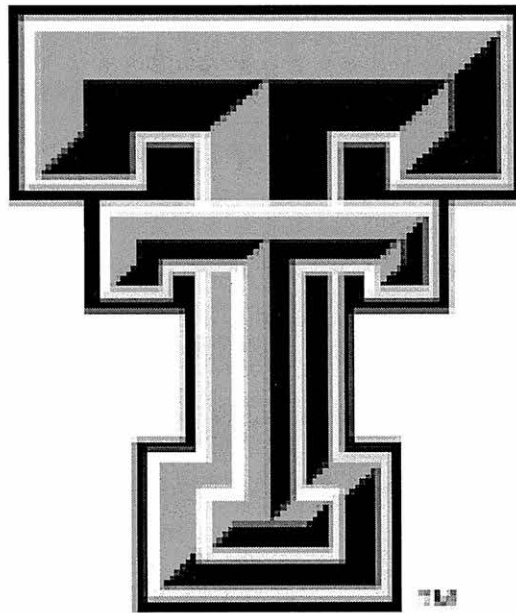

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TEXAS TECH CHANCELLOR STEPS DOWN

LUBBOCK – Texas Tech University System Chancellor John T. Montford today said that he had notified members of the system Board of Regents that he will step down, effective Sept. 3.

Montford made no mention of his future plans other than to say he intends to explore opportunities in the private sector. He did say he would make no decisions until he has finished at Texas Tech. Montford became chancellor of Texas Tech in September 1996. His tenure will fulfill his original commitment of five years.

“This has been the most difficult decision for Debbie and me, and it was not arrived at easily,” Montford said. He did not indicate whether or not he would be remaining in Lubbock.

“The Texas Tech students, faculty and staff are the best in the world,” Montford said. “It has been a privilege to work along side them.”

“Texas Tech’s future is bright and Debbie and I are grateful and honored to have been a part of it,” Montford said.

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MEMORIAL ESTABLISHES ENDOWMENT FOR ART AT TEXAS TECH

LUBBOCK – The family of Paul E. Marion, a native of Spur, will establish memorial endowments in his name, in Texas Tech University's art department. The presentation will take place at 3 p.m. July 5 in the gallery of the Art Building on the Texas Tech campus.

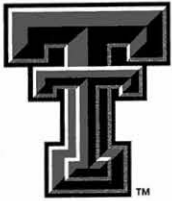
Raye Leigh Stone, Marion's sister and spokesperson for the family, said they will donate \$15,000 to the art department endowment and an additional \$10,000 for the student scholarship endowment.

Marion graduated from Texas Tech in 1993 with degrees in English, art history and studio art. While at Texas Tech, he was a member of the Army ROTC and the Naval Reserve organization. Marion also was a member of Kappa Sigma and the Ex-Students' Association.

Marion had attended Texas A&M University in 1990 and was a member of the Fightin' Texas Aggie Band. He also is memorialized as a member of the Eternal Aggie Band.

Commissioned out of ROTC as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army, Marion was a captain at the time of his death, serving with the 3rd Infantry Division at Fort Stewart, Ga. He had been on active duty in the Army since 1993. His overseas assignments included the 2nd Armored Cavalry Regiment in Haiti, the 2nd Infantry Division in Korea and Task Force 4-64th Armor in Kuwait.

Marion was a resident of Hinesville, Ga., at the time of his death in March 2000.

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TEXAS TECH POLICE BRING HOME MEDALS

LUBBOCK – Five members of the Texas Tech University System police department won medals during the recent Texas Police Games held in Lubbock.

The games are sponsored by the Texas Police Athletic Federation and took place June 17-22. The competition brings together officers from law enforcement agencies across Texas. "The games are a great way to make contacts with officers from other agencies across the state," said Maj. Eddie Huckabee, assistant chief of the Texas Tech Police.

Texas Tech officers winning medals are: Officer Chad Demaray, bronze medals in both racquetball and the mountain bike competition; Officer Chris Fox, silver medals in both the 200 and 400 meter dash; Maj. Eddie Huckabee, bronze medal in golf; Officer Joe Rodriguez, gold medals in both eight-ball and nine-ball billiards; and Officer Garnett Lee won six medals. He won gold in the police bike 100-yard sprint, the police bike individual obstacle course and the mountain bike competitions. He received silver medals in the road bike time trials, the road bike race and the police bike team relay.

TTUHSC NURSING DEAN AWARDED NATIONAL FELLOWSHIP

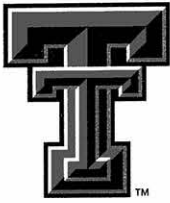
LUBBOCK – Alexia Green, RN, Ph.D., dean of the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center's School of Nursing, has been selected as a Robert Wood Johnson Executive Nurse Fellow. Just 20 nurses nationwide were selected this year to participate in the three-year program.

The award includes a \$30,000 grant for a leadership project at TTUHSC, as well as opportunities for educational and national exposure. Green's leadership project will focus on assisting in the future direction and mission of the TTUHSC Institute for Healthy Aging. It is the goal of TTUHSC to make the institute a source of cutting-edge education, research and care for older persons across the state and nation.

"Dr. Green has been a tremendous asset to the Health Sciences Center in the relatively short time she has been dean," said David R. Smith, M.D. TTUHSC president. "She is ready and willing to help lead and shape the U.S. health care system of the future."

Green became dean of the TTUHSC School of Nursing in June 2000. She also serves as president of the Texas Nurses Association, providing significant leadership in addressing public policy issues related to solving the nursing shortage and other workplace issues.

The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, based in Princeton, N.J., is the nation's largest philanthropy devoted exclusively to health and health care. 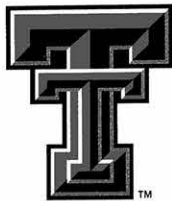

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TEXAS TECH BUSINESS COLLEGE TO HONOR ALUMNI

LUBBOCK – The Jerry S. Rawls College of Business Administration at Texas Tech University will honor three distinguished supporters at a noon luncheon Friday (July 13) at the Lubbock Country Club.

The event will recognize Jerry V. Smith of Dallas as the 2001 distinguished alumnus, Delbert G. McDougal of Lubbock as the 2001 outstanding entrepreneur, and Alan B. White of Lubbock as the 2001 outstanding chief executive officer.

Smith, who earned his bachelor's degree in accounting in 1965 and his master's in business administration in 1968, currently employs only Texas Tech-educated CPAs at his firm, J.V. Professional Corporation. Though hiring only Texas Tech graduates was not necessarily planned, Smith explained his unwavering support for Texas Tech.

"If it wasn't for Texas Tech and the business school, I would be driving a tractor in Ralls. Going to college and getting a degree opens doors for you – then you have to work hard to keep them open," Smith said.

Smith serves on many other Texas Tech boards and committees, including the Texas Tech Foundation board and the university's investment committee, donating his expertise in financial management to help maximize the university's endowment. Smith sits on the Chancellor's Council and has established an endowment for students in the business college.

McDougal, a native West Texan, is president and CEO of McDougal Companies, which encompasses all facets of the housing industry. He is a current member of the Chief Executives' Roundtable in the College of Business Administration and has been a loyal supporter of Texas Tech, serving on the Chancellor's Council and the Texas Tech Foundation board. He and his wife, Carolyn, have established a scholarship endowment in the college.

Committed to West Texas with vast civic and community involvement, McDougal serves as president of the Lubbock Reese Redevelopment Authority and as a board member of Market Lubbock Inc. and University Medical Center.

White, a former member of Texas Tech's board of regents, earned his bachelor's degree in finance in 1972 and completed the Texas Tech school of banking program. He is the chairman of the board and CEO of the Plains Capital Corp. and PNB Financial.

With a continuing presence in the banking community as well as involvement with Texas Tech, White has served as a member of the Texas Tech Foundation board and the Red Raider Club. He is a member of the President's Council, the Ex-Student's Association and the Chancellor's Council. White is past chair and a current member of the college's Chief Executives' Roundtable.

In 1998 White received an Honorary Saddle Tramp award and was honored as a lifetime member of Texas Tech's Dads and Moms Association. In 1999 he garnered the Lauro Cavazos Award from the Ex-Student's Association.

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TEXAS TECH ENGINEERING STUDENT PLACES FIRST

LUBBOCK – The Society of Engineering Science awarded Yong Zheng, a Texas Tech University graduate student in chemical engineering, first place for his paper “Hygro-Thermal Effects on the Physical Aging Response of Glassy Polymers.” Zheng presented his paper at the Mechanics and Materials Conference held in San Diego, Calif., at the end of June.

Gregory B. McKenna, Ph.D., chair, department of chemical engineering, said Zheng competed against eight other students and placed ahead of a student from Texas A&M University who took second place, and a student from Massachusetts Institute of Technology, who placed third.

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CARDENAS NAMED TO POSITION IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

LUBBOCK – Alberto P. Cardenas Jr., a native of Laredo, is now working in Washington, D.C., as director of federal relations for the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center.

David R. Smith, M.D., president of TTUHSC, said Cardenas' presence in Washington will allow the HSC to better develop and monitor federal research objectives, education and service initiatives for all four TTUHSC campuses and enhance TTUHSC relationships with members of Congress and their staffs.

"Beto's training in law and public policy, as well as his previous experience in Washington, will serve him and us well in this new position," Smith said.

Employed by the HSC since 1997, Cardenas has served as a research assistant for senior administrative officers and as a program analyst in the Office of Health Policy and Public Affairs. Prior to working with HSC, he served in various capacities in the legislative, judicial and executive branches of government.

Cardenas said he looks forward to promoting the HSC's objectives in Washington.

"I want to thank Chancellor John T. Montford, President Smith and Vice President Glen Provost for giving me the opportunity to help increase Texas Tech's presence in Washington," Cardenas said. "I look forward to working with our team of leaders and federal representatives to do the best I can for Texas Tech."

Cardenas graduated from the Texas Tech University School of Law in December 1998, and was then licensed by the State Bar of Texas. In December of 1994, he received his bachelor of arts degree in political science and speech communication from Texas A&M University.

While in Lubbock, the mayor and members of the City Council appointed Cardenas to serve on the Community Development Grant Board and the Sports and Community Venues Advisory Committee. He also served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Lubbock Hispanic Chamber of Commerce. REGENTS APPOINT DR. DAVID R. SMITH INTERIM CHANCELLOR

LUBBOCK – Texas Tech University System Board of Regents announced that David R. Smith, M.D. would serve as interim chancellor of the system beginning Sept. 3.

Smith will continue in his capacity as president of the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center. Smith has served in that position for almost five years.

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Smith will serve for an indefinite period of time as regents work to select a replacement for Chancellor John T. Montford. Montford announced his intention to step down last week.

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"I look forward to continuing my close working relationship with David J. Schmidly, president of Texas Tech University. It is my goal to maintain the system's progress and momentum. Texas Tech is a system where the interests of students come first and a system that recognizes its best investment is in its faculty. I will work very hard to ensure that we continue to make that investment," Smith said. "I'm personally proud of both of these universities," said Smith.

Montford praised the board's decision to select Smith. "David is an excellent choice. He will affect an orderly transition. He also will commit his full energies to furthering the goals of the regents and the system," Montford said.

Prior to his tenure at Texas Tech, Dr. Smith served as Commissioner of the Texas Department of Health from 1992 to 1996, overseeing Medicaid within this \$6.5 billion agency. From 1989 to 1992, Dr. Smith was senior vice president of Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas and chief executive officer and medical director of Parkland's community Oriented Primary Care Program.

He also has previously served as deputy director of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Division of Special Populations and Program Development in Washington, D.C.; and medical director of the Brownsville Community Health Center in Texas' Lower Rio Grande Valley.

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Smith is married to Donna Bacchi, M.D.; and they have two children.

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RUSHING FAMILY PROVIDES NEW GATEWAY AT TEXAS TECH

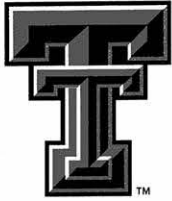

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ENGINEERING STUDENTS SOLIDIFY REPUTATION WITH TEST RESULTS

LUBBOCK – Eighty-seven Texas Tech University engineering students passed the Fundamentals of Engineering Examination given on April 21, 2001. With a 95.6 percent pass rate, Texas Tech's College of Engineering had the second highest passing rate in the state.

William Marcy, Ph.D., dean of the Texas Tech College of Engineering, said the exam results indicate the students' top performance. "It is amazing how solid this performance has become in the last three years. This has not gone unnoticed by engineering deans at other schools," he said.

"This is just another indication of the quality of education in the College of Engineering," Texas Tech President David Schmidly, Ph.D., said.

William Lawson, P.E., deputy director of Texas Tech's Murdough Center for Engineering Professionalism, said the eight-hour exam assesses technical competence regarding general engineering as well as more specific disciplines such as civil, electrical, industrial, chemical and mechanical engineering. Seniors within one year of graduation take the exam.

"The Fundamentals of Engineering Examination represents the first step to becoming a licensed engineer," Lawson said. "We take a lot of pride in this accomplishment."

The National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying developed the exam to test students at every engineering college in the United States. The Texas Board of Professional Engineers administers the exam each fall and spring semester.

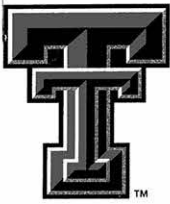

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HAMM HONORED WITH LAW SCHOLARSHIP

LUBBOCK – Holly Hamm, a third-year law student at Texas Tech University's School of Law, has been honored with a scholarship from the Rocky Mountain Mineral Law Foundation. 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PHASE ONE COMPLETE AT MONTFORD REGIONAL MEDICAL FACILITY

LUBBOCK - Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center announced the completion of Phase One in the expansion of the treatment capabilities at the Montford Regional Medical Facility (RMF). After two nurses were taken hostage by an inmate at University Medical Center on January 3, TTUHSC officials looked to expand the Montford Unit to serve as the primary medical treatment facility for more than 30,000 regional inmates.

James Laible, vice president of TTUHSC Health Care Systems and Hospital Relations, says Phase One was necessary to provide hospitalization and emergency care to the West Texas inmates in a facility where officers are trained to protect medical staff.

"We asked the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ) to support the upgrade of the Montford RMF to a stand-alone, community type hospital," said Laible.

Laible says the Montford Unit had offered some inpatient medical treatment and outpatient surgical procedures, but was not equipped for intensive care services. Phase One construction converted the existing physical therapy department into an ICU, emergency and operating rooms.

"With these upgraded operating rooms, emergency room and ICU, we believe this hospital is now capable of providing 95 percent of the care that was being done at UMC," said Laible. "TDCJ has been supportive of this entire action, and we feel Texas Tech can continue its contractual operations and provide the inmate the health care as required, but in a more safe environment."

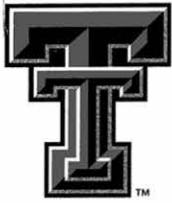
Laible credits the Lubbock legislative delegation for assisting in obtaining funding from TDCJ. "Senator Robert Duncan was most helpful with this arrangement and sponsored legislation to complete Phase Two," said Laible.

Laible added that the leadership of the Montford Unit, Warden William Stephens, and the staff were crucial in making these changes to the facility.

Phase One included adding 20 medical/surgical beds, developing an ICU, upgrading the Emergency Care Unit and the operating rooms, enhancing medical

coverage, and upgrading hospital gasses. Total cost for Phase One of this project was \$938,000.

Phase Two will include building an additional 44 bed nursing unit at the Montford campus as well as additional upgrading of the hospital support systems.

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**FIRST-EVER RED RAIDER CAMP HELD
AT THE TEXAS TECH JUNCTION CAMPUS**

For the last 76 years, Texas Tech University freshmen met for the first time at the Lubbock campus just as classes were about to begin. That all changed this year as the university held its first-ever Red Raider Camp at the Texas Tech Junction Campus July 22-24. Other camp sessions will be held until mid-August.

Approximately 500 members of the university's freshman class will travel to the Texas Hill Country for a unique transition to life as a Texas Tech student. The three-day, two-night camp is led by 32 student counselors and is structured around four components – academic engagement, leadership development, recreational activities and Texas Tech history and traditions.

Texas Tech President David Schmidly spoke to the group of 90 students that attended the first camp. "Red Raider Camp is success camp. You will be the leaders on our campus and we believe you will be among the best to graduate from Texas Tech."

Greg Elkins, associate dean of students, and Candice Troke, assistant dean of students, said Red Raider Camp is about the first-year experience, and impressing upon these students that college life is much more than what they've experienced in high school.

Campers spent time learning about life on the Texas Tech campus and were offered a variety of outdoor activities such as tubing, volleyball and hiking.

In preparation of the campers' arrival, the 411-acre campus received a facelift. Buildings were painted and the cafeteria and sports courses were renovated. "We're putting an investment in Red Raider Camp," Col. Bob Hickerson, dean of the Junction Campus and chief operating officer, said. "The town of Junction and the Lower Colorado River Authority are investing in the success of this program too."

Student Co-Directors Sarah Sims and Bryan Cole began preparation for the camp more than 16 months ago. Sims said, "Red Raider Camp is about making friends."

Ranging from small group activities to large group functions, students networked with other incoming students as well as upperclassmen. Student Government Association President John Steinmetz spoke to the students, and Masked Rider Katie Carruth and members of the Saddle Tramps were on hand for the spirit activities.

Texas Tech's Red Raider Camp was not just for students. At Camp Red, parents found programs designed for them as well. The Texas Tech Association of Parents held discussions for parents and the group traveled throughout the Hill Country while the students were enjoying separate activities.

Michael Shonrock, vice president of student affairs, said these students will be reunited throughout the year. "We're planning events to keep these students together throughout their careers at Texas Tech."

At the final event, Jim Douglass, associate vice president of the Ex-Students Association, presented each camper a key chain with a replica of the Texas Tech class ring they will earn upon graduation. Inside the ring, campers found the inscription "Strive for Honor Evermore."

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**TEXAS TECH PROFESSORS HONORED WITH
LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD**

LUBBOCK – Two Texas Tech University psychology professors were honored with a Lifetime Achievement Award from the International Network on Personal Relationships at its conference in Prescott, Ariz. Horn Professor of Psychology Clyde Hendrick, Ph.D., and Psychology Professor Susan Hendrick, Ph.D., are among the elite that were honored for their sustaining contribution to the study of personal relationships and their dedication to the Society.

This husband-and-wife team has established themselves at Texas Tech with their 17 years of commitment and research. “I believe our passion and dedication to research led to the award from the International Network on Personal Relationships,” said Clyde Hendrick. The Hendricks’ research started almost 20 years ago when they began to study the effects of love styles and sexual attitudes. In 1986, the Hendricks’ developed their Love Attitude Scale based on the work of John Alan Lee, Ph.D., a Canadian sociologist. This scale, which involves six categories of love styles, developed into a love style test that is widely used for research. The Love Attitude Scale has been translated into Chinese, Indonesian, Spanish, French, Japanese, German, Swedish, Polish and Turkish.

In addition to studying love styles and sexual attitudes, the Hendricks also study influences such as personality, self-esteem and styles of communication. The Hendricks’ have made these studies their life’s work. This commitment has grown from their belief that the yearning for a satisfying love relationship is a fundamental human need. “We believed in this work 20 years ago, and we still do,” Susan Hendrick said. “If we can help people improve the quality of their relationships, even with small changes in awareness and behavior, then we both feel we’ve made a valuable contribution.”

The International Network on Personal Relationships consists of individuals in a variety of academic disciplines who wish to advance understanding of relationship processes. This network has the purposes of promoting interdisciplinary collaboration and supporting the work of scholars. The Lifetime Achievement Award is not an annual award but one given only for remarkable performance.

“I’m pleased with the recognition that Drs. Clyde and Susan Hendrick have received for their contribution to their field,” said John Burns, Ph.D., Texas Tech University provost. “This lifetime achievement award is richly deserved.”

The department of psychology at Texas Tech includes 27 faculty organized into the divisions of counseling psychology, clinical psychology and experimental psychology. Approximately 100 psychology graduate students and about 600 undergraduates are in the department.

Texas Tech, the largest research university system in West Texas, provides education and support to approximately 25,000 students. Texas Tech is the only university system in the state with a comprehensive academic campus, law school and medical center on the same campus. The university's research programs, in areas such as wind engineering, agriculture and environmental and human health, impact the lives of all Texans.
