



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




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STADIUM SERVICES: CLIFFORD B. AND AUDREY JONES STADIUM TEXAS TECHNOLOGICAL COLLEGE

Stadium Capacity, 41,500; opened in September, 1947; Press Box and Special Option Seat Air Conditioned Booth opened in 1959.


PUBLIC TELEPHONES: Several booths are located on the ground level concourse in both east and west stands.

SAFETY PRECAUTIONS: A sizable continegent of Lubbock and Campus police officers, assisted by parking lot attendants and stadium ushers are on duty to assist in parking cars and seating fans. Your cooperation in following their directions will be beneficial to all. Aisles and concourses in the stadium are to be kept clear at all times. A carefully studied parking and traffic flow plan allows easy entry and exit from parking areas.

The Athletic Director

Physical Fitness

f I GUESS a lot of people still think athletes are born, not made—that they just grow up knowing how to hit curveballs, run pass patterns or shoot baskets. I can't speak for all the others, but it wasn't that way for me. I was fortunate enough to inherit a healthy constitution and good coordination, but I had to work for a lot of the things that made me a major leaguer.

My father, who came to this country from Poland, had an old-world regard for the healthy mind in the healthy body, and he enrolled me in an athletic club at Donora, Pennsylvania, when I was only nine. Long before I ever played for my high school team, I was an expert tumbler and could perform on the parallel bars, the rings, the horse and other gymnastics equipment.

These workouts improved my strength and timing, and I've always felt they were the reason I was able to avoid serious injury and keep playing baseball four or five years after everyone thought I should be washed up. So I know something about the importance of early fitness training, and I hope the day will come when every boy and girl can take pride in the kind of physical education program I had when I was a kid.

Many of our youngsters don't get enough exercise or play today, and you don't have to look far to see them. They're underdeveloped and uncoordinated, and some of them

look as if they were in spring training for early heart attacks or middleage spread. It's really tragic, and I think all of us have a responsibility to do something about it.

Of course, some people think kids should stay in shape the way they did 30 or 40 years ago-by walking to school, doing chores or working in the fields. Some of you can remember what it was like then. If you had



a little spare time, you rounded up a few friends and went down to the vacant lot for a game of work-up. Well, I wish it were still that easy, but I'm afraid it isn't.

Today's kids have to spend a lot more time studying and doing their homework than we did, and I don't think many of us would want to change that. They also have television and a lot of other distractions we didn't have. There's probably a housing development or a new office building on the lot where you used to play baseball or football.

I'm not saying today's kids shouldn't do the chores or walk to school. They should, but there just aren't as many chores to do or as many places to walk as there used to be. The answer is school physical fitness programs-fitness programs which will, wherever possible, provide some vigorous exercise every day for every boy and girl. All of us should see that our schools have such programs, and we should see that they put proper emphasis on physical development.

You could play certain games every day and not get in top condition. For instance, baseball requires good speed and skill, but you spend a lot of time standing around. Players don't get in shape just by playing. It takes the kind of systematic exercise you get in calisthenics or gymnastics to build strong, vigorous bodies. This is something every child—and every adult should have.

Varsity sports play an important and welcome role in our national life, but I hope the day will never come when most of us are in the stands and only a few are on the field. A nation is only a collection of individuals, and its vigor and strength depends upon the energy and drive which they bring to their daily lives.

National Football Hall of Fame Week, November 7-14

It is celebrated by the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame as a salute to amateur football throughout the country as played by the colleges and high schools of our nation.

The National Football Foundation affords an opportunity for all those believing in the principles of amateur football to gather together in a single organization.

The Foundation has pledged its resources to help develop on the playing field and in the classroom the kind of man who can face successfully the challenges of our competitive economy and to direct that economy toward defending our country from the enemies who vow to destroy us.

Furthermore, the Foundation has had an opportunity to review many studies concerned with the contributions of football players to society. We can report that studies conducted at Yale, Dartmouth, San Jose, as well as continuing studies Notre Dame, Michigan State and among the members of the Athletic Association of Western Universities on the Pacific Coast vividly show the overall contributions to University life and Society as a whole for the football players.

The Foundation views itself as the single unifying group of all amateur football seeking to be influential not through legislation but rather through communication of the problems and benefits of the game.

Through its 98 chapters in each of the 50 states and in Japan, the Foundation has provided a rallying point for over 5,000 concerned adults interested in the growth of football.

The Foundation recognizes excellence on the gridiron and The Foundation recognizes excellence on the gridiron and in the classroom in two of its most popular programs. Annually the Foundation honors the eight outstanding scholar-athletes in college football who have also demonstrated campus leadership in other extracurricular activities. Recipients of these awards, based on the eight districts of the NCAA, receive a \$500 scholarship to help defray the first year of graduate study through the generosity of Earl H. Blaik who makes this contribution from his regular newspaper articles on amateur football during the fall season

during the tall season.

In addition, each of the local chapters annually honors the outstanding scholar-athletes in the high schools in their area. Some chapters select the outstanding scholar-athlete in the entire area, other chapters cite outstanding high school scholarathletes from several schools or conferences

The local chapters of the National Football Foundation are cognizant of contributions to the game of football made

by civic minded officials in each community. For these leaders special awards are made at the annual awards dinners.

Recently the Football Foundation announced plans for a nationwide drive for funds to build the Football Hall of Fame on the site of the first college football game in 1859 between

Rutgers and Princeton at New Brunswick.

This beautiful Hall of Fame, designed by famed architect Edward Durell Stone, will be amateur football's salute to those who have helped make this game the intregating symbol about which are gathered the loyalties of students, faculty, alumni

and friends of the college.
Since 1954 one hundred and seventy-three men have been selected for membership in the National Football Foundation's

Hall of Fame.

On December 8 the Foundation will award its Gold Medal of Achievement to Donold B. Lourie, Princeton '22, and currently chairman of the board of Quaker Oats. Previous winners of the Gold Medal include the late General Douglas A. MacArthur, Dwight D. Eisenhower, the late Herbert C. Hoover, the

Arthur, Dwight D. Eisenhower, the late Herbert C. Hoover, the late President John F. Kennedy, Supreme Court Justice Byron White, Amos A. Stagg and Roger Blough, Chairman of the Board of the U.S. Steel Company.

Not only will the Hall of Fame honor the men who have been selected on the basis of their accomplishments on the field and their contributions to Society following graduation, but it will also feature the Gold Medal Award winners along with a provided bright well of champions, a bright wall by the with a special brick wall of champions—a brick wall built to honor those championship high school teams desiring to have their records enshrined at the Hall of Fame.

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



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

Improved Buffaloes Looking For Fifth Win

West Texas State brings a 4-3 record into tonight's game, considerably better than had been predicted for the Buffaloes at the start of the season.

After a heartbreaking 16-14 loss to Ohio in the season's opener, the Buffs were trounced by Arizona State University, 34-8.

However, the West Texas State defense turned in a stellar performance and they defeated Texas Western 14-0. The Miners were halted three times inside the Buffaloes' 10-yard line. Fullback Russell Mundy returned to action in this game, after having missed the Arizona State contest with a knee injury, but senior center Charley Daves, a two-year letterman from Mineral Wells, was carried from the field and has not played since.

In their first road game of the year, Joe Kerbel's crew came from behind to defeat North Texas State 21-13. It was the first win ever for the Buffs at Denton. The Buffaloes scored three times in a seven-minute span in the second half to erase a 7-0 Eagle lead.

Returning home, WTSU was routed 41-0 by Memphis State. Quarterback Billy Fletcher made 236 yards total offense against the Buffs, who threatened twice, but were never able to dent the Tigers' end zone. The 36 pass attempts were the most thrown in more than 25 years by a West Texas State team.

After coming from behind, WTSU scored with less than two minutes remaining in the first half to take a slim

7-6 lead to the dressing room against Trinity. However, the Maroon and White scored twice within the first two minutes of the fourth period to ice the game. It was the first start of the year for Don Dennis, the "Preacher Man" of the Buffs.

Last week's victory over San Jose State, a highly rated Pacific Coast independent, made it four wins in the last five starts. The Spartans held a narrow 7-6 lead at the half when Roy Armentrout missed his first conversion kick in nine attempts this year. However, an excellent defensive play by Doc Rowell kept San Jose State from making an important first down with three minutes left in the third quarter. Tony Waters took the ensuing punt and raced 94 yards down the right sideline for the lead touchdown, thereby eclipsing a 10-year-old school record for the longest punt return, 91 yards by Del Tuggle in 1954.


After the ensuing kickoff resulted in a touchback, San Jose was again forced to punt on a fourth-and-13 situation and Butch Walterscheid blocked the kick and pursued the ball into the end zone where he fell on it for a touchdown with 11 seconds left in the third quarter, making the score 18-7


Don Dennis has been the offensive spark for the Buffaloes since his first starting opportunity two weeks ago. The Preacher Man has 120 yards in his two starts, an average of five yards per carry. He has caught four passes for 67 yards and two touchdowns. His 9.7 speed gives WTSU the outside threat so badly needed. Russell Mundy remains the leading ball carrier with 421 yards, but Dennis' 4.52 average for the season is the team's best.
