access. Provenance notes in catalog records preserve the historical relationship of the various parts. A complete analysis of the actual collection would be required for a final plan. However, the following seem likely possibilities:

Published works would be cataloged individually and added to the circulating collections. Depending the donor's stipulations, unnecessary duplicates might be discarded.

Manuscript materials would be organized, placed in acid free containers and located in archival storage. A finding aid would be produced for retrieval assistance.

The cancioneros would have to be considered further for a treatment decision. Most likely, their current arrangement would be maintained unless some other order seems necessary to facilitate retrieval. Individual cataloging seems doubtful. Instead, archival storage and a finding aid to assist retrieval might be produced.

The database would require a thoroughgoing analysis to determine how it can best be sustained. Probably, it will be converted to a more portable format that can be preserved over time. A key decision will be whether additional data will be added to it.

The analog audio recordings should be digitally captured as soon as possible, for both preservation and delivery. Organization and retrieval of the audio files will require direct analysis. Priority will be given to preserving the organization in which they are received.

6. Unique, special, and other pertinent facts about your institution:
Present any other information you want us to know about your institution, including any special reasons why we should choose your institution as recipient of The Gertrude C. Suppe Hispanic Church Music Collection, or any unique qualifications the institution has for being its recipient.

There are two additional areas that I wish to highlight. The first is the contact that Perkins maintains with the Hispanic academic community. Perkins School of Theology is a place that is frequently visited by well known Hispanic scholars on at least an annual basis. In my eight years at Perkins Gustavo Gutiérrez has visited three times, most recently in May of 2000 to receive an honorary doctorate from Southern Methodist University. Pablo Sosa was at Perkins for a week in 1996 to participate in a week-long celebration of Mil Voces para Celebrar, edited by Perkins M.S.M. alumna Raquel Mora Martínez. Justo González has come to Perkins to teach in various programs and participate in the Lilly Grant on Hispanic Protestantism on at least a semi-annual basis. Carlos Rosas and Jorge Lockward have been on campus to teach with Raquel Martínez. The annual Roy Barton Lectures bring a recognized Hispanic scholar to Perkins each year. Mortimer Arias, Uruguayan poet and pastor, was the most recent lecturer in February 2000.

A second area is how Perkins reaches out to the Hispanic community in its role as an educational institution. At any one time Perkins has between 10-20 Hispanic students and a number of Anglo students that see Hispanic ministry as a part of their vocation. Together they form Los Seminaristas, an ongoing student-led organization that promotes study in Hispanic theology and leads a bilingual liturgy each week.

Perkins is in the process of developing sustained relationships with two Methodist seminaries in Mexico, Juan Wesley and Baez Camargo. Administration and faculty have visited both campuses and there have been reciprocal visits to Dallas. There are plans for Dr. Michael Hawn to offer a short-term hymnology course at Baez Camargo Seminary in Mexico City in January 2002, assisted by a recent M.S.M. graduate from Mexico Arturo González-Rivera. This bilingual offering will also be open to Perkins students who will travel to Mexico. This follows an earlier course offering, Worship in a Global Perspective, in 1996 in which Dr. Hawn took students to the Rio Grande Valley and sites in Mexico as far south as Monterrey to compare Spanish-language Methodist and Roman Catholic worship on both sides of the border.

This commentary on Perkins' involvement with the Hispanic community could be expanded considerably. Hopefully this helps to establish the School of Theology as an institution that is not only committed to Hispanic perspectives but also a place where Hispanic culture, theology and scholarship are an ongoing and integral part of the curriculum, research and life of the school.

## The Gertrude C. Suppe Hispanic Church Music Collection

#### **Summary Description of Collection**

This collection consists of:

- Nearly 1000 Hymnals and cancioneros.
- Electronic database cataloging more than 400 hymnal books and 14,000 hymns.
- Archival holdings including materials pertaining to conferences, workshops, and denominational hymnal commissions and task forces.
- · Audio-visual materials.
- · Miscellaneous materials

The dates of these materials range from about 1972 to 1999, with some from earlier times. Among other things, they show some of the changes that have taken place since Vatican II in music for Spanish-speaking churches. The collection apparently is among the most comprehensive extant. It is comprehensive in materials used in both Catholic and Protestant churches.

#### History of the Collection

Gertrude C. Suppe is an ethnohymnologist. Since 1976 she has been actively involved in the identification, transcription, translation, liturgical use, and promotion of Hispanic hymns; participated in workshops and conferences in the United States, Canada, and abroad; and worked with many denominational commissions and task forces. In 1996 she retired as Secretary to the Editor and Consultant to the Ecumenical Spanish Hymnal Committee. Her collection was assembled in conjunction with these activities.

The Collection has been shared with denominational hymnal commissions, task forces, and publishers in the production of at least ten hymnals including

#### **Detailed Description of Collection**

Hymnals and Cancioneros: Nearly 1000 hardbound and paperback Hymnals including about 800 cancioneros (small, paperback booklets with 10 to 30 hymns or choruses in a typical publication). Most of the materials are in Spanish, but a few are either in Portuguese, English, or other languages. Cancioneros constitute the richest source of indigenous church music but often have limited distribution or short publication lives (e.g., the vast majority in the collection appear to be out of print). They often are privately or locally printed and not cataloged (e.g., approximately 85% do not have ISBNs). Thus much of the collection consists of extremely rare sources.

Electronic Data Base: More than 400 books, (which includes both hymnals and cancioneros) and 14,000 hymns, have been entered at the present time. Approximately half the collection has been entered plus some materials not owned by the collection. The remaining hymns and hymnals in the collection gradually are being added to the database. Associated with the data base are physical copies (in hymnals, cancioneros, or notebooks) of perhaps 90% of the hymns and one folio shelf-foot of additional material in indexed notebooks.

Data-base fields for hymns include: title, first line, location (hymnal or other source and page number), copyright holder and copyright date, composer, arranger, author, translator, language, season, occasion, age-level, Mass (if part of), Scripture source of text, rhythm, notes. Data-base fields for books include title, title code, index number to notebook material, copyright owner, publisher, composer, printed by, available from, notes.

The data-base originally was produced using the now obsolete *Cornerstone* data-base software, but its text-format files are easily exportable to all standard data-base and spreadsheet programs currently in use. It also can be adapted for Internet search and availability.

Archival materials: These include Catalogs from publishers, draft hymnals, professional and personal correspondence with composers and others centrally involved in Hispanic church music, programs of concerts and other special occasions, workshop and conference materials, reports of research in the Hispanic church music field, dictionaries, periodicals, clippings, three photograph albums of pictures of events and persons related to Hispanic church music, etc.

**Audio-Visual Materials:** These include 100 cassette tapes of ethno-hymnological sessions, church services, performances, and concerts; two videotapes of church choirs; and about 15 phonograph records.

**Miscellaneous materials:** These include an autobiographical account of Gertrude C. Suppe's involvement in Hispanic church music and other personal items.


#### Physical Dimensions of the Collection:

The collection comprises 36 shelf feet and 6 folio shelf feet of books, cancioneros, and notebooks; 8 cubic feet of correspondence and other materials; 100 audio cassettes; two videotapes; fifteen vinyl recordings; and computer files containing the data base.

It will also help to support work in the joint STC/Claremont Graduate School M.A. and D.M.A. programs in Church Music.

Many thanks for your note of February 26, expressing interest in the School of Theology/Claremont Graduate School joint program in church music. The School of Theology is just now in the process of interviewing candidates for a new faculty position in Hispanic studies, and it would seem to me that such an appointment will bring students to Claremont who will have a special interest in Hispanic church music.

Among the key resources of our church music program are the McCutchan Collection at Honnold Library, which includes the working library of Robert McCutchan, editor of the 1935 Methodist hymnal, and on deposit at the School, the superb collection of Professor Robert Mitchell, who taught for many years in the field of worship and the arts; you may know him as the author of Ministry and Music, one of the standard textbooks in the field. Professor Mitchell's collection contains approximately seven thousand volumes, and is unusually multi-cultural in scope.

# The Robert H. Mitchell Hymnological Library

The Mitchell Collection of Hymnology and Church Music is the personal collection of Robert H. Mitchell. It is lodged within the Library of the School of Theology at Claremont, California. There is a shelf list and the books are available for reference use in the library.

The Mitchell Library includes 8,500 items; 7,500 are hymnals, books on hymnody, and materials on church music.

Unique to this collection are the 1,200 hymnals/ prayer books in 200 languages other than English. These include:

German—174 hymnals
French—55 hymnals
Scandinavian languages (Swedish/Norwegian/Danish/Finnish)—91 hymnals
Spanish—48 hymnals
Welsh—44 hymnals

Eastern European languages (Armenian/ Bohemian/Bulgarian/Czech/Estonian/ Hungarian/Latvian/Polish/Rumanian/ Russian/Russian Phonetic/Slovakian/ Turkish/Ukranian)—64 hymnals

The depth of the foreign language hymnal collection can be seen in the 92 hymnals in Chinese; its breadth in the 91 hymnals from India in 43 languages.

Among additional holdings are 150 sixteenth-to eighteenth-century books/hymnals/pamphlets in English/Dutch/French/Latin/German. These include, for example:

An original *Genevan Psalter*, 1562; Dutch Psalters by Dathenum (1643 and 1767) and Lodenstein (1768) (see Julian); Sternhold and Hopkins Psalters (1615, 1640, 1739, 1776); Lady Huntingdon's collections (1793, 1801); and Barton's *Six Centuries of Select Hymns* (1688).

There are 118 oblong nineteenth-century American tunebooks, including three copies of the *Easy Instructor*.

The collection contains 170 oblong nineteenth-century American Sunday School books, of which a number are from Robert Lowry's personal collection. There are 600 British nineteenth- and twentieth-century hymnals. The library includes 135 hymnal companions/concordances. Some of these are in Chinese, German, Native American, Swedish, and Welsh.

Among the hymnological holdings are 174 German hymnals from the U.S., Germany, Switzerland, and Austria. The research materials in German include Wackernagel's nineteenth-century definitive five-volume Das Kirchenlied von der altesten Zeit bis zu anfang des XVII Jahrunderts and Zahn's six-volume Die Melodien der deutschen evangelischen Kirchenleid. In addition, there are 24 facsimiles or significant reprints

of old German hymnals, as well as 18 hymnals from the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries.

The 78 books used by Katherine Diehl for her remarkable *Hymns and Tunes—an Index* (1964) have been assembled and are shelved together. Along with them are 49 related volumes—companions, historical surveys, concordances, etc. Thus one may find immediately any text, author, tune, or composer included in the *Index* along with supplementary material about it.

The Robert H. Mitchell Collection began when he was called to a small Northern California Presbyterian church as a full time Minister of Music in 1949. In the music room he found four nineteenth-century oblong tunebooks. No one claimed or wanted them and it was suggested that he take them. These became the foundation of the Mitchell Collection.

On various sabbaticals, Mitchell has lived and taught in Edinburgh (where he found the *Genevan Psalter*), Birmingham (England), Hong Kong, India, Germany, and Papua New Guinea. In addition, he has lectured in Singapore and in the Philippines. All of these situations provided an opportunity to search for hymnals.

As Professor of Church and the Arts (now Emeritus) in the Graduate Theological Union of Berkeley, California, Mitchell has had many international students. Many of these, returning to India, Thailand, Hong Kong, Cameroun, Zaire, Kenya, etc., have continued to help him in his quest for hymnals

In addition, through correspondence he has been able to establish connections with persons sympathetic to his goal. Thus, hymnals have been sent to him in Latvian, Ukrainian, Dutch, French, South African languages, Nigeria, New Zealand, etc.

The School of Theology at Claremont has 500 cataloged hymnological items in addition to the Mitchell collection. These include antiquarian Methodist materials. It is only a short distance from the Honnold Library of the Claremont Colleges, which holds the McCutchan Hymnological Collection of 3,500 books. Together these make over 11,500 hymnological items in Claremont that are available for researchers.

#### Dear Mom:

I have studied the three proposals for your Hispanic Church music collection, the background information on each school, and your summary preparations.

My understanding is that you want your collection where it will be used regularly, where it integrates into larger research and teaching interests in the institution, where it will be really available to scholars, and where the institution has adequate resources to support and maintain the collection.

I rank the three schools on the basis of ability top met the above criteria. My ranking is: Perkins first choice, Indiana second choice, Ryder third choice.

#### Reasons:

Perkins: I was impressed by the strong on-going commitment to Mexican American and Hispanic concerns. I was especially interested in the new Hispanic Music Certification Program they are starting. (By the way: Is the Jorge Lockwood who will be involved with that YOUR George Lockwood?).

Back when you were in the hospital in Takoma Park, I did some web searching and I was then very impressed with the Perkins Special Collections (as presented on their web pages). Perkins has an impressive library budget (\$1.5 million with \$533K annually for new acquisitions.) It is part of a solid, well-endowed institution (southern Methodist University). It is located in a major city with easy access (Dallas). I liked their plans for publicizing the collection, especially the idea of having an exhibition for which a booklet would be produced that could be used subsequently for PR, etc.

Negatives: I'm not sure I like their plan for integrating the collection into the larger collection.

It might limit the browse opportunities. However, I don't know how these items would be catalogued. You might inquire how they have handled the Methodist Hymnal Collection. Also, the physical arrangements between the seminary and the music school don't sound ideal, but are probably doable.

One thing you might plan to do: When you come to

Methodist Hymnal ents between the und ideal, but are or perhaps kyba of added to seminary like

Lubbock in January, you will need to come via either Houston or Dallas. You might consider stopping over in Dallas to meet with the Perkins librarians and negotiate some details. John or I probably could arrange to be with you.

Bottom Line: Perkins seems to me to accomplish more of your desiderata than the other two--largely because of their strong commitment to Mexican-American/Hispanic church issues including music.

Indiana: This is a great music library, a world-class music school, and a major Latin American Music institute. (By the way, this is the Music School Charles Webb, of the Methodist Hymnal, was dean of for 24 years.) It may be the most important place for Latin American music in the Western world. The library has excellent resources, is state of the art with respect to digital streamlining of music, etc.

Negatives: Doesn't have that central focus on church music (outside coral and Organ depts.). It's an hour from a major airport, yet fairly convenient. (Hordes of scholars come to use the IU facilities annually, especially the Lilly Library—and this doesn't stop them. There is convenient limo service to Bloomington from Indianapolis.)

Westminster Choir College/Ryder University: The strength is the fact that so many of their graduates direct choirs. They make an interesting case for dissemination through choir directors.

Negatives: The library is small (~1/10th the size of either of the other two, low budget, limited resources, weak university despite the Westminster excellence. Unlike the other two universities, it is not a place one would go to do research (other than choral music). Their emphasis is on choral music, not hymns. This might be a place for Raquel's collection of Choral music.

Finally: Let me say that it would not be a mistake to give your collection to any one of the three institutions. I just think the above is a reasonable order of preference which one to offer it to.

Suggestion: Once you make your first choice selection, then you need to begin some negotiating of specific terms of the bequest. Also, you will need to have a value put on your collection. You SHOULD NOT simply say, OK, you have it. Rather you negotiate with your first choice, informing the others that they are not your first choice, but if you are not satisfied with the negotiations with your first choice you may come back to them.

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
