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

RELIGIOUS ORGANIZATIONS

The COMMITTEE ON STUDENT RELIGIOUS LIFE, appointed by the President of the College, is responsible for considering and advising concerning matters of student religious welfare. Faculty members appointed for the scholastic year, 1943-44 are A. J. Bahm, O. A. St.Clair, Ella Mae Lyle, Agnes True, Bessie League, Edna Houghton.

The STUDENT CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION (YMCA-YWCA) is directed by a Board of Directors made up of college faculty members and town people. Current members are H. G. Gantz, President, Mary W. Membership in the Student Christian Association is open to all students regardless of other religious affiliation.

The STUDENT RELIGIOUS COUNCIL is composed of two students representatives from each of the churches and from the Student Christian Association, one adult student leader from each church and the Student Christian Association, members of the Committee on Student Religious Life, and the pastors. The purpose of the Student Religious Council is "to serve as a discussion group to consider problems and opportunities of a religious nature among students; to serve as far as possible in the capacity of a coordinator of religious activities of students; to present plans and methods of securing the largest possible good from religious sources; to function as a clearing house for various suggestions to improve the religious life of the city." Meetings of the Student Religious Council occur regularly on the second Thursday of each month from September through May, Usually supper is served to members prior to devotional and business sessions. Each of several churches takes turn in providing the meeting place. On the campus, the college provides an office, Library Room 17, for the Student Christian Association (YMCA-YWCA) and makes available the Gymnasium and classrooms for special meetings. The Auditorium of the new Agricultural Building promises to be a more desirable place for occasional meetings.

Efforts toward meeting long-felt needs for more adequate on-campus religious facilities are under the direction of the CHAPEL COMMITTEE. Members of this Committee are Mrs. Wm. Dingus, Jonnie McCrery Michie, Martye Poindexter, A. W. Young, F. A. Kleinschmidt. Architectural plans have been drawn and a Texas Technological College Chapel Fund has been established to receive donations.

Religious Activities

In addition to the numerous regular Sunday and weekly services in churches and student halls and the monthly meetings of the Student Religious Council, several all-college religious events stand out.

SPECIAL SERMON SUNDAY. All Lubbock churches serving college students presented special sermons for students on Sunday, Sept. 19, 1943.

CHURCH OPEN HOUSE. All Lubbock churches, or their college student organizations, held open house for students on Friday, Sept. 24, 1943.

RELIGIOUS EMPHASIS WEEK. Most outstanding religious event was the Fourth Annual Religious Emphasis Week, Nov. 29 to Dec. 5, 1943, with an all-college convocation at 10 o'clock Monday and vesper talks every evening. Dr. Sam Joekel, Professor of Bible in Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary, was the speaker. The Student Religious Council is regularly responsible for the planning, management and financing of Religious Emphasis Week.

"THE SEVEN LAST WORDS OF CHRIST." The Tenth Annual presentation of this religious oratorio is scheduled for April 4, 1944, at 8 p.m., under the direction of Julien Paul Blitz.

EASTER SUNRISE SERVICE. The Eighteenth Annual Easter Sunrise Service is to be held April 9, 1944, in the cloisters on the south side of the Administration Building.

BACCALAUREATE SERVICE. The concluding religious service for graduating seniors is scheduled to be held on May 14, 1944.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Religious educational services of two sorts are available to Texas Technological College students.

Church school classes and teachers are provided specifically for college students by many churches.

Classes in religious education, for which college credit may be received, are offered by the college through its Department of Bible and Religious Education. Following a policy common in state-supported schools, the college allows credit for such instruction as is supported by private funds and is duly accredited under the standards and other regulations of the college. During the current year, courses in Hebrew History, New Testament History, the Prophets, and Contemporary Religious Problems, were offered by Cecil Matthews, supported by the Wesley Foundation, the Methodist Student Movement of Texas and the Northwest Texas Conference. A course in Philosophy of Religion is offered in the Department of Philosophy and Sociology.
